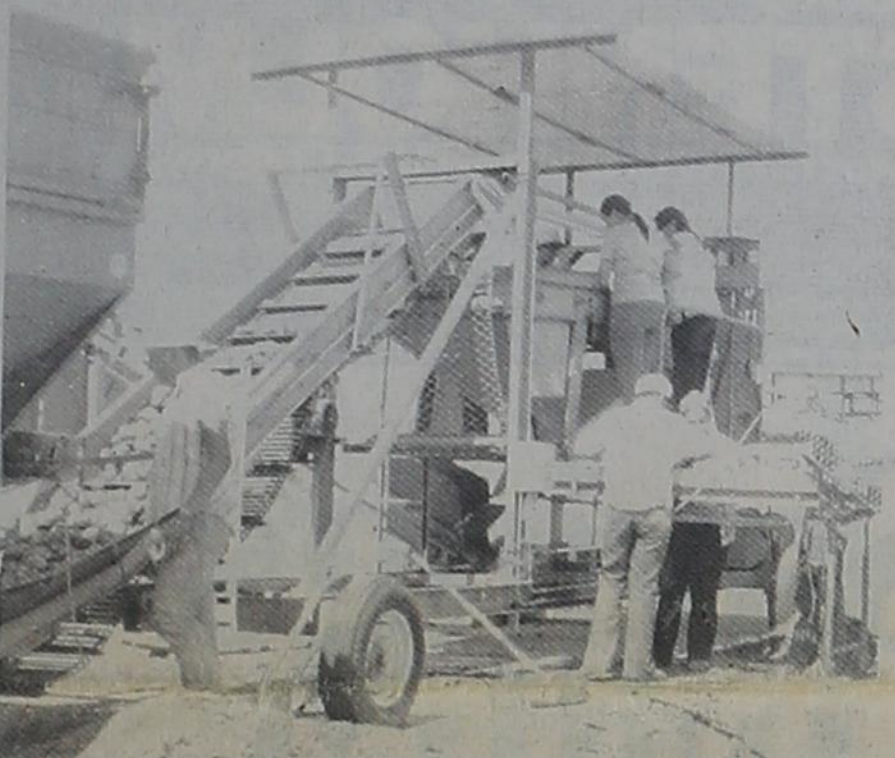

## Potato Harvest Gets Underway In Munday



TABLE stock potatoes are being worked at the Colville and Wilson sheds this week. They are mechanically dug, picked up by hand and culled when they reach the shed in Munday. All four growers and shippers have started their operations this week.



CHIPPERS are being loaded on trucks at Kiser and Sons operations Monday morning. All of these potatoes are mechanically harvested and processed for shipment by truck.

Harvesting equipment pulled into the first field of the 1978 potato crop Thursday, June 8th. Munday Vegetable Growers Inc. started with the first load of taters being brought to the sheds grown by Chalmer Hobert on the Voss place.

Munday Vegetable Growers Inc. have approximately 350 acres seeded and to be processed by the firm. Five growers have contracted this years crop to chipper firms. The yield is about 180 bags to the acre, according to Gene Thompson, who is in charge of processing.

Along with the Vegetable Growers, Munday has three other growers this year. B. E. Smith and Sons, operated by James Smith and Colville-Wilson are two of the other growers who have been raising potatoes and are known quite well in the potato industry. New to the area as a shipper, but not as a grower, is the firm of Kiser and Sons.

Freddie Kiser, in association with his son Danny, has grown potatoes in the past in the Munday area. Another son Steve, joined them this year and went into a business venture of processing the potatoes they raise. They purchased the old cotton compress and warehouse property south of the railroad and installed their processing equipment. This year the firm has 280 acres of chippers all contracted. They started digging Saturday, June 10. Prospects look good in the area of yield and quality.

B. E. Smith and Sons will begin their harvesting Wednesday of this week. James has 220 acres of Red LaSodas. The quality looks excellent and the yield will be determined after harvesting begins. Price wise, trucks loads of the table potatoes, will bring approximately ten dollars on the market today, Monday, June 12.

Jack Colville of Colville-Wilson began operations Sunday, June 11 on the 265 acres of red potatoes.

## Council Approves Oil And Gas Lease

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas, met June 6, 1978, at 6:30 p.m. at the Munday City Hall in special session.

Members present: Mayor Dale Selzer and Aldermen Von Marr, Donald Hobert, Ray Lynn Hardin, M. M. Booe and Jessie Andrade.

Members absent: None. Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order. Donald Hobert led in prayer at his request.

Mr. Robert E. Rankin met with the City Council to discuss on oil lease proposal. Discussion. After discussion Marr moved that lots 1,2,3,4 Block 50, Lee be leased to Mr. Robert E. Rankin for a 3 year term for oil and gas lease for \$15.00 provided no well is to be drilled on the tract. Hobert seconded. All members voted in favor.

Mr. Rankin is also to provide assurances in regard to drilling adjacent to or inside the City in writing prior to commencing drilling operations. These assurances will provide protection for the water supply, property owners, children playing in the area, fencing and clean quiet operation with electric motors if oil is found, etc.

After examination of a proposed street paving contract as prepared, Marr moved that the City adver-

tise for bids to seal coat app. 28,913 square yards of City streets as set out on a map in the contract documents and specifications. Publication is to be on Thursday, June 8, 1978 in the Munday Courier briefly setting out the project. Bids are to be opened on Friday, June 23, 1978 at 1:30 p.m. at the Munday City Hall. The Council discussed possible use of 5A rock with 98-100 retention on a #10 sieve. The motion also recommends acceptance of this or standard Class B, Type A rock or equal. The City Administrator is instructed to purchase necessary patching materials and prepare and clean the streets to be sealed and raise valves and manholes as soon as workload permits. Hardin seconded the motion, carried with all members voting for.

Hobert moved the City Administrator be authorized to pay app. 3 1/2 hours Sunday work only at the pool concession stand at \$2.20 per hour, this to be done to provide two life-guards on duty when pool use is extremely heavy. Marr seconded. All for. Meeting adjourned with unanimous approval.

## Memorial Building Dedicated At Benjamin

The dedication of the Memorial Building in Benjamin was held on Saturday, June 10, during the 1978 homecoming during which 379 ex-students registered.

At four o'clock Rev. James Patterson, pastor of the Knox City and Benjamin Methodist Churches, lead in the invocation. Kenneth Roberts, superintendent of the Benjamin schools, served as master of ceremonies during the dedication services.

After welcoming the guests Roberts stated, "It has taken the combined efforts of a lot of people and each one of you has contributed your part in the project of building this fine Memorial Building. Looking over the list of donors there is a large number with some donating very heavily. This building would not have been possible if it were not for your contributions. Others contributed many hours of labor and skills in the erection of this fine building to the community. This is just as valuable as money, maybe more so, because it's hard to get those things done if you do have the money. If it hadn't been for each and everyone of you doing your part this dream could not have been a reality."

Roberts commented, "If I had to make a speech about the dedication I would entitle it 'The Impossible Dream'." The dream he was referring to was that of Jim Bisbee of Benjamin. "People of Benjamin who had faith in Jim's dream signed up and built the Memorial Building.

People living in Benjamin, or associated with the city, know you can't raise \$45,000

or \$50,000 for a building of this nature in Benjamin, but they did it. A dream with

dedication and determination built this and here you are enjoying it."

Roberts next introduced Bobby D. Burnett, County Attorney, who has served as legal council for the association. Burnett commented on the significance this addition would make in the community. "It is proof you are looking ahead. As the people in the urban areas look to the smaller towns to raise their families and get away from social and political problems, Benjamin is one of the ideal places. With the historic background of this city, there is no reason for this not to be a place to come to and not from." In closing Burnett stated, "Jim Bisbee and all the others who worked and labored to make this building possible should be commended for a job well done. The time, money and efforts are clear indicators that a spirit of achievement and progress exists in

Congressman Omar Bureson announces the approval of a \$36,577 Community Services Administration grant to the Community Action Program, Inc., with headquarters at Abilene. The counties served are

The program will weatherize 38 houses of eligible low-income homeowners, thus lowering their consumption of scarce energy supplies.

The effective date of the program is June 1, 1978 and it will run for twelve months.

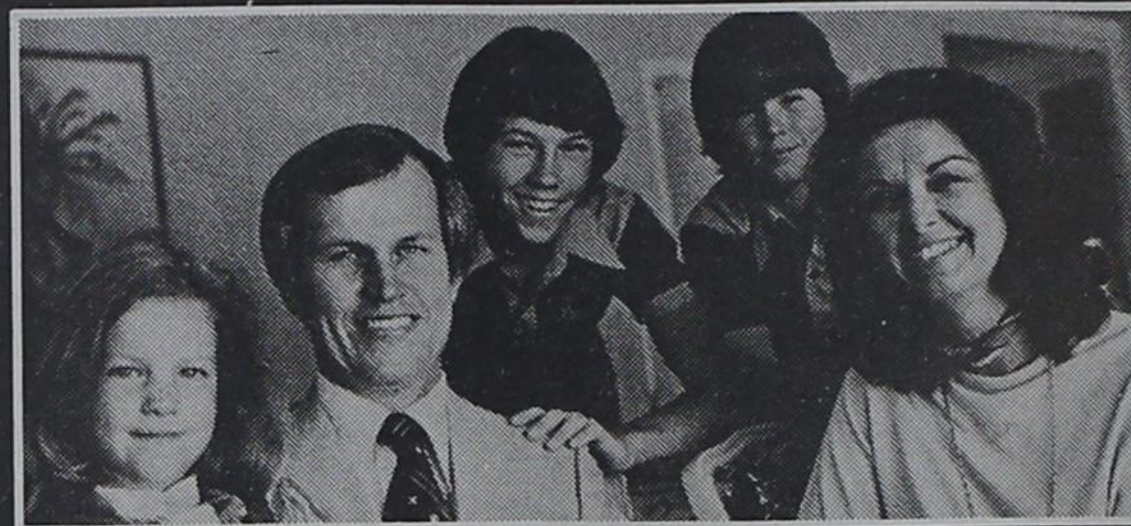

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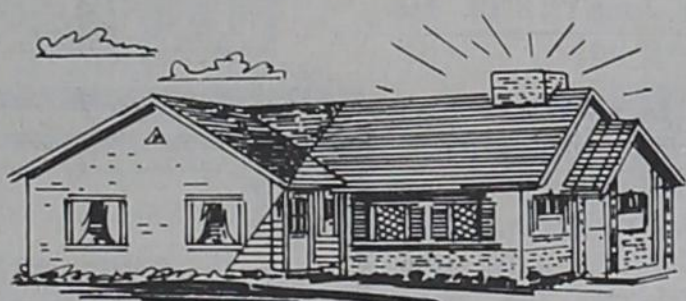

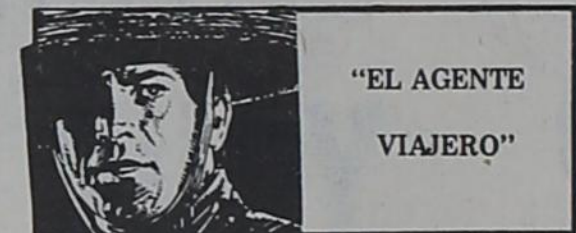

Don't skimp on the potash if you want top yielding soybeans. That's the advice of Cliff Spies, Purdue University agronomist. "Potassium is the element soybeans most frequently run short of while there is a tendency to use potash and phosphate in the same amounts. Soybeans remove more potash than phosphate." Soil pH is not an important limiting factor for soybean yields. Spies says that if pH is adequate for corn, it's generally adequate for soybeans. University of Illinois agronomists say they see little need for micronutrients or nitrogen fertilization for soybeans. University of Illinois agronomists feel, "broadcast application of soybean fertilizer usually is sufficient. However, if the phosphate level is very low, benefit may be derived from placing some in the row." Using both soil test and plant analysis will show you what you need for high yielding soybeans.
