As faces out of the past appeared at the scene many were recognized as being classmates of the years gone by, but names were somehow momentarily forgotten. Former football players and fans enjoyed viewing the older Moguls during the showing of old films.

The general assembly program began at 2 p.m. in the auditorium. Ex-students and guests were entertained by a Combo of the Big Purple Cloud Band. Providing the music were: Jerry Frazier, band director and saxophone player; Junior Andrade, drums; Kelly Fisher, guitar; Sharon Hendrix, saxophone; Robin Elliott, piano and Nikki Urbanczyk, trumpet.

Charles Baker, master of ceremonies, welcomed the ex-students and former teachers to the largest

homecoming ever had at MHS.

John Phillips, accompanied by Sandy (Brown) King on the piano, led the audience in songs. The group sang Get Together Song, America The Beautiful and the School Song.

Ex-students were registered from Arizona, Arkansas, Tennessee, Colorado, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and New Jersey. Hulen Montgomery of the class of 44 was recognized as the ex who traveled the farthest distance. Hulen lives in Morristown, N. J.

Ed Whittemore of the class of 1911 was the oldest graduate in attendance. Other graduates recognized were: Kimmie Caughran, 1912; Lucille Stodghill, 1920 and Myrtle Phillips, 1920.

The class of 44 was honored for having the most exes present. Twenty-one members of the class registered for the homecoming.

James Amerson, president of the 78 committee, expressed his thanks and appreciation to the other members of the homecoming committee and everyone who helped make this the Best One Ever. Moguls Take District 7-A Lead By Defeating Knox City 28-20

A large crowd of fans and spectators ventured into the Mogul country Saturday, some for homecoming festivities, to witness the annual rivalry between the Munday Moguls and the Knox City Greyhounds. This years contest was for the lead in District 7-A and as the game ended the Moguls owned sole possession of the District crown with three games left in the season.

The first half score was not what Mogul supporters had hoped for 20-7 in favor of the Greyhounds, but as the game ended the scoreboard showed Munday 28 and Knox City 20.

A proud defense by the Greyhounds held the Moguls to 68 total yards in the first half. Their offensive ran up a massive 154 yards rushing to 59 passing in taking the first half lead.

As the dust settled at the end of the game the Moguls

defensive had held the Greyhounds to a total of 56 yards in the second half and no scores. Defensive plays by Johnny Melton, Phil Johnson and Isom Murray forced key turnovers in the second half. Melton recovered two fumbles, one for a touchdown after a 40 yard punt by Larry Welch which put the ball on the Greyhounds 1 yard line. Johnson recovered a fumble and Murray stopped a drive with a pass interception. Defensively and offensively the team effort produced a win for the Moguls.

The Moguls being the leader in District 7-A has by no means secured the District crown. They will face the Crowell Wildcats at Crowell this Friday, Friday, November 3rd on their home field they will face a very tough team from Haskell, the Indians. Haskell has lost only to Knox City by a score of 6-3 and have been rated above the Moguls all year long. The last opponent the Moguls will face will be the Aspermont Hornets.

Knox City won the toss at the beginning of the game and after the kickoff marched 60 yards to score the first TD of the game with 4:43 left in the first quarter. Jimmy Rushing went in from the one yard line and Domingo Garcia kicked the PAT.

On the ensuing kickoff the Greyhounds were offside and were forced to kick again. Craig Paylor returned the kick 7 yards to the 25. Moving the ball to the Greyhounds 45, Larry Welch punted on fourth and 4 to the 14.

The Greyhounds moved the pigskin to the 50 as the second quarter began and then back Joe Gutierrez romped 50 yards around

right end for the six pointer. Garcia's kick was off and the score was 13-0 in favor of the Greyhounds.

Isom Murray returned the kickoff 18 yards to the 28. After advancing to the KC 47, Routon dropped back to pass and was sacked for a 12 yard loss to the 41. Welch booted a 48 yarder to the 11 with a 3 yard return by the Greyhounds.

The Moguls stopped the Greyhounds on the KC 22 and Jimmy Rushing punted to the Munday 43. On 4th and 8 Welch hit a 37 yard punt into the end zone.

Knox City drew a five yard penalty for delay of game and started on their 17. The Moguls defensive held and KC was forced to punt from the 17. Paylor took the punt and returned it to the 42.

Otis Adams went off right tackle for 8 and then a personal foul gave Munday a first and ten on the 15. Murray picked up 2, Routon 5 and Adams 1 to put the ball on the 1 with first and goal. Dockins went in from the one with 2:46 left in the half. Welch added the PAT and the score was Munday 7,

Knox City 13.

The Greyhounds moved the ball to the 31 before they were forced to punt on 4th and 7. Paylor signaled a fair catch on his 46.

Munday was on the 42 with first and ten when Greyhound David Counts recovered a Mogul fumble

quickly submitted the name
and M. L. Cooke seconded it.
The classes approved the
mascot and Munday's foot-
ball team was officially
named the Moguls.

Homer played football in
the years of 24 and 25 and
now lives at Tyler. He
retired in 1970 from the city
of Riverside, California.

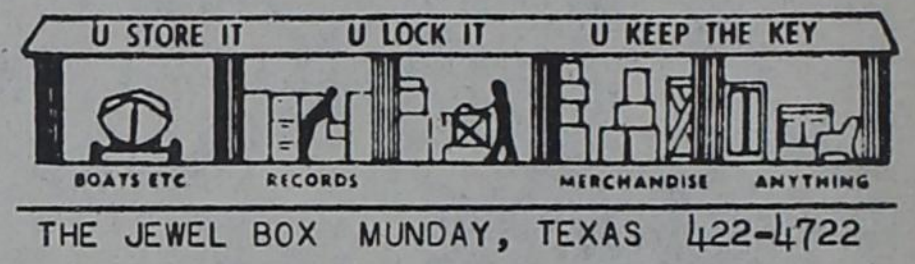

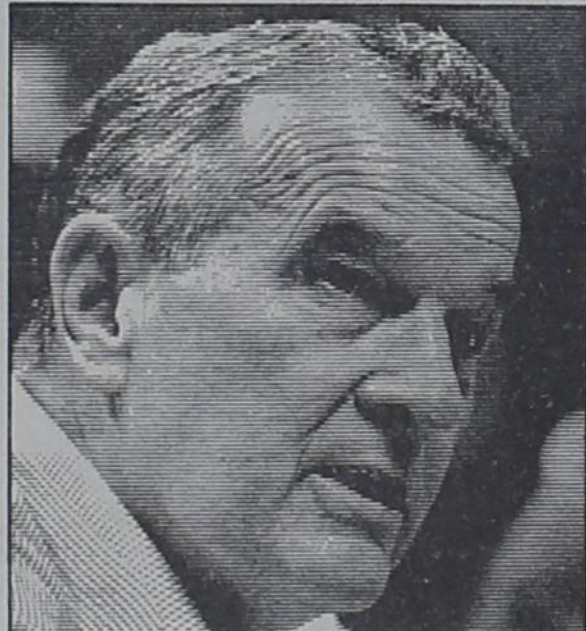

Passes from quarterback Dwayne Johnson to David Benson and Counts moved the ball to the Mogul 7 yard line. On third and three Johnson threw a TD pass to Rushing with no time left in the second quarter. The kick by Garcia made the score 20-7. On the pass from Johnson to Counts in this series it appeared Doug Michalik had intercepted the ball but was ruled to be Knox City's by the officials as Counts came up with the ball after the tackle.

Murray ran the kickoff back 22 yards to the 42 as the second half began. Munday moved the ball to the Knox City 41 and Welch punted on fourth down to the 1 yard line of K. C. On the next play by the Greyhounds, guard Johnny Melton recovered a Greyhound fumble in the end zone for the 6 pointer. Welch added the one point PAT. Rick Gonzales put Knox City on the 25 with a 10 yard return. Moving the ball to the 45, Rushing punted to the 33.

Again for the second time in the game Rounton was sacked in the backfield for a loss. On 4th and 21 Welch punted to the 49.

Knox City ran two plays before their second fumble of the night was recovered by Mogul Phil Johnson on the 38 of Munday. A pass to Welch netted 7 yards and Murray and Dockins carried

the ball to the 45 of KC. Rounton hit Michalik for 16 yards, Murray and Dockins carried for 15 and Rounton to Welch for 14 gave the Moguls another TD. Welch hit the PAT and Munday took the lead 21 to 20.

The Greyhounds were penalized for clipping on the run back and started from their 6 yard line. Into the fourth quarter Knox City was forced to punt and Michalik returned the ball 29 yards to the Greyhounds 26.

Dockins, Murray and Rounton moved the ball to the 16 and Welch caught a pass down to the six. Rounton faked to Adams and went off left end for the score with 9:01 left in the game. Welch added his fourth PAT for the game making the score 28-20 where it remained the rest of the game.

Knox City was assessed a personal foul to be taken on the kickoff. Herring kicked off from the KC 45 and the ball went into the end zone for a touch back. The Greyhounds moved the ball to the 21 and punted on fourth down to the 43 of Munday.

The Hounds held Munday on third and Welch punted on fourth down. The ball went into the end zone for another touch back.

Johnson completed a pass to David Benson and the next play Melton recovered his second fumble on the 23.

The Moguls moved the ball to the 8 and then lost 7 yards to the fifteen where a field goal attempt by Welch

was wide left.

Play was resumed on the 20 after the failed field goal. Knox City moved the ball to the 25 and on the next play Murray picked off a Johnson pass on the 36.

Munday gained a yard in three plays and took a delay of game penalty running the clock down to 27 seconds. Welch punted to the 4.

Knox City threw two incomplete passes before the third one was completed on the 15 to Ricky Gonzales as the clock ran out and the game ended.

Smith Named President Of Knox County Farm Bureau

Larry Smith of Munday was elected president of the Knox County Farm Bureau at their 3rd annual meeting Monday night at the Munday High School. Other officers elected were: O. L. Patterson Jr. of Benjamin, vice-president and Charles Griffith of Benjamin, secretary-treasurer.

Directors were elected to fill six places. Place 1 was won by Boyd Lynn Meers. He was opposed by Buddy Mayo of Goree. Elected for place 2 was Leo Beason of Knox City. His opponent was Don Hawkins of Knox City.

E. D. Welch of Gilliland was elected to place 3. Dwight Burgess of Gilliland was his opponent. Spike Bryan won over Dan Offutt for place 4. Both men are from Munday.

O. L. Patterson Jr., place 5 and Louis Baty, place 6 won, running unopposed.

Eight resolutions were adopted by the members present. The Knox County Farm Bureau supports the

November amendment to the constitution on tax relief and is against an ad valorem tax method to support public schools.

The bureau wants a law to halt deficit spending.

Members voted to support the grazing of small grain set-aside acres for full production.

A 30 percent set-aside for grain sorghum to decrease the surplus and thereby increase prices was the fourth resolution.

In the fifth resolution the county bureau supports the Texas Department of Agriculture to check natural gas meters for quality and quantity. Also pertaining to natural gas the sixth resolution submitted supports that agriculture should have the right to appeal a rate increase by the natural gas industry.

The green card grading systems was supported by the farmers. The resolution was that the green card grading system being the first grading, should

stay with the bale of cotton all the way to its final destination to prevent damage to lint caused by repeated gradings.

The final resolution requests and urges that all regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration be fully reviewed and researched for effects to agriculture before they are implemented.

The resolutions were presented to the members by Larry Smith.

These resolutions will be submitted at the State Convention in November in Dallas.

A plaque was to be presented to Omar Cure but due to an illness suffered recently he was unable to attend. The plaque will be presented at the next directors meeting. Cure has resigned as Knox County Farm Bureau president due to two heart attacks in three years.

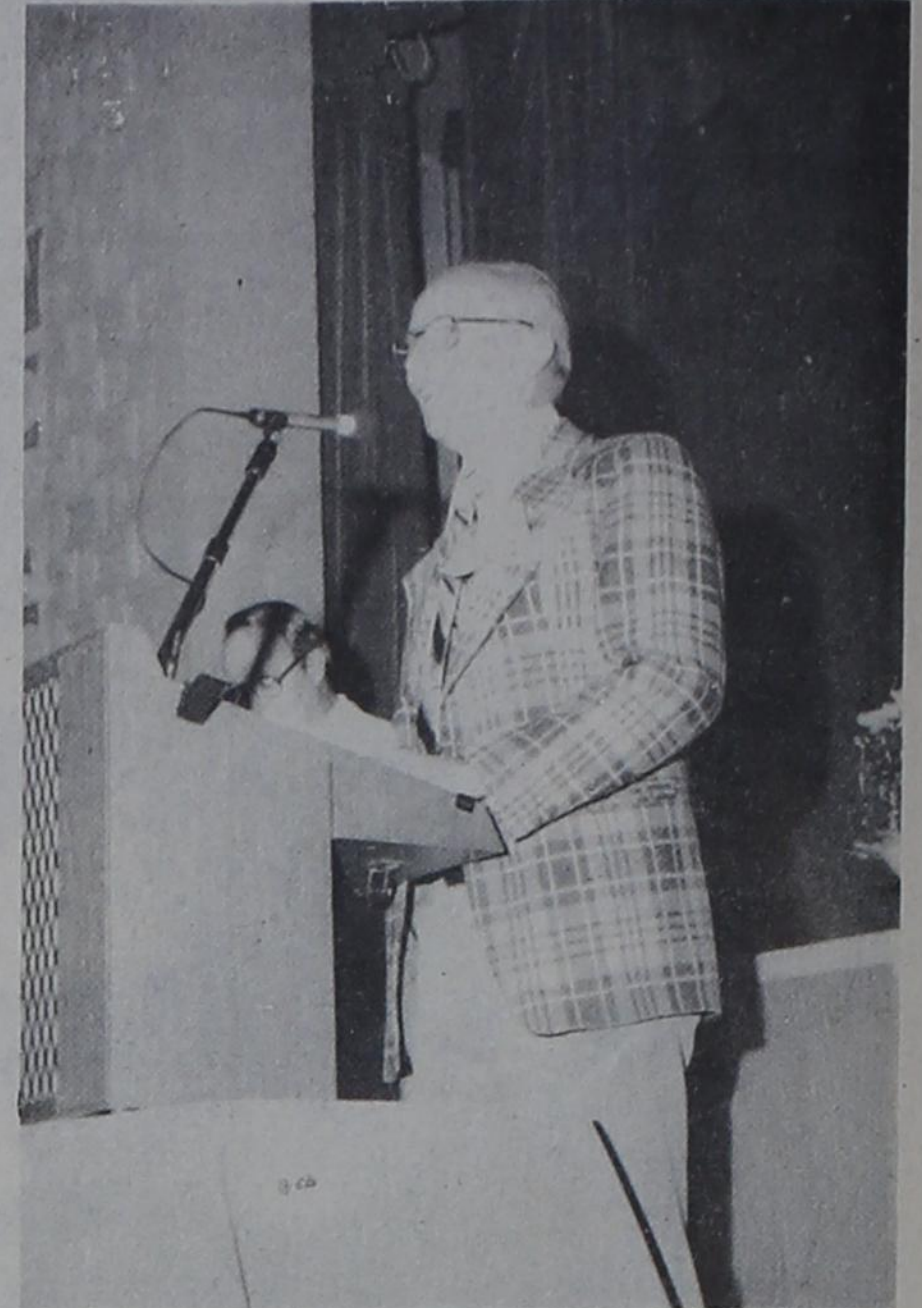
Important Rules For Living

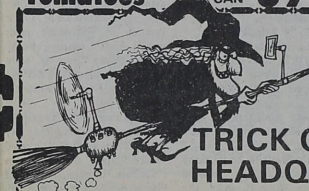

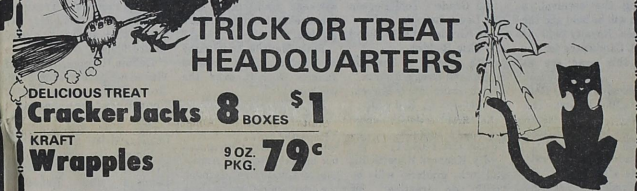

Stenholm Caravan To Visit Munday

A bus caravan loaded with supporters of Charles Stenholm for Congress will visit Knox City and Munday Tuesday, Oct. 31. The bus will be met by local Stenholm volunteers when it arrives in each town. The visit has been arranged by Bruce Campbell of Knox City, area coordinator; Stacy Angle of Knox City and Charles Baker of Munday, Knox County Coordinators for Stenholm. The Caravan is due in Knox City at 1:50 p.m. and Munday at 2:20.

Stenholm and his wife Cindy will accompany the group of volunteers meeting the people, answering questions and passing out campaign literature concerning Stenholm. Stenholm is the Democratic nominee for the 17th Congressional District.

Stenholm, a farmer-businessman from Stamford, won the Democratic nomina-

tion in a landslide, two to one victory in the June 3 runoff. He is seeking the post being vacated by the retiring, veteran legislator Omar Bursleson. Bursleson has endorsed Stenholm as "his successor" on numerous occasions.

Stenholm, 39, has based his campaign on seven major issues facing America: inflation, agriculture, paperwork, energy, free enterprise and defense. "The direction of our country must be changed," states Stenholm.

"Government spending must be reduced. Taxes must be cut substantially to provide private investment capital. The Federal budget must be balanced," Stenholm has repeatedly told his followers.

Speakers of agriculture, Stenholm states, "The most critical problem facing agriculture today is low farm prices received vs. high cost

of production. Supply management and improved marketing are vital to a profitable agriculture."

"Government 'red-tape' will cost the American public over \$100 billion in 1978. Government bureaucracy that restricts or hinders private initiative must be eliminated."

"We must deregulate domestic oil and gas production and support development of non-depletable resources such as solar energy for our future needs," Stenholm says on energy.

"Freedom for individuals to succeed or fail by their own efforts must be preserved," comments Stenholm, a strong believer in the free enterprise system. "Competition is healthy for our country and must be encouraged. Profit is not a dirty word in my vocabulary," he states.

Taking a stand on our Nation's defense, he says, "If

we do not maintain our position as Number One in military strength, all other problems become secondary. We must maintain a strong defense."

Stenholm, the father of three, attended Tarleton State Junior College and received his M. S. in agricultural education from Texas Tech University. He has taught vocational agriculture, served as the executive officer of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, general manager of Stamford Electric Cooperative and is a director of the First National Bank of Stamford.

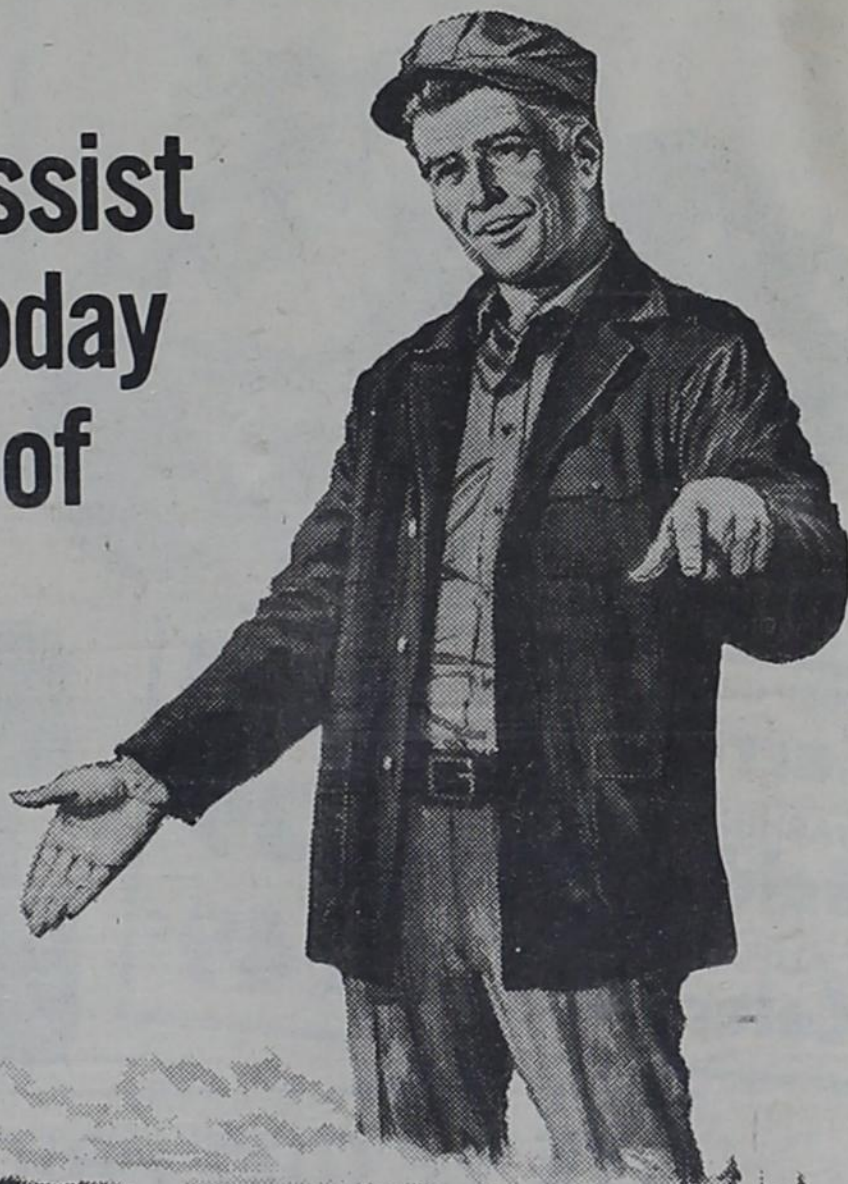

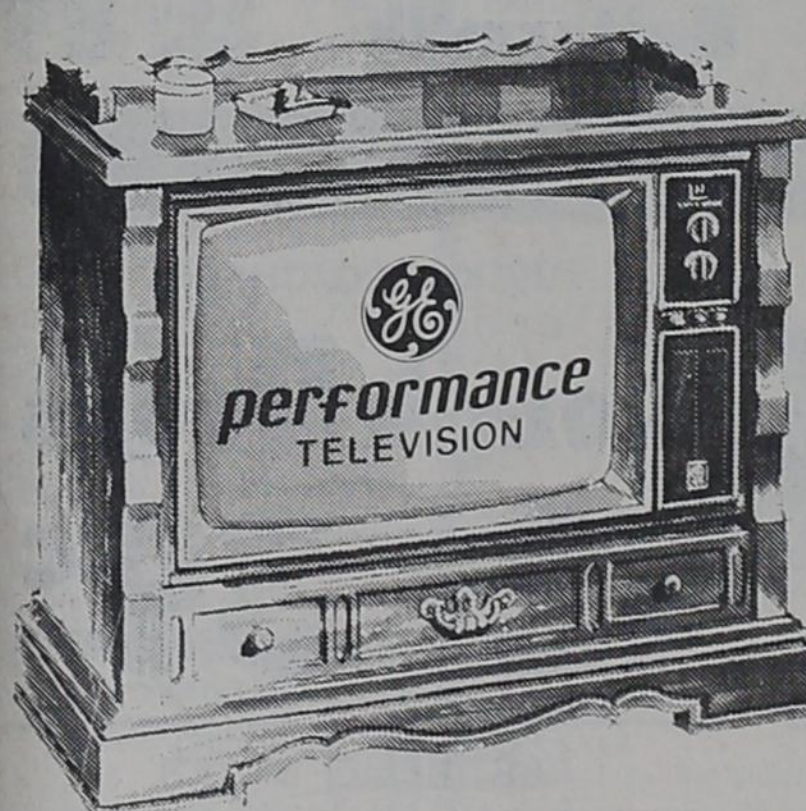

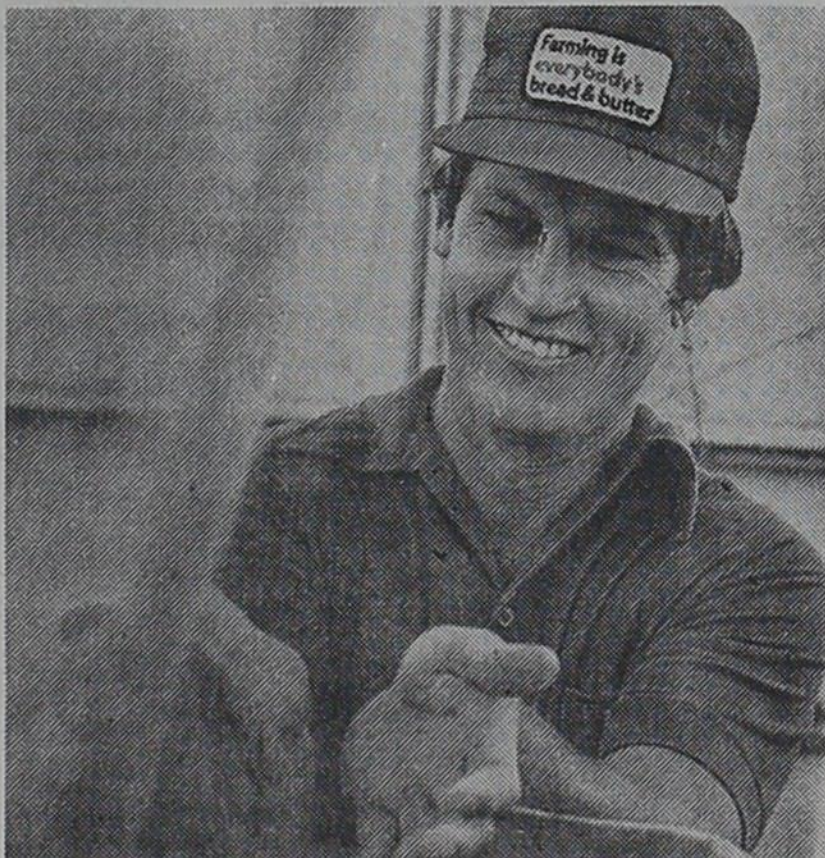

Agency Included In The United Fund Campaign

NORCENTEX COUNCIL OF GIRL SCOUTS

The purpose of girl scouts is to provide an opportunity for girls to participate in a meaningful program of informal education toward the end of creative and responsible citizenship. The girl scout program is carried out by adult volunteers of the community with the aid of a paid staff and of a national organization.

To aid the leader in each community is a volunteer service team to provide ideas and methods, and a Council Field Advisor who gives needed help with training materials and any other information concerning policies and procedures.

This past year, the Munday Troops attended a 'Do-It-Yourself' meeting in Quanah; participated in the cookie sale; held the Father-Daughter Banquet; the Cadette Troop attended a wider opportunity camp-out at Ft. Belknap, and were involved in the Christmas Parade.

Tena Josselet was one of 8 girls chosen for a Wider Opportunity in Hawaii. She was chosen from over 800 applicants. This past year, the Munday Girl Scouts had a membership of 44 girls and 10 adult volunteers. The expenditures of the girl's expense provided by her family includes National dues, uniform, handbook, badges, weekly troop dues and day-camp dues. The troop does receive a percentage of the cookie sale money. The money raised by the United Fund is returned in services primarily through training, program development and council events. The money raised last year helped send Tena Josselet to Hawaii, paid for books for troops and staff training once a month, phone calls to NorCent Council, training of leaders, (example - camping).

The NorCent Council of Girl Scouts requested \$800.00. The United Fund Budget and Admissions Committee approved \$500.00 all of which goes to the Council in addition to the fact that only 9% of the cookie sale is kept locally, with 91% going for Council expenditures.

Munday United Fund.. BICENTENNIAL PROJECT
The Bicentennial Project was begun in 1976 for the purpose of building a tourist park for traveling vans as well as for local citizens. The park will be located on Highway 277 north of the Rea Pump Company. It is hoped that eventually a museum will be included at this site at the rear of the park area. The project is to be developed in stages as the money is raised. The site for the park has been donated.

The initial work on the park will consist of providing parking area for vehicles, water hydrants, two barbecue pits and two picnic tables. The Munday FFA is donating their labor in building the shelters and tables. Posts and shrubs are

also donated. Construction is to begin within the next few weeks.

Stage two is projected to include additional picnic areas, rest rooms and a walkway to the museum site. A house of historic significance has been donated for the museum. The expense of moving the house, a new foundation, wiring and plumbing is an expensive item, although the primary work must be completed first.

Stage three includes providing a dump station for travel trailers at the back of the park and fencing of the entire area.

The Bicentennial Project Committee requested \$500.00 and was approved for that amount by the United Fund Board of Directors.

Munday United Fund.. NORTHWEST TEXAS COUNCIL OF BOY SCOUTS

The Boy Scout program is designed to build generations of youth to take on responsibility and to become leaders. Last year, of 189 boys available in the Munday area, only 60 were in the scouting program. The Northwest Texas Council provides service to sponsors and leaders with training and materials. The Council operates two camps which are open the year around. There were eight boys from Munday who went to summer camp last year.

Of the entire budget of the Northwest Texas Council of Boy Scouts, 50% is raised by United Funds and 50% by sustaining membership drives since most United Funds do not raise the total amount requested. The Council requested \$2,991.00 from the Munday United Fund. The amount is based upon the number of available youth in Munday at a cost of \$15.83 per youth.

The Munday United Fund Budget and Admissions Committee felt this was an unrealistic amount as only 60 boys were served by the Council last year. The Committee and Board of Directors allocated \$300.00 to the Northwest Texas Council because they have already had a sustaining membership drive in Munday this year.

MUNDAY BASEBALL LEAGUE, INC.

The Munday Baseball League, Inc. operates a baseball program for boys and girls of Munday and Goree. Last year, there were four Little League teams and four Pee-Wee teams with approximately 120 young people involved. The money allocated from the United Fund pays for insurance, materials for the equipment house and field, bats, balls and bases, their annual charter, replacement of some lights, concessions, equipment maintenance, etc.

Each year, new uniforms for one team are purchased and this year some lights will need to be replaced and repairs to the bleachers and fences.

The concession stand

provides their main source of income. The mothers of the young players help out by donating food. Last year local business firms donated funds for signs on the fences as an additional source of income.

The Munday Little League requested at least \$700.00, however, the Budget and Admissions Committee approved \$900.00 for 1978-79 to assist in their expenses. This money stays in Munday and the program benefits a large group of players and team leaders.

The Southwestern Diabetic Foundation is a charitable, non-profit tax-exempt corporation operating Camp Sweeney near Gainesville, Texas. The Southwest's first and only rehabilitation and educational training center for diabetic boys and girls.

The youngsters learn about themselves, their disorder, and start learning how to live with it for the rest of their lives.

During Camp Sweeney's twenty-eight years of operation, they have cared for 7,322 diabetic children. Of this number their records show: 2,779 were No Pay; 3,225 were token or part pay; 1,318 were full pay.

Camp Sweeney expected 300 children for the 1978 session. They requested to be included in the Munday United Fund for \$95.00 as their pro-rata share of funding for the 1978-79 fiscal year.

The funds will be used for tuition fees for a diabetic child to attend one session at the Diabetic Educational Training Center at Camp Sweeney.

The Munday United Fund Board approved their budget request of \$95.00

Notify SS Of Address Changes

If you, or members of your family receive a check from the Social Security Administration, including social security retirement, survivors, or disability benefit checks, as well as Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments, you should report any change in your home mailing address to the Social Security Administration as soon as possible.

Whether you receive your payments directly, or if they are being sent to your financial organization for deposit, reporting your new address will reduce the chance of your check being delayed and will help assure that you get any correspondence sent to you. Even if you have reported your change of address to the post office and asked them to forward your mail, it is important to notify social security so that your records can be corrected. This will help avoid a delay in the receipt of your check, or the possibility of your not receiving it at all.

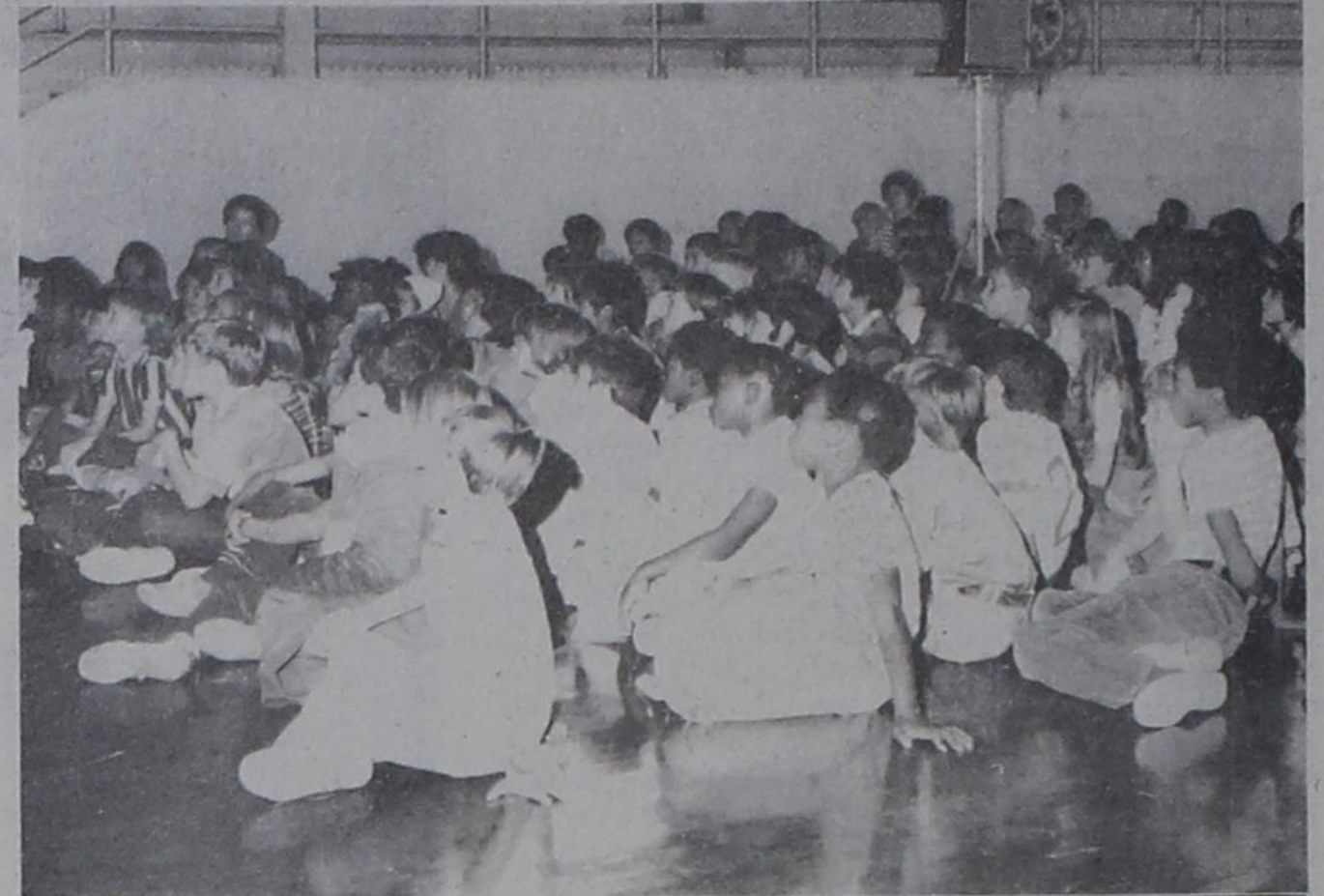
To report a change of mailing address, you may contact any social security office by mail, telephone, or in person, whichever you prefer. However you choose to report, be sure to know your complete new address, including your zip code number. Also, you should give your social security claim number, your old address, and the name of all those in your family who should get checks.

If you have any questions, or need assistance in changing the mailing address for your check, any social security office will be glad to help you. The address and phone number of the social security office nearest you is listed in your telephone directory under "Social Security Administration".

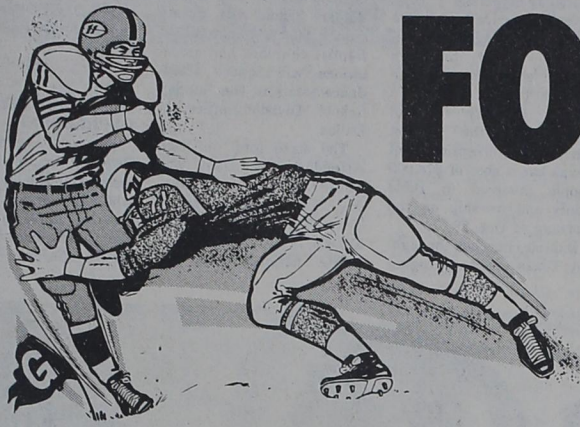

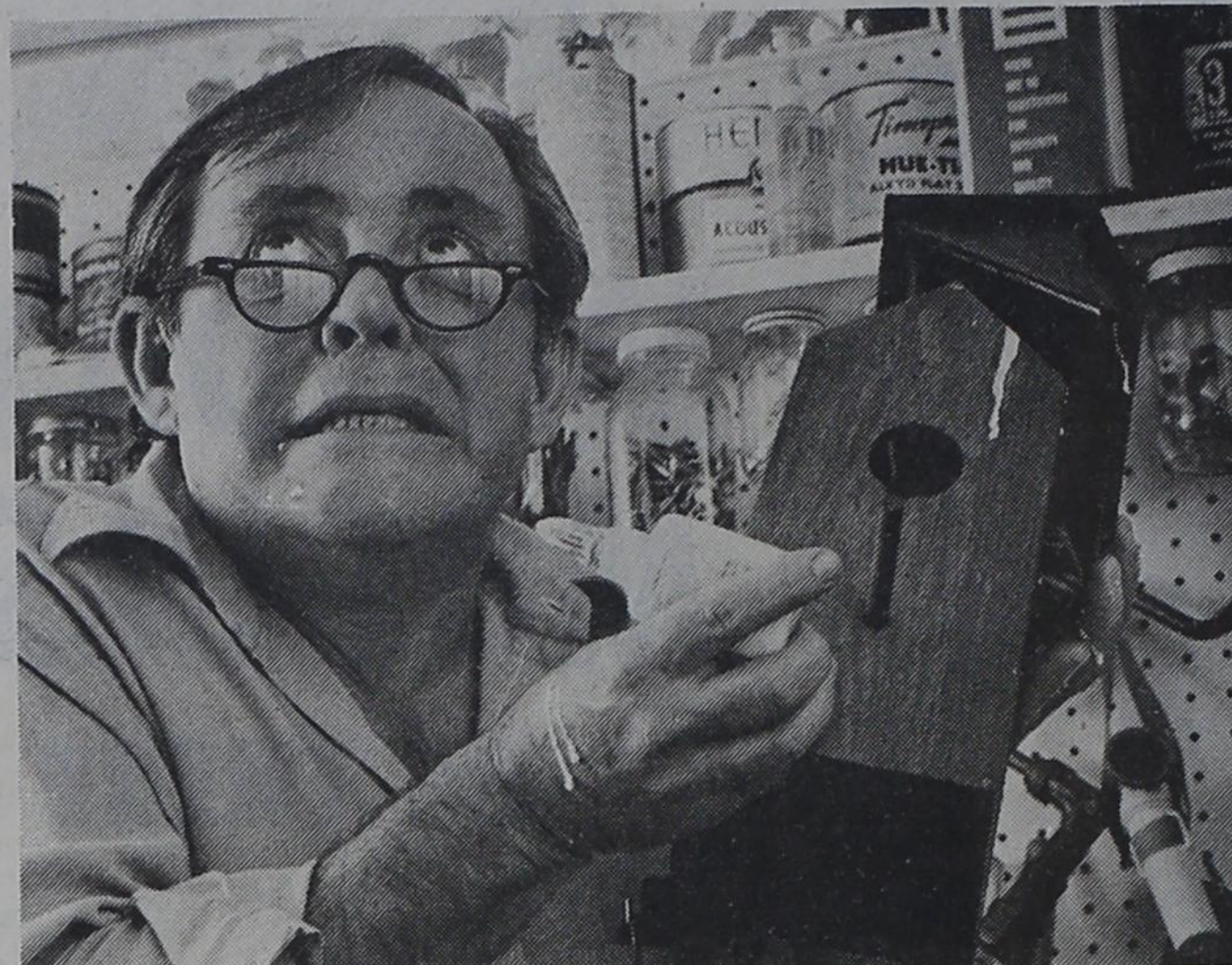
