# Damaged Lines Delay Water

repairs last Friday. Plans are to pick them up late Tuesday afternoon and begin re-installing them Wednesday.

No water is presently in the sterilization tanks. When repairs are finished, water will be treated with a high concentration of chemicals to sterilize lines. This concentration will be left in the lines for at least 48 hours. After sterilization is completed lines will be flushed with the treated water that carries proper amounts of chemicals. Fiftyfour miles of line will be treated in this manner.

Three new employees have been hired by Water Authority. They are Billy Harris of Goree, license plant operator; E. J. Stew-Morgan, Munday both maintenance workers. One position is still open. The Authority is looking for a licensed operator experienced in ground water treat-

According to Beecher, if plans go on as scheduled we hope to be pumping treated water in approximately three more weeks.



## **Nutrition Program For** Elderly Set In Goree

The Title VII Contract for a nutrition program in Knox County in conjunction with the public schools in Knox City and Goree has been approved by Judge Homer T. Melton.

The nutrition program created by Congress in 1972 is designed to serve older persons over the age of 60 (and their spouses of any age) who need nutritious meals in a group setting. The purpose of the program is to benefit the whole person by helping to keep the individual active, healthy and alert in social interaction.

This is not a welfare program. The federal funds provided for the project will meet part of the costs but every participant will have an opportunity to pay the cost of the meal or whatever amount he is able to contri-

The public schools mentioned are providers only for the meals, costing approxi-

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
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## Krueger Supports Public School System

Krueger will face Republican John Tower in the piece of machinery for just November election.


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


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
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## Mary Meadors, Rogers Hellman Married In Lubbock

The calf that has things too good on the ranch or farm may be the calf that winds up dead in the feedlot, according to Dr. George Lambert of the National Animal Disease Center. Studies prove what researchers have long suspected, once the calf leaves home and heads through the sale barn to the feedlot, it's going to be hit with a whole barrage of diseases. "Animals that have been exposed to most respiratory pathogens on the farm will probably come out of that movement in reasonably good shape. They will be stressed, But they will survive." Studies show that the compact, fat calves have the highest percentage of sickness while the tall, narrow, thin, long kind of calf had less. Lambert suggests, "We should start with a good program in the herd of origin and get that calf protected before he moves, with a good preconditioning program. Farm of origin has. a significant effect on the gains posted by those calves for the first 50 days in the feedlot.'




