Here Is Copy of Ballot For Democratic Primary

We are publishing in this issue a complete copy of the Democratic Primary ballot, upon which the names of the candidates for the various offices appear in the order in which they will appear on the ballot to be used in Saturday's election. We are publishing this ballot in order that the citizens may study the ballot before going to the polls and thereby have their favorite candidates picked before they go to the polls Saturday. The ballot is a long one and care should be exercised in the selection of public officials.

The Munday voting box has been divided into two voting precincts which are designated officially as No. 6 and 6A. Citizens of Munday residing south of Earliest street will cast their ballots in precinct No. 6, and those residing north of Earliest street will cast their ballots in precinct No. 6A.

It will be noted that there is no name on the ballot for precinct chairman for this precinct, and R. B. For the purpose of making it possible for all the people in this section to secure detailed information on the plan and program of the Federal Farm Board for assisting the farmers through the Texting and Cotton Cooperative Association, a general mass meeting has been arranged to be held in Munday on Wednesday evening of next week, July 30, at 8 p. m. at the community tabernacle.

At this meeting, a speaker well informed on the organization and the government's connection with the proposition and answer any questions asked concerning it. All farmers, merchants, bankers and others desiring to learn more of the undertaking are invited to attend the meeting.

The Texas Cotton Cooperative Association is the only organization in Texas through which the farmers can secure the benefits of the agricultural marketing act which became a law on June 15, 1929. That association absorbed the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association and its membership contract has been considerably changed in order to meet the requirements of the Federal Farm Board.

Under the old farm bureau contract, a member was required to deliver every bale of his cotton to the co-op. The Texas Cotton Cooperative Association membership agreement calls for the delivery of only every bale of cotton that is produced by the farmer up to 20 bales. In other words, if a cotton farmer produces 20 bales he must ship five bales and if his production reaches 100 bales he is required to deliver only ten bales, but may deliver all or any part of his total crop.

The mass meeting above will be held in Munday, and will give information on the cooperative plan to the people in this territory who are wanting to learn of its details and no efforts will be made to "high pressure" any farmer or other person to endorse this idea against his better judgment.

H. J. R. No. 11  
Proposing a constitutional amendment to be voted on November 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 16, which shall read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to taxation for county purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon values fixed by the State Tax Board; and providing that the State shall remit annually to each of the counties in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1930.

S. R. J. No. 7  
Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 4th, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made or hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, shall constitute and become a permanent university fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in school bonds of municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in obligations and pledges issued by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas, or secured by such obligations and pledges, for the construction of dormitories and other buildings for the use of the University of Texas, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing section; provided, that the one-tenth of the alternate sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, "An Act to establish the University of Texas" shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the permanent university fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1930.
