## No Sunday Mail?

No mail on Sunday?

A bulletin to this effect, which was posted on one of the post office doors in Munday last week, was accepted by some patrons as "a slap in the face with a wet towel!"

No mail on Sunday! Patrons can not recall a time in all the history of Munday's post office when such an event occurred. To many, it means a complete change in every-day living, especially on Sundays and weekends. No one relishes the idea of reading those big voluminous Sunday newspapers on Monday. It deprives them of some leisure reading that perhaps cannot be enjoyed, except on Sunday.

The "directive" stated that new post office hours would be observed. Just one hour of window service on Saturdays, from 9 to 10 a.m., cutting off two hours of time. No mail will be placed in patrons' post office boxes on Sunday! The mail will be delivered to Munday by truck, as usual, but no one will be there to place it in post office boxes. This means another saving of possibly two hours.

This was cited as an economy measure in a letter from the U. S. Post Office sectional center in Fort Worth, according to Delores Lambeth, local postmaster. When asked the feelings of local post office employees, Mrs. Lambeth stated: "Well,

of course, we like to give service to our patrons."

This is nothing new in postal services, as this procedure has been in effect in the Abilene area for several years, possibly 5 to 7 years.

There is some indication that enough letters to proper authorities might cause this order (or directive) to be rescinded. Persons who feel this would be an undue burden on post office patrons of Munday may voice their views to: Mr. Jack D. Watson, Sectional Center Manager, Fort Worth, Texas, 76101, or to Congressman Charles Stenholm, as directed elsewhere by Mayor A. Dale Selzer.

To The Citizens of Munday:

As mayor of Munday, I called Congressman Charles Stenholm to protest the shortening of our post office window hours and the elimination of Sunday post office box mail delivery.

Stenholm encouraged me to have citizens write him and give their reasons why this post office order will not be good for them.

## Bank Plans For Future Expansion

The First National Bank of Munday has purchased the building formerly occupied by Biard's Cleaners, with plans for a drive-in installation and also a bank employee parking area.

The existing building is being razed at present time. Gary Schur, president, stated: "We hope to open a drive-in facility with two lanes with the capacity to expand the drive-in to four lanes in the future."

We will be using one drive-up window and remote unit at the time construction is completed.

Plans are for construction to be completed and equipment installed by late spring or early summer of 1980.

## Area Corn And Maize Now Being Harvested

When planting is done, you ordinarily anticipate a harvest. Harvest time has come for the approximately 1200 acres of corn planted in this area.

Maynard Moore, manager of Farmers Grain Coop., stated that some corn is yielding as much as 135 bushels per acre. The average yield should be close to 120 to 125 bushels.

By the end of this week, corn harvest should be ended for all practical purposes, if fair weather reigns. Ten days or so is all the time needed for corn

gathering.

Farmers Grain expects to handle around 7 to 8 million pounds of corn through their elevator.

A measure of maize was brought in on the 16th of August by Gerard Kuehler, followed by Vernal Zeissel later that same day. The first was damp; but last Friday good dry maize began to find its way to the elevator, measuring 13.0 moisture content.

Of course, maize harvest will continue at least through October. In fact, several planted late maize on "potato ground" after potatoes were harvested, which could cause harvest to continue well after frost.

The reapings on the corn and maize are from irrigated land and it looks as though irrigated milo this year is better by as much as 25%, over last year's yield according to area farmers.

Totals for Munday were recorded by Goodson Sellers, weather observer as follows: August 21, .80; August 23, .03; August 25, .40; and August 26, .03. A trace fell here Monday morning.

Greater amounts were received in other areas of the county. Rhineland and Gilliland both reported better than two inches, the Ike Gresham farm, northeast of Munday, had 2.5 inches Saturday morning, while Goree reported 2.3 inches Saturday with electricity being disrupted for four and one-half hours.

## Orphaned Raccoon Has Home, Regular Bike Rides

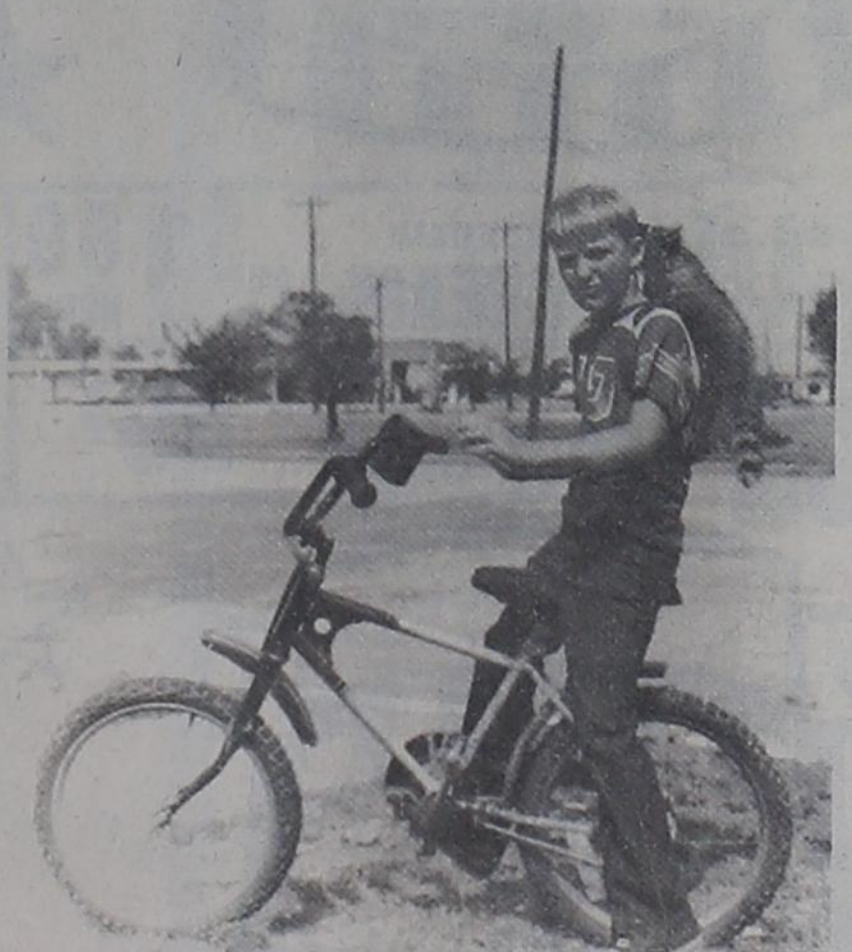

Jimmy carried the orphaned critter home with him to Benjamin, sharing the presence of the raccoon and the story with his family. His parents are Sheriff and Mrs. James Redwine, sheriff of Knox County.

Buster, age nine, is Jimmy's brother and he took a liking to the small creature immediately. So Jimmy, after a few days, officially made a gift of the little animal to Buster.

The raccoon had already been dubbed Jaws and Killer by Jimmy, because he snapped and tried to bite them as they hand fed him. However, Buster just didn't think the name fit and was soon calling his new possession Rascal.

After considerable patience and attention on Buster's part, Rascal would

allow himself to be petted. After about two weeks time, Rascal was climbing onto Buster's lap when he sat down.

## Enrollment Totals 445 For 1979-80 School Year

Enrollment totals by classes, announced by superintendent Douglas Myers are as follows:

**ELEMENTARY**  
Kindergarten 22, first 35, second 25, third 29, fourth 28, fifth 34, making a total of 173 students in Elementary. Compared to last year's total of 186, this is a loss of 13.

**JUNIOR HIGH**  
Sixth 38, seventh 33, eighth 27, totaling 98. With last year's total of 107, there

is a loss of nine students.

**HIGH SCHOOL**  
Freshmen 44, sophomores 40, juniors 47, and seniors 43, totaling 174. The total high school students last year was 177, making this year's reduction, three students.

The combined total enrollment of 445 is 25 students less than last year. In 1976 the enrollment was 522, in 1977, 504 was the total and in 1978, 470.

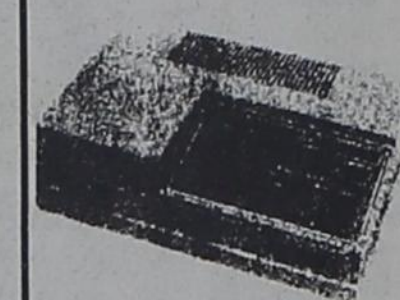
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## Moguls Travel To Electra For Scrimmage Friday

### Labor Day Death Toll Estimated at 37 Lives

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has estimated that traffic accidents will claim 37 lives in Texas during the Labor Day holiday weekend.

The holiday runs from 6 p.m. Friday, August 31, to midnight Monday, September 3. During the comparable 78 hour period last year, there was a preliminary death count of 45, with late deaths raising the toll to 62.

"Our estimate is lower this year because, due primarily to the supply and cost of fuel, weekend travel is reduced from 1978. But at the same time, we recognize that traffic will probably increase during Labor Day since it is the last holiday weekend of the summer," Speir said.

"We could easily have

## Grain Sorghum Producers Unhappy With Trade Control

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has asked the U. S. Department of Agriculture to remove all restrictions of feed grain exports to Russia or increase the price support levels to 90% of parity. In a letter from GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp to Secretary Bob Bergland (dated August 21), Harp stated, "The continued refusal of USDA to remove the restrictions on exports to Russia is an unnecessary restriction of free trade."

The Association believes that the grain markets have reflected lower prices due to the restrictions placed on exports of grain to Russia by the U. S. government. If the

present policy is continued, then it is, in effect, a "psychological embargo," even though there may have been no sales denied by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In the Agricultural Act of 1977, provisions were made for the protection of farmers, in the event an embargo is imposed.

The Agricultural Act of 1977 states that "whenever the President or any other member of the Executive Branch of the Federal Government causes to be suspended, based upon a determination of short supply, the commercial export sales of any commodity, to any country or area with

which the United States otherwise continues commercial trade, the Secretary of Agriculture shall, on the day the suspension is initiated, set the loan level for such commodity under that Agricultural Act of 1949 as amended, if a loan program is in effect for the commodity, at 90 percent of the parity price for the commodity, as such parity price is determined on the day the suspension is initiated."

The law also states that the loan level established at 90 percent of parity, because of this provision, shall remain in effect as long as the suspension of commercial export sales are continued.

The Grain Sorghum Producers Assn. concludes that the refusal of USDA to lift

the ban on future sales of feed grains to Russia, is, in fact, an embargo that is placed on such sales due to a fear of such short supply. GSPA feels that because of the Administration's refusal to lift the trade restrictions, the grain farmers are due 90 percent price support protection immediately.

Reflective film is made of metal and polyester, and it's available in a variety of colors and reflective ability. You can buy it in several widths by the foot - and in premeasured packages. Follow the manufacturer's directions for a do-it-yourself installation project, Ms. Seaman suggests. Make sure the windows are spotlessly clean before installing it. Also, follow directions for care after you install it. Remember that the film also reduces light in the house, so you may need to use interior lighting and relocate certain plants. Finally, it offers another saving - it retards color fading in home furnishings. \*\*\*\*\*

## The 'Book' Report

By SHARON BOOK

Circulating fans create air movement and increase cooling sensation.

Both the oscillating fan and the old-time ceiling-mounted fan are designed to create air movement within a given space by the use of rotating blades or paddles.

Oscillating fans are portable and can be moved easily from one room to another. Efficiency in circulating air depends on design. The more air a fan moves in a given time, the better its cooling potential.

The less electricity it requires to move the air, the cheaper and more efficient it will be to operate.

Generally, a 12-inch blade will move less air than a 20-inch blade, and the fan with the more power will thrust air further into the room.

An oscillating fan distributes its cooling effect best when set to turn from

side to side. Some models permit adjustments in the arc or stationary operation by adjusting a control knob.

A clutch that slips or disengages when the swinging fan meets an obstruction is a desirable feature on an oscillating fan. This feature prevents a serious pinch if fingers are caught between the fan head and the pedestal.

It also keeps the fan from tipping over if it meets an obstruction as it swings.

Since fan speed is often related to how noisy a unit is during operation, units that give a choice of low, medium and high speeds offer some flexibility. Expect a higher level of operation noise at higher fan speed than low or medium speed.

If the unit will be used at night or in a child's room, make sure the unit operates quietly on a low setting.

CEILING-MOUNTED FANS

Popular in the early 1900's, ceiling-mounted fans are making a strong comeback because of their energy-saving potential as well as the nostalgic touch they add to an area.

Today's ceiling fans come in a wider assortment of colors and styles, but their operation is essentially the same as the original models. Paddle blades, propelled with about the same power required for a light bulb, stir up stagnant air to keep room temperatures within the comfort zone.

Because of size and location, the ceiling fan is capable of redistributing sizable amounts of air over a wide area.

Since they use less than 200 watts, they're an economical substitute for air conditioning on those not-so-hot days, as well as an economical and effective supplement for those higher air-conditioning settings.

Units which permit a change of pitch on the paddles or blades will make for more effective use during both heating and cooling seasons.

Heavier, cool air that accumulates near the floor will be drawn upward and recirculated by the revolving paddles during the summer season.

During winter when heated air accumulates at the ceiling, the fan works to move warm air gently downward for a more consistent temperature from floor to ceiling.

Some units accomplish this dual-season feat by a motor that permits direction of the paddles to be reversed, or tilt of the blades to be changed.

While most models are equipped with variable speed motors, this feature is especially important when the unit is used in conjunction with winter heating.

Unless a low speed can be achieved, uncomfortable drafts will result throughout the heated area.

Most manufacturers package ceiling fans for easy do-it-yourself installation. Short-stem mounts are included that provide seven-foot clearance when installed on eight-foot ceilings.

Electrical connections may be made in any ceiling receptacle designed to accommodate an ordinary light bulb.

## Safe Driving Being Urged

Calling children "our greatest natural resource," Governor Clements has asked all drivers to become "especially aware of the need for increased safety and vigilance, particularly around our school zones."

Clements proclaimed Back to School Safety Week, from August 25 through September 1, to "call attention to this need for added caution during the start of school." "Increased traffic safety awareness and careful driving can help preserve the lives of our children and save them from harm," said Clements.

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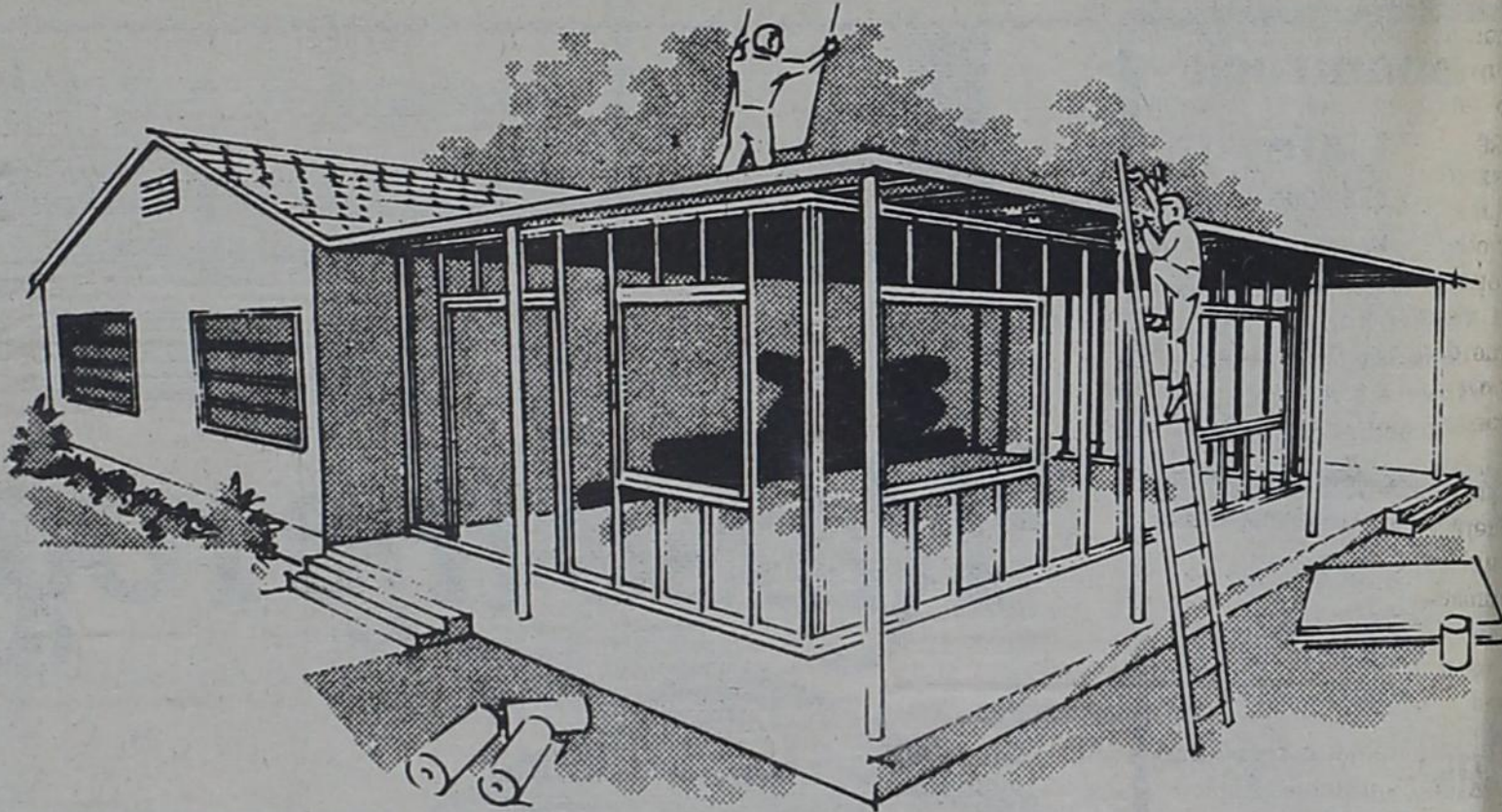
