We are of the firm belief that there are currently on the books, laws which, adequately enforced, are equal to and even go beyond some of the problems for which relief additional legislation has been used; that many other laws and regulations need to be pruned and reconsidered so that they will accomplish their oblectives rather than impede commerce; and that there is wide room for voluntary cooperation among persons of good faith, leading towards solution of consumers problems and business differ-





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
