### A LESSON FOR US

For some time, stories have been coming out of Russia telling of drastic, if severely limited, changes in economic policy. The gist of them is that the Soviets have been testing such once-dispised capitalist principles as the profit motive in order to stimulate production and indifferent administrators.

Now, it seems, another lengthy step is being taken. It has been announced that by the end of 1965 a third of Russia's consumer-goods factories will also be operating on a capitalist principle. They will produce only what retailers can sell.

This certainly won't strike Americans as remarkable. That's exactly the way things are done in this country under our system of free, competitive mass production and distribution. But in Russia, just the opposite policy has been followed. Factories have been told by the planners what to make and in what quantity. As a result, stores are stocked with inferior, over-priced, unwanted goods. And consumers have been vigorously complaining.

So, Russia, even if slowly, is moving toward a supply-demand consumer economy, complete with a certain amount of profit motive. One may be sure that this is being done out of reluctant necessity—it must be something of a humiliation to the Soviet hierarchy to imitate capitalism to any degree, and Karl Marx, very likely, is revolving in his grave. At any rate, there is a lesson in this for us. Our production-distribution system, working all the way from the sources of raw materials to our splendid retail stores, does more good for more people than any other system man has been able to think up.

### OIL BENEATH THE SEA

The oilmen are searching for petroleum and natural gas in the sea-covered rocks of the Continental Shelf. And this spectacular undertaking is one of almost incredible complexity and cost.

Ernst Behrendt, writing in Petroleum Today, says: ". . . the whole process of offshore drilling is riddled with problems. There is, for example, the task of transporting men and elaborate equipment to points dozens of miles from the coast and maintaining them for months on end. Then the drill bit must pass through hundreds of feet of water and penetrate thousands of feet of rock, at a cost three to five times the amount required for drilling on land. If and when the drill bit finds oil, the oil must be transported miles back to land.

"To date, the oil companies' interest in the Continental Shelf off Louisiana, for example, has taken the form of an investment of \$4 billion. And thus far they have recovered only \$1.5 billion.

But the drilling goes on in a vast area which is still filled with mysteries. Estimates say that the Shelf may yield as much as 20 billion barrels of oil and 150 billion cubic feet of natural gas. So the risks are taken, and vast sums of money ventured, in the hope of eventual profit, to assure that an almost insatiable demand for oil and gas, here and in other nations, will always be met.

### FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA WEEK

Future Farmers of America Week is to be observed during the February 20-27 period. And this is one of those annual events that is fully worthy of the attention and interest of us all.

The stated purpose is "Public recognition of the Future Farmers of America organization in developing better agriculture and rural citizenship." The young people who participate are brought close to the profound values that are a part of nature. They have a healthy and dedicated interest in crops, in farm animals, and in the ever-changing techniques which people give our agriculture its vast efficiency and productivity and help make us the best fed people in the world. The city dweller is totally dependent on the farmer for the means of life itself.

Beyond this, the nation faces a critical problem of juvenile delinquency. Various cures are offered, based on the home, schools and churches. In addition, those groups which work with youth, in all manner of fields, can do an essential job in building character, honor and responsibility. The Future Farmers organization is one of the best of them.

## Spotlight on HEALTH

Science Features

### Common Measles Encephalitis

Of all the complications which can follow common measles, encephalitis is by far the most frightening. The death rate is 25 per cent, and brain damage—severe and often permanent—frequently ensues for the survivors.

This dread consort of a widespread childhood disease develops once in 1,000 or 1,100 cases. With the United States Public Health Service report of 73,731 more measles cases in the first 49 weeks of 1964 than in the same period of 1963, victims of encephalitis will increase also.

Encephalitis usually appears four to seven days after the onset of measles. It is thought to be caused by the same virus. Symptoms are coma, convulsions, drowsiness, or—in odd contrast—irritability. Some of the abnormalities may result from edema, accumulated liquids causing swelling inside the skull.

Drs. A. C. LaBocceta and A. S. Tornay of Philadelphia General Hospital who made a study of measles encephalitis believe this complication involves the central nervous system, causing brain lesions, at an early stage of the disease before the encephalitis symptoms appear. So, by the time treatment can be started, it is usually too late to

head off any damage.

Evidence of damage may show in later convulsive seizures, neuromuscular weakness, behavioral changes, and arrested mental development. When convulsive seizures accompany encephalitis, the chances of survival are not good. If other complications also appear, the death rate rises to almost 50 per cent.

An indication of just how serious encephalitis can be appears from an earlier study by LaBocceta and Tornay:

Nineteen patients who had survived the complication were given follow-up examinations. Of these only two were judged to have returned to normal mental and physical health.

Such tragedy may be averted by measles vaccination. Currently, there are two types of multi-shot vaccines available from physicians and a new, improved, one-shot type—called the Schwarz strain is expected to be ready shortly.

### Panhandle Gets New Deer Stock

SAN ANGELO—A truck load of mule deer live trapped in arid West Texas were released in Palo Duro Canyon, near Silverton, roughly 400 miles from their native habitat.

The Parks and Wildlife Department reports that last year 174

head of mule deer were trapped in the same west Texas area and transported by truck across Texas to help boost wildlife numbers in the sparsely populated Palo Duro Canyon section of Briscoe County, Caprock area of Floyd and Motley Counties, and the Canadian River breaks of Roberts County.

Past efforts to establish both whitetail and mule deer herds in the Palo Duro began in the early 1940's when both species were trapped in other parts of the State and transplanted to the northern end of the Canyon. Additional mule deer will be released in the three approved areas to supplement the initial plants made in 1964.

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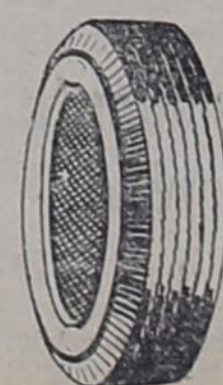
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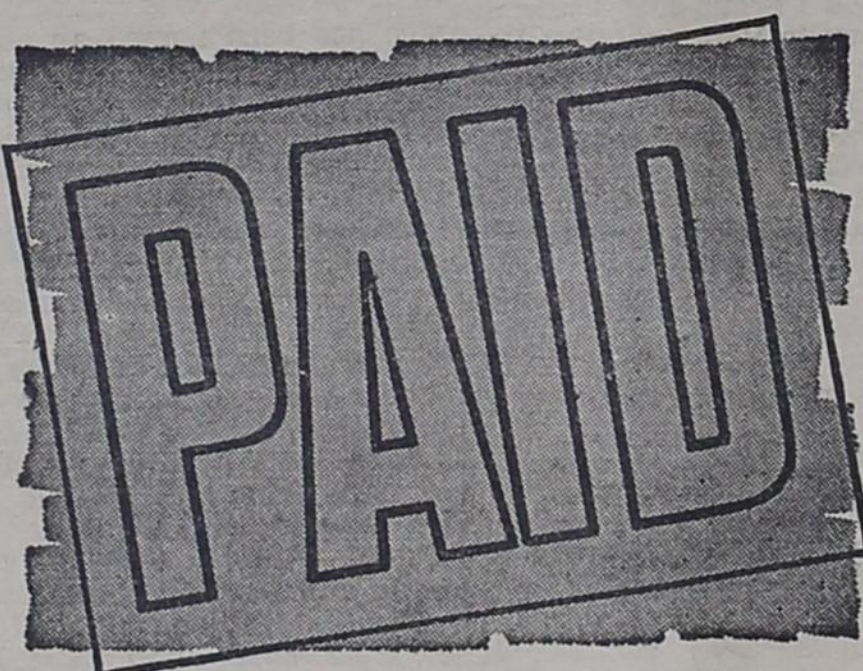
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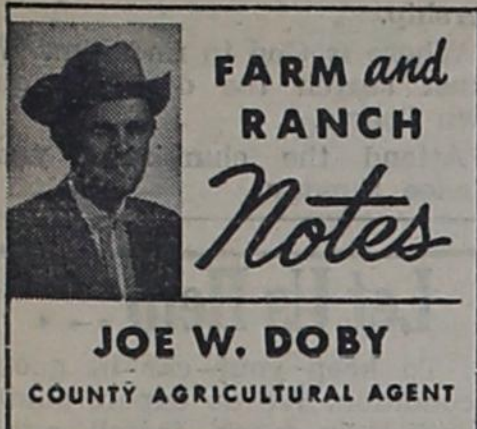
### Checks Are A Double Check

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**FARM and RANCH Notes**

Irish potato planting has begun in Knox County. Approximately 700 acres will be planted again this year. Much of this year's production has been contracted to a potato chip company. The principal varieties being planted are Kennebec, Cherokee, Red LaSoda and the new variety, Norgold. The latter is the russet potato that has been known as 4192-3 in the variety trials for the past few years.

Seed potatoes have been very scarce and high priced this year due to an early freeze in the Red River Valley of the Dakotas and Minnesota. The freeze damaged the potatoes making them unfit for seed.

Anyone interested in learning more about how to prune and care for fruit trees? We will have a demonstration Friday, February 19 at 5 p.m. at the home of Doris Dickerson, 1325 S. 13th Avenue in Munday and at the George Nix place in Goree on Monday, February 22, at 5 p.m.

A few fruit trees in the backyard can provide a welcome addition to the family food supply. The life of the trees as well as the amount of fruit produced is influenced by the kind of care they receive. Correct care is not difficult to learn or to do. Attend this demonstration, which will last about an hour, and learn the fundamentals of pruning and insect control.

Large numbers of feeder cattle have been available at most western markets this winter. Many cattlemen were forced to reduce numbers in the Central and Southern Plains because of poor feed supplies — and in the Northern Plains because of severe winter and high hay prices. Weekly feeder steer marketings at ten markets in December were 10-30 per cent larger than a year earlier.

With the increased numbers of heifers that are apparently being held for herd replacement, total feeder cattle now available to be placed on feed this winter or spring probably is about the same as last winter. However, if 1965 should be a year of liquidation, this would provide increased supplies of feeder cattle.

There continues to be a wide margin between feeder steer and slaughter steer prices. This difference started widening in April, and ranged \$4-6 during the fourth quarter of last year. Feeder prices could show a small seasonal increase this spring, if there is good grass, but changes in feeder cattle prices this year will be closely keyed to slaughter prices.

Little change is noted in length

of time on feed in Texas. The U.S. figures, however, show that there has been a substantial increase in the proportion of cattle on feed less than 3 months and a decrease in those on feed more than 6 months. Of the total 234 large feedlots in Texas, only 192 had cattle on feed. Utilization of these larger Texas feedlots on January 1, 1965, was only 54%.

Cattle slaughter continues to exceed year earlier figures by wide margins. Slaughter for five weeks in December averaged about one-fifth larger than a year earlier. Total slaughter in the first full week of January was 545,000 head. The second week was 570,000 head. This was 23 per cent more than a year ago—an all time high.

Prospects are for about the same fed cattle marketings the rest of this winter as a year ago, but at lighter weights. Producers again may market more fed cattle than they indicated. If so, this will be due to lighter marketing weights and more heifers on feed.

The length of time on feed continues shorter than 1963 and early 1964. This is due both to placement on feed at heavier weights and marketing at lighter weights.

Demand for beef appears strong and this should keep prices near present levels. More beef is being consumed at higher prices than a year ago. But as long as fed cattle marketings continue at higher levels, there is not likely to be much price strength. Spring marketings of fed cattle may not hit quite as high a peak as in 1964 — and prices should not go as low.

Placing pesticides in containers other than the ones in which they came can be dangerous and can lead to serious misuse of the materials. The contents of an unlabeled insecticide are unknown, and there is no guide on what crops or animals the material should be used. Using the material for any other than its intended purpose, can lead to damage or perhaps to illegal and unwanted insecticide residues.

A soft drink bottle full of insecticide, for example, is an invitation to children and others, if there is no label on the bottle which gives information on its contents or directions for its use. Such information might be vital to a doctor undertaking treatment for insecticide poisoning. Users and sellers of insecticides are urged to keep these materials in their original packages and also to store, handle and use them safely.

It is better to dispose of small amounts of left-over insecticides than to keep them around in unmarked containers or improperly stored.

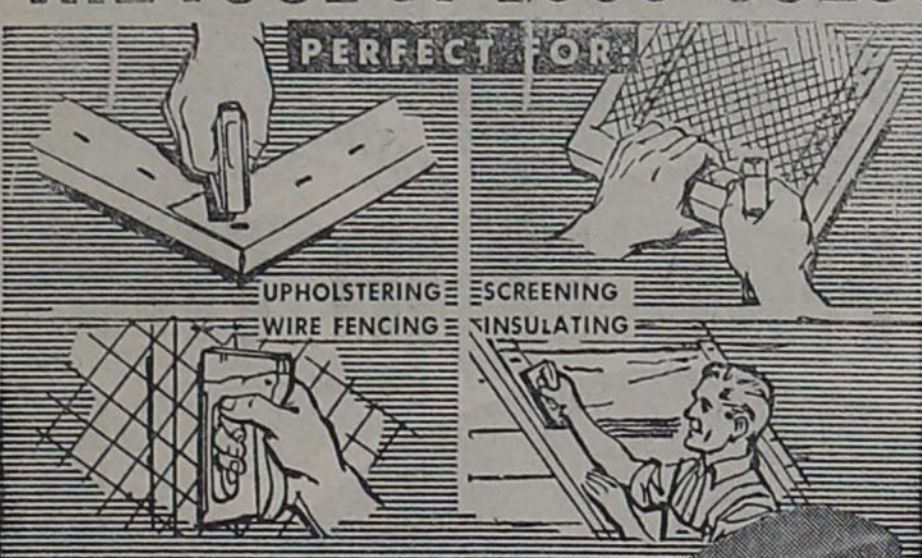

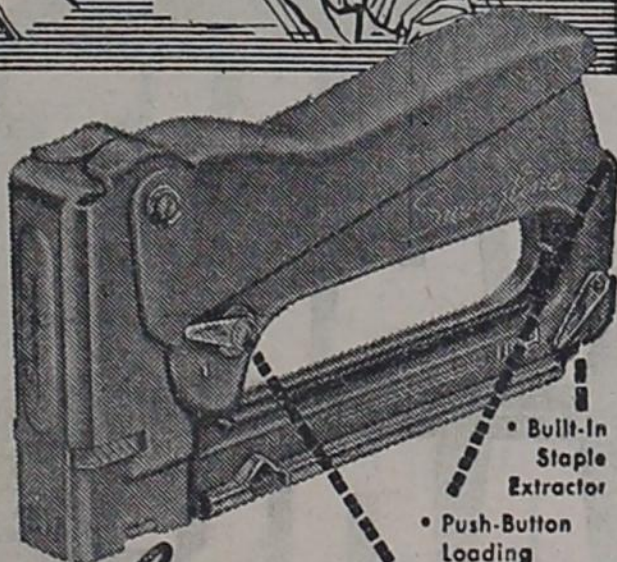

**Miss Frances Warren Is College Nominee**

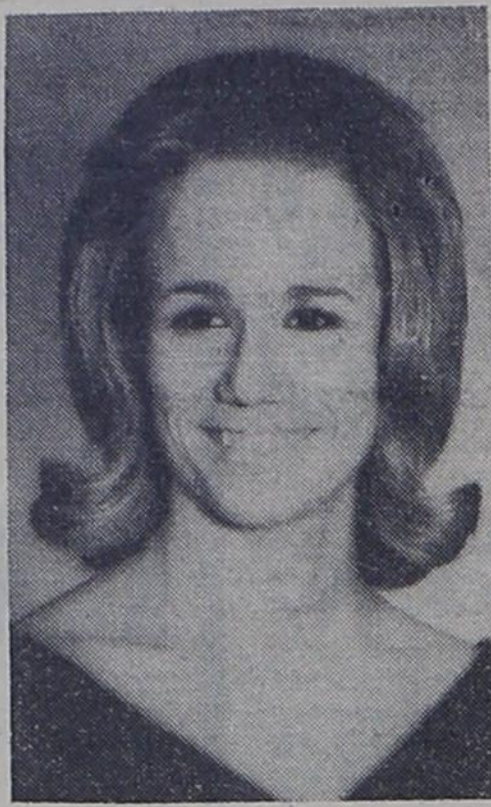

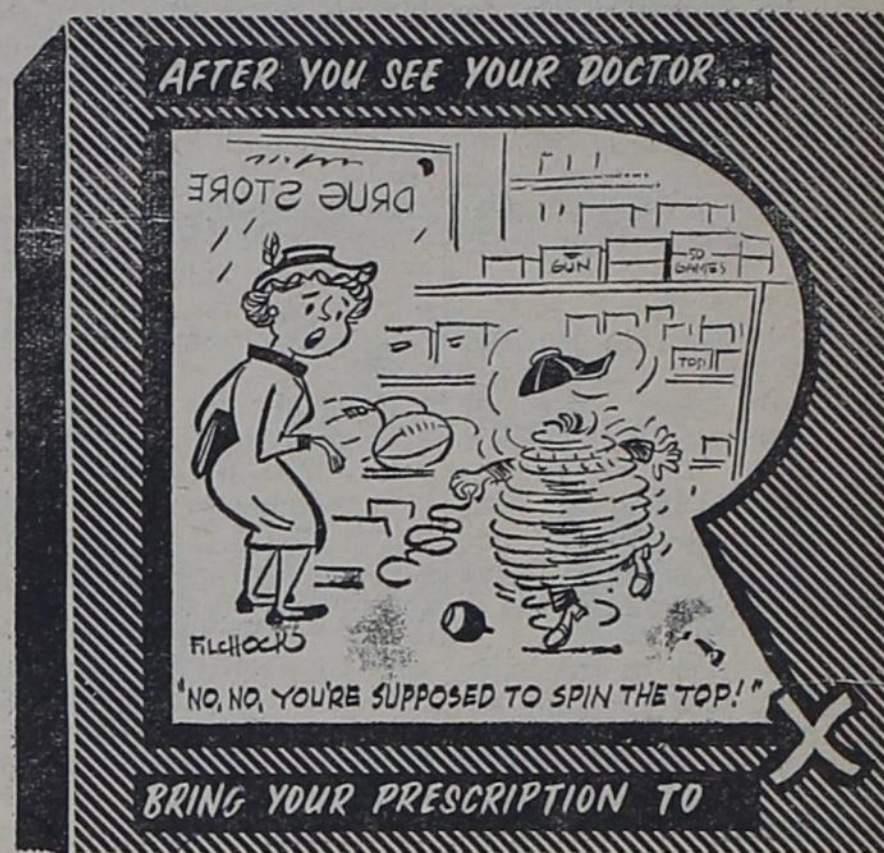

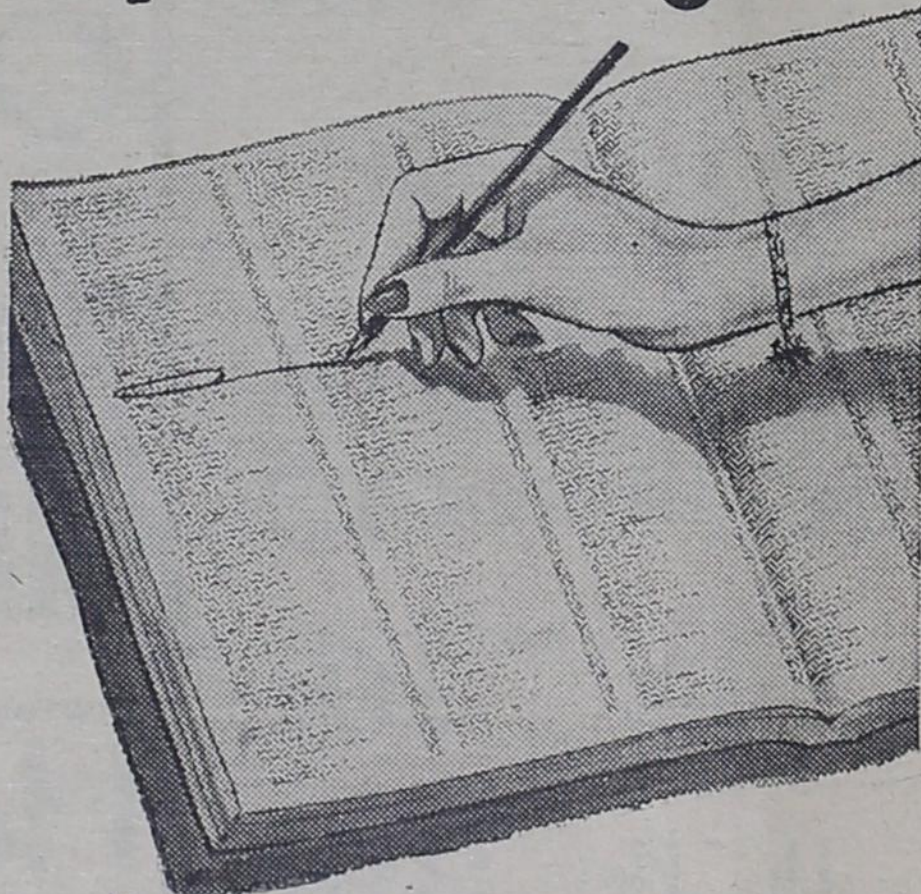

## Cotton Farmers Are Eligible For Crop Insurance

Cotton farmers in Knox and Briscoe Counties and grain sorghum growers in Briscoe County will be eligible in 1965 for Federal Crop Insurance.

Under the program, participating farmers are protected against crop losses from natural hazards, said Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Texas State Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. He added that more than 12,000 farmers in 49 Texas counties will carry almost \$40 million in Federal Crop Insurance protection on their crops of cotton, grain sorghum and wheat.

Federal Crop Insurance is an effective tested method of cushioning the terrible impact of crop disaster. FCI presently operates in nearly 1,200 counties representing most of the major crop producing areas of the nation, Jordan revealed.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by the State Health Department

Maintaining good dental health for your children is an investment in their future.

This week — National Children's Dental Health Week (February 7-13) — is designed to call attention to the importance of good dental health, particularly in our children.

Tooth decay afflicts more people today than any other disease — about 95 percent of the population of the United States.

Dental problems can begin early in life. Fifty percent of all 2-year-olds have one or more decayed primary teeth while permanent teeth are being formed beneath them in the jaw. By the time these children reach the youthful age of 15, they already have an average of nine decayed "permanent" teeth.

In addition to the necessity for proper chewing, comfort, general well-being and pleasing appearance, teeth are important in helping shape the mouth and face. It is obvious that decay prevention cannot be started too early.

Diseased teeth or gums can interfere with proper growth and development. Furthermore, dental disease can complicate and aggravate disease elsewhere in the body.

Isn't it better to visit a dentist regularly for preventive check-ups instead of suffering all night or longer with an agonizing

toothache or waiting until the tooth has to be pulled because damage has gone too far? Dentists recommend that youngsters have their first check-ups between the ages of two and a half and three.

Develop the good dental health habit early in your child's life. As you teach your child to dress himself and wash his face and hands, include tooth brushing as a part of the regular routine. Show your youngster how to rinse his mouth after meals with water—swish and swallow — if he can't brush his teeth. Nutrition, too plays an important role in your children's dental health. Training comes through preparing and serving balanced meals with a minimum of sweets each day.

Healthier teeth will mean a happier life for yourself and your children.
