Area Men Asked To Attend BCRIA Kick Off Meeting

The Kick-Off Meeting of the Knox County Brush Control and Range Improvement Association has been set for the District Courtroom in Benjamin, Tuesday, April 8, at 8:00 p.m. according to Jack Idol, County Chairman. All farmers, ranchers and other businessmen from over Knox County are asked to attend.

Brush control and range improvement is a problem which is of concern to everyone in the state. Brush and weeds rob the soil of more water than is used by all the towns, factories in all people. Water stored in all reservoirs of the state amount to only about one fifth of that robbed by brush and weeds.

Each landowner in the state is being asked to "invest" on a voluntary basis one cent per acre each year for the next five years to be used in the program. Many utility companies and other business representatives over the state have indicated their intentions to aid the program.

Dr. W. J. (Dub) Waldrip, Chairman of the Evaluation Committee, to determine the use of funds received by the

BCRIA drive has stated that no single approach or objective would be used in the fight. "And we're not looking at any one individual or one group to help solve this problem". "It takes a team effort from all of us."

The BCRIA is a non-profit, tax exempt association not associated with any university, company or agency. A board of directors with 18 members, representing different areas of the state will direct activities and approve research and education projects for funding.

Each of the 12 Texas Agricultural Extension Service districts have organized with a chairman and district committee. Each county within a district will have its chairman and committee to contact landowners and other prospective donors.

Just one significant improvement in brush control over the next few years, will more than offset the funds being asked for. The benefits would be to ranchers, farmers and all urban people, according to county chairman Jack Idol.

An early Knox County settler and active participant in nearly every phase of community affairs for more than 60 years was honored as Munday's Citizen of the Year at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet held in the High School Thursday night, March 27.

He is J. E. Reeves, Mayor of the City of Munday for four years and is in his second term of office. The outstanding citizen

of the year award was presented Mayor Reeves by retiring President, M. L. Wiggins.

In making the award, Mr. Wiggins recalled that Mayor Reeves established the first Scouting program in the county, was president of the school board for many years, was listed in Who's Who in 1968, served for 20 years on the county Selective Service Board and is a state officer in the American Legion.

In addition, the Mayor is a director of the West Central Texas Council of Governments an active member of the Texas Municipal League, a charter member of the First Baptist Church of Munday and a member of the Board of Deacons. He was in the automobile business until retirement eight years ago.

He and Mrs. Reeves have three sons and a daughter. Also recognized during the

Approximately 100 friends registered and congratulated him on a job well done. Coffee and cookies were served to the guests. He was presented a beautiful silver tray with the inscription:

Munday, Texas.

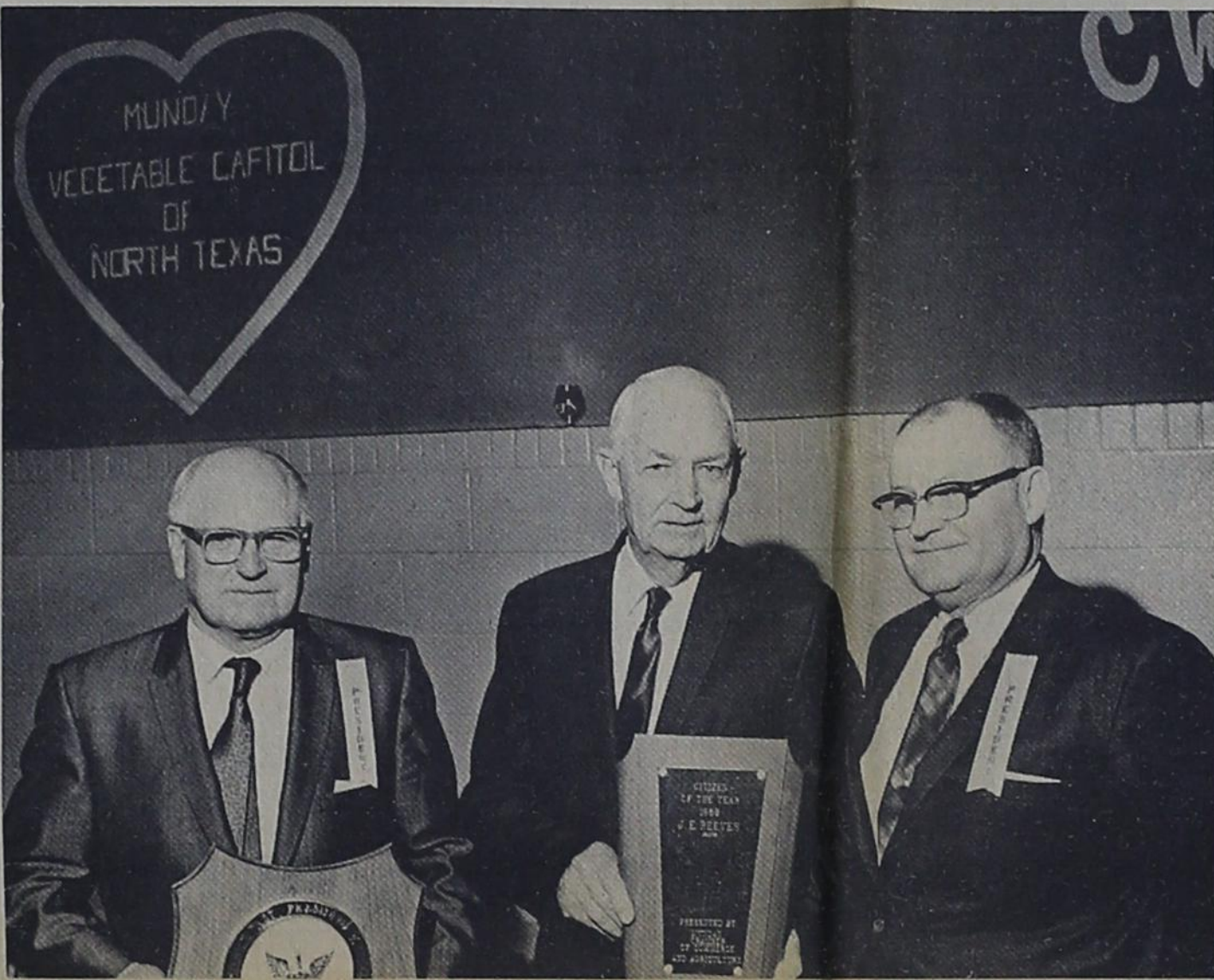
E. W. Harrell was born August 30, 1888 in Anson. He attended a small country school known as Swan's Chapel and later attended Business School in Anson.

Mr. Harrell recalled that back in 1905 he made the remark to the Anson banker that some day he would like to work in his bank. In 1908 he did just that, started working in

the Anson State Bank as bookkeeper and served in that capacity for 27 years. He then was employed by the Home State Bank in Rochester for 13 years and later moved to Munday where he was in the Mercantile business for 18 years with retirement coming March 31 after serving 13 years as City Secretary of the City of Munday.

He married Miss Will Dick Davis in May 1911. She was deceased in October 1959. They had two sons, Gene, of Portales, N. M. and Dr. Dick of Philadelphia. He married Claudia Griffith Rodgers in Nov. 1964. She shared the honors of the afternoon with friends at the City Hall.

W. H. Hertel, who was elected new City Secretary of Munday, assumed full duties as secretary April 1. Mr. Hertel, former City Manager of Benjamin, has been working with Mr. Harrell, as he remarked, "learning the ropes" since Feb. 15 and has been commuting from Benjamin. He plans to move to Munday in the near future.

Albus Sets New Record

Munday Claims 11-A Crown For Second Consecutive Year

The Mighty Munday Moguls, placing first in 7 events, swept to their second straight District 11-A championship Saturday.

The Moguls captured 143 points and qualified 8 individuals and two relay teams to the Region II meet to be held in Denton April 19th.

The only record broken for the day came by Mogul Richard Albus in the High Jump. Breaking the old record of 5-11,

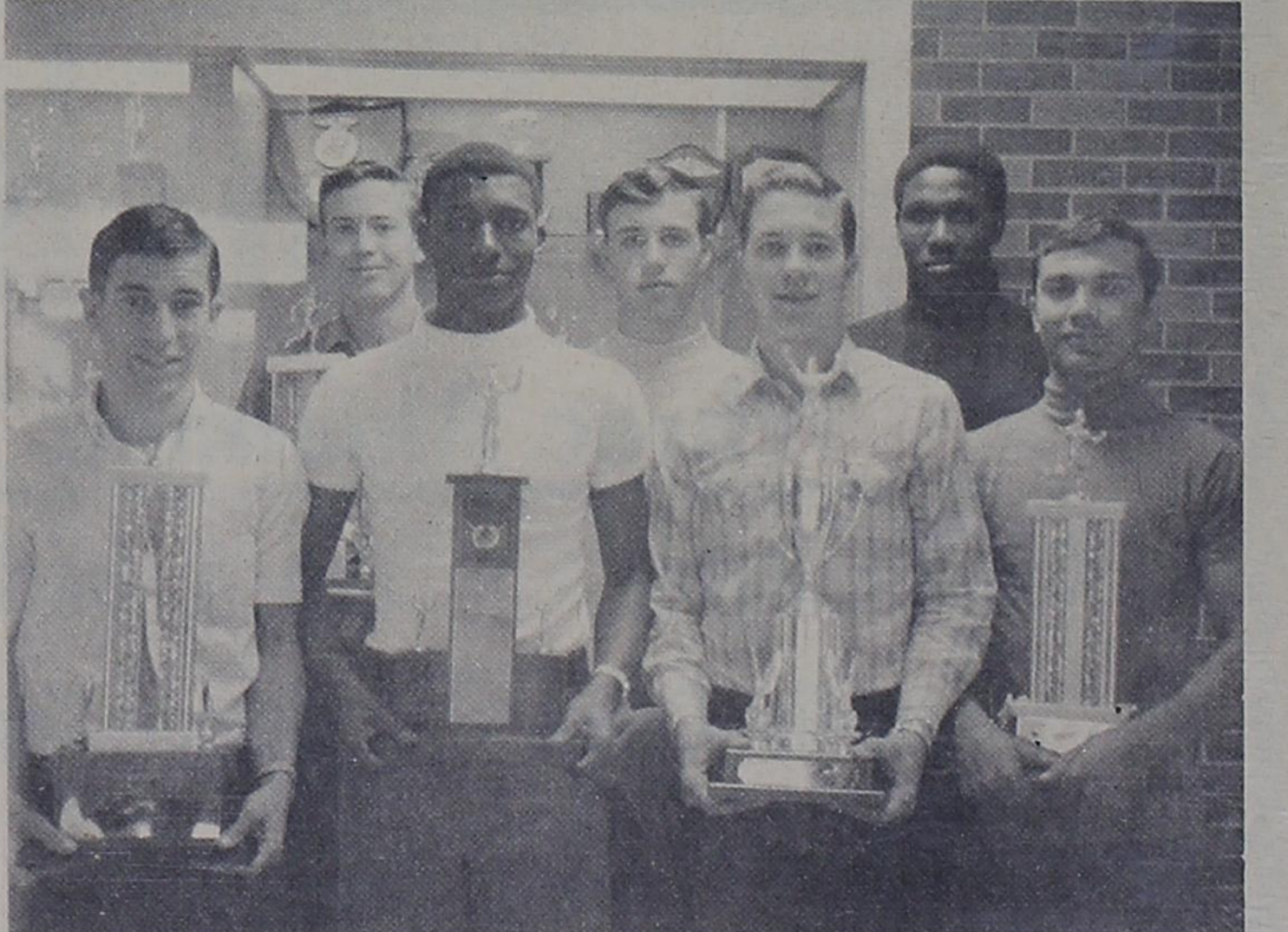
Richard jumped a soaring 6-3. The Moguls won the sprint relay in 45.3 over Holliday which came in 46.4. Running legs on the winning Moguls squad were Richard Albus, Larry Toliver, Billy Carden, and Ricky Hamilton.

Munday also won the mile relay with a 3:32.7 over Paducah finishing with a 3:39.5. The same runners that made up the sprint team ran the mile relay with the exception

of Wayne Zeissel who substituted for Billy Carden.

Larry Toliver grabbed off the broad jump with a leap of 19-10 1/4 and won the 220 dash in 23.3 for the Moguls. Teammate Ricky Hamilton finished second in the broad jump at 18-11.

Storage supplies of onions are very large. In addition, heavier supplies than usual are expected from the early spring crop grown in the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas.
Rice production broke all records last year - and this large crop is moving to market in big volume. Dry beans - especially pintos, are in unusually big volume. However, the plentiful supply also includes pinks, blackeyes and baby lima beans. *****

Farm And Ranch News

GREENBUGS AND WINTER GRAIN MITES CONTINUE TO INCREASE

In Knox County and surrounding areas, small grain producers continue to check their grain for greenbug and winter grain mite buildup. Several thousand acres have been sprayed in this area the last 2 or 3 weeks.

Producers feel that control applications are likely worthwhile even on good sized wheat whenever the greenbug count passes 400 per linear foot of row. Some fields are showing both greenbugs and winter grain mite population increases.

Chemicals recommended for control of these insects are parathion, methyl parathion, phosphamidon or malathion. The rate of application and other information is contained in the "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Mites on Grain and Forage Crops" which is available at your County Extension agent's office.

PLANT PATHOLOGIST SUGGESTS CONTROLS FOR MDMV

Control of Johnson grass in and around your fields may be the most satisfactory means of control of the maize dwarf mosaic virus, says Dr. C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist at Texas A&M University.

MDMV overwinters in rhizomes of Johnson grass. As the young shoots emerge in the spring, aphids begin feeding and acquire the virus. They then transmit the virus to susceptible corn and grain sorghum. Symptoms vary depending upon the type host plant and its stage of growth, said Horne. Most plants show mild chlorotic mottle. Grain does not develop normally in virus infected plants. On corn only a few grains may form on the cob while grain sorghum heads may be practically sterile.

The virus can also be controlled by the use of resistant or tolerant hybrids, noted the pathologist. Some hybrids can tolerate infection quite well, while others are severely damaged. Losses will be dependent upon the percentage of infected plants and upon the susceptibility of the hybrid to the disease.

HINTS OFFERED TO IMPROVE STAND OF COTTON

Farmers who have trouble getting a good stand of cotton can improve their chances by following a few simple rules, says Dr. C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist at Texas A&M University.

One of the most important factors in getting a good stand of cotton is seed quality. The use of high quality seed will produce a much better stand. High quality seed will resist most seedling diseases, while seeds of low quality prove to be extremely susceptible to such diseases. Seed of high quality will produce a long taproot, says Horne, instead of the short, stubby one that results from poor quality seed.

Seed can be treated with a fungicide before planting to reduce its susceptibility to diseases. Treated seed has a protection zone immediately around the seed. When the seed germinates, and the seedling leaves this zone in its growth, it again becomes susceptible to disease. In-furrow treatment with fungicides protects the seedling until it sprouts above ground. This practice is recommended where seedling disease is a consistent problem.

A good practice for control of cotton diseases is in crop residue management. Organisms which cause diseases often live in the crop residue that is left on the surface of the soil. Deep plowing, noted the pathologist, puts the organism far enough under the seedling to eliminate infection.

New strains of "cold tolerant" cotton are being developed. Farmers should watch the performance of these new strains as they are being tested, and put them to use when they are released, stressed Horne.

CONTROL OF PEACH AND PLUM INSECTS

Insect damage in the home orchard can impair the health and vigor of peach and plum trees as well as adversely affect the quality of fruit. Control of damaging pests is based on recognition of their damage and applying control measures at the proper time.

Effective insect control may be obtained by applying insecticides at various times during

the growing season according to the stage of growth of the trees. Information on the timing and insecticides recommended for control of various insect pests is contained in L-245, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruit and Nuts. Further information on insect pests is in MP-685, Peach and Plum Insects. Both of these publications are available at the county Extension agent's office.

The application of insecticides is also very important in obtaining effective control. In the home orchard a hand sprayer or a sprayer that can be attached to the hose might be used. When insecticides are applied, wet all the foliage and fruit thoroughly so that runoff of spray material occurs over the entire tree.

When shopping for insecticide to control peach and plum pests, read the label before you make your purchase and make certain that the insecticide can be applied in the manner in which you intend to use it. Reread the label just prior to the time you apply the insecticide and make sure you get the dosage right as well as follow all safety precautions.

GET FACTS ON WEED CONTROL SUGGESTS SPECIALIST

In years of good moisture and areas of high annual rainfall (above 30 inches), weed control is one of the most important factors to consider in getting a good stand of cotton, says Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist at Texas A&M University.

Chemicals for controlling weeds and grass offer a means of doing away with hand hoeing, as well as offering a cheaper method. There are a number of herbicides available, noted Elliott, but all of them have some limitations. It would be well to study all the materials and learn as much as possible about their use, pointed out the specialist.

There are nine chemicals recommended for use as pre-emerges in cotton. All of these can be applied in a band at the time of planting with equipment mounted on the tractor with the planter. Elliott said they can also be band or broadcast applied as a separate operation immediately after planting.

Two of these chemicals, Planavin and Treflan, must be soil incorporated. They can be applied broadcast in the fall or spring before planting, or can be sprayed on the beds, and then incorporated with a Roll-N-Cultivator, row disc, do-all, or roto-tiller. They may also be band incorporated with a roto-tiller at the time of bed shaping before planting, added Elliott.

Mechanical weed control and careful attention to cultivation is still cheaper and safer than all-out use of chemicals. In the years of low rainfall, the mechanical practices may be sufficient.

Each grower can work out a system suited to his land and equipment. Elliott added that a copy of B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals", available at the County Agent's office, would be helpful.

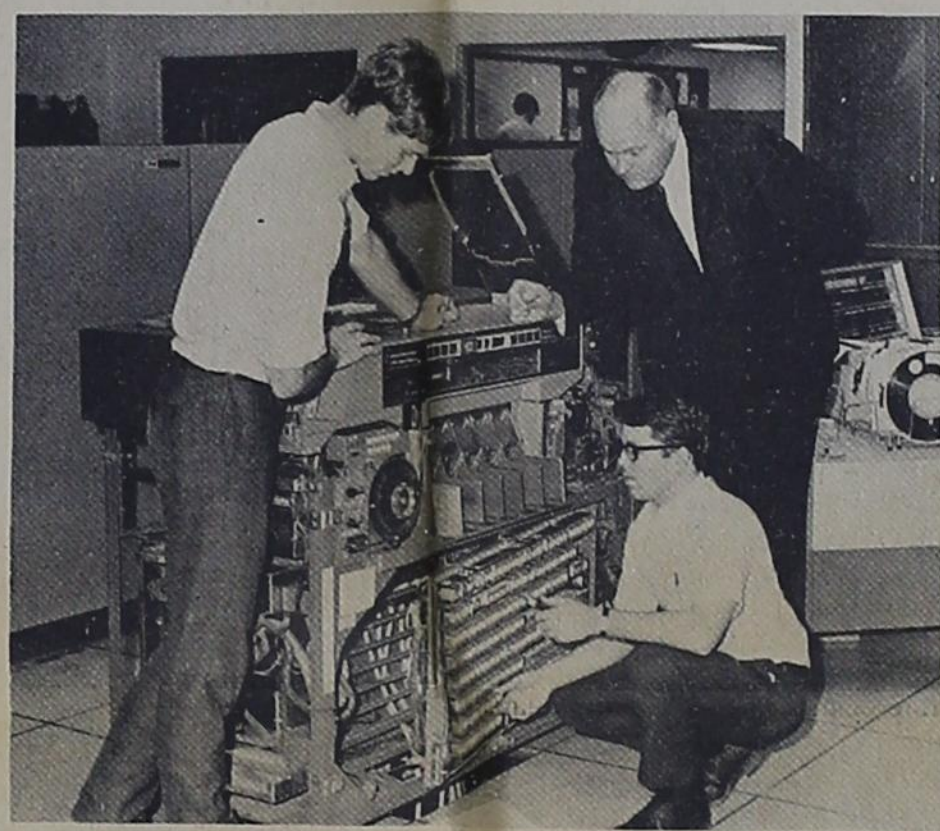

The computer needed such forms as Schedule B, Schedule C, Schedule D, Form 2440, "Statement to Support Exclusion of Sick Pay," and Form 3901 "Moving Adjustment."

Most folks don't like to write to a computer, so we recommend that you re-check that tax return. Make sure that all required supporting schedules or statements are attached.
