It appears that Internal Revenue overdid the job of simplifying the 1969 red, white and blue tax forms. As soon as the tax returns reached the computer, the computer started objecting to the taxpayers' entries on line 15b. This line was provided for taxpayers to adjust their gross income by deducting allowable sick pay, moving expenses, employee business expenses, and payments to self- selves justly entitled, as is employment retirement plans. However, in changing the 1040 tax form, IRS took several computations such as itemized deductions and dependents off Page 1. Many taxpayers obviously decided that Internal Revenue intended for them to put these deductions on line 15b. Entering the additional items on line 15b, in effect. gives the taxpayer a double deduction and creates a larger refund, which is erroneous.

Internal Revenue has a campaign on to get you to read your tax instructions carefully and to adjust only the items listed in the tax instructions for 15b. It appears that even the good tax folks can get too simple for us taxpayers even though we have been wishing that they would do just that for years.



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

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
