



Toliver won the broad jump, the 440 yard dash, and anchored both of Munday's winning relay teams. In the mile relay, Toliver took the baton in second place 12 yards behind Holliday's Yogi Gore and quickly took over the lead as he rocketed around the oval in 49.7 to win by 10 yards.

In the open quarter Toliver was clocked in 50.8 and he set the record in the broad jump with a leap of 22 1 3/8 to break the old record by 4 3/8 inches which was held by Iowa Park's Bobby Gilbreath.

Holliday's Anderson tied the record for the high jump with a leap of 6' 3", while Richard Albus, who set the record last year, finished fourth with a leap of 5' 10". Yogi Gore of Holliday was second in the event with a leap of 6' 9".

Crowell's Ken Sellers was another double winner as he took first place honors in the sprints. Sellers flashed to a 10.3 victory in the century and added the 220 title when he clocked a 22.8 to nip Chillicothe's Robert Tucker by one tenth of a sec-

In the 220 Tucker led coming out of the turn, but Sellers turned on the speed down the straightway to win by a step. Sellers ended up with 30 points for the afternoon.

Another record fell in the pole vault as Nocona's Jimmy Shields cleared the bar at 11' 6" beating the 1966 record by six inches.





According to the county nurse Mrs. Wretha Fitzgerald, children under a doctor's care at the time of rubella vaccine clinic should consult the doctor before taking the vaccine. Also children who are sick with high fever, those who are sensitive to chickens or ducks, chicken or duck eggs and feathers, or neomycin, or those who are being treated for cancer or leukemia should not receive the vaccine. Neither is it necessary for children who have already received the vaccine to

Mrs. Fitzgerald said that registration forms are being passed out in the various schools but will be available at the vaccine clinic for those who did not receive a form and for pre-schoolers.

Many - perhaps most - of them have doubtless heard of the need for early diagnosis and treatment. The trouble is, too often they don't act on it.

What is at the heart of the matter is obviously not so much a "communications gap" as an "action gap." The Society's messages of sense and safety are reaching millions . . . but all too many of us aren't really
