Look To The East

Floods, disaster, turmoil, foolishness, are-evaluation of the hippie movement!

We don't know what it's coming to!

We complain here in Knox County, and rightly so, we guess, about too much rain. True, we've had our portion of problems with the weather and from other sources--but, in the main, we remain the fortunate lot.

"Over 1,500 miles of flood." We heard that statement over the radio Thursday morning in a report of conditions along the mighty Mississippi River. The river, highest in history of records, had not then reached its crest, but millions of dollars in damage had been done.

Thousands of families from just below the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico had been forced to flee their homes. A total of 8,300 families along the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers had been affected.

Makes us kinda proud to be living on the prairies of West Texas--the Knox Prairie, in particular--where the floods are not of such nature as to endanger lives. One of our worries is that a huge sandstorm can come within an hour (maybe minutes) of a big rain.

Disaster has hit a number of areas, too, as the spring season and tornado season arrived. We guess about the nearest such disaster to us has been in Plainview, with deaths and great property damage.

Makes us watchful of all clouds, whether rain or storm clouds. They have a habit of coming up at the right time to disturb a good night's sleep, and when the tornado alert sounds the consequent result is a mass rush for the fraidy hole.

Melton Stapp, chief of police, says he'd rather blow that siren and nothing happens than to fail to blow it and disaster hits our town. A pretty good philosophy we call it.

One long blast doesn't mean head for the cellar, however. That's an alert--that angry clouds are forming and should be watched. When the short blasts occur--that means that you should "git out and git."

Turmoil. The war didn't end when the U. S. withdrew our fighting men from Vietnam. We don't begrudge this action one whit, because it also means the release of prisoners of war, and the return of our boys from the war-torn area.

But we're still fighting! U. S. Planes continue to fly missions in Cambodia: where, it appears, they've never heard of a cease fighting order.

Two Men Killed In Accident Friday

Death rode the route of Highway 277 as it entered the city limits of Munday at about 4 a.m. Friday, resulting in the death of two men.

Killed in the crash of a large truck, operated by the J. H. Rose Truck Line Corp. of Houston were the driver, Gary F. Gale, 22, of Morris, Okla., and Freddie M. Carroll, 29, of McCamey, who was asleep in the truck's "sleeper."

The truck, entering the city limits from the northeast, failed to negotiate a curve in the highway just about three blocks north of Munday's city hall, crossed a bar ditch, broke a utility pole at the ground and crashed into a large tree as it overturned.

Killed instantly was the driver, Gale. Carroll was still alive immediately after the crash, but expired before he could be removed from the wreckage. It took around 1 1/2 hours to free the victims from the wrecked vehicle. Aiding in the work were local officers, highway patrolmen, volunteers from the Munday Fire Dept., and several from Knox City.

The two men were pronounced dead at the scene at 5:15 a.m. by Billie Montgomery, justice of the peace. Investigating the accident were Patrolman Bryan Williams, Melton Stapp, local chief of police, and Tommy V. Hattox, night police.

The truck barely missed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Ramirez, where four people were sleeping. Something from the wreckage was thrown through the door of the home into the den, but none of the family was injured.

An automobile belonging to Ramirez which was parked in front of the home "was totally" according to reports.

Both bodies were taken to McCauley-Smith Funeral Home, and relatives were notified.

An air ambulance from Ada, Okla., flew to Munday and returned to Morris with Gale. Carroll was later removed to McCamey by ambulance.

Information secured locally indicated that Gale is survived by his father, Floyd Gale, Jr., of Morris, Okla., and that Carroll's survivors include a wife and small daughter. Wreckage of the truck was removed from the scene of the accident late Friday afternoon.



Farm And Ranch News

BOLL WEEVIL DIAPOUSE CONTROL

The purpose of a cotton boll weevil diapause control program is to increase yields, net income and use less insecticide spray applications in the future, according to Vernal Zessel, president of the Knox County Boll Weevil Association. Many cotton producers, landowners with cotton allotments and alternative to improve the sagging cotton industry for the county.

All interested persons are being asked to pay a \$5.00 membership to the Knox County Boll Weevil Association, a chartered, non profit organization. Share cost assistance from the state will be requested if participation is great enough. Meetings have been held and information on cotton boll weevil diapause control has been presented at Knox City, Rhineland, Gilliland and Munday. This information is to be presented in Goree, May 5.

Each ginning area in Knox County plus Vera and Benjamin is represented on the board of directors of the Knox County Boll Weevil Association. All cotton producers or landowners with cotton allotments should be interested in becoming a member of the association and trying to increase income from cotton. The last information received from the Vera community was that all producers approached paid membership dues except one.

COTTON PICTURE LOOKS GOOD
Texas cotton farmers can look forward to another good crop year if weather conditions don't affect production too severely, believes Charles Baker, marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Overall, the cotton picture looks good going into the 1973 season," says Baker, "In many cases, the situation is similar to last year. Crop contracting is active in southern areas of the state, with many farmers contracting for good prices--up to 35 cents a pound. The demand should again be strong this year, perhaps more so than last year since acreage allotments have been cut by 13 percent throughout the United States."

The 1973 crop should get off to a good start with favorable soil moisture levels over all the state.

On the gloomy side, reduced government payments and increased production costs will lower net income for the coming season.

Looking at the demand picture, Baker expects world consumption of cotton for 1973-74 to be up one million bales over the record 57 million bales for 1972-73.

Carryover in the U. S. last August was 3.4 million bales, the lowest in 20 years. By August of this year, carryover is expected to up a million bales even though exports are expected to increase from 3.3

million bales last season to 4.5 million this year.

Texas farmers will produce about 3.5 million bales this year compared to 3.9 last season. Most will stay close to their allotments as cotton prices are expected to be somewhat lower while feed grain prices are zooming. However, some of the setaside acres that have been freed recently may encourage additional plantings.

Nationwide, production for 1973 is expected to total about 12.5 million bales, down from the 13.5 million bales last year. The 1972 crop was the largest since 1965.

FEEDGRAIN OUTLOOK
A grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that exports are the key to the long-term feedgrain outlook. With high exports sales, above average prices are anticipated at harvest. Domestic Grain usage is also up due to increased livestock feeding. U. S. production is expected to reach near record levels in 1973, with feedgrain acreage up about 7 percent. In Texas, grain sorghum acreage should be up about 10 percent and soybeans up 5 percent, but corn acreage will increase only slightly.

STATE 4-H HORSE SHOW
The top 4-H horsemen in Texas will be competing in the State 4-H Horse Show Aug. 1-4 in the Ector County Coliseum in Odessa, according to a horse specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Events in roping, cutting and English and drill team competition will be open invitational. Competition in halter, showmanship, western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing events will be limited to those qualifying at

any of the 13 Extension Service district horse shows over the state. A new attraction at this year's event will be a handcraft show.

The District III 4-H horse show is to be July 6-7 at the Santa Rosa Roundup Grounds at Vernon.

Farm And Ranch News

BOLL WEEVIL DIAPAUSE CONTROL

The purpose of a cotton boll weevil diapause control program is to increase yields, net income and use less insecticide spray applications in the future, according to Vernal Zeissel, president of the Knox County Boll Weevil Association.

Many cotton producers, landowners with cotton allotments and alternative to improve the sagging cotton industry for the county.

All interested persons are being asked to pay a \$5.00 membership to the Knox County Boll Weevil Association, a chartered, non profit organization. Share cost assistance from the state will be requested if participation is great enough. Meetings have been held and information on cotton boll weevil diapause control has been presented at Knox City, Rhineland, Gililand and Munday. This information is to be presented in Goree, May 5.

Each ginning area in Knox County plus Vera and Benjamin is represented on the board of directors of the Knox County Boll Weevil Association. All cotton producers or landowners with cotton allotments should be interested in becoming a member of the association and trying to increase income from cotton. The last information received from the Vera community was that all producers approached paid membership dues except one.

COTTON PICTURE LOOKS GOOD

Texas cotton farmers can look forward to another good crop year if weather conditions don't affect production too severely, believes Charles Baker, marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Overall, the cotton picture looks good going into the 1973 season," says Baker. "In many cases, the situation is similar to last year. Crop contracting is active in southern areas of the state, with many farmers contracting for good prices--up to 35 cents a pound. The demand should again be strong this year, perhaps more so than last year since acreage allotments have been cut by 13 percent throughout the United States."

The 1973 crop should get off to a good start with favorable soil moisture levels over all the state. On the gloomy side, reduced government payments and increased production costs will lower net income for the coming season. Looking at the demand picture, Baker expects world consumption of cotton for 1973-74 to be up one million bales over the record 57 million bales for 1972-73.

Carryover in the U. S. last August was 3.4 million bales, the lowest in 20 years. By August of this year, carryover is expected to up a million bales even though exports are expected to increase from 3.3

million bales last season to 4.5 million this year.

Texas farmers will produce about 3.5 million bales this year compared to 3.9 last season. Most will stay close to their allotments as cotton prices are expected to be somewhat lower while feed grain prices are zooming. However, some of the setaside acres that have been freed recently may encourage additional plantings.

Nation wide, production for 1973 is expected to total about 12.5 million bales, down from the 13.5 million bales last year. The 1972 crop was the largest since 1965.

FEEDGRAIN OUTLOOK

A grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that exports are the key to the long-term feedgrain outlook. With high exports sales, above average prices are anticipated at harvest. Domestic Grain usage is also up due to increased livestock feeding. U. S. production is expected to reach near record levels in 1973, with feed-grain acreage up about 7 percent. In Texas, grain sorghum acreage should be up about 10 percent and soybeans up 56 percent, but corn acreage will increase only slightly.

STATE 4-H HORSE SHOW

The top 4-H horsemen in Texas will be competing in the State 4-H Horse Show Aug. 1-4 in the Ector County Coliseum in Odessa, according to a horse specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Events in roping, cutting and English and drill team competition will be open invitational. Competition in halter, showmanship, western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing events will be limited to those qualifying at

any of the 13 Extension Service district horse shows over the state. A new attraction at this year's event will be a handicraft show.

The District III 4-H horse show is to be July 6-7 at the Santa Rosa Roundup Grounds at Vernon.


