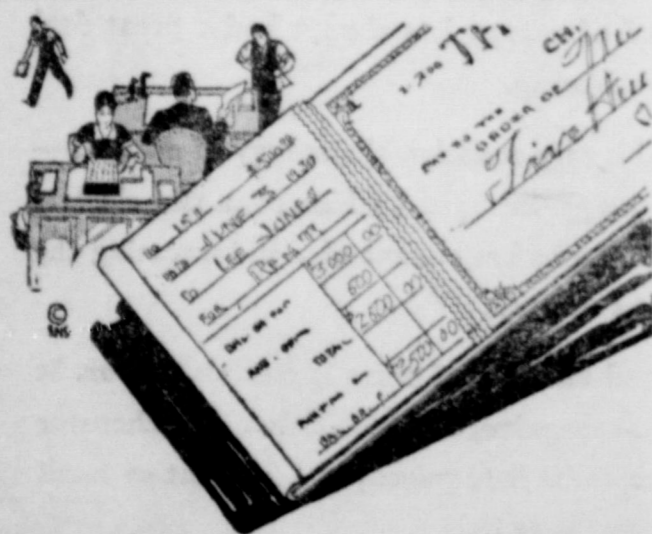

able citizens. I shall, if elected to the senate, make a careful personal study and investigation of the whole problem to the end that I may support legislation for a definite policy that will be to the best interest of the entire state.

It is now a well recognized principle that it is the duty of the state to furnish public education for the children to the end that they may be more prosperous, better and happier citizens. This is a debt that the present generation owes to the coming generations. I favor a continued liberal policy on the part of the state in carrying out this duty to the children of every class. This necessarily means a liberal policy toward the teachers.

I do not feel that the duty of the government toward the future generations closes with the matter of education. We are constantly voting bonds to raise money for present improvements, which we may enjoy. But these bonds usually run for a long term of years and the coming generations will be required to pay them off, whether the improvements are still in existence or have been worn out. And while we are leaving to the future generations this indebtedness and this burden, I believe that we should leave to them also some of the natural advantages and pleasures that are ours, with no expense on our part. I refer to the great out-

doors and the beneficial recreations that we have had and particularly that matter of game and fish. If I shall represent this district in the senate, I will follow officially the same course that I have followed as a private individual in bending every effort toward saving and bettering for the younger generation and future generations the fishing, hunting and other outdoor recreations that we have enjoyed.

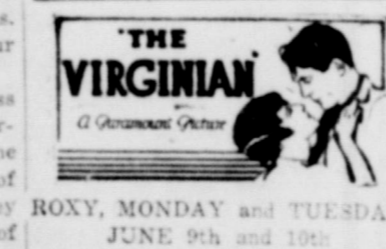
