Remember this, if we are busy looking after our own affairs, we will have little time to find fault and condemn the other fellow, and if we look after our own affairs as we should we will find little time to find fault with

Conditions are not just as we would have them, and probably never will be, but the sooner we cease to talk about the misfortunes that have come to our community, the sooner we will be on the road to recovery from the malady from which we are suffering most-loss of con-







Turkeys Offer Good Method of Utilizing Surplus Feedstuffs

However bad it is to guess what turkeys will bring this fall, it is pretty safe t osay that a pound of turkey will be worth more than five pounds of feed ,and that much or even less will make a pound of turkey.

What to Do:

With the abundance of feed now on hand, at absurdedly low prices, there is little excuse why our turkeys should not go on the market this year in extra god condition. Starat crowding the ourkeys now, by gradually incerasing the night allowance of grain . In a week or ten days give them all they will clean up. A mash feed is needed to balance this heavy grain feeding. To 84 pounds of either of the following, finely ground, maize, corn, oats, wheat, (all home grown feeds). Preferably a combination of two or more of the above mentioned grains are better than Here's How Those where fed singly.
