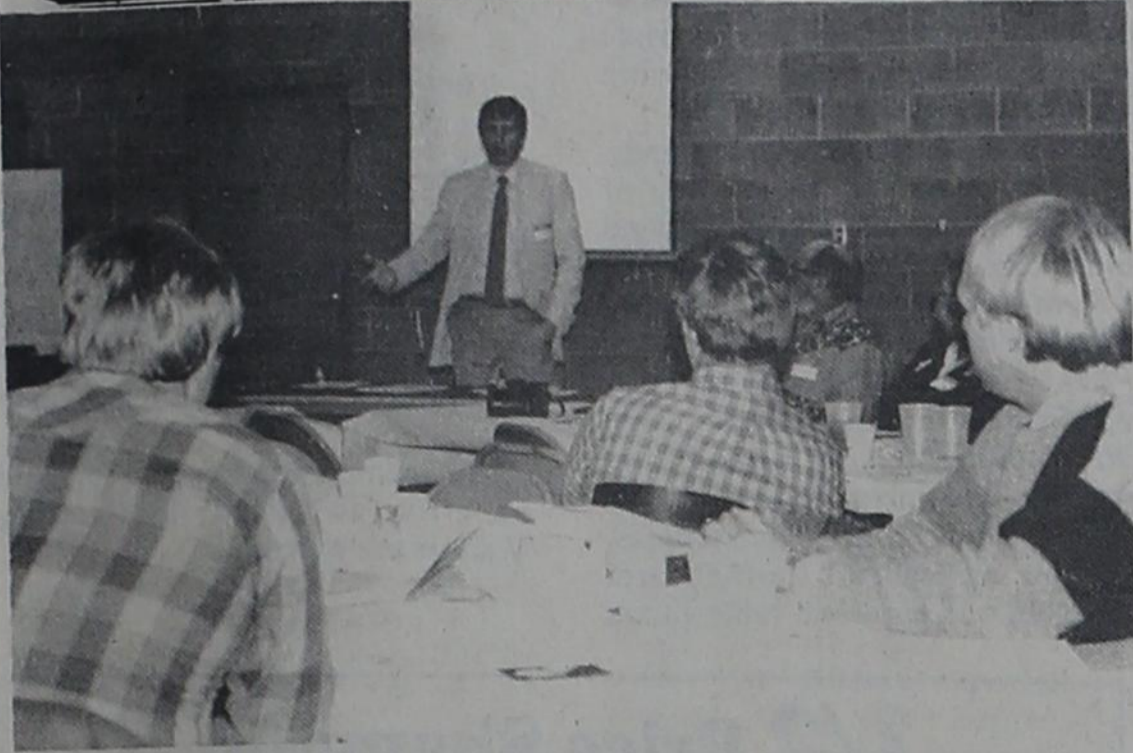

Local Producers Investigate Alternative Crops For Area

(Editor's note - The following coverage of the alternative crops seminar presented recently at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland was furnished to us by David Tunmire, Knox County Extension Agent in agriculture.)

More and more agricultural producers are looking into alternative crops as a way to become more economically stable. A program to help producers become familiar with possible alternative crops and their pros and cons was sponsored January 22 by the Knox County Extension Program Council crops committee.

Dr. Roland Roberts, Extension vegetable specialist, pointed out to those present that before selecting an alternative they must look at the market window for that crop. The market window includes the time when the crop is needed and how much demand there is for that particular commodity.

Potential crops discussed by Roberts included onions, potatoes, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, spinach and peppers. One advantage to the production of these crops in this area, according to Roberts, is our

Farm-To-Market Road Construction Planned

A pair of new farm-to-market roads planned by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will provide several benefits for residents of Munday and the surrounding area, and construction will begin as soon as legal preparations are completed.

The longest stretch of road to be constructed begins at the dirt road just west of Dr. W.H. Stewart's veterinary clinic and continues south and east 1.7 miles to U.S. Highway 277, coming to an end by Quality Implement Company south of town. The new road will follow the existing county road alignment with the exception of a curve instead of a T where the dirt road turns east.

The second new highway will be just less than a mile long, beginning 1.8 miles north of Munday on Farm to Market Road 267 (the Rhineland highway) and continuing east to end at Farm to Market Road 2811 at Offutt's Corner. It also follows the existing county road, one which becomes impassable during periods of heavy rain.

The major benefit to drivers in Munday will be a reduction in farm traffic traveling through town, as both the new roads will divert tractors, trucks and trailers away from the school zone and business area. This will also be a savings in time for farmers and their employees. In addition, the roads are expected to ease flooding problems in those areas.

The first order of business in preparing for the new roads, according to Knox County Judge David Perdue, is for the county to secure easements from the landowners whose property the roads will cross. Fewer than 20 landowners will be involved, and tracts of land needed are very small, most less than an acre.

Judge Perdue explained that they will ask these property owners to donate to the county the portion of their property needed to acquire the easements. But they are not required to make the donation unless they wish to do so. Landowners may ask the county to purchase the portion of their land needed, in which case the land must be appraised and a price in line with current appraisal values will be offered.

Because the sections of land needed are so small, Perdue continued, the price received by a landowner who sold his land instead of donating it would be correspondingly small, and would not, in fact, outweigh the benefits of having a paved road instead of a dirt road on which to travel. But the county is prepared to pay for at least part of the land, since some landowners have already agreed verbally to donate their property.

Other costs the county must absorb on the road project will be replacing of fences, utility and telephone poles, water line and oil pipes which may be affected by the construction. After the county has secured the easements on the property and provided the cost of utility adjustments, the state will proceed with construction.

Perdue said officials would begin talking to the landowners next week about securing the easements. Robert Hosea of the Munday Highway Department office said contractors would bid on the construction work in August, with construction to begin possibly as early as September. The estimated completion date, which allows for shutdown time during inclement weather, is May or June of 1989.

Construction cost of the longer road, for which 10.84 acres of land will be needed, is estimated at \$260,000. The shorter road north of town will require 1.55 acres of land, and the estimated cost is \$100,000.

Munday Back On Its Feet On First Anniversary Of Fire

Wonder how many people in Munday took special note of the date January 22, which was last Friday. Several should have - really, all of us should - because it was the first anniversary of a day that we haven't forgotten.

On Thursday, January 22, 1987, most of us awoke to the news that our downtown was on fire. Actually, not all of the area was burning, but the loss of four businesses was devastating enough to a small rural town struggling to survive disasters in the farms and oilfields that surround the area.

Of the four businesses, two of them - Haynie's Barber Shop and the Video Station - moved to new locations. The Carousel Beauty Shop is no longer, but operator Janie Hendrix just took on a partner, found another shop and changed the name to Shear Looks. Only Clarice's, a dress shop which served customers here for many years, has remained closed. In the ensuing year, one more clothing shop, the Little Bug, also closed, but another opened, and we hope S&L Apparel enjoys a long and successful business life.

Unfortunately, the location of the original stores still is vacant, a mute reminder of that bleak day last winter. As we remember the awful fire, we should also remember the

Six Munday Students To Compete In Spelling Bee

Thirty-seven Munday Elementary School students entered the first spelling bee held in Munday in several years. The final round of the contest is set for February 15, with the winner to represent Munday at the district spelling bee in Wichita Falls on April 9.

Students in grades three through

six entered the first round of the contest, which was held December 7. Twenty contestants advanced to the second round after a 50-word written exam. Another 50 words were spelled by these 20 quarter-finalists, with 10 eliminated from competition.

In the third round, held Monday, the 10 semifinalists took another test containing 50 words to be written, and six were chosen to compete in the final round, in which the youngsters will spell orally.

Contestants in the spelling bee will be Kandis Longan, third grade; Zane Donoho and Jennifer Baker, fourth grade; and Michele Berryhill, Laura Burnett and Melissa Berryhill, sixth grade.

The Wichita Falls district spelling bee, which is sponsored by the Wichita Falls Times-Record News, will be held at the Woman's Forum building. The winner of the contest will compete in the national spelling bee, set for June in Washington, D.C.

Also honored on the All-Area team were Ron Steele, who coached the Moguls during the past two football seasons; small school Coach of the Year; junior interior lineman Lowell Hutchens on the offensive team and junior linebacker Chad Bordovsky on the defensive squad.

District 5 placed three of the top four honorees on the small school team; in addition to Stinnett and Steele, Paducah's Will Flemons was named Defensive Player of the Year. The small school team included players from schools classified Class 3-A or below.

Williams with 5, and everyone on the team scored at least one basket.

SMALL MEALS NO ADVANTAGE

Contrary to the common advice, eating several small meals each day may not help burn up more calories than eating the same amount of food in only one or two large meals. A study at the Western Human Nutrition Research Center in San Francisco showed that the rate at which the body uses calories in foods during digestion was essentially the same, whether volunteers ate two large meals or ate the same amount of food at several smaller meals. The smaller meals may have some physiological and psychological benefits for dieters, and may be a necessity for people with diabetes or other disorders. But splitting the day's intake into smaller meals may not, by itself, boost the rate at which the body uses up calories.

MEDICAL BENEFITS FOR THE UNINSURED

According to a federal law which took effect January 1, 1987, if you become unemployed or divorced or separated from a spouse with medical insurance benefits, you may be able to continue your coverage. If you become unemployed, you can continue to pay your share of medical insurance premiums (usually at a low group rate) and maintain your insurance coverage for up to 18 months. If you become divorced or separated and had relied on your spouse's medical benefits, you can continue to pay your share of the premiums and maintain your coverage for up to 3 years. This also includes coverage for any dependents. But it's critical that you make insurance premium payments on time, since coverage is contingent upon being "paid up."

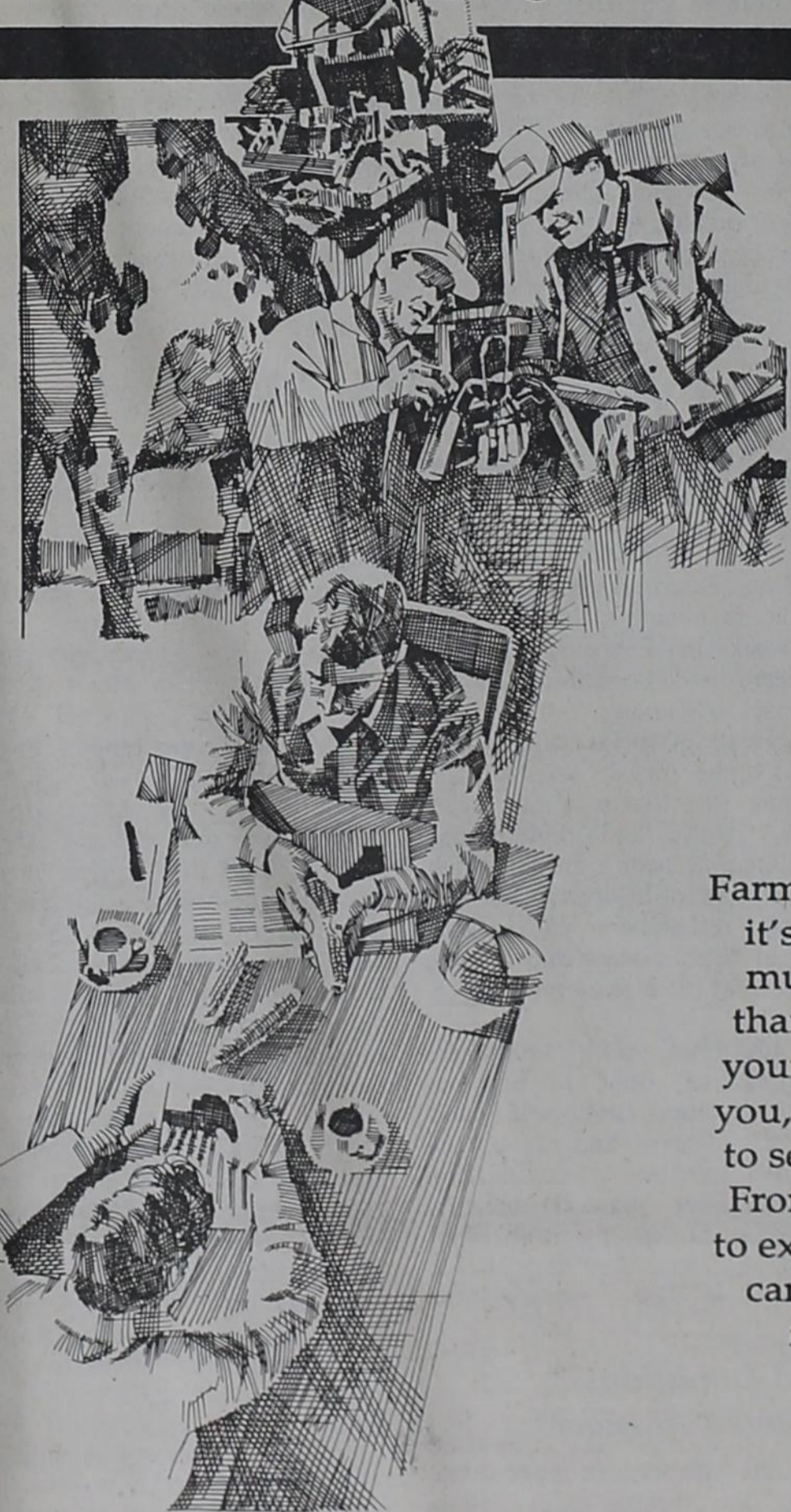

Report Changes Which May Affect Size Of SSI Check

People in this area who receive supplemental security income (SSI) checks should know that they must report changes in their situation that can affect the amount of their check, Frances Braden, Social Security representative in Vernon, said recently.

Failure to report a change can cause an overpayment which must be repaid or may cause the person to miss out on money they should get, Braden said. A change should be reported within ten days after the change occurred.

People should report:

*Starting or any change in checking or savings accounts, a Christmas club or certificates of deposit.

*If their name is on a joint bank account with someone else, even if the person getting SSI does not use the account. Also report any change in this account.

*Any change in earnings from a

job.
*Any change in any other income.
*If a person gets help with living expenses.
*If a person enters or leaves an institution.

*Any change in address.
*If the person leaves the U.S.
*If someone moves into or out of the person's house, or a baby is born, or someone dies.

*Buying or selling real estate or any other kind of property.
*Marriage or divorce.

*A disabled or blind person's condition improves.

Changes can be reported by telephone, in writing, or in person. The Vernon Social Security office is located at 1701 Cumberland and the telephone number is 817-552-9346.

TAX CHANGES AFFECTING '87 RETURN

Agricultural producers need to keep in mind the more significant changes of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 as they prepare to file their federal income tax return.

These changes include the following:

1. Tax rates have been reduced and tax brackets have been expanded. For example, the marginal income tax rate for a married couple filing a joint return is 15 percent on

taxable income between \$3,000 and \$28,000.

2. Personal exemptions have been increased from \$1,080 to \$1,900.

3. The standard deduction for a married couple filing a joint return has increased by \$90 to \$3,760, but is scheduled to increase to \$5,000 in 1988.

4. A self-employed individual is allowed to deduct 25 percent of what he or she pays under an insured or self-insured family health plan. This is not available if the self-

employed person participates in a health plan furnished by his or her spouse's employer.

5. Capital purchases of up to \$10,000 on eligible property may be deducted in the year of purchase.

6. Limits have been placed on the amount of prepaid farming expenses that can currently be deducted if you use the cash-basis method of accounting. The limitation applies to prepaid expenses in excess of 50 percent of the nonprepaid farming expenses.

7. Deductions for IRA contributions are phased out for middle to high income individuals who are covered under another qualified pension plan.

Items that have been eliminated by tax reform legislation include the following:

1. Two-earner deduction for married couples.
2. Income averaging.
3. Capital gains exclusion (there are special rules for participants in the dairy herd buy-out program.)
4. Land clearing expense. Conservation expenses must be part of an approved plan.
5. Dividend exclusion.
6. Charitable contributions. These must now be included with other itemized deductions.
