## City Police Officials Issue Reminder To Dog Owners


#### Abstract

A large number of dogs running loose strays, has promoted officials of the City of Munday Police Department to issue a reminder to dog owners in the city. According to the City Ordinance, it is unlawful for any person to allow any dog torun at large within the city limits, rand willful violation can mean a fine of up to $\$ 100$. up to $\$ 100$. Police officials request that owners of our canine friend obtain a complete copy of the ordinance available at City Hall. The following is an segment from that ordinance. "It shall be unlawful for any person to allow any dog to run at large within the allow any dog to run at large within the corporate limits of said City, provided that the term "run at large" shall be construed to mean the permitting of such dog to go off the premises of its owner without being securely restrained and in charge of a competent person. Be it further ordained that after th effective date hereof, the Police Chie or any police officer of the City Munday, shall sieze such animal found running at large in violation of this ordinance and impound it in such plac as shall be provided by the City Council of this city. Be of a urther ordained that the disco ery of a dog running at large by the Chief of Police or a member of the City Police Department shall be prima facia

It shall be unlawful It shall be unlawful for any person to allow any dog of dangerous, vicious, fierce, or mischievion fierce, or mischievious propensities or lendencies and any female dog in heat he allowed upon any street, avenue, highway, alley, sidewalk, parkway or other public place within the city whether such dog is under the control of the owner or any other person, either by leash, cord, chain, or otherwise Any such dog so found upon any of the public places shall be taken up and impounded and shall not be released except upon the approval by the Chie of Police; provided however, that if any ous dog so found cannot be tischiev and impounded with reasonable safety for the person attempting the same, such dog may be slain by any policeman dog may be slain by any policeman."

Conservation Service Introduces New Erosion Control Structure


FIFTY YEARS AGO, when rangeland pasture grasses went
dormant in winter and were low in nutrients, livestock owners dormant ith foresight fed silage, hay or cottonseed cake. But weight loss of livestook was expected and the usual man-
