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NOW FOR THE NEW DEAL.

When the bottom is reached there remains but one direction in which to go—upward! And we believe the present crisis in banking circles has merely served as a signal to the people of this nation that the bottom has been reached, and as the crisis has been reached just at a time when a Democratic administration is taking over the responsibilities of government, naturally the first order of business for the new administration is to exert every effort to rectify the ills that have beset the people of the nation during four years of Republican misadministration, plundering and graft.

In Knox County Homes and Gardens

By Mrs. Jewell Eastover

March is the time for the planting of grapes and berries as well as the time for planting our gardens.

A list of some of the vegetables that should be planted between now and March 15th, and the varieties that are best adapted to the section, as recommended by J. E. Blandworth, Extension Horticulturist, are as follows:

Apples—Hart Washington or Martha Washington.
Lettuce—Los Angeles or Big Boy.
Spinach—Blanchette variety or Long Standing.
Beans—Great Northern variety.
Cucumbers—Globe or Champion.
Squash—Candy's Egyptian or Delectable.
Carrots—Chattahoochee or Danvers Half Long.
Cabbage—Early Jersey Wakefield, Copenhagen, Market or Glory of Easton.
Pepper—Baby King.
Tomatoes—Marigold, Gulf State Market or Globe.

If you are planning to set out grapes or berries in March here are a few suggestions as to the variety to choose:

Grapes—Carnation, Beacon, Essex, Niagara, Concord.
Berries—Dixie, No. 1, No. 2, Texas Wonder.
Strawberries—Austin King.

Knox county is especially adapted to the growing of grapes and berries. Besides having plenty of frost-free days in season, I received 10 quarts from my vine last year," said Mrs. G. L. Pratt of the Munday Home Demonstration club. Because the berries have proved so successful, Mrs. Pratt plans to set out 200 vines this year and a good many more from the year.

"I have just received my order that we can have fruit in Knox county if we only plant the right variety," said Mrs. Ray Jones of the Munday club. Mrs. Jones plans to set out a number of peach trees as well as some grapes and berry vines. Mrs. Jones has been a 45 year

demonstrator for two years and is making her plans for a full penny this year. She is beginning her work by laying her coffee garden with the for sub-irrigation.

A balanced garden plan for a family of five that many demonstrators have used with satisfaction calls for the following in 1/2-acre area: 10 feet of shallots, 10 feet of mustard, 10 feet of New Zealand spinach, 10 feet of cauliflower, 10 feet of lettuce, 10 feet of Swiss chard, 10 feet onion sets or plants, 10 feet of garlic, 10 feet of chili, 10 feet of wild pepper, 10 feet of English peas (two plantings on same soil two weeks apart), 10 feet of beans, 10 feet of turnips, 10 feet of lima beans, 10 feet of carrots, 10 feet of spinach, 10 feet of bush beans, 10 feet of early cabbage, 10 feet of leaf peas, 10 feet of egg plants and bell peppers, 10 feet of okra, and 10 feet of leaf lettuce, 10 feet each of squash and cucumbers, and 10 feet of small

tomatoes, 10 feet of asparagus, and 10 feet of eggplant.
This plan gives at least five vegetables and 72 feet of row space to the lady and grows vegetables at least two varieties and 72 feet of row space to the sturdy kind; at least two varieties and 72 feet of row space to green fruits; and at least five varieties and 72 feet of row space to other kinds of vegetables. Such a balance as this is required for health. Varieties may be substituted in the above plan but replacements should be made with other varieties of the same class, that is, if eggplant is left out, one or more other leafy vegetables should replace it, such as cauliflower, broccoli, rape, kale, or Brussels sprouts.

Tips on Taxes

Only forms of only thirty-two. Until recently he had only twenty-five. The proposed increase was made possible by reducing salaries and thus using the same appropriation to employ a larger number of field men. This form has the duty of enforcing collections of the following taxes: gasoline, gross receipts, inheritance and cigarette. Combined they brought into the state treasury about thirty million dollars last year.

The field men have many other duties, such as auditing records of county tax collectors and generally protecting the state's interests in tax matters. It is obvious that such a small force cannot adequately deal with the thousands of different farms, corporations and many officials throughout the state. Serious steps are being taken to employ a larger number of field men. Mr. Sheppard estimates that at least five million dollars is lost annually in evasions of the gasoline tax and cigarette tax, besides considerable losses in inheritance taxes and losses in various taxes, because of inability of the field men to make regular and thorough audits. With these evasions stopped, Sheppard believes the state would be on a cash basis, even without any other special reforms in the tax office.

Senator Baskin of Munday has introduced a bill limiting benefits of the Confederate pension to those who are in actual war. There is a large number in the field and the total number are increasing, due to liberalization of the law. The estimate, prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, is that there are 100,000 in the state.

1932. The House has passed a bill reducing the poll tax to \$1. The Senate is yet to act on the measure.

Proposals to reduce the gasoline tax below four cents per gallon were rejected by the House during the past week.
