

The city council on last Monday evening issued instruction to Chief of Police Shannon Layne to rigidly enforce the ordinance prohibiting center parking on the business streets of the city hereafter, and the public is hereby informed that this ordinance will be enforced

This action is taken with a view of eliminating danger to pedestrians in crossing the streets, as it is extremely hazardous to pedestrians crossing the streets when cars parked in the center of the streets obstruct view of approaching cars, and it is hoped that no serious inconvenience will result, and it is the opinion of the council in ordering enforcemet of the ordinance that at this season of the year there is no great necessity for center parking, since there are not a great number of cars on the streets at any time.







Every death of this kind is a senseless, useless waste of life for no good purpose. It is not enough to say that fatal accidents are the fault of careless drivers; the situation calls for some way of insuring against carelessness in driving. The best insurance of this is requiring everyone who drives a car to be licensed, after a rigid examination into their ability to drive carefully, and then to enforce strict ly the laws forbidding unlicensed drivers to sit behind a steering wheel and punishing the licensed dri ver for any accident which causes injury to persons or property. In the half dozen states in which such laws and regulations exist the proportion of automobile accidents is lower than anywhere else. Automobile drivers are not always t fault. While 44 percent of the persons killed by automobiles last year were pedestrians who were struck by cars, nearly half of those were killed by their own carelessness atersections, or stepping traffic from behind parked cars. No sane person would think of letting a boy or girl handle firearms without making sure that they thor-

oughly understood the danger inherent in their use and knew perfectly well how to handle them. But people who shudder at the idea of giving children firearms to play with let them run automobiles without any evidence that they have the necessary skill and presence of mind and ntelligence to handle them safely. 


