





## Rev. Rex Ray Tells Of Conditions In China As Seen By Missionary

Southern Baptist Mission, Kweilin, China, March 26, 1948.  
Dear Friends and Fellow-Pilgrims:

Really I would much prefer to make this a very special letter but I must hurry to make it even a Mimeograph Special. I shall try to tell you a little about things over on this side of the Pacific-ocean-fence.

Early in Jan. Mrs. Ray and I made a trip by ship, Chinese boats and buses from Hong Kong to Toi Shan City in Kwong Tung Province. Upon our arrival we found there was not a Baptist or Protestant missionary in that section of the country. Our group of Chinese Baptist told us they had been praying the Lord would send them some missionaries to work with them and felt that Mrs. Ray and I were the answer to their prayers. It greatly humbled us to hear them talk thus. Anyway I left Mrs. Ray there with them and continued my journey by bus as far as it went. Then I mounted the baggage carrier on the back end of a bicycle while the Chinese bicyclist peddled his bike and me across the country for 30 Chinese miles. From there I walked over the mountains to Chek Kai village or town. I preached there the next day Sunday in our new Baptist Chapel. That night we set sail or rather rowed in a fishing junk, as there was a dead calm, across the open sea to our Tai Kam leper colony and hospital. Just before sunrise we dropped anchor in the bay just off shore from the leper colony and ate breakfast on deck of the

boat. Upon our arrival in the bay I blew a big conk-shell horn. The response from the lepers on shore was beautiful. They replied by singing Christian songs. It was glorious music coming from the hearts of lepers who were anxiously awaiting our arrival. This solemn hour made me think of that hour ahead when some early morning my little bark will drop anchor on eternity's shore where I shall hear the voices of the redeemed welcoming me home from my Last Cruise.

The Chinese pastor, Ng Chaak Wing, and I went ashore and met the smiling lepers. Three of them were the only survivors out of more than a hundred who were in the colony when the Japanese attacked. After a happy greeting we went with the lepers to the church building where I helped conduct services with them. There were no chairs or benches left in the place but the Christian lepers still had their song books and we all sang together for the Lord. Following this service Bro. Ng Chaak Wing and I examined all the buildings thoroughly, and found the twelve dormitories, the church, hospital, administration, and Mrs. Lake chapel buildings and found all of them in fairly good conditions except the doors, windows and furniture and fixtures were missing. All that will be needed to rehabilitate this leper property will be to replace the doors, windows and furniture and fixtures, cooking utensils, beds, medical supplies and equipment for the hospital.

This week I shall begin packing some medical supplies, mosquito nets and blankets for this Tai Kam leper colony. We already have some clothing that was sent out by Mrs. Ray and myself for the lepers. That is Mrs. Ray and I brought out these supplies that were given by you friends in America. Later I shall let you know more about this leper work that was planted years ago by the John Lakes on Tai Kam Island.

A few days ago we welcomed some 70 members of the staff from our Cheng Chow Baptist Hospital in Honan Province. The Communists had driven them out and gladly we accepted them to join in running the Kweilin Baptist Hospital. Dr. Ayers and his loyal staff have brought much joy to us here. The 15 tons of hospital equipment they brought with them added to what I already have on hand will help greatly to carry on the work here.

Last week two of our missionaries, Miss Bradley of Wuchow and Miss Lovegren of Kweilin. Dr. Ayers, Bro. Oz Quick and I rushed to them and their fellow Chinese passengers. I drove our newly-acquired Dodge truck. Dr. Ayers assisted by Bro. Quick bound up the broken Chinese arm and a leg as well as cuts and bruises. Miss Bradley had several cuts and bruises on her head. Miss Lovegren was unhurt. When the bus wreck happened the heathen Chinese who gathered around the wreck absolutely refused to help with the wounded unless they were paid in cash. They were not paid and the unhurt passengers extricated themselves and then cared for the wounded until we arrived. We loaded our truck full of wounded after first-aid bandaging and started. Water killed our engine and the cold north rains held us and kept our truck load of wounded and us shivering until

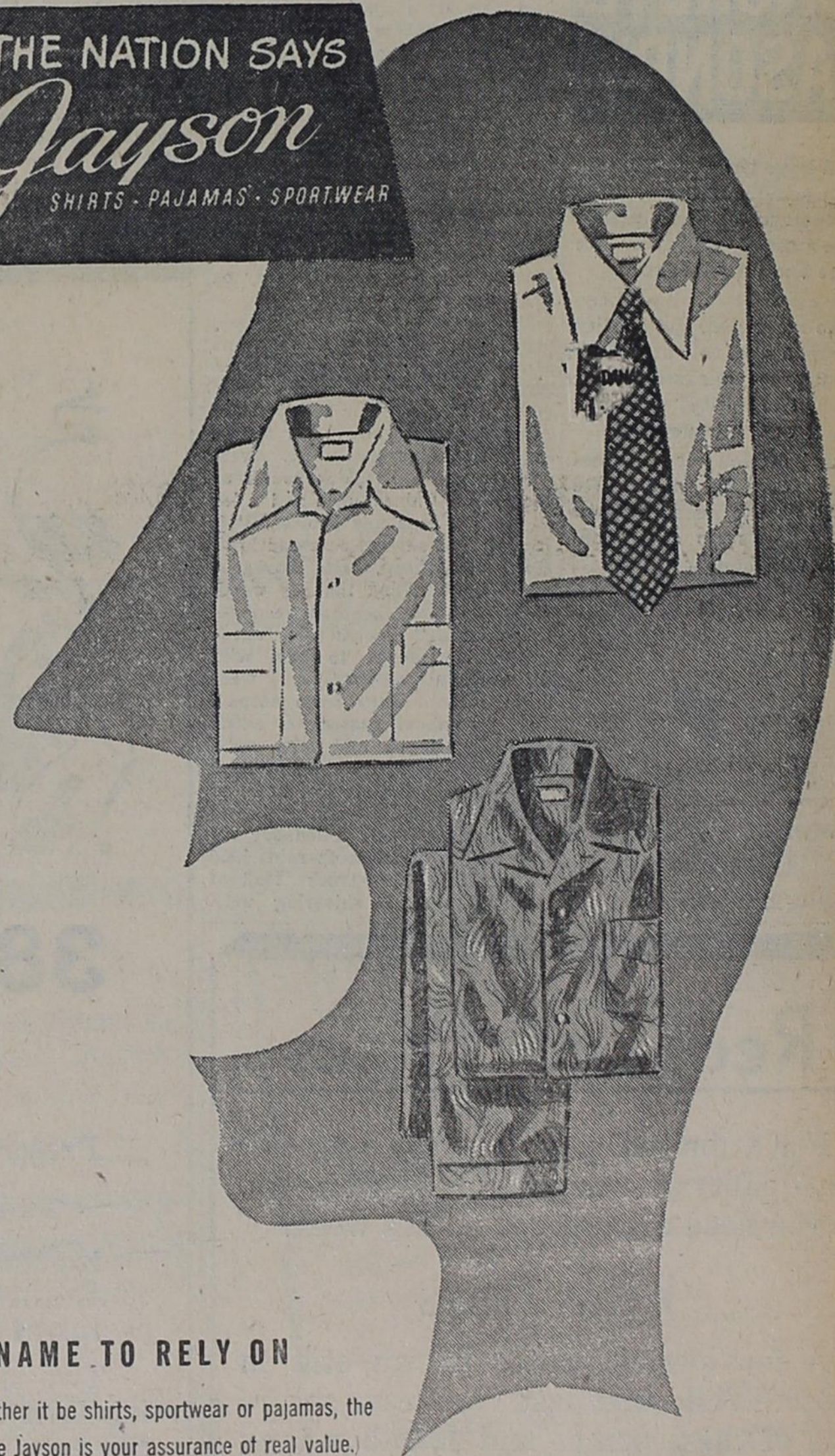

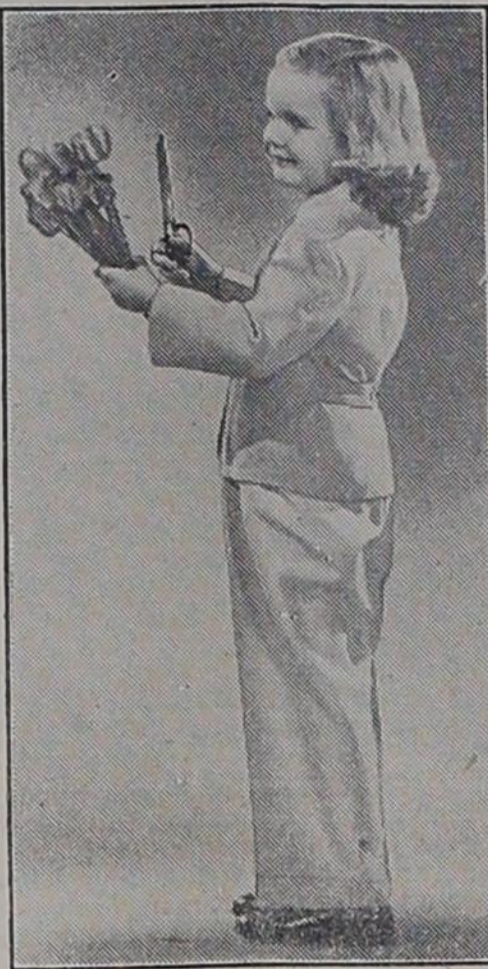
Dr. Umphrey Lee, SMU president, delivered a commencement address to more than 600 seniors, largest graduating class in SMU history.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin—A warning against the hitch-hiking germ of typhoid fever has just been issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. They must catch a ride from an infected person to the well person; this is generally accomplished by water, milk, flies, fingers, or food. Every case is contracted by way of the mouth and digestive system.

A carrier is a person who has had typhoid fever at some time and who even after recovery carries the germs of the disease in the urine and discharge of the bowels. Carriers who are careless in their personal habits are likely to infect any food they handle with unwashed hands. Some of the most serious and far-reaching outbreaks of the disease have been caused by drinking milk or eating foods that have been handled by carriers. Persons may be carriers without knowing it.

Typhoid fever is unnecessary and preventable. Every case is due either to community negligence or to the ignorance or carelessness of some individual. Persons planning a vacation or trip where sanitation may not be rigidly enforced should protect themselves against this disease by being vaccinated. Inoculation with typhoid vaccine, a week apart, is all that is necessary to secure protection against this disease for two years. The purity of water, milk, or food cannot be judged by looking at it so the best thing to do is to play safe and have your physician protect you.

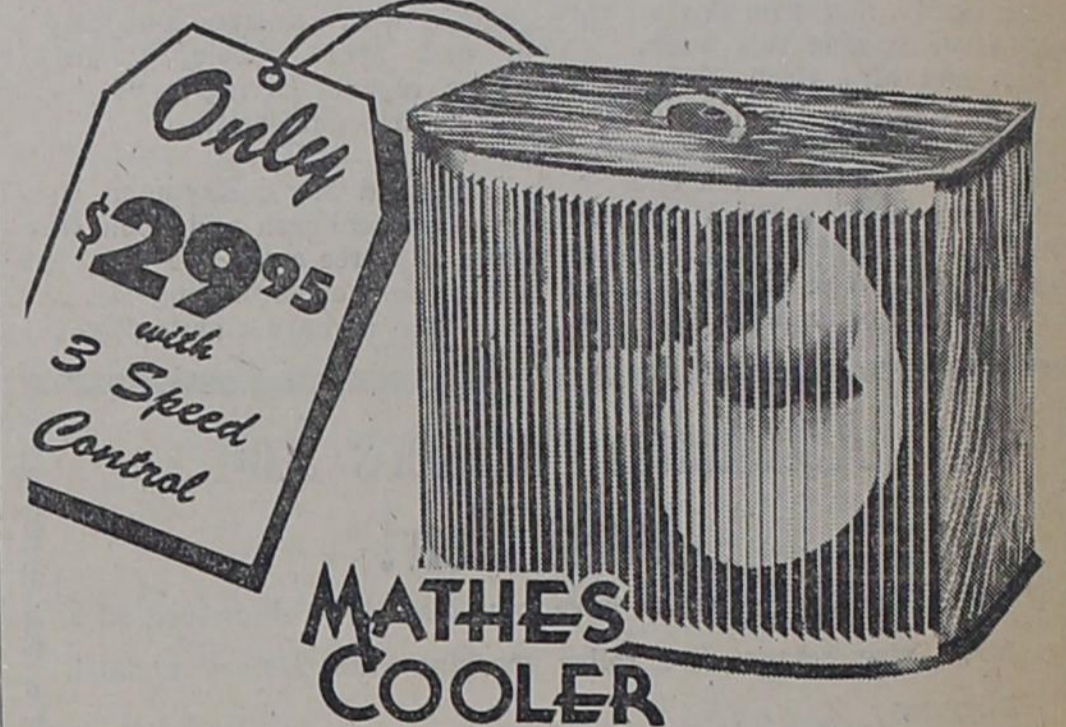

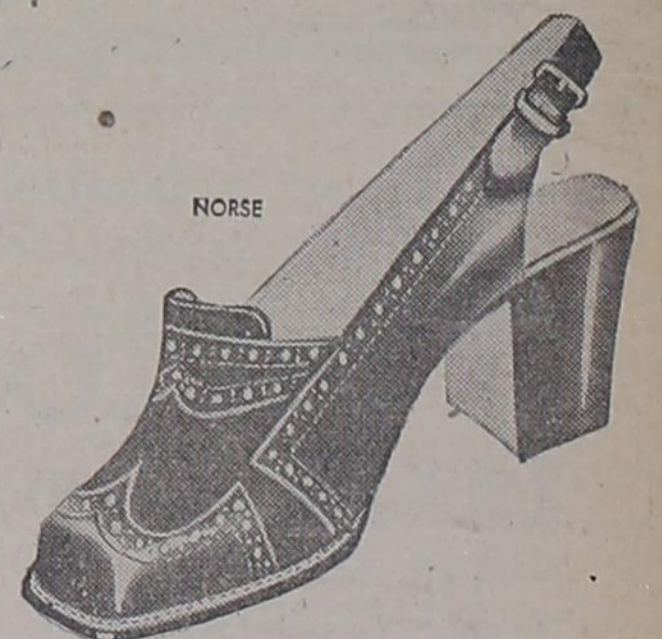

## Walker Is Made Range Specialist

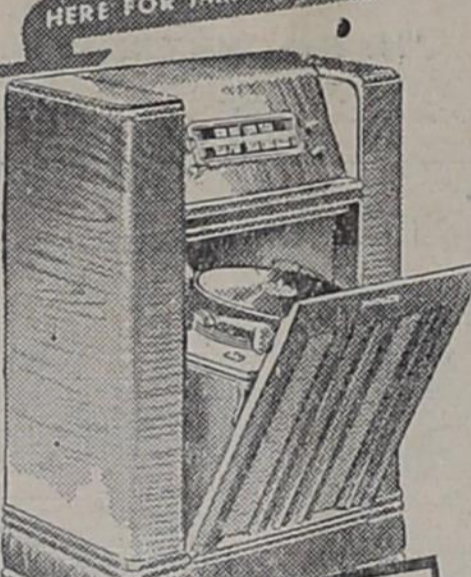

## Veterans' News

The Veterans Administration reminds all veterans training in colleges and universities under the GI Bill that they will automatically be granted 15 days leave at the end of the present term.

Subsistence allowance will be paid and entitlement charged for this leave period.

Veterans who do not want their entitlement reduced by the leave should already have posted notices to VA.

Most of the veterans in schools and colleges under the GI Bill and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) for disabled veterans are attending one school only, a Veterans Administration survey reveals.

The survey, based on the training elections of the 1,800,000 veterans in schools during November, 1947, shows 1,609,000 confined their studies to a single school.

Almost 4,000 study in more than one school. Combining school and job training, but taking the majority of the training in schools are 15,700.

Over 171,000 limit their studies to correspondence schools, while 1,400 combine regular school studies with correspondence school work.

Veterans needlessly take the chance of losing their money and their insurance protection when they mail cash to pay premiums on National Service Life Insurance policies, Veterans Administration warned.

A veteran making his payments in cash through ordinary mail has no way to prove he made the payment in the event it fails to reach VA. Veterans are urged to use money orders, postal notes, or checks for NSLI premiums, and also to use the yellow envelopes furnished by VA in mailing payments.

Questions And Answers  
Q. If I attend summer sessions at the college where I am enrolled under the education benefits of the GI Bill, do I need a supplemental certificate of eligibility?

A. No. The only time you need a supplemental VA certificate of eligibility to attend summer school is when you transfer to another school for the summer term.

Q. I am a U. S. citizen and have received war service gratuity and reestablishment of credit benefits from the Canadian Government. Am I entitled to loan benefits under the GI Bill?

A. Veterans Administration has ruled that the loan benefits under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act are neither the same nor similar to, "war service gratuity" and the "reestablishment credit" apparently paid you in cash by the Canadian Government. Therefore you are entitled to a loan guaranty if you are otherwise qualified.

DR. ROBERT A. MILLIKAN, one of the world's most distinguished scientists and Nobel prize winner, has referred to current proposals for federal aid to education as "another of those efforts to clear out the cockroaches by burning the house down." That is right. More federal aid might bring increased teachers' salaries, which all of us want. But I stand in constant amazement that so many folks in the education profession are blind to the tremendous dangers of federal aid.

Not to be outdone by those clamoring for money to be routed via Washington for the public schools, college and university administrators recently climbed on the bandwagon and put in for their share. At a major conference of higher education in Chicago, Dr. Alonzo Myers of New York University proposed a catch-all program that would call for expenditures dwarfing those in public school bills now in Congress.

Ask For AMONG other Your Part things, this program would set up an "Educational Reconstruction Finance Corporation." As a government project, this bureau would no doubt take bookkeeping lessons from RFC and TVA. Both of these have tucked away millions of wasted tax dollars. Experts have said that it will be impossible for RFC ever to account for all of its funds. After this ERFC, we can expect other RFCs for any group that has enough power and votes to get the ear of Congress.

Not to be outdone in the scramble, educators from several private colleges (not state-supported) fought strenuously at the above-mentioned conference for federal aid. Their impelling mo-

tives went like this: In any disposal of federal funds, we must not be neglected! In other words, as long as Washington is throwing the money around, you have nothing to lose to ask for your share.

Must Keep TO ME, all these Local Control things look like very poor Americanism. Is this a generation that runs to Washington and Congress to receive cure for every ill that besets the community? If our local people (states and communities) haven't got the backbone to take adequate care of their educational problems, then for sure more money from the federal government will not remedy the situation. And that goes for Arkansas, too.

But the nub of it is: local communities have done plenty, still are doing things about local and state needs in education. I have no patience with those who halloo the internal propaganda machine in Russia and call it education. We have done more to educate our youth than any Communist country ever will be able to do — under Communism. There's nothing radically wrong with American education. But there will be — if we hand control over to Washington.

Education is one of the biggest enterprises in America. When we give over to the federal government the purse strings for local education, then we have taken the long step toward Socialism. What we must do is get the federal government off the necks of taxpayers. Then the states can collect more taxes and there is no rime nor reason left to get education expenses from Washington. We must draw the line on this dangerous trend. Let's have no so-called "federal aid."

next spring. This clover is a very good soil conservation crop and grows well on all types of soil except deep sand.

Farmers are urged to prepare now for next year's grass seeding. This should be done by drilling in something like Sudan or some grain sorghum. This then should be prevented from making seed either by mowing or cutting high with a combine so as to leave plenty of residue on the surface to shade the ground. The grass seed should then be planted in this mulch in the spring. The Soil Conservation Service technicians working with the District have found the above method of planting grass seed a lot more effective than bare ground planting.

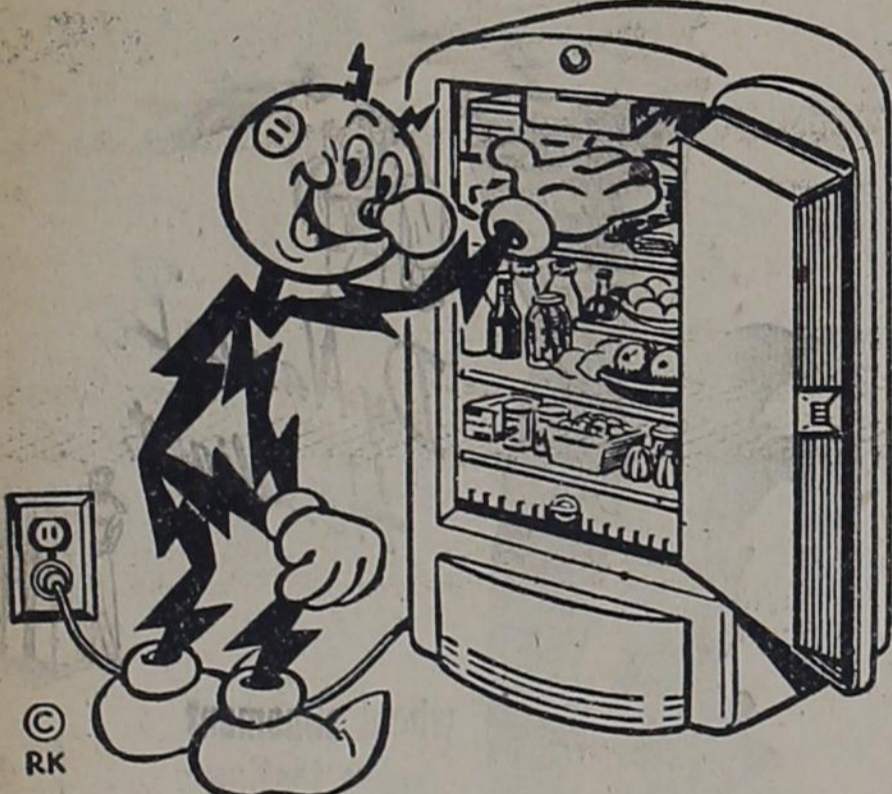
