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How Will The Twenty Million For Relief Be Spent

The citizens of Texas by their vote have recently authorized the issuance of bonds in the sum of twenty millions for relief work in Texas. While no provision has been made as to the methods by which these bonds are to be paid, should they be authorized by the special called session of the legislature at Austin, it was specifically provided that the money could not be raised by an ad valorem tax on property.

While the citizens of Texas, fully realizing that thousands were without work that must be cared for, approved the expenditure of this vast sum, they did so believing that no great amount of this money should be used for administrative purposes. The R. F. C. work over the nation has been carried on during the past year or more at a very small administrative cost, as in each community public spirited citizens have volunteered their services in carrying on the work.

E. T. Johnson, editor of the Amarillo News-Globe has analyzed the two chains of thought very forcefully in a recent issue of West Texas Today, which we quote:

"Now that the relief bond issue has carried, it is imperative that the public be both warned and prepared regarding what may happen in the legislature as to the distribution of the funds. It is up to the special session to say how thomony is to be handled. Whether relief is to be obtained through constructive public works or the money is to be doled out as a charity. The funds will be handled by competent state agencies accountable to the people or by political racketeers; whether we are to have waste and graft in the form of spoils or efficiency and absolute relief with public spirited citizens serving gratis on local committees—all of these must be determined by the legislature when it adopts a program for the distribution of the funds.

Two trends of thought will develop when the law-makers gather. One group sees in the \$20,000,000 fund an opportunity of a life-time for the building up of a political machine. It will want to reward its friends, pay political debts, give salaries to incompetent ward-healers out of the money which voters authorized for charity and jobs. If this group has its way the bond issue will turn out to be the blackest page in the state's history. It will constitute a disgrace which can not be lived down.

The other group, led by constructive, clear-minded and patriotic members will seek to safeguard every dollar of the fund and see that 100 cents of each dollar goes to actual relief. It will seek to have the funds expended on worthwhile and permanent public improvements. It will ask that laws be enacted setting forth in minutest detail how the money is to be spent, designate the state

agencies which are to handle and account for it, make it mandatory that every dollar allowed this county or that city go into actual relief and work; that local administration be handled by committees serving without pay; that not one penny be available as commissions, fees, salaries or any other form of spoils. If such a program be set up by the legislature the bond issue could be made far-reaching and lasting benefit to the state, and with a maximum or results for the money spent.

The battle lines will be drawn as soon as the legislature meets. The issue will be clearly defined. Political racketeering or honest relief. Law-makers who take a definite stand for constructive relief honestly administered will need the vigorous support of the people at home. It is up to the public, the taxpayers who must foot the bill, to stand back of this group when it brings forth its plan for discharging the bond issue funds.

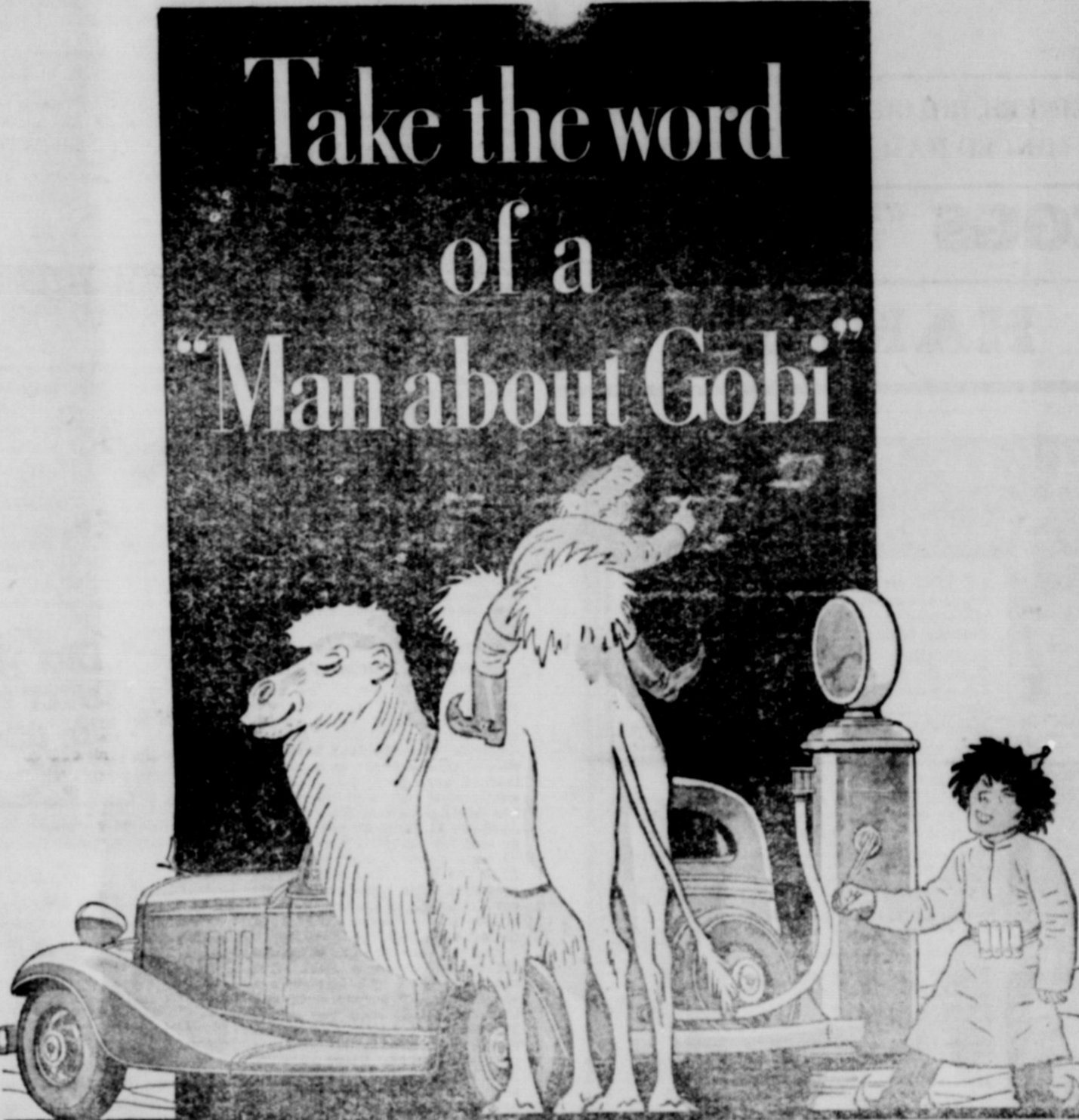

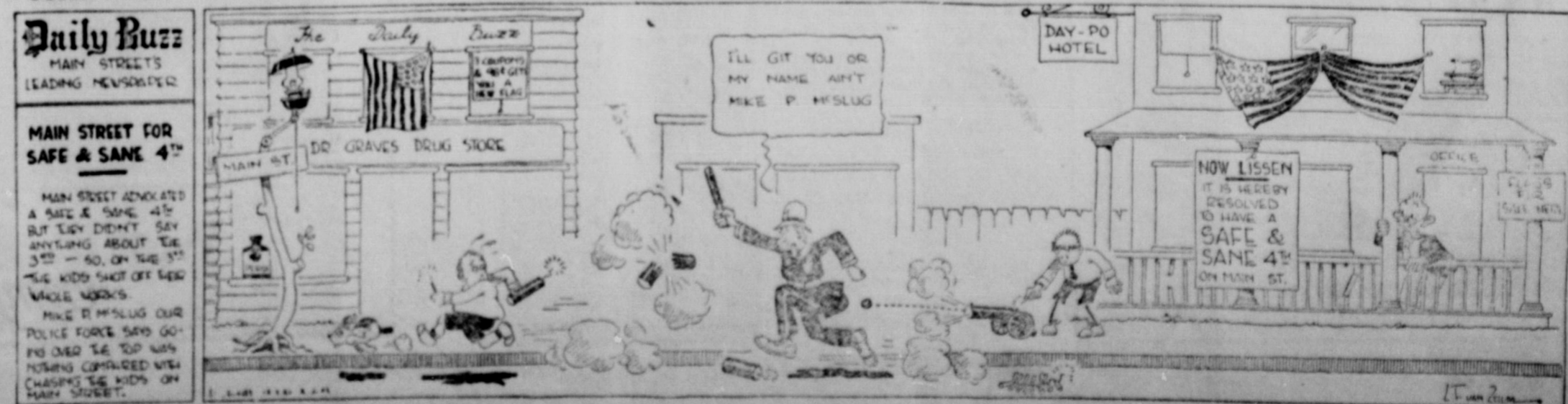
