#### INDIAN SUMMER

Every year, or almost every year, there comes a long spell of mild weather, after the first sharp drop in temperature, which over most of America is known as "Indian Summer." An old saying used to be that Indian Summer never came until after there had been a fall of snow "deep enough to show rabbit tracks." That early snowfall was known to our pioneer ancestors as "Snow Winter."

This was the hunting season of the Indians, as it is for the white folks today. It is a busy, pleasant interlude between the end of summer and the onset of real winter. It is the time of year to take one's gun and one's dog and go out into the

woods, after anything or nothing. It is the last, or almost the last chance to be outdoors in comfort until another Springtime comes.

In spite of the haze and the smoke from brush fires, the eyes seem to penetrate farther in Indian Summer than in real summer. The trees are nearly leafless now, and through their bare branches the stroller in the woods sees farther and clearer. Things that were hidden are now disclosed. The whole landscape takes on a new and somewhat sad aspect.

That is Indian Summer as it is known in the North and East. In the milder South, however, it is not unknown. There is that period, nearly every year, between the harvest season and Christmas, when it

seems the perfection of happiness just to be out of doors. Farm work is over for the year. The mosquitoes have gone into winter quarters. The slanting sun peering over the bulge of the earth's girle cheers without burning. Under the liveoaks, among the pines, where one chooses to wander there comes a feeling that it is good just to be alive.

### Corn Production Estimate Is Cut Very Slightly

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Corn production this year was announced today by the Department of Agriculture in its preliminary estimate at 2,289,544,000 bushels. A month ago 2,291,000,000 bushels were forecast. Last year's crop was 2,876,000,000.

Preliminary estimates of this year's production of other crops, with comparative figures giving last year's production, are:

Buckwheat, 8,000,000 bushels, with 6,800,000 last year.

Flaxseed, 7,500,000 bushels and 11,800,000 last year.

Rice, 36,800,000 bushels and 40,600,000.

Grain sorghums, 91,600,000 bushels and 105,900,000.

Beans (dry edible), 11,600,000 bushels and 10,200,000.

Soy beans, 11,300,000 bushels and 13,200,000.

Cowpeas, 6,500,000 bushels and 6,100,000.

Peanuts, 92,000,000 pounds and 1,062,000,000.

Apples, 144,000,000 bushels and 141,000,000.

Pears, 21,200,000 bushels and 22,000,000.

Grapes, 1,810,000 tons and 2,200,000.

Pecans, 61,100,000 pounds and 52,200,000.

Potatoes, 218,000,000 bushels and 258,000,000.

Sweet potatoes, 69,700,000 bushels and 78,500,000.

Tobacco, 1,468,000,000 pounds and 1,016,000,000.

Sorghum syrup, 14,600,000 gallons and 15,200,000.

Sugar cane syrup, 18,400,000 gallons and 17,900,000.

Sugar beets 11,150,000 tons and 9,070,000.

Broom corn, 30,200,000 tons and 37,100,000.

### Today And Tomorrow

#### LITVINOFF—Russian Visitor

Maxim Litvinoff, the Foreign Minister of the Soviet government, who has come to America at President Roosevelt's invitation to talk over the recognition of Russia, the Russian debts to America and other things, is one of the world's remarkable. A Polish Jew (his name used to be Finkelstein) he lived for years in England, employed as a traveling salesman, and married an English girl, Ivy Low, daughter of a leading London lawyer.

He was one of the earliest leaders of the Russian Revolution. He speaks four languages, is afraid of nobody, and has made a great impression in every international conference he has attended.

Litvinoff plays the game of diplomacy frankly and in the open. He has no use for diplomats who beat around the bush and wait for instructions from home before they agree to do anything.

I have a hunch that this visitor from Russia and President Roosevelt will hit it off together.

#### LEISURE—Made Profitable

Commercialized entertainment has given most of the young people today a false idea of what to do with leisure time. Going to the movies or driving around in automobiles are the principal means of amusement among a large percentage.

They do not understand how anyone can spend their leisure time happily without also spending money. Yet the happiest people I know are those who spend their leisure in things that cost them nothing.

I know one boy who has spent his spare time for more than a year in the American Museum of Natural History; another who devotes every spare daylight hour and some nights to finding out all he can about the animals, birds, trees and plants within a mile of his home.

The happiest man I know is so interested in his job that he spends all of his own time trying to learn about the business in which he is employed. It takes most of us a long time, though, to learn that happiness can't be bought. It has to be pursued.

#### ENTHUSIASM—and dollars

It is the easiest thing in the world to get everybody stirred up emotionally over almost any new thing. It is the hardest thing in the world to get them to back up their enthusiasm with their dollars.

I have seen a dozen great national "movements" started with a great hurrah, but the only ones I recall that went over with a bang were when we were being stirred up to go to war. Prohibition—and its repeal—took years of education and underground political work.

What made me think of that was seeing a big NRA banner on Fifth Avenue, left from the decorations for the big parade a few weeks ago. Everybody in town was all stirred up that day, but it is hard to hear a kind word spoken for the NRA today.

It will take years for this revolutionary doctrine to become generally accepted and liked, if at all.

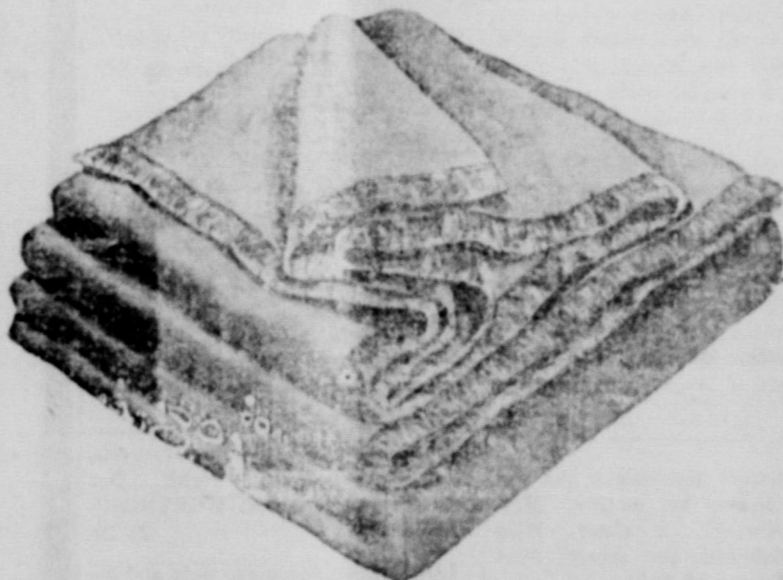
