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SUPPORT THE RED CROSS

This is the time of year when the annual roll call of the Red Cross prepares to make its appeal to every helpful-minded American. It is a call that ought to be regarded as the nation's greatest mainstay when calamity strikes.

One thing that makes the Red Cross effective is the promptness with which it moves when called upon. It can only do that by having ample cash reserves on hand at all times with which to mobilize the forces of relief. So, even though the year 1933 has been fortunately and singularly free from major catastrophes, such as have brought the Red Cross to the fore in past years, it is just as important that it should receive its annual contributions as it ever has been.

This winter, as last, much of the relief work of the Red Cross will be taking care of the homeless and unemployed. There are fewer, numerically, to be looked after this year than last; more men and women are back at work, and more are being cared for through Governmental and state relief works. There is ground for great hope in the President's program of Civil Works, which is intended to give employment at fair wages to several millions for the next few months. But there is still a huge burden to be carried by those who still have something left, and it is a burden which ought to be shared by everybody.

There is a double reason, therefore, for giving liberally to the Red Cross this year. Keep its coffers filled against the sudden, unexpected catastrophe, which may strike anywhere, at any time, and throw hundreds or thousands into distress. See that this great instrument of aid to the suffering is not handicapped in its work of keeping American workers from starvation until the crisis is past.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the City Hall in the City of Munday, Texas, within the Munday Independent School District, on the 18th day of December, A. D. 1933, to determine if the bonds of said District shall be issued in the amount of forty thousand (\$40,000.00) dollars payable in serial annual installments over a period of not exceeding forty years from their date, and bearing interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, for the purpose of constructing, repairing and equipping school building made of brick and concrete, and if there shall be annually levied, assessed and collected on all the taxable property in said district for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at the maturity thereof.

C. L. Mayes has been appointed election judge of said election and H. B. Williams and W. H. Bray have been appointed clerks to hold such election, which election shall be held as nearly as possible in conformity with the general election laws of the State.

No person shall vote at said election unless he is a qualified voter under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and a taxpayer in said Munday Independent School District.

Those in favor of the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax shall have written or printed on their ballots "For the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof," and those against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax shall have written or printed on their ballots "Against the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

Said election was ordered by the board of trustees of said Munday Independent School District by order passed on the 21st day of November A. D. 1933 and this notice is issued pursuant to said order.

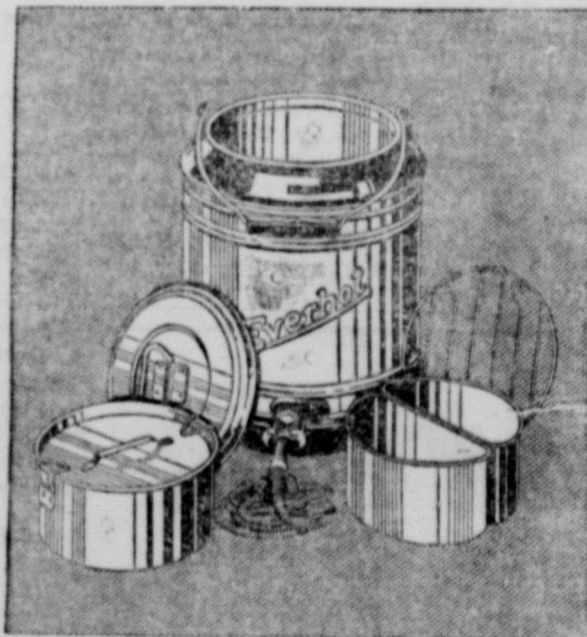
