

Heavy Vote Polled In School Election Here On Saturday

A rather heavy vote was polled in Margaret Tiner. the school trustee election held here Saturday in which four trustees were elected, J. D. Kethley, with 167 votes leading the ballot. Leland Hannah, with 143 was second and R. D. Atkeison third with 134 votes. Tom Haney and John Ed Jones ran neck and neck for fourth place, with Jones emerging two votes ahead, with 105 to Haney's 103. R. G. Campbell, whose name was not on the ballot, received 22 complimentary votes from citizens who wrote his name on the ballot, and one vote was written for C. M. Thompson.

Tom Haney, who goes off the board, was serving an unexpired term of D. C. Fritz, who moved to Abilene. Other retiring members of the board are M. H. Reeves and W. R. Moore.
