Sheppard, and since Mr. Sheppard has followed the policy of operating that great department of our State government with the minimum number of employees, everyone is kept busy doing his or her job. Mrs. Kennedy is in the cigarette tax division, which has been added to the Comptroller's office in recent years, and which is in charge of Judge Carlos Speck, a former citizen and attorney of Abilene. In fact, West Texas is well represented in the Comptroller's office, since Mr. Sheppard himself is a former citizen of Sweetwater.

Among our most enjoyable visits in Austin was that with Preston Ivy, veteran newspaper man, who on Saturday celebrated his 78th birthday. Ivy for many years was editor of a chain of newspapers published by the late H. B. Terrell who served the state ably as Representative, Senator and State Comptroller. For the past nineteen years he has been custodian of records in the Comptroller's department.

And our young friend Gaynor Kendall, who is a member of the staff of Attorney General Jimmie Alfred, was very busy on every occasion we visited his office, and incidentally we learned that many members of the Legislature carry their proposed bills to Gaynor to be drafted in regular form before they are submitted. Gaynor is a son of Judge and Mrs. J. S. Kendall of this city and is a graduate of the Munday Public Schools, born and reared in Munday, and a lad of whom we can justly feel proud.

### Knox City, Aspermont and Peacock Will Have Clubs In Valley League

Those interested in the Wichita Valley League met Sunday afternoon at the Tonkawa hotel at Haskell, at which time it was definitely decided that the teams that would constitute the circuit for the coming season are Munday, Haskell, Stamford, Hamlin, Peacock, Aspermont, Rule and Knox City. It was decided that another meeting will be held at Hamlin next Sunday afternoon at which time the schedule for the season would be adopted. Plans call for the opening of the season about April 15, with a split season, and the season will close about August 15. It was stated that the teams at Knox City, Aspermont and Stamford will be sponsored by the local posts of the American Legion.

Each club will be required to post a forfeit of \$25.00 to bind themselves to complete the schedule adopted, and the rules adopted for the season do not restrict clubs from employing salaried players, the only exception being that no player is eligible to play who has played professional baseball during 1934.

The Knox County Meat Show, the first of its kind ever held in Knox county, will be held in Munday on Saturday, March 3, at which time the 4-H club boys of the county will place on display of the cured and canned meats that have been put up by members of the Home Demonstration clubs of the county under the supervision of Miss Jewell Faulkner, county home demonstration agent. Prizes, which have been made possible through the cooperation of the chambers of commerce at Benjamin, Gore, Knox City and Munday, will be awarded as follows:

**Junior Calves**  
First, \$6.00; second, \$5.00; third, \$4.00; fourth, \$3.00; fifth, \$2.00; sixth and all other awards, \$1.00.  
**Senior calves:** first, \$6.00; second, \$5.00; third, \$4.00.

Judging in the baby beef division will begin at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

The Knox County Meat Show is to be held in Munday, Saturday, March 3rd. The cured and canned meats division will be in the Tull building just west of the Bauman Motor Company. Judging will begin promptly at 10:00 o'clock on the following products:

**Pork:**  
Roast in No. 2 or 3 cans (plain).  
Sausage in No. 2 plain cans.  
Liverpaste in No. 2 plain cans.  
Minced meat in No. 2 lined cans, (enamel).  
**Chicken:**  
In No. 1 or 2 cans, any type of boned chicken.  
**Beef:**  
Roast in No. 2 or 3 cans (plain).  
Steak in No. 2 plain cans.  
Chili in No. 2 plain cans.  
Cured hams and bacon.

Cash prizes will be awarded to first and second winners and ribbons to third on canned products. These cash prizes are 40c first, 20c for each prize.  
At 2 o'clock the 2 girls 4-H teams will give demonstrations on the will give demonstrations on the preparation and canning of mince-meat and the preparation of an attractive and appetizing finished product. These girls are: Mary Helen Partridge, Jimmie Lois Frasure, Margaret Shannon and Dolly Nix, all of the Sunset 4-H club.

Beginning at 2:30, eight Home Demonstration Club women, each representing an organized club, will give demonstrations on Utilization of Canned Meats. They will use the prize winning products of each of the 8 entries and prepare them into interesting and attractive dishes or platters meals. These will be on display until 5:00 o'clock.

Thirty-five of the best entries in this show will be taken to the Quality Meat Show, Lubbock, March 28-30. The best of the 4-H demonstration on meat will also be taken to the Lubbock show to represent Knox County in the district.

Everyone is invited to spend the entire day at the show, hear the judging and see the demonstrations.

**PANTRY DEMONSTRATORS EXPERIMENTING WITH NEW TYPE CORN IN COUNTY**

Since corn can be grown successfully in Knox County, Dr. P. C. Mangelsdorf, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station corn breeder, has sent samples of a new sweet corn to be given to the 4-H pantry demonstrators to experiment with this year.

Dr. Mangelsdorf has contributed a type of corn combining the good qualities of sweet corn and field corn. The ears of good plump, white kernels. This sweet corn has been named Honey June, and is a cross between Country Gentleman and Mexican June.

Those experimenting with this new type of corn are: Mrs. Lewis Cartwright, Munday; Mrs. Clyde Warren, Gore; Mrs. H. L. Cannon, Hood; Mrs. Leslie Melton, Gillespie; Mrs. Marion Ryder, Knox City; Mrs. Mary Howell, Gilliland; Mrs. J. H. McGee, Union Grove; Mrs. J. J. Stark, Benjamin; Mrs. R. N. Smith, Vera and Mrs. R. M. Almanrode, Gillespie.

"With my hothed, I am sure I will have plenty of plants for my garden," said Mrs. Marion Ryder, 4-H pantry demonstrator in the Gilliland Home Demonstration Club. "My problem now is to have a garden, which I believe I can have if I lay some tile. I have had my garden plowed deep and plan to make and lay at least 100 feet of concrete-sub-irrigation tile. It is a problem to have enough water for a garden here and what we pour on the surface makes the ground hard, white, and seems to burn the plants. Since sub-irrigation takes less water, does not cause the ground to bake and seems to be a sure way of raising tomatoes, at least, I must try some of it."

Mrs. Ryder stated also that she was planning to save the wash water and clear waste water from the kitchen to use in the tile.

**4-H BEDROOMS**

### TODAY and TOMORROW

The year 1935 ought to be a good year for red clover in New England. The winter has been the most severe in years. Comparatively few of the little animals of the fields and woods survive a winter when the crust of the snow is frozen hard. There will be fewer field mice to rob the bumble-bee's nests in the spring. More bumble-bees will come to maturity and seek honey from the red clover blossoms. The clover crop will thus be thoroughly pollinated, and the red clover seeds will be fertile. That will make for a good red clover crop in 1935.

To me this example of the cycle of life, first pointed out by Charles Darwin, has always seemed one of the most interesting of all natural phenomena. I think that many well-meant efforts to disturb Nature's ordinary course are calculated to do more harm than good to a world that has adjusted itself to the normal cycle.

TEETH—Now and then

Tooth decay has little to do with tooth cleanliness or the lack of it, according to the British Medical Research Council, which has been digging deep into the subject. What makes children's teeth decay is not enough sunshine, too high a percentage of cereal foods, not enough meat, eggs, milk, cheese, fats and fresh vegetables in the diet, these medical men say.

The whitest and soundest teeth are found among savage and half-civilized people who live largely out of doors and eat whatever they can find that is edible.

In my boyhood toothbrushes were just beginning to come into general use and not more than one or two dentifrices were advertised. Most folks never brushed their teeth at all, yet the human race had survived for a good many thousand, perhaps millions, of years.

Clean, white teeth are desirable, but nothing to worry about if one doesn't have them.

MONSTERS—Men have seen

The amount of evidence that some strange sea-monster lives in a Scottish loch, and the many reports of a sea-serpent seen in Vancouver Sound, have encouraged many folk to tell of strange things they have seen at sea, about which they had kept quiet for fear of being ridiculed.

Officers of the Mauretania saw a sea-serpent on a recent Caribbean cruise, and drew a picture of it in the ship's log. Now the Rev. J. E. Rockliff, who is a sort of traveling missionary to seamen and voyagers some 50,000 miles away from here, tells of seeing a yellow serpent about sixty feet long in mid-Pacific two years ago.

It seems to me we are on the verge of demonstrating once more that there is more to ancient beliefs than a skeptical modern age has been willing to believe.

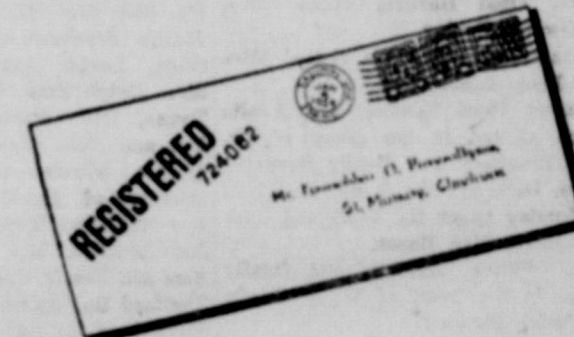
