#### Let's Re-Elect GEO. H. SHEPPARD State Comptroller

A vote for Geo. H. Sheppard for State Comptrolltr is a vote for more efficiency in State Governmental business.

THE CIGARETTE TAX-Mr. Sheppard as State Comptroller has sponsored adequate enforcement provisions which have materially increased the revenue of the State, without the addition of other levies. In the Cigarette Tax decision alone the revenues have been increased more than a Million Dollars the past year due to adequate enforcment measures sponsored by Mr. Sheppard, and included in this increase is \$14,870.30 collected in civil penalties by supervisors from the Comptroller's office. All funds collected in this division go into the School Fund for the maintenance of the Free Schools of Texas.

MOTOR TAX FUEL-During the same period of time the Motor Fuel Tax division of the State Comptroller's office has collected an increase of over Three Million Dollars over previous years, and this increase too has been due to the adequate enforcement measures that have been sponsored by Comptroller Sheppard. Aside from the outstanding accomplishments in administration of Cigarette and Motor Fuel Tax Divisions, reflected above, notable are the following:

INHERITANCE TAX-Mr. Sheppard has effected through reorganization of the Inheritance Tax Division and methods of procedure, assigning two field auditors to personally inspecting and appraising assets of large estates and working with attorneys and executors in securing fair valuation for tax appraisals. The probate records in practically all counties have now been checked, and many taxable estates, ranging from three to ten years old, have been discovered unreported and taxes unpaid. Efficient performance in this field has added \$120,000.00 to taxes which otherwist would have been

COUNTY TAX AUDITS-When George H. Sheppard assumed the duties of Comptroller the ad valorem tax accounts of many counties had received no audit for a period of from three to ten years, and several counties had never been audited. The Department Auditing Division has been thoroughly organized so that now every county has been audited without delay where necessity demands.

GROSS TAX RECCIPTS-Mr. Sheppard sponsored enactment of a new gross production tax law on crude oil to make this revenue more collectible. Effect of the new law, operative September 1st, 1933, has been to increase revenues at rate of about two and one-half million dollars annually with tax paid on millions of barrels of oil previously escaping the levy. Other gross receipts taxes include that collected from telephone companies, natural gas and oil operators, gas, water, light and power companies, etc. Total receipts from these sources approximate seven millions of dollars.

In harmony with Geo. H. Sheppard's continued efforts to increase receipts and improve the State's financial condition without additional tax burdens upon the people, many other improvements have been effected.
