CLYDE--A two vehicle accident claimed the life of a Clyde man just before 5 p.m. Monday afternoon and sent four local teens to the hospital.

School Board Member Resigns

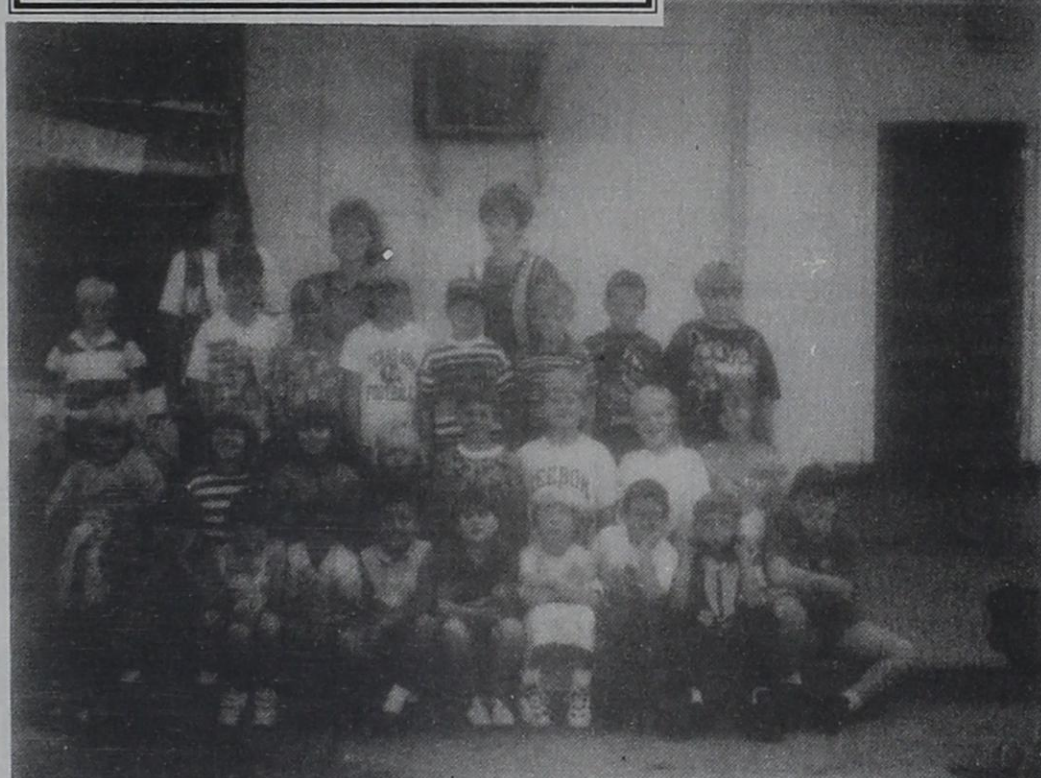

A tour of downtown Baird and the historical depot were a part of a study of the culture, heritage and history of Baird and the Baird Schools by the third grade classes of Mrs. Linda Wilson and Mrs. Suzee Odom, and student teacher Mrs. Windy Burns.

During the month of September, students have been reading stories, learning songs, making drawings, models and replicas of

scene by an Eastland County Ambulance and Cisco Fire Department, but refused further treatment according to a Callahan County Sheriff's Deputy. Baird Fire Department responded to the call at the 322 mile marker with one truck and five firemen.

Ray Dale Simpson, a truck driver from Potosi, witnessed the accident and said a truck passed the west bound pickup as they were crossing the bridge and the pickup veered to the right, making a U-turn back into the rushing waters. He and some other passers-by stopped to aid the victims.

Simpson said he and a man with an ATV reached the man in the tree, carrying him to safety. The 5 foot flood gauge sign was peaked out and the word gauge was barely visible, according to a Baird Fire Department spokesman. The pickup was not visible and was assumed to have been carried far down-

stream.

Baird Fire Department, assisting local and county law enforcement, were notifying residents in low lying areas of rising flood waters about 3:15 a.m. when they received a call that a vehicle had been washed into Ross Creek at the 7th Street crossing.

Baird City Marshal Sargent Sue Martindale was patrolling the area and discovered two young men in the back of a small white pickup that was lodged in some trees about 30 feet downstream of the crossing. The water was lapping over the hood onto the windshield of the vehicle. Two efforts by Baird Firemen to reach the vehicle failed due to the swiftness of the water. The third attempt was successful and Brent Hatchet of Baird along with Jason Moody of Camaron, both 19 years old, were brought to the shore from their 'perch' in the 1996 Ford Ranger. Neither man was physically injured in the incident.

Baird Fire Department had two trucks and 10 men on the scene. Men and trucks returned to the station about 5:45 a.m. Martindale commended the Fire Department for performing a great rescue.

Baird Receives A Lot Of Rain!! - 7.2 Inches!

BAIRD--Baird received over 7.2 inches (seven and 2 tenths inches) between 5 p.m. and 5 a.m. with over five and 1/2 inches falling before 1:00 a.m. This after a half inch of rain early Saturday morning. No Baird residents were evacuated according to Baird Assistant Fire Chief Russell Robbins, although water was almost to some houses before it started to recede. "The rain stopped in time," Robbins said. Every low water crossing in Baird was closed in the early hours Sunday and Ross Creek was over the Walnut Street bridge on the east side of the City Park at 3:00 a.m.

Baird Lake, Baird's Water Supply, had been approximately 7 foot below spillway Saturday morning, according to the city's water director. It is now full and had backed over County Road 484, closing it to traffic early Sunday morning.

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Learning Serenity In Today's World 12-Steppin'

Step 1 - We admitted we were powerless over our dependencies - that our lives had become unmanageable.

Matthew 9:36

But when He saw the multitudes, He was moved with compassion for them, because they were weary and scattered, like sheep having no shepherd.

Step 1 asks us to confront the chaos and the unmanageability of our dependent lifestyles. The paradox of every addiction is that the more we try to compulsively control ourselves and others through the practice of the addiction, the more out of control our lives spin.

In what counterfeit ways do we seek for interior security through co-dependent manipulation of the outside world? We may struggle desperately through our perfectionism or workaholicism to win the praise and approval of our fellows. We may become preoccupied through hypochondria with health and bodily functions in pursuit of a kind of physical immortality and invincibility. We may strive to shore up our own fragile self-esteem by allowing a love partner to become the only source of affirmation for our worth.

In the depths of our dependency, we are like sheep, "weary and scattered." Scripture assures us that the True Shepherd, Jesus Christ, views this human discord and fragmentation with deep compassion. Twelve Step recovery allows us to confront compassionately but firmly our own human unmanageability.

Romans 7:18-20

Two indicators of addiction are the gradual loss of identity and the progressive violation of one's own values in the practice of the addic-

tion. The gospel describes these addiction symptoms in the following terms: "It is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells in me". (v. 20)

In assessing the presence of addictions and co-dependencies, we frequently ask the following simple diagnostic questions: Is the dog wagging the tail, or is the tail wagging the dog? For example, the conscientious workaholic may have strong values concerning the primary of home and family life. However, as the workaholic progresses, the workaholic does violence to those values by diverting increasing amounts of time and energy into work pursuits. The tail is now wagging the dog...

A universal warning sign of all addictions is the frightening recognition that I have begun to "do what I will not to do." This recognition is the beginning of the awareness of powerlessness and can be used by God as the beginning of the end of the addiction.

Psalms 6:2-4

It is human nature to want to be (and to believe that we are) in complete control of our circumstances and our lives. But truly fortunate people come to a point in their lives when they realize this is definitely not possible or even desirable. These people are the fortunate ones because they have come to the end of themselves just as the psalmist David has come to the end of his physical and emotional resources.

"My bones are troubled" is a Hebrew way of saying "I am wracked with pain." David, the valiant warrior, admits his weakness, his emotional collapse. But instead of being defeated by this admission, David has actually placed himself in the strongest position possible. Now he is free to transcend the emptiness of his own resources, free to surrender trying to manage things on his own strength, and free to partake of God's unlimited resources!

Starting Where You Are

To start over, you have to know where you are. To get somewhere else, it's necessary to know where you're presently standing. That's true in a department store or a big church, on a freeway or a college campus...or in life, for that matter. Very, very seldom does anybody "just happen" to end up on the right road. The process involved in redirecting our lives is often painful, slow, and even confusing. Occasionally it seems unbearable.

Take Jonah. (No one else wanted to.) He was prejudiced, bigoted, stubborn, openly rebellious, and spiritually insensitive. Other prophets ran to the Lord. He ran from Him. Others declared the promises of God with fervent zeal. Not Jonah. He was about as motivated as a 600-

pound grizzly in mid-January.

Somewhere down the line the prophet got his inner directions cross-wired. He wound up, of all places, on a ship in the Mediterranean Sea bound for a place named Tarshish. That was due west. God had told him Nineveh. That was due east. (That's like flying from Los Angeles to Berlin by way of Honolulu.) But Jonah never got to Tarshish, as you may remember. Through a traumatic chain of events, Jonah began to get his head together in the digestive tract of a gigantic fish!

What a place to start over! Stopping around in the seaweed and juices inside that monster, fishing for a match to find his way out, Jonah took a long, honest look at his short, dishonest life. For the first time in a long

time, the prophet brushed up on his prayer life. He yelled for mercy. He recited psalms. He promised the Lord that he would keep his vow and get back on target. Only one creature on earth felt sicker than Jonah--the fish, in whose belly Jonah bellowed. Up came the prophet, who hit the road running -- toward Nineveh.

One of the most encouraging things about new years, new weeks, and new days is the word new. Friend Webster reveals its meaning: "refreshed, different from one of the same that has existed previously...unfamiliar." Best of all, it's a place to start over. Refresh yourself. Change directions. Begin anew.

But that requires knowing where you are. It required taking time to honestly admit

your present condition. It means facing the music, standing alone inside the fish and coming to terms with those things that need attention, fishing in the seaweed for a match. Before you find your way out, you must determine where you are. Exactly. Once that is accomplished, you're ready to start over.

Just as there are few atheists in foxholes, so there are few rebels in fish stomachs. Perhaps you can identify rather easily with Jonah. This hasn't been your all-time-spiritual-high-plateau year, right? You've dodged and ducked, squirmed and squeaked your way through one Tarshish trip after another. But no more. You're tired. Exhausted says it better. Swallowed alive by your circumstances says it best. You feel oppressed, guilty, overused, and underdeveloped. You're not that old...but you've run a long way. Few moons

but many miles. A subtle whisper in your ear says, "You're through. Finished. Burned out. Used up. You've been replaced...forgotten."

That's a lie! A carefully-timed deception by the enemy of the soul. Look at what the prophet Joel writes to all the Jonahs who may be reading this. God is speaking:

I will make up to you for the years that the swarming locust has eaten... (Joel 2:25a)

If God can take a disobedient prophet, turn him around, and set him on fire spiritually, He can do the same with you. He is a specialist at making something useful and beautiful out of something broken and confused.

Where are you? Start there. Openly and freely declare your need to the One who cares deeply. Don't hide a thing. Show God all those locust bites! He's ready to heal every one...if you are ready to run toward that

Train UP A Child Proverbs

Train up a child in the way he should go, And when he is old he will not depart from it. (Proverbs 22:6)

Solomon spoke much about training children. His wisdom has been a successful guide for raising hundreds of generations. It is ironic that his own son rejected his father's training and chose to live foolishly.

Wise training of children requires instruction, correction, and, at times, chastening. Children should be instructed in wisdom and godliness and warned against the dangers of life, such as unlawful gain, unlawful love, indebtedness, and laziness.

Correction is necessary by the very nature of children, but it should be properly given with love, purpose, and discernment. When necessary, chastening must be given, but within wise guidelines. The righteousness do not need it, but it is sometimes necessary for the less discerning;

fools require more! Chastening should inflict some measure of pain and may need to be harsh in extreme cases; but it serves as a deterrent to further misbehavior. These guidelines also apply to chastening administered by civil authorities. Although the results may be delayed, training reaps rewards, bringing the desired results with rest and happiness.

Training Requires Instruction
Hear, my children, the instruction of a father,

And give attention to know understanding;

For I give you good doctrine: Do not forsake my law.

When I was my father's son, Tender and the only one in the sight of my mother,

He also taught me, and said to me: "Let your heart retain my words;

Keep my commands, and live." (Proverbs 4:1-4)

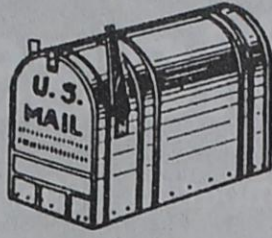

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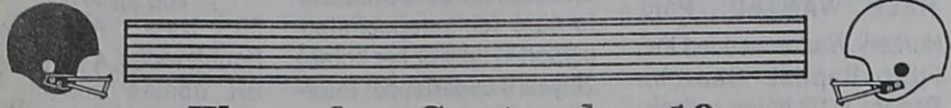

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Lawsuit Settled With Former Jail Administrator

A lawsuit by former Jail Administrator Elizabeth White was settled on Sept. 6 just before going to Federal Court in Abilene on Monday, Sept. 9.

Under the settlement terms, Eastland County agreed to pay \$50,000 to Ms. White, who was seeking \$4 million in damages. The so-called "Whistleblower" lawsuit involved charges that Elizabeth White was fired after reporting alleged financial mismanagement by former Eastland County Sheriff Ronnie White.

An Eastland County official describes the agreement as "a compromise settlement of a doubtful claim." "It's no admission of any liability or fault on the part of the County or Ronnie White," he says. The settlement of the case was seen as a practical matter to avoid the cost of further litigation. Austin Attorney Bob Bass represented the County, and Melissa Hirsch of Odessa was the lawyer for Ms. White. Reportedly

the settlement was instigated by Ms. White's attorney.

Ronnie White stated to the Eastland County Newspapers this week: "I'm very disappointed that the case didn't go on to trial. I think we could have won it."

Reports are that the alleged misappropriation of petty cashes happened among employees of Sheriff White -- not the Sheriff himself. And the total value of cash and a scrap of shelving did not amount to more than \$40.00, according to information received by this newspaper.

Apparently Ms. White began reporting alleged mismanagement of public funds by the Sheriff in the summer of 1993. Later she questioned the status of fine money forwarded to the Sheriff's office, causing investigation by the Texas Rangers and State Attorney General's office.

Former Sheriff White states that she did not come to him with any of

these allegations.

"I demoted Elizabeth White and then fired her because she was not doing her job properly. I had no knowledge of any reports she had made," Ronnie White states.

"And I never ordered her to pay for any material at my home," he declares.

In the summer of 1995 an Eastland County Grand Jury declined to indict Sheriff White on allegations of mishandling funds. This Grand Jury was given an opportunity to hear his defense as well as the accusations.

Early in 1996 a Grand Jury indicted White on other charges, these stemming from the Sheriff's removal of a private fence moved into a portion of the Alameda Cemetery Road.

This Grand Jury did not get to hear White's defense of the charges.

White resigned his office of Sheriff on April 1, 1996. When the case came to trial in June 1996 some top lawyers and investigators from the Attorney General's office came to Eastland County to prosecute him.

They dropped the case within a few days. Evidence was stated about an order from the Commissioners Court, and how the Sheriff's office was assisted - by at least one Commissioner - on the fence removal.

When this case was dismissed White stated that he did not plan to work in law enforcement again, simply because it was too stressful for his family.

John Travolta has starred in a number of roles in movies, but this one is different. Audiences will no doubt find it appealing.

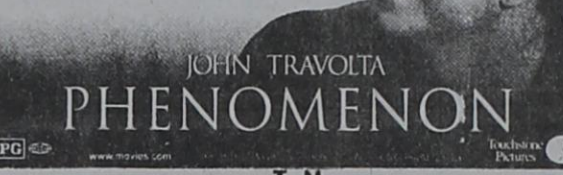

City Election
State of Texas
County of Callahan,
Whereas, all elections was(sic) held in the town of Baird, Callahan County, Texas, on (sic) the 22nd of January, 1889, for the purpose of determining whether said town should be incorporated within the following described bounds, to wit; Beginning at north east of section No. 109 BBB & CRR Co. survey. Thence west to the north-west corner of the northeast quarter of section of the northeast quarter of section No. 104, BBB & CCR Co. Survey. Thence south to the north-west corner of the S. E 1-4 of said section No. 109. Thence north to the beginning.

And a majority of the electors within said boundary having voted in favor of incorporation of said town. Therefore, I, E.E. Solomon, County Judge, within and for said county, do by virtue of authority invested in me by law declare that said town is duly incorporated. In compliance with the law, I order and direct that an election be held in said town, on the 12 day of February, 1889, for the purpose of electing officers for said incorporation to wit: A mayor, a Marshall, and five aldermen.

Given under my hand and the seal of the County Court, at Baird, Texas this 23rd day of January, 1889.

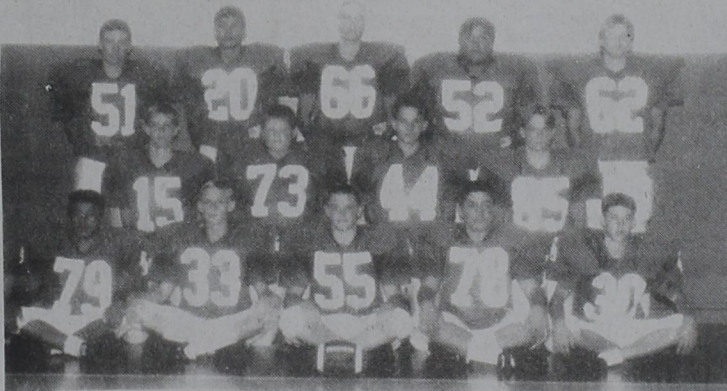

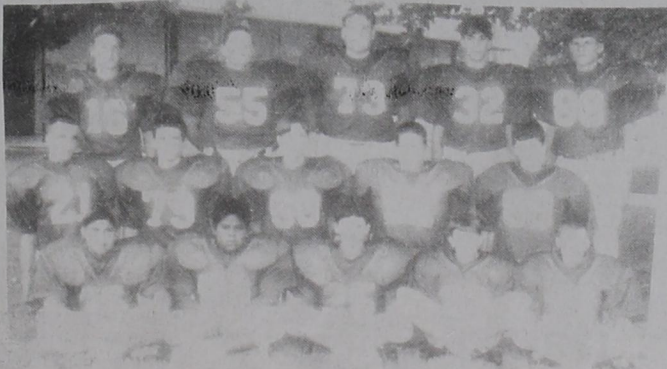

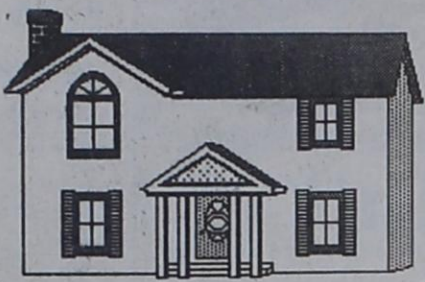

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This Is Your Brain Use it!

THINK....about these brain facts. At birth the average brain weighs under 1 lb. Between birth and age 15, the brain triples in size and weight. At age fifteen, the brain is at full adult size and weight -- approximately 2.7-3.2 lbs. The average brain has 100 billion microscopic nerve endings that serve as chemical relay switches which communicate our thoughts and feelings.

Brain Size has nothing to do with intelligence. One of the largest brains on record (2.5 lbs) belonged to a writer. A whale brain weighs about 12 lbs. and a grasshopper brain weighs a fraction of an ounce. The brain itself feels no pain. Look up the word 'brain' in the dictionary or thesaurus and you'll find words like mind, head, intellect, wits and intelligence. In fact, the brain has been called the knapsack of intelligence.

In schools, we aim much of our curriculum and instruction at our student's brains, yet we are just now discovering how the brain works and how to explain intelligence. There are many misconceptions about the brain and intelligence. For example, we know the brain needs work to stay in shape, but un-

like specific muscles, we don't know which exercises work best to tone it up. Only interesting discovery about the brain concludes that students who find school easy may not be thinking and working as hard as students who find school more difficult. Sound illogical?

Dr. Richard Haier, a scientist at the University of California, used what is called a PET brain scanner, to measure heat and energy generated by the brains of different students who were taking the same test. His results suggest that the brains of students who performed poorly generated much more energy. Heat x-rays revealed the brains of the successful students were cool, while the brains of the students who were struggling to come up with the answers glowed red hot.

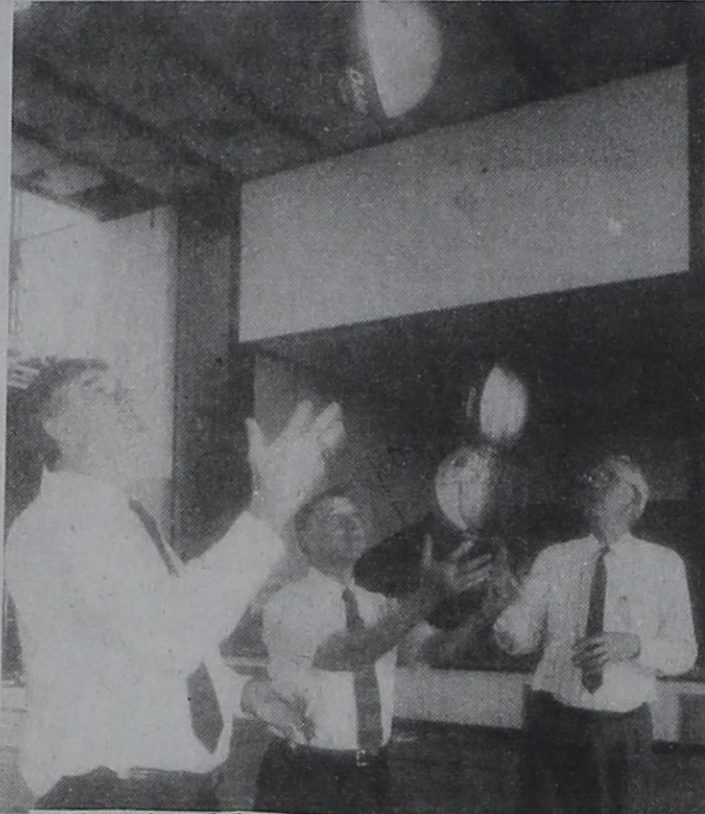
Another provocative concept challenges the traditional notion that intelligence can be reduced and measured solely by an individual's language and mathematical reasoning skills. Dr. Howard Gardner, a professor at Harvard University and his associates,

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have challenged the traditional definition of intelligence and IQ with a theory presenting not two, but seven intelligences. They are: Verbal - the ability to use and manipulate language and words; Rhythmic - the ability to create, express and enjoy a musical experience; Mathematical - the ability to work with abstraction, logic, reasoning and patterns; Visual - the ability to comprehend, capture and reproduce objects, spaces and images; Bodily - the ability to control and coordinate one's physical system, motions and muscular expressions; Intrapersonal - the ability to understand one's own thoughts and feelings; and Interpersonal - the ability to identify, understand, and illuminate the individuality of others. Dr. Gardner maintains that intelligence is too complex and diverse for a fixed pencil and paper reasoning test to measure. We must encourage, stimulate and maximize actual performance to gauge intelligence.

Dr. Gardner's theory has stimulated discussion and controversy. Not everyone agrees that his definition describes genuine intelligence. However, for many students, his theory of multiple intelligence offers broader possibilities for recognition, creativity, productivity, success and hope.

More and more schools are studying adopting Dr. Gardner's ideas. Getting the most out of our brainpower means recognizing and mastering our special talents, skills and gifts. We need to keep in mind that while we all see the same objects in the world, we understand and interpret them independently and differently. It is our brain and intelligence that provides the means for our unique understanding and interpretation of what we see. Gardner grants each of us unique opportunities and avenues to excel and succeed given our multitude of

Views On Dental Health

TEETH ARE TOUGH...BUT...

Teeth are tough! Did you know that the outside layer of teeth (the enamel) is the second hardest naturally occurring substance. Only diamond is harder. That's one reason why more human teeth are found as prehistoric relics than any other part of the body.

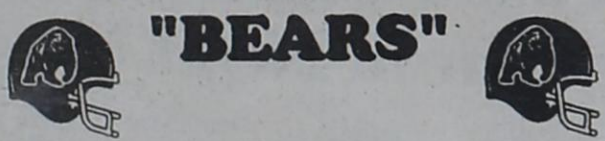
It seems paradoxical that such a fabulously hard substance should be such easy prey to decay. It's amazing how teeth can decay in short order from contact with sugar and its eventual change into enamel-cating acid.

Another thing to be careful of is eating extremely hot and cold foods together. For example, drinking hot coffee while eating ice cream is liable to make teeth crack, because tooth

enamel and the dentin underneath it expand and contract at different rates as they react to temperature changes. Tooth enamel is not damaged by hot liquids, but if something cold is consumed immediately afterward, the enamel contracts and could crack. Hot drinks are usually about 140 degrees Fahrenheit, ice cream is about 35 degrees. That much sudden change can be harmful to teeth.
