



The Baird City Council met in regular session Tuesday, Sept. 24, at Baird City Hall. Mayor Jon Hardwick called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. with Councilmen Brenda Mitchel, Dale Brewer, Rudy Rodriguez, Pat O'Brien, Terry.Hunter and City Secretary Nancy Turnbow.

The Council unanimously approved the \$675,376.00 budget for fiscal year 1996-97, as presented by Hardwick, on a motion

by Hunter and seconded by Rodriguez. This was up some from last year's budget of \$661,398.00 due to increases in Citizens E.M.S. subsidy payments, City employees wage's and street paving.

The Tax Rate for 1996 was adopted on a motion by Mitchel and seconded by Brewer. The unanimous decision was for a rate of .544307, which is down from last yea's rate of .578315. Due to an increase in local property

evaluations citizens will notice a slight increase in assessed tax amounts even with the decreased tax rate.



HEART WORM: Growing Problem in Callahan County Area With Increase Mosquito Numbers---

Dogs with heartworms are being diagnosed on a regular basis in our area. 13 cases have been diagnosed since the first of the year and more cases are sure to be found before the end of the year.

Many cases would not have been found until clinical signs of heart diseases were evident, but increased awareness of the problem has increased the testing for heartworms. Our area was once to be a low incidence area, but with the rapid increase in the numbers of heartworm cases, we must take a more aggressive approach to the problem.

Heartworms are on the increase: Mild winters with increased rainfall resulting in more mosquitoes and year around exposure; Owners more aware of the problem which results in more testing of infected dogs. Heartworm checks and preventatives must be initiated to decrease the incidence of the disease.

this is such a deadly disease that it is well worth reminding owners of certain facts:

The net result of heartworm disease is the serious mechanical damage it causes to a dog's heart, lungs, liver and kidneys. But while it is stopping up kidneys and blood flow, there are few outward

caused until the disease

is very far along. Mosquitoes are key

carriers of heartworm disease. When an infected dog is bitten by a mosquito, blood is carried away which may include tiny, immature forms of heartworms called microfilaria.

It takes about three months for these larvae to travel through the tissues of the body to enter the heart.

Dozens of these larvae (some of which can actually become up to 14 inches long) become adults within another three months. By that time, much of the mechanical damage just mentioned has become fact.

and modern preventative medicine, there is a lot you can do to avoid heartworms in the first place or see that it is successfully treated if it hasn't progressed too

-A blood test is the only way to detect heart disease in its early stages.

-Since it's possible for an infected dog to have adult heartworms without microfilaria, an X-Ray examination and other lab tests may be needed to confirm

heartworm infection. has progressed, symptoms can include fre-

quent coughing, sluggishness, rapid tiring and finally, labored breathing.

> -If caught in time, a series of injections of an organic arsenical rug can be used to kill heartworms. Then another drug can be used to get rid of the microfilaria.

-No vaccine is available for heartworm disease, but we can give you regular doses of a drug which can prevent infective larvae from developing into adult heartworms. This can be in the form of a daily





These programs can offer you substantial savings on a 15 and 30year mortgage and allow you to get more home for your money."

Mauro said there are more than 10,600 veterans in Brown, Coleman, Callahan, Eastland, Comanche, Mills and surrounding counties that are eligible for the special state benefits but have never taken the time to get the details of these outstanding programs.

Notice: to those offended by the earlier flag amendment vote -- we feel your frustration! There were circumstances that influenced Cong. Charles Stenholm's vote on the flag-burning issue. His vote displeased many.

Sometimes the worst mistakes are not the things we do, but things we don't do. Here are four examples.

Not starting to save early enough. It's never too soon to start saving for your retirement. As soon as you begin to earn a regular paycheck, set aside some percentage, however small, as savings. Even if it's only a small amount, the power of compounding will have longer to work and you'll be surprised how it grows. The later you start, the tougher it becomes.

Not taking advantage of a 401(k) plan or an IRA. One of your best investment options is your 401(k) plan at work, especially if your company matches your contributions. Invest the maximum you can afford to set aside, and enjoy tax-deferred savings for your retirement. If you reach the maximum in your 401(k) and can still afford to save more, contribute to an IRA too. Even though the contribution may not be tax-deductible, the earnings will grow sheltered from tax. And if you're not eligible for a 401(k) plan, put all you can into an IRA.

Not understanding what "guaranteed" means. If you buy a guaranteed investment, know what kind of guarantee you are buying. For example, bonds may be insured against default. But that doesn't mean their value won't fall below your purchase price during the life of the bonds. If you sell before maturity, you could sell at a loss.

Not preparing or updating your will. your careful planning can be wiped out it you don't have a will or fail to keep it updated. Estate planning doesn't just minimize est de taxes makes sure that your assets are left to the people you choose. This mistake can have a huge dollar impact, yet it's relatively us and mexpension to avoid.



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

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

McCleskey No. 1 Derrick And Rig Dedication

Saturday, September 21, 1996 was a beautiful day in Eastland County, Texas. This was the date the Ranger Historical Preservation Society and approximately 150 others would remember an historical event of October 1917 on the John Hill McCleskey farm, and to dedicate the wooden derrick and rig on the original site of Ranger's Oil Boom Discovery Well, J.H. McCleskey No. 1. Society president Jeane Pruett said that on Friday when the clouds burst and rains came again "the ground was just beginning to dry out from Thursday's storm and my heart dropped. I didn't know if it would be dry enough to get the people up here or not, but we kept on going and so did North Ridge Corporation's crew". But it did work out and the transportation buses provided by the Mesquite Street Church of Christ, driver Jim Jones and RISD, Willie Drivers Mowery and Karrol Williams were able to get the visitors to the site. Ceremony began with Mrs. Pruett introducing Mr. Jerry Jackson who gave the Invocation and Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey, Master of Ceremonies. SSG Lister and SSG Alvarez of the Texas Army National Guard Company B 111th Engineer Battalion, Mineral Wells posted the Colors and the Pledge of the Allegiance was led by Adam Lopez, Jr. after which the crowd sang the National Anthem led by J.R. Hunt. Judge Bailey in his introduction said "we'll never see an occasion like this again in our time ... when you come out here.. and reconstruct history like it was in 1917 and 18". > "CALLAHAN COUNTY TEXAS SIXTY YEARS AGO" By J. P. Davis

"One afternoon some time in March, 1878, two covered wagons crossed Arkansas River at Van Buren, Ark., bound for Callahan City, Callahan County, Texas. One was drawn by two hors-

es. In this wagon were my mother, a sister and her family, Mr. and Mrs. William Wills

and four children. My father, my brother and myself were in the other wagon. We had four mules to our wagon. Our wagons were partly loaded with dried fruit.

We all stopped near String Town, where my father and uncle hauled lumber from the saw mills to the railroad. Two of my aunt's

children died there. As we neared Fort Worth, Sam Bass and his gang were loose and the law was after them, just a day ahead of us. Ft. Worth has a mule, car street service on main street.

We finally arrived at Callahan City. This city had four homes. One of them a picket house made by putting wooden stakes in the ground, sawing the tops even and then nailing 2 by 4 lumber in order to frame the roof. There were also a blacksmith

daughter Susan, two sons, Howard (and family of four children) and John; Mr.

Barnhill (the blacksmith), who was the father of the late Martin Barnhill, father of I. G. Barnhill our present Blacksmith. Mr. and Mrs. Jess Hart was here at an earlier date, but I did not meet him at that time.



caused many heart aches as in a case here at that time. Mr. Tom Terry was in the Terry store; two men started a row. A man named John Barnett and a fellow named Blansit begin to draw their guns, Burnett ran to the back door (in the north end of the store.) Mr. Terry came out from behind the counter fac-

ing the back door, just as Burnett fired and received the bullet in the stomach. He died that night. He was the first one buried in the Callahan City cemetery. Blansit was stooping to get his gun from his boot when the bullet passed through two folds in the front of his

shirt making four holes in it. Burnett took immediate leave, by way of the Dawkins ranch, buried his pistol near the ranch corrells. It was found by some who lived on the ranch some odd 30 years afterwards - a colts six cap and ballpistol. It was rusty and the wood of the han-

dle rotted off. I have seen that pistol twice. A man who lived at Cottonwood had it here at Baird a few years ago on exhibit at the fair. It had been cleaned, but never used since, so this man said. My grandfather was

TEETH ARE TOUGH...BUT...

Teeth are tough! Did you know that
the outside layer of teeth (the enamel)
is the second hardest naturally occurring substance. Only diamond is harder.
That's one reason why more human
teeth are found as prehistoric relics
than any other part of the body.

It seems paradoxical that such a fabulously hard substance should be such easy prey to decay. It's amazing how teeth can decay in short order from contact with sugar and its eventual change into enamel-eating acid.

Another thing to be careful of is eating extremely hot and cold foods together. For example, drinking hot coffee while eating ice cream is liable to make teeth crack, because tooth enamel and the dentin underneath it expand and contract at different rates as they react to temperature changes. Tooth enamel is not damaged by hot liquids, but if something cold is consumed immediately afterward, the enamel contracts and could crack. Hot drinks are usually about 140 degrees Fahrenheit, ice cream is about 35 degrees. That much sudden change can be harmful to teeth.
