Trench Silo Means More Dollars

The Trench Silo, greatest boon to farming in years, will make the farmers and stockmen more money on feedstuff than all the bumper crops that can be grown, is the opinion of W. W. Rice, County

The silo which is taking hold in this county fast, can be built cheaply, and there is no upkeep. Another advantage is that there is practically no loss, regardless of weather conditions or storms.

Another example of the value of a trench silo can be had from one built by C. R. Elliott recently. Elliott harvested a ton of heads per acre from his grain crop of 30 acres. He then placed the stalks in the sile, which will hold 70 tons of the feed stuff. In past years the stalks, which are good stock feed, have been a total loss.

Elliott estimates that the silage will be worth \$1,000 on the spring market. The entire cost of the silo was \$17.25.
