

## Baird City Council reinstates City Marshal Dale Coley

Baird City Marshal, Dale Coley, was unanimously reinstated by the City Council after a four hour long meeting Wednesday night.

Dale Coley was suspended on Tuesday, the week before to investigate allegations made by Pete Mendez and others. Mendez complained of the methods used by Coley when arresting his 18 year old son. Several other people came forward at that time to complain of alleged harrasment against juveniles.

More than 50 people crowded into the city council meeting Wednesday night with the majority of the people backing Marshal Coley.

Eleanor Weeks presented the council with a petition containing the signatures of 126 residents who are supporting the city marshal.

"There were a lot of people who wanted to be here but couldn't because of church, ball games, etc. These people wanted everyone to know that they are behind our city marshal "Rosa Haas ex-

plained.

The city council meeting opened at 6 p.m. and comments were made by citizens for the next hour and a half. At least 10 people spoke up in defense of Marshal Coley and the job he and other law officials are doing for Baird.

A few comments were made from complainants stating that "we do not need any law in a town like Baird!"

After comments from the public, the council went into executive session and met with City Attorney Thomas Wheeler, Marshal Coley and City Marshal Sgt. Sue Martindale.

The meeting was reopened at 9:30 p.m., but it was 10:15 p.m. before the motion was made by Dale Brewer to reinstate Marshal Coley. Rudy Rodriguez seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

The council also stated that it has not been in touch with some city department as it should be and that this would change.

## Thursday afternoon fire causes Clyde's major grocery store to re-locate

Lawrence Bros. IGA will be open for business on Wednesday, June 11, at 215 South 1st in Clyde following the fire that gutted the original business last Thursday on the south access road. Also destroyed in the noon time fire was Reel Action Video, a video rental shop that was located next door to the only major food supplier of the Clyde-Baird area.

According to Rick Gilmore, Chief of the volunteer fire department in Clyde, when the first fire trucks responded to the scene, "there was so much smoke that we could not see the flames." The initial response to one of the most major fires in recorded history was to attack it from the front of the store, but the fire was so hot and intense that it overwhelmed the volunteer departments of Baird and Eula as well and it was burning their protective coats. Also on response were ambulances from the surrounding area who were on scene in case of heat exhaustion that may be suffered by the volunteers fighting the blaze.

The extent and quickly spreading fire also caught the employees by surprise as they had just received their payroll but were unable to get to the employee lounge where their belongings, purses, and other items were located. However, Lawrence Bros. announced that insurance coverage would take of the employee losses.

"I heard the manager, Eddie Freeland, yelling to dial 911," described by an employee of Lawrence Bros. who wished to remain anonymous. Freeland is also credited for the estimated fifty or so people who were in the store in getting out unharmed. At that time, she looked up to see where the fire was and noticed it

was up! above the freezer display case. She stated also that no fire was seen on the roof at that time.

No word has been given on when and where Reel Action Video will reopen and where. More information is sought on this matter.

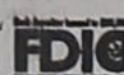

## Law limits common law marriage passes

The Texas House of Representatives this week passed a bill that would prohibit the recognition of common law marriage of minors under the age of eighteen. The bill, passed overwhelmingly, was co-authored by State Representative Jim Keffer (Eastland).  
"This bill will establish in law that minors can not enter into informal marriages," said Keffer. "There have been cases where criminals have been let off the hook by using common-law marriage as a defense to statutory rape."

Recent court rulings have established that girls between the ages of 13 and 17 can enter into common law marriage without parental consent. In 1996, a 22 year old was acquitted of statutory rape on the grounds that he and the thirteen year old girl he had impregnated were married under common-law. Such a defense would be disallowed under the new legislation.

The current Legislature has four weeks left in the Regular Session, and time is running out for most bills. "Of the many bills out there, only a fraction will actually pass into law," said Keffer. "I'm glad to see a good bill such as this passed so overwhelmingly in the House." The bill will now head to the Senate and, if passed there, will be sent to the Governor for his signature.

## Professional auto racing returns to Abilene

More than 200 racing teams from around the nation have signed up to participate in the 7th running of the Abilene Sunburn Grand Prix.

Set for June 14-15 at the Abilene Regional Airport, Mike Dohrse, vice president of the Abilene Motor Sports, Inc., said this grand prix will be the best ever.

"With Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) racing teams arriving from Washington state, Florida, California, Nebraska, North Carolina and Canada to challenge teams from Texas and neighboring states, the stage is set for this to be the biggest and best ever Abilene Sunburn Grand Prix," Dohrse said.

Spectators can enjoy six grand prix races every day. Saturday, June 14, will showcase regional races while the Sunday, June 15, races will feature the nationals.

Gates to the Abilene Regional Airport west side will open at 8:30 a.m. Saturday with races beginning at 9 a.m. On Sunday, gates will open at 7:30 a.m. with the start of races at 8 a.m. According to race officials, out of town visitors can reach the race track, located on the east side of Abilene, by getting on Loop 322, taking the airport exit and following the signs.

Gate prices are General Admission adults \$6, one day pass; children under 12 (must be accompanied by an adult), free each day, \$3 per day.

Bleachers will be provided for spectators as well as ample free parking. Handicap parking is also available. "Just inform the parking attendants and they will direct those individuals to the appropriate area," Tim Propst, parking supervisor said.

Also, food and beverage vendors will be available and located near the bleachers for the convenience of the spectators.

"Don't forget to bring a hat, sunglasses, suntan lotion, and possibly an umbrella," Matt Smith, race chairman said.

"After all, this is the Sunburn Grand Prix!" Race officials request that racing enthusiasts leave their pets at home. It will be too warm to leave them in the car and too loud for them to be comfortable around the race track.

The Abilene Sunburn Grand Prix is presented each year by the Abilene Motor Sports, Inc., with proceeds benefiting the Abilene Rotary Club charities.

### Two Steps Forward, One Back

Congress took action on two important budget issues this week. Passage of the House and Senate compromise on the balanced budget blueprint amounted to two steps forward, while passing an unpaid for disaster relief bill retreated back one step.

The conference report approved by Congress finalizes the outline for tax and spending legislation to be considered this year. This budget resolution conference agreement calls for enactment of two comprehensive reconciliation bills which will change spending and taxing policies sufficient to reach a balanced budget in 2002. The second reconciliation bill, which will not be presented to the President until after the spending reduction bill is completed, will provide for tax reductions including a capital gains tax cut and inheritance tax relief for small businesses and farmers.

Unfortunately, Congress also took a step away from fiscal responsibility when it passed the disaster relief spending bill. I am very sympathetic to the need for these funds to help flood victims in the mid-west, and that is why I was so disappointed that just hours after approving the budget resolution, the House voted to deficit spend in this supplemental appropriation bill. This bill is expected to be vetoed for reasons unrelated to the disaster funds, forcing Congress to then revise the bill. I am hopeful that in that process, we will craft legisla-

tion which helps both flood victims and all deficit victims.

### Gold For Good

Mother Teresa came to the Capitol this week to join the celebration of passage of legislation honoring her with the Congressional Gold Medal.

Regardless of party, religion or nationality, individuals world-wide have come to respect the 86-year-old nun whose life has personified the highest level of service to the poor, the unwanted and the unloved.

The Congressional Gold Medal is Congress' most prestigious civilian honor. The legislation passed earlier this year authorizes the Treasury to mint a medal which will bear an image of Mother Teresa holding a child.

In the brief remarks which Mother Teresa made, she reminded us to continually pray for the strength to do God's work with love — good advice regardless of whether the audience is full of Congressmen, students, business folks, housewives, or anyone else.

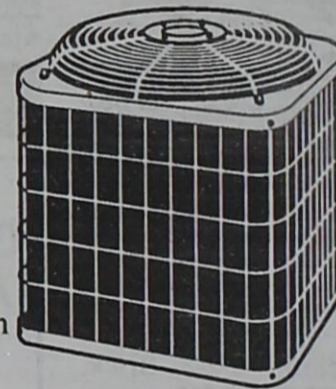

### IF YOU MUST SELL YOUR HOME AT A LOSS

Selling a home isn't easy, but it's especially tough if you face a financial loss. Unfortunately, in the current real estate market, more and more people must deal with this possibility.

As a general rule, a loss on the sale of your personal residence isn't tax-deductible. If it looks like your home will sell for a small loss, you might simply decide to take your lumps and move on. But if it looks like the market will continue to drop before you sell, you might consider converting your home to a rental property. Any loss in value after you convert will be treated as a loss on rental property.

There is no firm rule governing when a personal residence becomes a rental property, but the tax consequences are clear: a loss on the sale of rental property is tax-deductible, while the same loss on a residence is not. To help substantiate that your prior residence became a rental, you must look and act like a landlord. At a minimum, this usually means advertising or listing the house with a broker and asking a reasonable rent. How long must your former residence be rented, or remain available for rent? Again, there's no firm answer, since each situation is unique.

You should always consult a qualified accountant before attempting to convert a residence to a rental property. This is a major tax and financial decision, and it's usually more complex than it seems. For example, how much benefit do you actually stand to realize? Can you handle periods of negative cash flow? What happens when you sell the property and depreciation deductions trigger gain? The questions go on, but you probably get the idea. 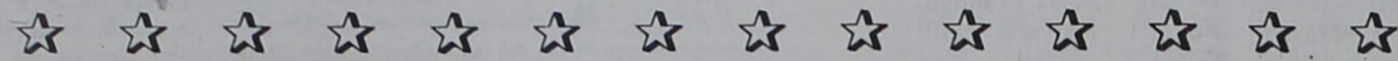

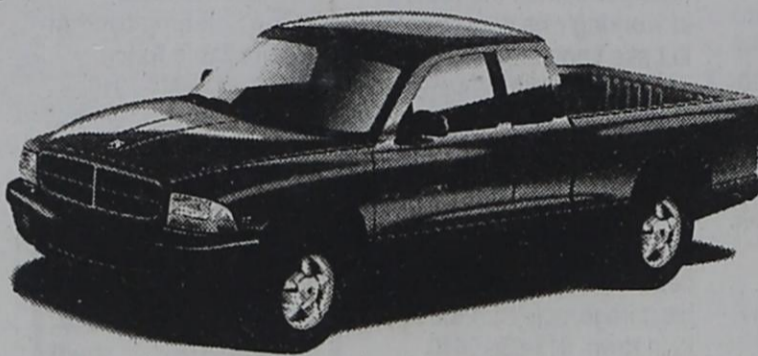

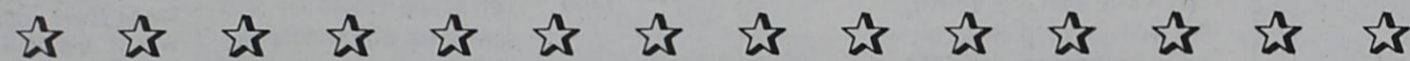

### Recipes

#### SIMPLE CHICKEN STEW

3 tablespoons Better Than Bouillon Chicken Base  
3 cups hot water  
1 (3 to 3 1/2-pound) chicken, cut up  
1 tablespoon olive oil  
1 medium potato, cubed  
1 medium turnip, cubed  
2 medium carrots, cubed  
1 medium green pepper, cut in 1-inch pieces  
1 or 2 ribs celery, diced  
1 small onion, chopped  
Thoroughly dissolve chicken base in hot water; set aside. Brown chicken in oil in Dutch oven. Add chicken-base broth; heat to boiling. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 2 to 2 1/2 hours. Add potato, turnip, carrots, green pepper, celery and onion. Simmer until vegetables are crisp-tender. Makes 5 to 6 servings.

#### BEAN STEW

1 pound dried white beans, soaked overnight  
1 1/2 quarts fresh water  
2 tablespoons Better Than Bouillon chicken base  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
1/2 cup chopped shallots, optional  
1/4 teaspoon black pepper  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon canola oil  
1 (4-ounce) can chilies  
2 teaspoons cumin  
2 teaspoons oregano  
2 teaspoons chopped cilantro  
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper  
5 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cooked and cubed  
1 cup grated cheddar cheese

#### 1/4 cup chopped green onions

Drain soaked beans, discarding water. In large saucepan, combine drained beans, fresh water, chicken base, onion, garlic, shallots and black pepper. Bring to boil; reduce heat, cover and simmer until beans are tender, about 1 1/4 hours. Add salt to taste. Add water, if needed, during cooking.

Heat oil in skillet and sauté chilies 1 minute. Add chilies to saucepan along with cumin, oregano, cilantro, and cayenne. Add cooked chicken. Cook 20 minutes. Ladle into bowls and top with cheese and green onion. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

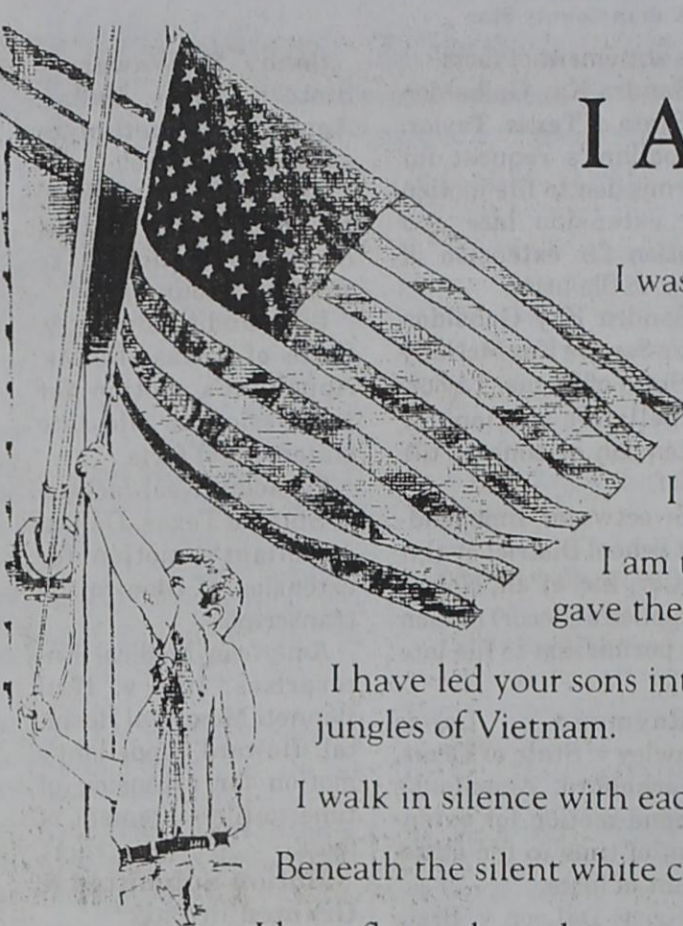

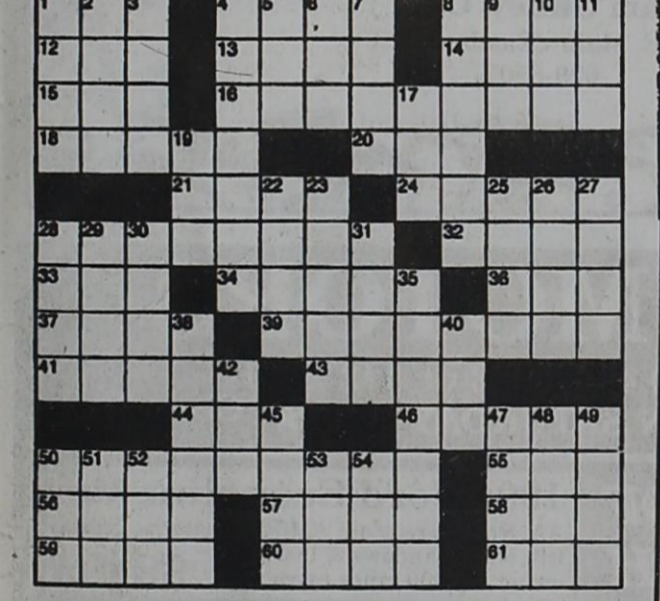

erty tax reform his top goal for the Legislature.

"Texans would prefer a governor who's effective," said Democratic Party Chairman Bill White. "He started too late on tax reform and failed to deliver the votes."

Despite the Legislature's failure to substantially reduce the school tax burden on homeowners, Bush indicated he is not ready to quit the governor's mansion. "We've delivered the largest tax cut in the state's history ... you ought to assume I'm going to run (for reelection)," he told reporters.

If voters approve a constitutional amendment on the Aug. 9 ballot, the average homeowner can expect a \$140 break by increasing the homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

**Sharp, Mauro Eyeing Race**  
Comptroller John Sharp, a Democrat, who may have gubernatorial aspirations, said Bush's proposed business-activity tax would have taxed the income of limited partnerships and was nothing more than a personal income tax.

"If any Democrat had proposed this to the Legislature, they would have been run out of town inside 12 hours," Sharp said, adding that lawmakers did Bush a favor when they failed to agree on a tax reform plan.

Countering, Gov. Bush's spokeswoman, Karen Hughes, said Sharp had advocated a similar tax six years ago. And, she defended Bush's pre-session pledge not to raise taxes. She said it was "absolutely absurd" to portray the partnership tax as an income tax.

Meanwhile Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has hired a pollster and plans to travel the state, asking Texans "what they want in their next governor."

**Race for Governor Begins**  
Meanwhile, electioneering for the 1998 gubernatorial race began even before Bullock's surprise announcement.

One day after lawmakers departed Austin, Democrats questioned the effectiveness of Gov. George W. Bush, who made prop-

addresses environmental protection and population growth.

The legislation was Lt. Gov. Bullock's top priority for the session. "Our future depends on this bill. Texans can now stand united on a subject that has long divided us," he said.

The bill will provide more than \$1 billion for upgrading standard drinking water systems. It will protect freshwater flows into bays and estuaries and it creates obstacles for transfers of water from one basin to another. The measure will appear as a constitutional amendment on the Nov. 4 ballot.

Cities, water districts and other local governments will have to work together to create and manage a water-conserving drought plan due September 2000.

**'Gangsta' Investment Ban Revived**  
Texas could become the first state to prohibit agencies from investing in companies that produce or distribute "gangsta rap" music under a measure Gov. Bush will sign into law.

After a House committee threw it out, Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, revived the measure by attaching it as a rider to the 800-page state budget bill. Ratliff, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said he wanted to stop public money from going to companies he said poison the minds of children and teenagers.

According to a report in the *Austin American-Statesman*, the rider prohibits the use of state money to invest in or buy securities of a business that owns 10 percent or more of a company that records or produces any song, lyrics or other musical work that explicitly describes, glamorizes or advocates:

- Acts of criminal violence, including murder, assault, assault on police officers, sexual assault and robbery;
- Necrophilia, bestiality, pedophilia;
- Illegal use of drugs;
- Criminal street gang activity;
- Degradation of women; and
- Violence against sex, race, ethnic group, sexual orientation or religion.


