NCTMWA Receives Check For Miller Creek Project

A future water supply for the area was assured last Friday, September 18, when officials of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority and members of the Texas Water Development Board met in the new State Finance Building in Austin.

Marvin Shurbet, Chairman of the Texas Water Development Board handed a check in the amount of \$986,250 to L. B. Patterson, President of the Board of Directors of NCTMWA, which will be applied to land acquisition of the reservoir site.

Delivery of the state loan was the culmination for Patterson, president of the board of the authority, of 15 years of work. The project has been before the Texas Water Rights Commission, the legislature, the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Water Development board many times. It has been the subject of several elections in the cities involved.






Heroin is the most used of all the addictive narcotics. When first taken it relieves pain, reduces tension, eases fears and relieves tension and worry. But, at the same time, it depresses the brain, reduces hunger, thirst and the sex drive.

Heroin users require repeated and larger doses to get their effects. Soon they are addicted or "hooked." Then they must take increasingly regular and larger doses or suffer agonizing pains. They may sweat, shake, get chills, diarrhea, nausea, leg cramps and abdominal pains.

A Heroin habit costs about \$100 a day to obtain the drug. Most often prostitution or other crimes are the only way to get this money. The addiction is so powerful that a heroin user will do anything to get relief. Otherwise he suffers continuous unbearable torture.
