## NCTMWA Receives Check For Miller Creek Project

A future water supply for the area was assured last Friday, September 18, when officials of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority and members of the Texas Water Development Board met in the new State Finance Building in Austin.

Marvin Shurbet, Chairman of the Texas Water Development Board handed a check in the amount of \$986,250 to L. B. Patterson, President of the Board of Directors of NCTMWA, which will be applied to land acquisition of the reservoir site.

Delivery of the state loan was the culmination for Patterson, president of the board of the authority, of 15 years of work. The project has been before the Texas Water Rights Commission, the legislature, the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Water Development Board many times. It has been the subject of several elections in the cities involved.

The loan is a part of the \$3,400,000 combination tax and revenue bond issue that was voted by member towns of Goree, Knox City, Haskell, and Munday, in the election of each of the towns on August 14, 1969. The State of Texas is purchasing the bonds at a low interest rate and will participate in conservation storage. Approval of the bond issue has been given by Attorney General Crawford Martin.

A Federal grant in the amount of \$1,500,000 by the Department of Housing and Urban Development will complete financing plans of the water project.

"It was 15 years ago, just about now, that we started studying feasibility of the lake," Patterson said. He said representatives of seven towns organized to sponsor the lake. "This is the happiest day of my life," he added.

Patterson said he had missed only part of one meeting since the first organization gathering. But he obviously is not calling the job finished. He told the group that four more towns may join the authority to get water supplies from the reservoir.

"The area has to work together," he said. "If we do, we can build one of the best agricultural areas in the state."

Members of the Texas Water Development Board in attendance for the meeting were Howard Boswell, Executive Director; Marvin Shurbet, Chairman; W. E. Tinsley, Vice-Chairman, and Danny Burger, Fund Development Manager.

## Goree Producers Co-op Gins First Bale Of Cotton

W. L. Robertson, manager of Goree Producers Cooperative Gin reported the first bales of cotton of the season were brought in Tuesday, September 22. The cotton was brought in by J. C. Watson.

Out of 4050 pounds of cotton, Mr. Watson had a 495 pound bale and a 460 pound bale. The cotton was harvested from 6 acres of Lockett 4789A cotton making approximately one-third bale to the acre.

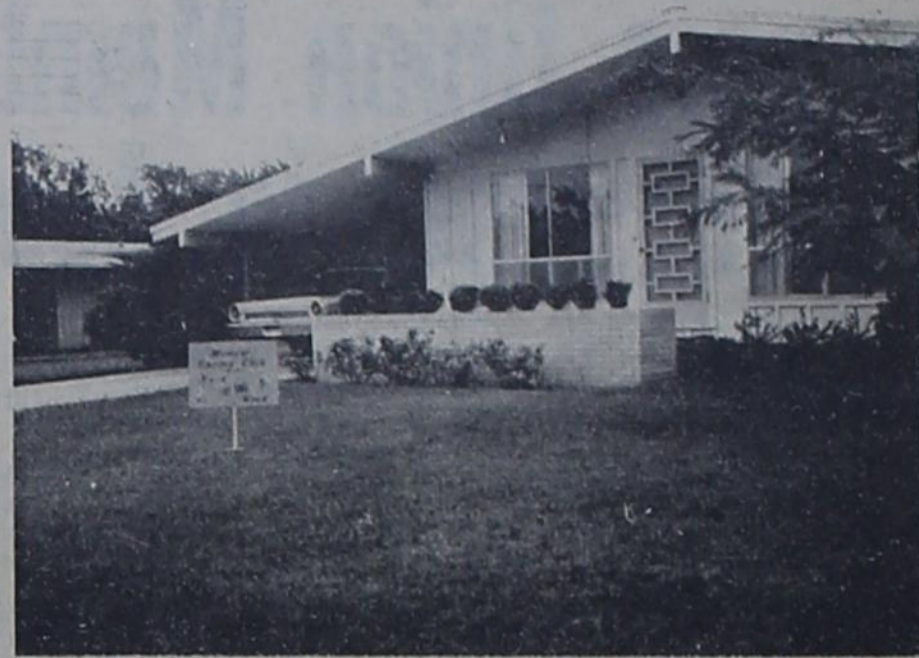

## Construction Underway On City's Underground Drainage

Work on Storm sewer and Drainage system for the City of Munday has begun, many pieces of heavy equipment were moved into position last week and more is expected to be added shortly, such as shown in the accompanying picture. The crew at work now are mostly equipment operators and engineers shooting grades for the storm sewer. Much preliminary work has been done and the actual full operation will be in progress shortly.

With reference to the paving with curb and gutters to assist the drainage of our streets will not begin before October 1, 1970 due to the fact that all of the property owners have not made the satisfactory settlement for the paving of the streets next to their property as required by the State of Texas laws for street paving. October 1, 1970, is the date set to start operations on curb and gutter portion of the street paving. If you have not already made the proper arrangements for financing your portion of the street paving, do so at once, for this is a must.

The engineer called city officials last week and stated that work was to begin on the underground drainage portion of the project on the south end of the ditch with heavy equipment. On approximately Thursday (today) a small crew with smaller equipment should commence laying underground pipe in the smaller sizes on the northern portion of the ditch.

# Farmers Union Members At District Meet In Aspermont

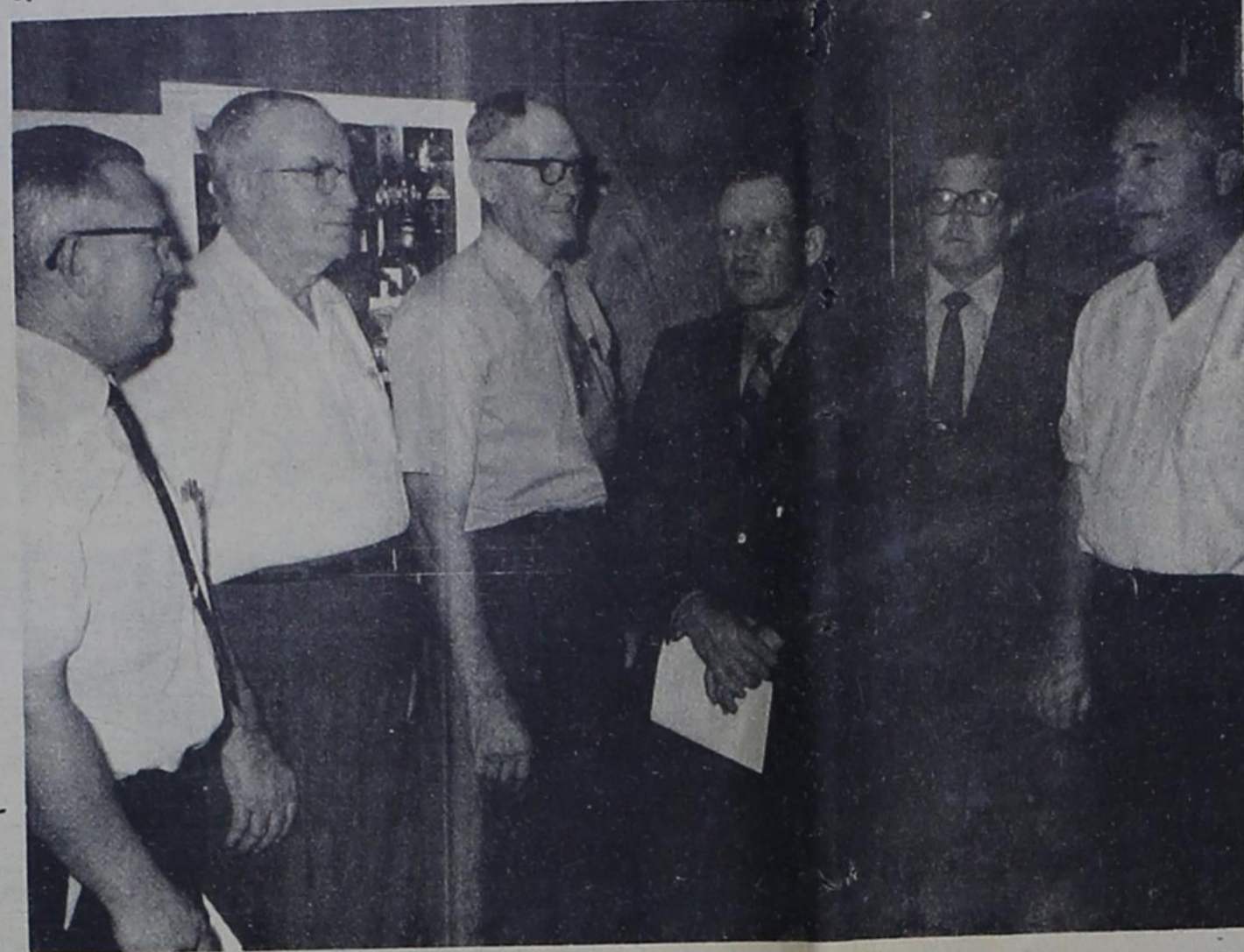
Knox City—Several members of the Knox County Farmers Union and their wives were in Aspermont Saturday, September 12, to attend the annual District III luncheon meeting held in Frazier's Cafe.

Presiding at the business session was District III president Foy Mitchell of Roby, who welcomed members representing the seventeen counties which comprise District III. Kenneth Moss, organizational director of Texas Farmers Union, reminded members that the current membership drive is being conducted September 21-26. He praised Knox County for surpassing its goal by some 65 members.

State vice president Joe Rankins of Ralls told the group that he was attending the meeting on behalf of president Jay Naman who was in Washington at the time in the interest of pertinent farm legislation. He

explained the farm bill proposals of both the House and Senate comparing them with the 1965 Agricultural Act. (Since the Aspermont meeting, the Senate passed an improved farm bill Tuesday night of last week containing parity for wheat, feed grains, and cotton. Loan floors were set for wheat and feed grains, and the "set aside" land retirement scheme was watered down. Senate conferees included U. S. Rep. Graham B. Purcell who has been very receptive to farmers' needs and requests. According to word received from Farmers Union, differences must be resolved in all sections of the bill, and even with improvements it is a rock-bottom minimum bill. Any compromise downward with the House will be a blow to farmers. House and Senate conferees are on the spot, officials said.) County officials were urged to plan their annual meetings in preparation for the Waco meet

November 9 and 10 and the state convention in Amarillo this year on December 3, 4, and 5.

## Rep. Graham Purcell Farm Bill Conferee

Washington - Rep. Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls is one of 14 lawmakers picked to draft the final version of a new omnibus farm bill. Included

will be seven House members and seven senators.

The Senate-House conference committee is expected to begin work early next week to reconcile differences between the farm bill passed by the Senate Tuesday night and the measure approved by the House in August.

The Senate conference panel includes four Democrats and three Republicans. The Democrats are Chariman Allen J. Ellender of Louisiana, Spessard Holland of Florida, James Eastland of Mississippi and Herman Talmadge of Georgia - an all-southern group.

The Republicans are George Aiken of Vermont, Milton Young of North Dakota and Jack Miller of Iowa.

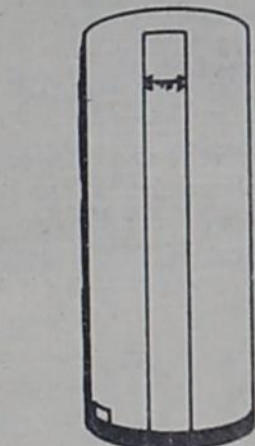
In the House delegation - also four Democrats and three Republicans - the Democrats will be Chairman W. R. Poage of Texas, Thomas Abernethy of Mississippi, Graham Purcell of Texas and Bernard Sisk of California.

The Republicans will be Page Belcher of Oklahoma, Charles Teague of California and Catherine May of Washington.

Nixon administration farm officials have made it clear they'll be pushing the conference committee to produce a compromise sticking as close as possible to the House version of the farm bill.

The administration already has announced its opposition to features of the Senate bill, including minimum support loan rates for wheat and feed grains and the retention of acreage allotments for wheat and cotton.

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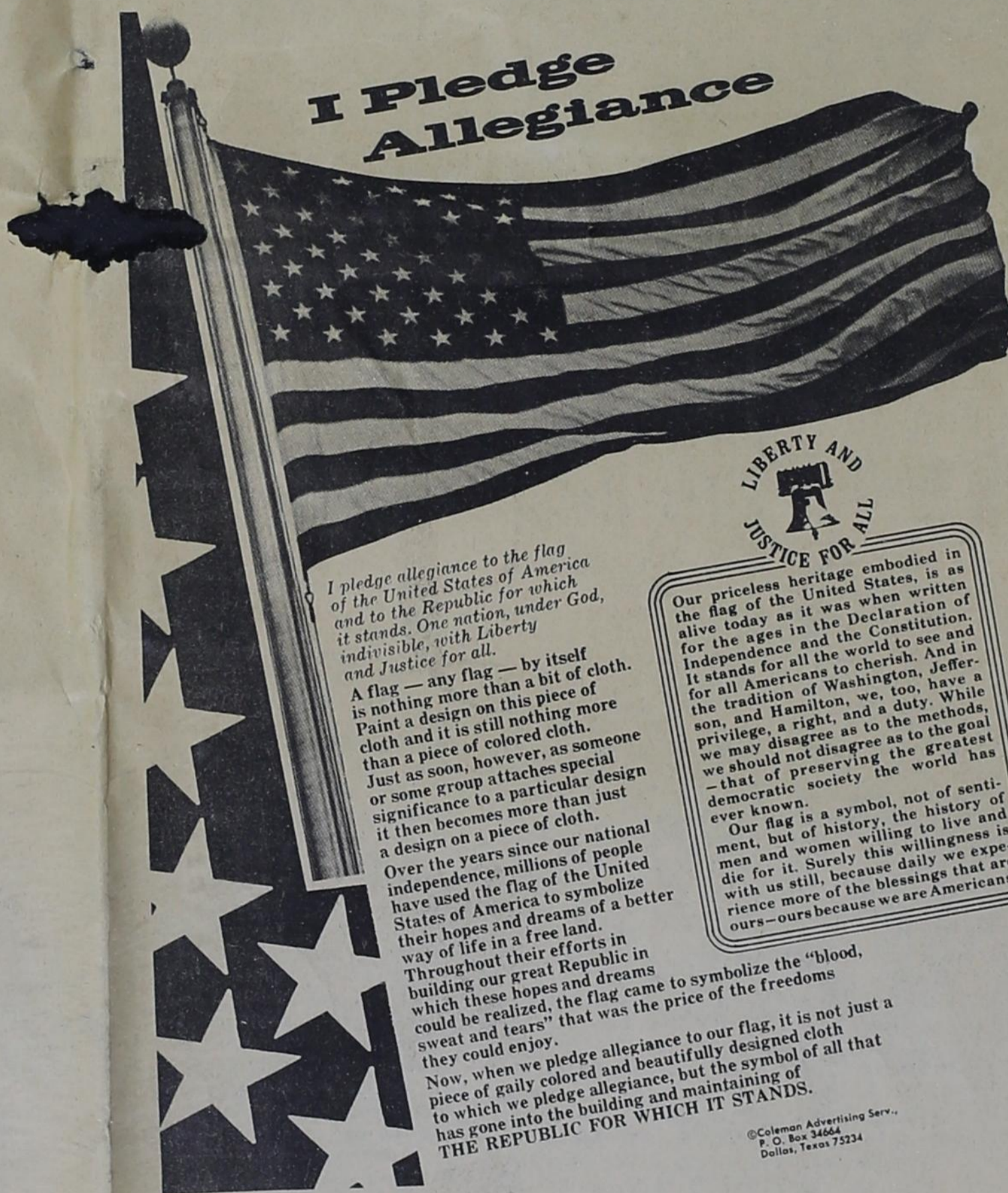

now concluding an unprecedented fifth term as chairman of the influential Texas House Appropriations Committee.

This is one of the most influential positions in the Texas House and the fact that Mr. Heatly has been elected to head the committee for so many times testifies to the esteem in which his fellow House members hold him.

Rep. Heatly has built a reputation for being a real worker, both for his district and the entire State of Texas, during his services in the House.

He has a deep interest in education, in mental health and in the state highway program as well as the prison system, Texas Youth Council, the Welfare Department and the Institute for Cancer Research.

Rep. Heatly has always been interested and a real booster for Midwestern University, in Wichita Falls, and helped to make it a state school. He has always supported programs that would improve the mental health activities in Texas and was one of the authors of the House version of the Farm-to-Market Road Bill passed in the early 1960's.

He has always actively opposed legalized gambling and has been a leader in attempting to equalize the tax on beer with cigarettes and gasoline. He has always favored rural electrification and has been active in seeking improvements in insurance laws.

We feel that the re-election of Rep. Heatly next November to another term in the Texas House will be a prime move in

crew will begin installation of curbs in areas where underground drainage will not be installed.

The construction underway at this time includes the digging of the 15 to 20 ft. hole where three pumps will be installed. The curb inlets will drain into this low point and from there it will be pumped into the big ditch. It is hoped that this will eliminate the major portion of the back-up problem during heavy rains and also eliminate standing water which can become stagnant and unhealthy for the townspeople.

The entire street paving and drainage project will be a great asset to the City of Munday. We were fortunate in obtaining a grant of \$100,000.00 and a loan of \$102,000.00 at a low rate of interest of five percent payable in forty years to apply on our storm sewer drainage system from FHA, but they stated distinctly that we could not get funds for street paving system from FHA. It will be nice when we can say that the job is finished. This entire project of drainage and paving our streets must be completed by August 1, 1971 according to the contract.

Funds for street paving and curb gutters were obtained from another source.

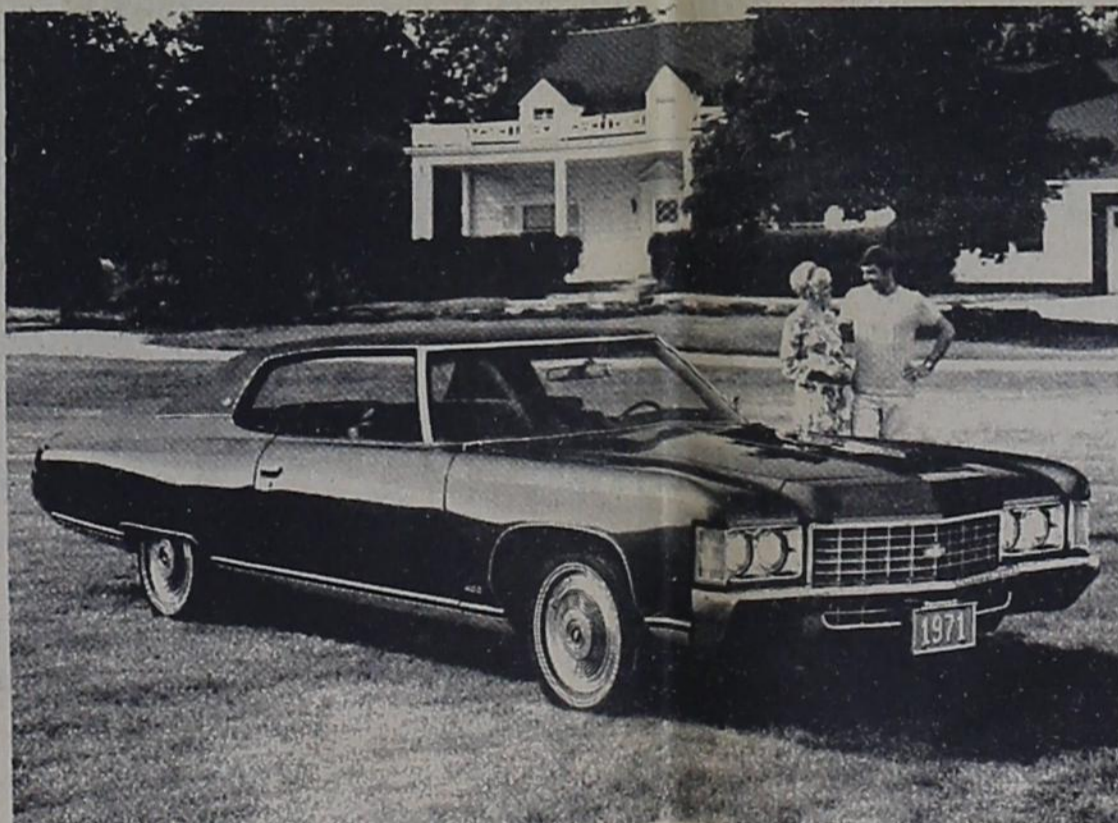

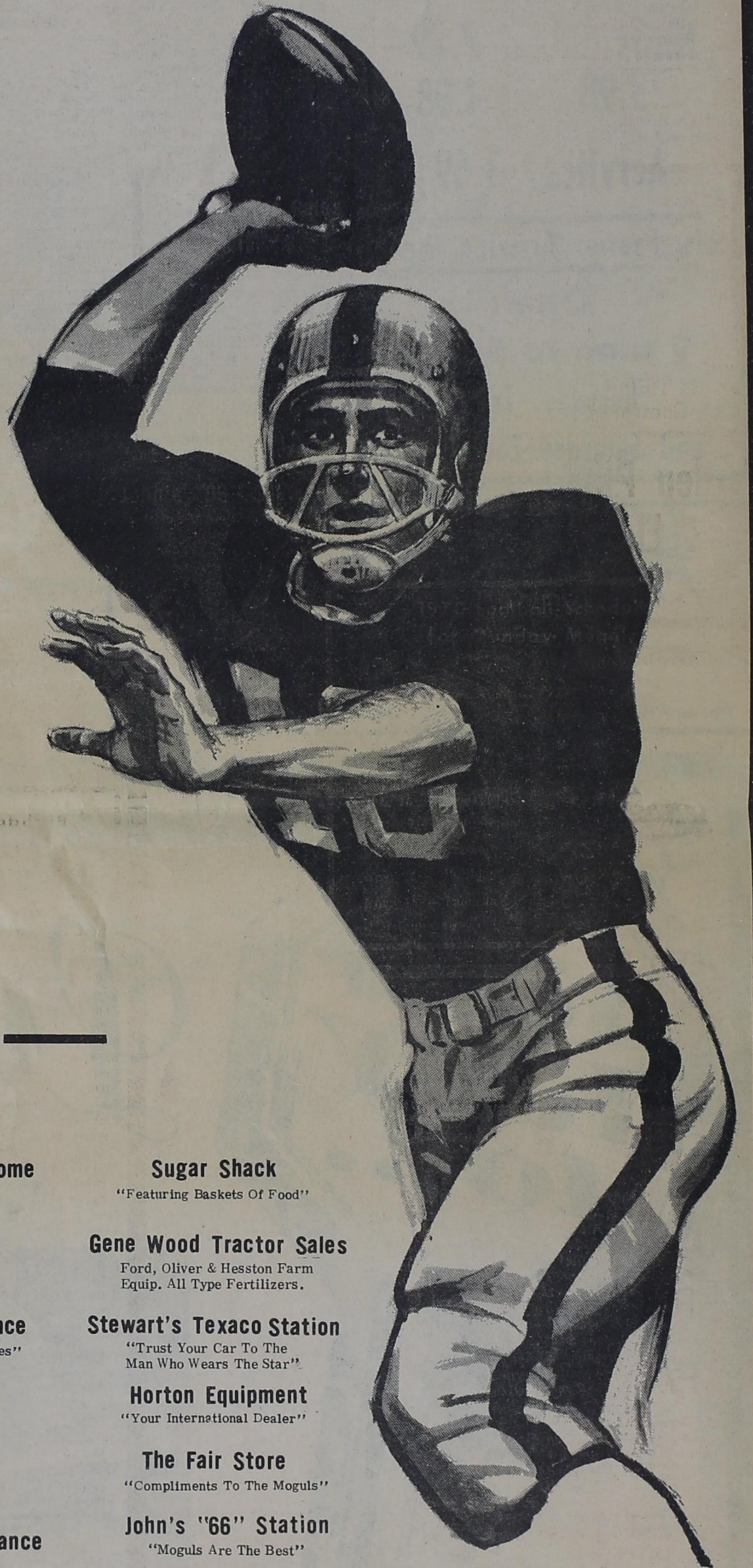

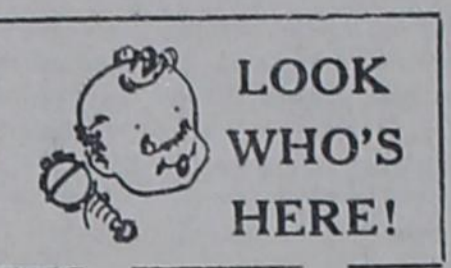

## Review Of Pilot Program Made At Lions Club

One purpose of the Pilot Program on Special Education is to find out if the rural high schools of Texas can work together in such a program to aid the children who are handicapped in certain areas of learning.

This statement was made at Tuesday's meeting of the Munday Lions Club by James Mickler, supervisor of the Pilot Program for Haskell and Knox Counties. He stated that he is supervisor over about 30 people who are working in the program for the 10 schools and 3,080 students in the two-county area.

"We are the only rural high school system in Texas to have this program," he said, "and the only one to guide all rural high schools of Texas. One of our purposes is to find out if we can work together in such a program. We are five years ahead of other rural high schools. The State Department of Education says all high schools will have the program in 1975 - we have it now!"

The program, as explained by Mickler, "is for any child that is handicapped in any way or in any area of learning. The child is examined for hearing, seeing, etc., and given tests on reading, spelling, arithmetic, etc."

"We locate the area where

the child is strong, or weak, or where he needs help; as well as the area in which the child is not able to learn," he said. We find living conditions in the home, broken homes, etc., also contribute to the child's inability to learn."

Mickler stated that a vocational program will be instituted to discourage dropouts among the students. This program is one in which the child receives training in a vocation, through the cooperation of local merchants and business people for a half-day at a time. The child may continue to attend school as well as receive training in a particular trade or vocation.

"The handicapped child is as much a part of society as you and I," he proclaimed, "and we're proving that such a child need no longer remain at home, but may attend school and eventually become a self-supporting member of our society."

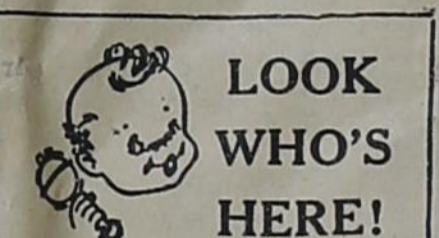

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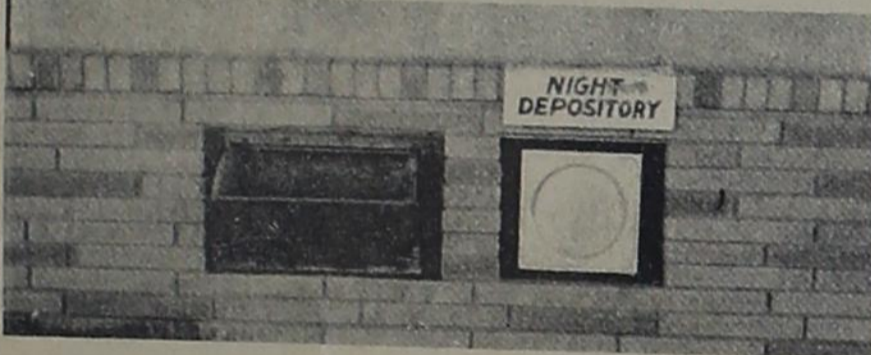
