## Draft Calls Resumes In Near Future

Selective Service System Executive Secretary Mrs. Leola Isbell, who manages Texas local board #82, Benjamin, Texas, says the current congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among area draft-age men.

Mrs. Isbell continued, "selective service director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in the Congress is not likely to affect any registrant's chance of being drafted."

"Our local Board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for pre-induction physical examinations those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming months," Mrs. Isbell said.

Men with lottery numbers through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the defense department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 in July-August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final congressional action on the draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

"Those young men with relatively low lottery numbers who are eligible for induction this year, particularly those with numbers below 175—the current processing ceiling—have a very good chance of being processed for induction after draft calls are restored," Mrs. Isbell said.

"Many young men," said Mrs. Isbell, "seem to think that the Selective Service act has permanently expired and that they probably will never be drafted. Some of them also think that the entire system has stopped. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They, therefore, may be unintentionally breaking the law by failing to register at age 18, by not keeping their current address, or by failing to report, if ordered, for their preinduction physical examinations."

Mrs. Isbell also stressed that local boards are continuing to consider co, hardship, and student deferments and to take other classification actions. "Young men who had planned to submit requests for deferments or exemptions are encouraged to do so," Mrs. Isbell said. "The expiration of the induction authority does not affect our responsibility to classify young men," Mrs. Isbell added.

## VEE Vaccination Day To Be Held Monday, August 2

Veterinarians located in Memphis, Childress, Lockney, Spur, Paducah, and Munday have designated Monday, August 2, for VEE vaccination day and each Monday thereafter will be set up as vaccination day for VEE due to the fact that 100 dose lots, is the minimum that may be mixed at any one time.

If you have not had your horses vaccinated, please contact the veterinarian of your choice prior to Monday, so that he can request sufficient vaccine for that specific day.

It is mandatory that all owners of horses, mules and donkey must have their animals vaccinated.

You may bring the animals to a spot designated by the veterinarian and the owners will be permitted to take the horses back to his premises but they cannot be moved from there for 14 days and then be moved only accompanied by the vaccination certificate.

There is no charge for the vaccine for inoculation.

## Photo Slides Of Thailand Shown To Lions

The photos showed the water buffalo as a beast of burden in that country, although some elephants were used in some parts, the planting and harvesting of rice, floating markets, temples and churches of Bangkok, various entertainment and sports enjoyed by the people, methods of transportation, etc.

## Bond Sales Total 46% Of '71 Goal

Mr. M. L. Wiggins, County Bond Chairman, announced today that sale of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Knox County during June were \$10,767.00. Sales for the first six months totaled \$73,600.00 for 46 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$160,000.00.

During the month Texans purchased \$15,781,727 in Savings Bonds compared to \$13,658,647 (includes Freedom Shares) during June 1970. Year-to-date sales totaled \$101,916,420 -- 56 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationwide, new purchases of Series E and H savings Bonds during June amounted to \$486 million, 9 per cent above 1970. Sales the first six months of 1971 were \$2,785 million -- 18 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$127 million were reported for the six-month period of 1971, compared to \$123 million exchanged during 1970.

## David Walker One Of High School Debaters At Texas Tech University

LUBBOCK — The jury system in United States courts has become the most controversial topic on the Texas Tech University campus this week.

Forty high school debaters from as far away as Houston, San Marcos and Wichita, Kan., have enrolled in the 20th annual Texas Tech High School Forensics Workshop which opens Monday (July 19) to continue through July 30.

The subject to be used by the nation's high school debate teams this year is Resolved: That the jury system in the United States should be significantly changed.

Students attend lecture sessions during the mornings, with instructors explaining proper research methods, recording and cataloging information, analysis of the proposition, developing arguments, constructing affirmative and negative cases, refutation and delivery.

Each student is assigned to a work group consisting of approximately eight students of varsity or novice quality for afternoon study sessions. Each work group is headed by an instructor with students learning how to make practical application of principles presented in the morning lectures. Each student participates daily in his work group. During the second week every student will be assigned a colleague for practice rounds of debate. Superior debaters in the four-round tournament, final event of the workshop July 30, will be accorded workshop recognition.

Work study groups also have been organized in the areas of extemporaneous speaking and interpretation. David Walker is one of the students enrolled.

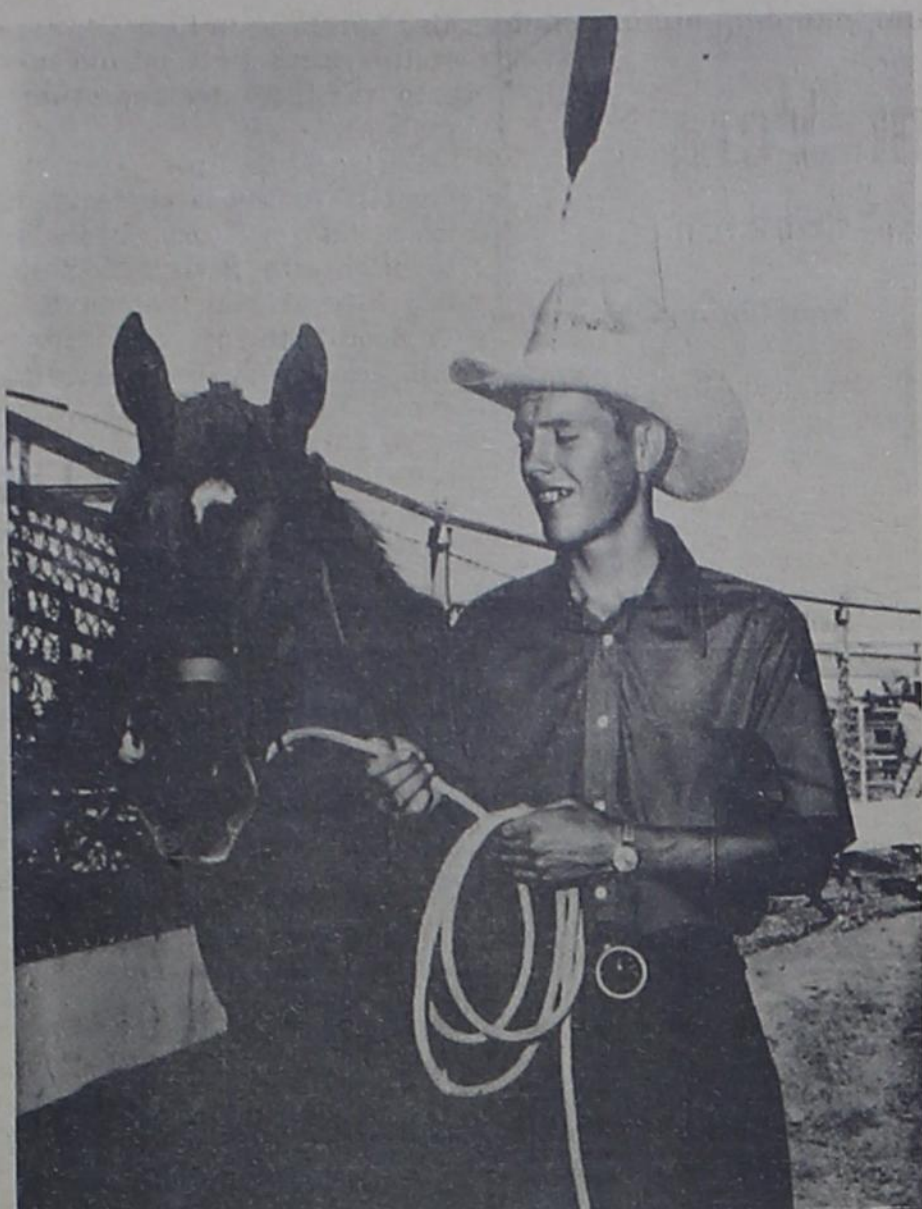

#### Tax Man Sam Sez

Unfortunately the drought has forced many livestock owners to sell a part or all of their herd. The Internal Revenue Service provides a modified form of tax relief on the sale of livestock due to a drought. You are not required to pay taxes on any profit that you make on the sale of your herd (provided your sales for the year are in excess of normal sales) if you reinvest within two years with the same type of herd. An extension of this period beyond two years may be granted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue Service in exceptional cases. Publication 225, the Farmers Tax Guide, spells out all the requirements on drought sales of livestock on pages 36 through 40. Local county agents and Internal Revenue Service offices have free copies of the Farmers Tax Guide available for you. IRS advises farmers considering a drought sale to obtain a Farmers Tax Guide and carefully check the rules in advance.

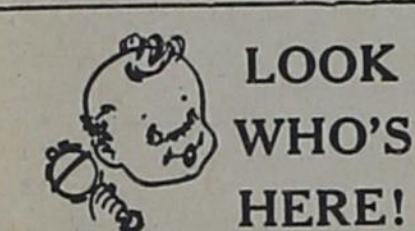

### Rural Population Increase And Decline To Be Studied By TIC

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. -Plans for a comprehensive research project to discover why some Texas rural areas have begun a population upsurge while many more continue a 30-year loss have been announced by the Texas Industrial Commission.

A preliminary commission survey of Texas counties shows 16 counties that consistently declined in population from 1930 to 1960 reversed this trend during the 1960's and showed population growth.

"Something happened in those counties to turn the population tide," said Jim Harwell, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission. "Our goal is to make it happen in all of them."

Commission personnel will measure quantities ranging from industrial location patterns to new tourist attractions, Harwell said, and a computerized analysis will determine factors responsible for increasing rural population.

"We already know that factors like new lakes or resort areas have affected several areas," he said. "But a thorough study can detect more subtle qualities which make for healthy population growth."

Current population trends are deleting the state's rural areas and concentrating people into huge metropolitan complexes, Harwell said.

"Unless preventative action is taken, Texas could develop vast areas of vacant rural land and overpopulated, unmanageable cities," he said. "This project marks the start of that action."

### S. S. Reports

Are all detergents biodegradable? All laundry and cleaning products now manufactured for use in the United States are biodegradable.

What types of detergents cause excessive foaming on lakes, streams and in sewage treatment plants?

When detergents first came on the market they contained an ingredient called alkyl benzene sulfonate which was slow to break down, causing excess foaming. In mid-1965, the detergent industry completed more than a decade of research and converted to the use of another ingredient called linear alkylate sulfonate which is biodegradable. Since the conversion there has been a dramatic reduction in foaming incidents.

Do today's detergents break down the way they are supposed to in septic tanks and cesspools?

The answer is yes, in a properly-functioning septic tank and tile drain field system. It should be noted, however, that septic tanks and cesspools are not highly efficient waste treatment devices, and are largely intended for rural use.

What does the word "biodegradable" mean on detergent packages?

A biodegradable material is one which the useful bacteria commonly found in sewage, surface waters and soils can attack, break down and utilize as food.

Why do some detergent packages list "phosphorus" content rather than the "phosphate" content?

There are different kinds of phosphates used in detergents and they can be listed in several different ways. The use of a common designation "phosphorus" eliminates confusion. About 25 percent of the phosphate used in detergents is phosphorus, which is the part being questioned with regard to the aging or life cycle of a lake.

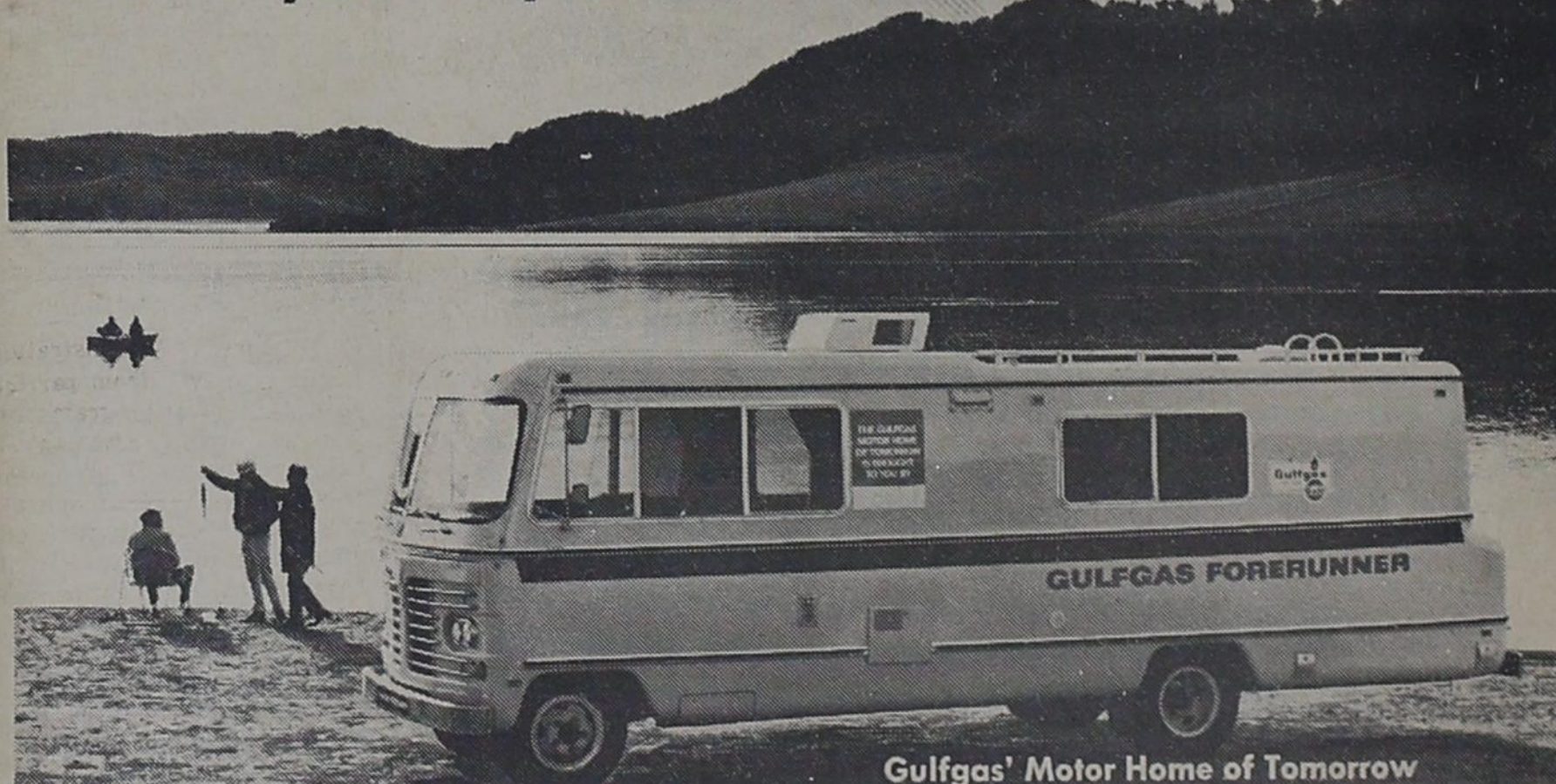

### Mexico Travel Restrictions

American youths under 18 desiring to visit Mexico are required to have the standard tourist card (issued free to U. ### FHA Loans Help Rural Economy

The rural economy of Knox County is stronger because loans from the Farmers Home Administration have helped 106 farmers finance real estate or operating expenses during the 1971 fiscal year, Joe Boone, County Supervisor of Farmers Home Administration said today.

The loan programs supervised by the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be repaid, with interest, Boone said.

## Farm And Ranch News

### CATTLE POISONED

Several cases of prussic acid (hydrogen cyanide) poisoning in cattle grazing Johnson grass and sorghum hybrids have been diagnosed during the past week at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory in College Station, Texas.

Dr. John C. Reagor, toxicologist, said that in one case, 250 hungry cows were turned into a Bermuda grass field about 4:30 p. m. The upper edge of the field had a large amount of wilted Johnson grass, which the animals began to eat immediately.

The next morning, 27 were found dead. They never made it to the Bermuda grass.

In another case, 20 cows were placed in a small pasture containing volunteer Hay-grazer from hay fed in early spring. The young, drothy plants were quickly grazed, and 13 animals were found dead the next morning.

Dr. Reagor said acid caused the deaths in both instances. Johnson grass and sorghum hybrids may contain high levels of the deadly poison when under drought stress followed by a summer rain shower.

Either the wilted or fast growing stage of the plant can be dangerous, the toxicologist points out. Problems usually arise when hungry animals are suddenly placed in these pastures.

Prussic acid is swift. Reagor said death can occur within five minutes after grazing affected plants, and almost always within 12 hours.

He urged stockmen to graze their cattle in such pastures only with great caution. Hungry cattle should never be turned in.

Samples of muscle tissue may be submitted to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory for testing, Reagor said. However, they must be "fixed" in a 1 per cent mercuric chloride solution for transport to the lab because prussic acid is not stable.

The lab also offers a testing service on plants suspected to be poisonous. Reagor said the

fee for either the muscle tissue or plant test is \$2 per sample.

### TEXAS HOG INVENTORY

The Texas hog inventory on June 1, 1971, was 1.7 million head, up 51 per cent from a year earlier, according to the latest release from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The December-May pig crop estimate for the state reached 1.2 million head, showing an increase of about 41 per cent over the same period a year earlier. For the June-November period, Texas hog producers intend to farrow 37 per cent more sows than during this time last year. This means that the Texas pig crop should reach close to 1.5 million head for June-November.

Breeding animals accounted for 282,000 of the state's inventory. The expansion of the breeding herd was somewhat less than the number kept for other purposes, according to Dr. Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist.

The number of hogs and pigs on U. S. farms as of June 1 was up 2 per cent over year earlier figures, the report revealed. The December-May pig crop was estimated at 51.9 million head, 1 per cent below the year earlier figures.

Intentions are to farrow 6.3 million sows during June-November in the U. S., 9 per cent less than last year. Uvacek says this would mean production of about 45.7 million pigs which represents 8 per cent less than the level during the same period a year ago.

In general, the report indicates no real cutback in hog production will be felt until the fall and winter months, the marketing specialist says. He adds that heavy marketings should keep prices from strengthening throughout this summer and on into the fall and that it will be 1972 before any price improvement can be expected due to reduce supplies of pork.

NEW COTTON STUDY AT A&M - A method of establishing the impact of restrictions in the use of agricultural chemicals on cotton production

is under study at Texas A&M University. Emphasis of the study, to be conducted by research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is to test a new technique for establishing the relationship between cotton and production and pesticide use.

### AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

ALERT FOR SCREW-WORMS - Though the outbreak of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis among the state's horses is getting major attention, stockmen are reminded to stay on the alert for possible cases of screw-worms. The recent outbreak in the northeast corner of the state and nearby area in Arkansas illustrate what can happen. A sample of any worms found in animal wounds should be sent to the Mission Laboratory for positive identification.

PROGRESS REPORTED IN HOG CHOLERA ERADICATION -- Over 40 percent of the nation's swine are now produced in states officially free of hog cholera. Officials of the eradication program are making plans for the achievement of the program's objective, a nation free of hog cholera by the end of 1972.

FARM SAFETY WEEK--While special emphasis is given to the prevention of farm and home accidents during the week of July 25-31, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council rural residents should never treat the subject lightly. Theme for this year's week is "Protect Yourself--Work Safely." And adds the Council, this means the use of safety devices on every piece of equipment used on the farm or in and around the home.



## Accent on Health

These summer days are noted for a lot of activities in Texas--picnics, summer vacations, annual rodeos and other festivals, and the traditional flocking of the population to resort areas on weekend. But there's one other happening summer and fall in Texas is noted for, something we don't like to remember but we must for obvious reasons. That is the beginning of hurricane season, an annual problem that potentially troubles the Texas coast and much countryside and many people for miles inland.

As this hurricane season gets underway, many stories are brought to the minds of several Texans about killer hurricanes of the past. Hopefully, this won't happen this year as it did in 1970. One year ago, Hurricane Celia struck the Texas coast and tested the ability of residents in the Corpus Christi area to endure one of nature's calamities. It also tested the capabilities of the Texas Health Department and other agencies in their ability to move quickly to aid the stricken area.

This hurricane was deadly. She hit the Texas coast on the afternoon of August 3 with a punch that left 13 Texans dead, thousands homeless, and millions of dollars worth of property damage. Almost every phase of State Health Department activities was pressed into service to master the challenge of Celia. The hurricane had produced more than a half-billion dollars worth of damage; destroyed 9,000 homes and damaged another 60,000; disrupted electrical power and telephone communications; and cut operations of water and sewage systems.

Advanced planning paid off and some essential services were restored to parts of the stricken area soon after Celia roared through on a path which took her into Mexico and then back into the Big Bend Country of Texas.

With early communications

limited to radios and messengers because of the destructive winds, relief workers and local citizens pitched in to keep the area in touch with needed supply centers in the state. Calls were sent out as needed by health officials for medical supplies, emergency generators to provide power for hospitals and water and sewage systems, and "packaged" natural disaster hospitals to needed areas.

Health officials can truthfully say that Hurricane Celia was a challenge met. It is this type of operation that is ready to swing into action in a moment's notice should another hurricane threaten the Texas coast.
