Mile Relayers Cinch Tie For Crown Moguls Tie Clifton For Regional Title

The rains Saturday put a stop to the track meet at Denton but not before Munday's 440-yard relay team had qualified for state meet with 44.8 second to Springtown's 44.5. The four-some is composed of Billy Carden, Richard Albus, Randy Herring and Larry Toliver.

City Receives FHA Approval Of Loan, Grant For Paving

Congressman Purcell announced today the passage of a Farmers Home Administration Loan in the amount of \$102,000 and a grant of \$100,000 for the city of Munday, Knox County for construction of a rural community storm sewer and construction of added water storage facilities.

Mayor Jim Reeves and members of the City Council who worked so hard on the paving project were exuberant in announcing to the citizens of Munday the FHA approval. Mayor Reeves said that with the loan and grant, the project would get underway as early as possible.

Munday has long had the problem of water drainage, especially after heavy rainfall, and with the new paving construction, most of this will be eliminated. Not only will it help solve the drainage it will also

KC Elects Local Board

Knox County OEO Program Is Organized In KC Mon. Night

Knox City — A county-wide public meeting was held here Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock in the Knox City school lunchroom to institute and elect members for an official county board of directors to administer and elect members for an board of directors to direct a poverty program in Knox County through the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts presided and introduced Felix Taylor, executive director of the Economic Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardemen, and Wilbarger Counties, who explained the programs now in operation in his area and defined the position of the Knox County OEO program as a 'satellite' operation out of his office, due benefits and aids from, but not a part of, that incorporated agency. Mr. Taylor also acted as advisor on organizational procedures, using the official OEO manual as authority on the procedures.

Bob Harrison, executive director of Operation Mainstream in this area, explained the Mainstream program, a part of the U.S. Department of Labor, which will operate in Knox County in conjunction with the OEO program, through the Crowley office.

It was explained to the group that representatives of elected officials, private organizations, and the economically deprived will serve on the county board and each of these three elements will be equally represented.

Elected officials will be represented by Judge Clonts for the Knox County Commissioners' Court, Knox City Mayor C. C. (Buddy) Angle, Munday Mayor Jim Reeves, Benjamin Mayor Vernon D. McCanlies, and Goree Mayor Walter Coffman.

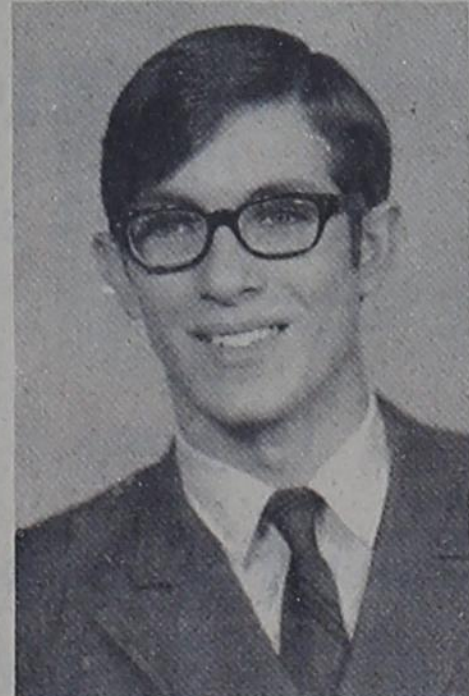

The cucumber trials, planted on the Offutt farm, is a continuation of past years' trials. The experiment will be beneficial in selecting varieties of cucumbers that are high yielding and disease resistant, and they may be adapted to machine harvest. Herbicides were used to control weeds on both trials.

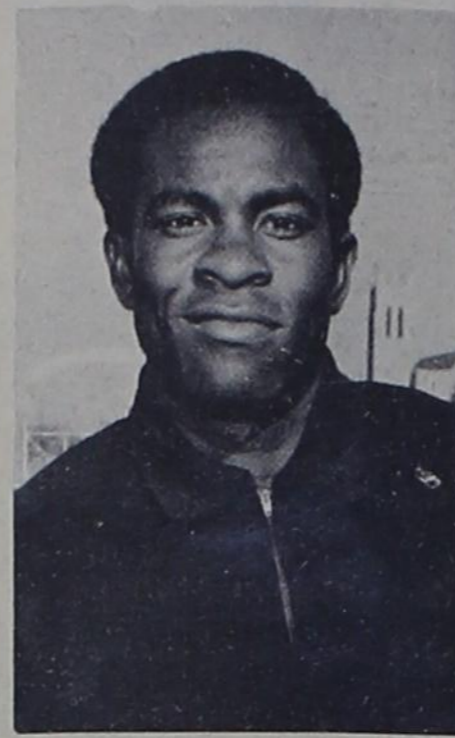

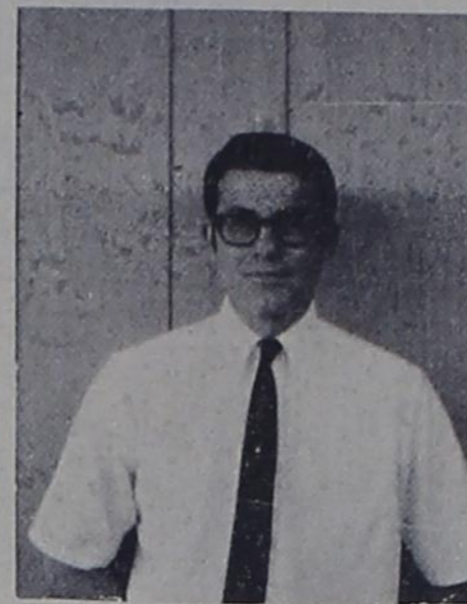

Ramsey Speaks Of Fight To Help Control Pollution

Austin - Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey said here today propane, butane and mixture fuels of liquefied petroleum gases appear destined for an important role in the continuing fight to control air pollution.

Ramsey is seeking a second full term as a member of the three-member Commission in the primaries May 2.

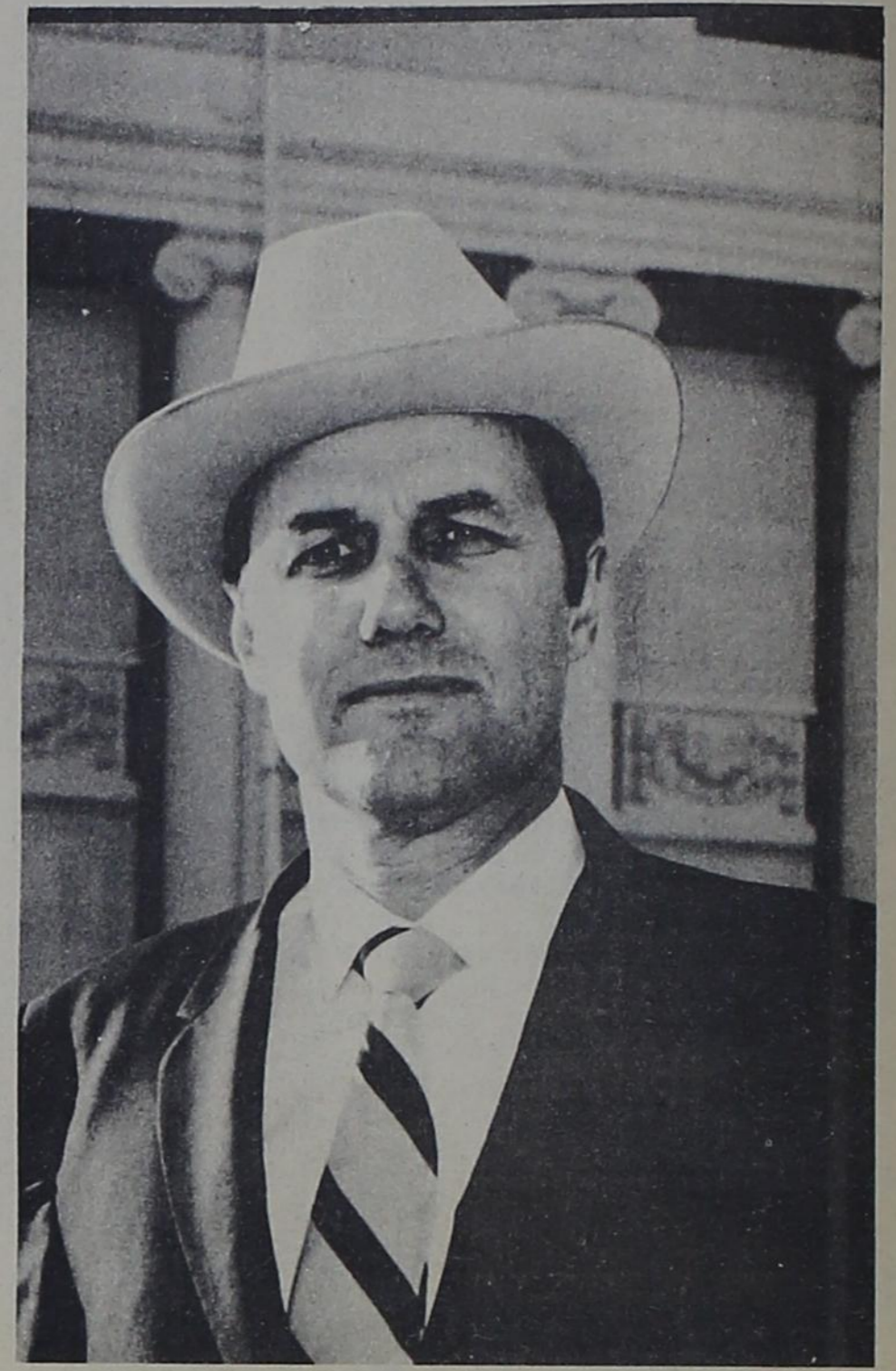
The ever increasing demand for liquefied petroleum gases as fuel for internal combustion engines, space heaters, and central heating units, Ramsey said, constitutes one of the most dynamic segments of the growing market for petroleum products. These light, pure hydrocarbons burn cleanly and efficiently, he explained, and do not contain the solid particles nor the lethal gases that state and federal authorities have found to be harmful and dangerous to humans, plants and other animal life.

Ramsey said the Commission responsible for protecting the public health and safety in the

transportation, storage and use of these gases, has recently adopted revised requirements tailored to help maintain liquefied gas as one of the safest fuels available to the consumer.

The Commission, Ramsey added, also has moved to help improve the supply and demand situation that has plagued the propane and butane markets in recent years. The said Commission acknowledgment of jurisdiction over the underground storage of these products is designed to help smooth out the erratic supply and demand fluctuations that propane has been experiencing due to its dual role as a fuel and product supply for the chemical industry.

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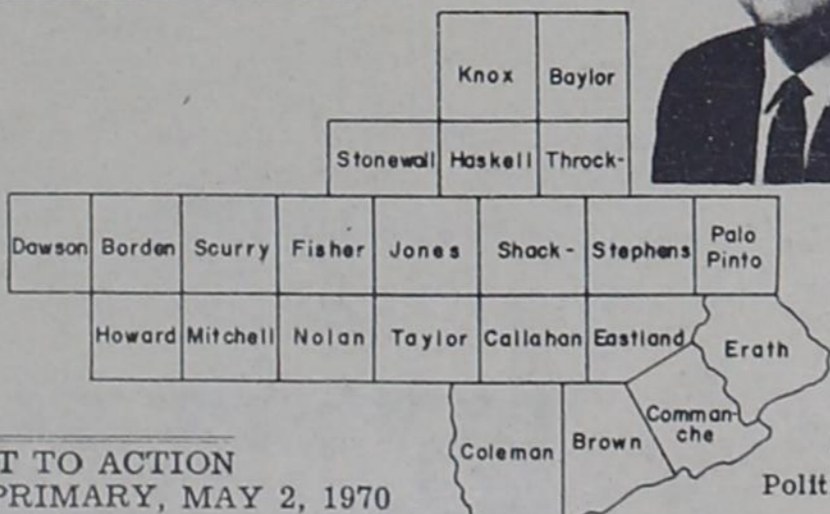

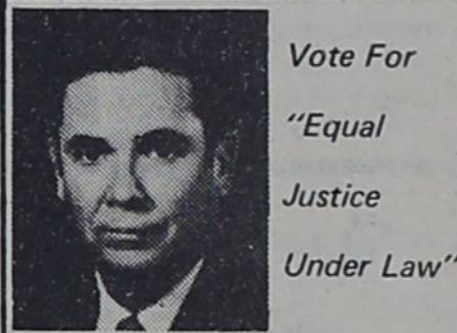
