In case of an accident, what might ordinarily be a minor mishap could become disastrous under these conditions, AAA said, and if a chain reaction highway accident occurred, the result could be a holo-

The motoring federation stated further that gasoline stored in cans inside a hot car trunk can expand and overflow, increasing the risk of ignition by sparks from a crash or from a lighted cigarette. 

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
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


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
