Tell that to people who pay \$4.50 (and better) for a subscription to their weekly newspaper, when \$2.00 per year used to be the going price. We remember one fall when the \$2.00-per-year paper we worked on came out with "bargain days" and sold the sheet for \$1.00. Then in appreciation for the buck, we gave the subscriber a useful kitchen gadget!

Banker To Be Honored For 40 Years Service

It will be a day of reminiscing and one of comparison next Monday when officers, directors and employees of the First National Bank in Munday will be honoring their "boss man" and president, M. L. Wiggins, for his 40 years of service to the local bank.

This event will be in the form of a coffee at the bank, and people from a wide area are expected to come in for coffee and cookies, for conversation and for looking back over a period of 40 years. The hours will be the regular banking hours -- from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The 40 years will be exact to the minute, for it was at 9 a.m. on July 21, 1935, that M. L. Wiggins began his first duties with the local bank. He recalls that he was hired by Homer Lee, president of the bank at that time, who came from Peaster to talk with him. "No one had any money then," Wiggins recalls, "and it didn't take me long to say 'yes' to Mr. Lee's offer."

His first job was as bookkeeper, and Wiggins remembers how he posted the figures to the old ledger by hand -- an exacting and tedious job. He has seen this method of banking advance from the ledger, to posting machines; and, finally, to the computerized method.

Son of a well known banker, John A. Wiggins, who operated the last private bank in Texas, Moulton had some preliminary banking experience, such as sweeping the floors and other janitorial duties! John Wiggins liquidated his bank at Peaster in 1939, then became associated with the First National Bank in Munday in 1940.

On January 12, 1937, Moulton was advanced to the position of assistant cashier, and in 1940 he was elected a director in the bank. He also served as vice president and cashier until 1969, when he became president of the bank.

Deposits in the bank amounted to \$250,000 in 1935. Capital stock was \$25,000, surplus was \$25,000.

and undivided profits were around \$2,000. Wiggins saw deposits climb from that figure to better than \$10 million in January, 1974. They have been consistently above \$8 million since that time.

Heavy Rains Fall In Area Last Friday

Rain clouds formed quickly last Friday and poured out different amounts of rain, ranging from showers to a heavy downpour, in the area in and surrounding Munday.

Munday received a total of .73 of an inch, according to the gauge of Goodson Sellers, local weather observer. Others reported .80 or better.

Winds that Mrs. J. H. Bardwell believed must have been "a small tornado" demolished her TV antenna, although others in the neighborhood were not damaged.

H. H. Cowan, who farms southeast of Munday, said his place received at least two inches of rain in a period of 30 minutes. "I've never experienced a rain like that in the 50 years I have lived here," he said.

During the two-day period -- Thursday and Friday -- Goree received .40 of an inch, while Munday's records showed .93.

He has taken part in two building programs. The bank was remodeled in 1956, with banking facilities being moved north across the street during the remodeling program. Then in 1970 another giant remodeling program got under way. The building formerly occupied by the Rexall Drug Store was purchased, and the "banking house" was increased to twice its size. This involved a period of several months, but business was carried on in the building during this time.

He married Clara Bouldin in 1949, and she became his wife and companion in many of his church and community affairs. She passed away in September, 1973.

On the local level, Wiggins has been active in the Methodist Church and Chamber of Commerce during these years. He has also served on the City Council, is an area executive in Boy Scouts of America and a director in King's Manor, Methodist home for the aged in Hereford. Presently, he is chairman of the City Planning Board, Munday Airport Committee, Knox County Drainage District No. 1, and takes a leading part in other activities.

The public is invited to assist in honoring this long-time banker next Monday. A large crowd of area people, and those from neighboring cities and towns will likely attend this joyous event.

Jail Escapee Sets Record For Freedom

He just walked away from a work detail at about 3 p.m. Sunday. He was apprehended at about 10 p.m. at Gilliland, after having about seven hours of apprehensive freedom -- the longest period of freedom anyone has enjoyed after escaping from the Knox County jail.

Johnny Gray, 23, of Vernon, who was in custody of Knox County officers on swindling and check charges, was mowing the lawn as a trusty, and while Deputy Sheriff James Redwine was sharpening his hoe, Gray just walked away, leaving the mower running.

Then started a manhunt that lasted for seven hours involving Sheriff H. C. Stone, Deputy Pete Hatfield of Munday, Eddie Carr of

Knox City, Boyd Baker of Munday. They were aided by Van Green, Buddy Tolson, Tom Hudson and Buster Tolson, who were on horseback, and Sheriff Don Mooney and Grady Nelson of Seymour.

These fanned out in all directions from Benjamin. The escapee, after walking several miles, caught a ride into Gilliland. From this point, he called his wife in Vernon -- and the hunt was practically over.

Vernon police were reportedly talking to Mrs. Gray when the call came through and talked to the wanted man. He told them he would give himself up in Vernon. They called Knox County police, who caught the escapee in Gilliland. Deputy Redwine brought him back to Benjamin. His freedom had ended and the manhunt was over!

Gray was first apprehended in Seymour, where he was turned over to Seymour officers by his attorney. There were no charges against him in Baylor County, so officers turned him over to Knox County officers. He was booked on a hot check charge, with bond being set at \$1,000. Police were advised that he was wanted in Andrews, Gainesville, Texarkana, Duncan, Okla., and Altus, Okla., which places had warrants against him on hot check and swindling charges.

Increase In Phone Rates Is Tabled

After a lengthy session between members of the City Council of Munday and representatives of General Telephone Co. on Tuesday night, July 8, apparently nothing was accomplished. Mayor J. E. Reeves and council members let it be known that the proposed rate increase was totally unacceptable. The company spokesman countered with a slight deduction in the proposed rate, which Mayor Reeves said last Monday "amounted to practically nothing."

The company's request was not rejected, but tabled, Mayor Reeves said. He informed them that the council wanted to study their proposals further, and it was indicated that the company would "bargain" with the city on an increase. As the matter now stands, no definite date has been set for another hearing by the City Council. Mayor Reeves indicated that the company would not be granted another hearing until some proposal which was more acceptable had been decided upon.

The telephone company had tentatively applied for an approximate 30% rate increase, citing "inadequate return on their investment and inflation" as the primary cause.

Child Abuse Film Shown To Lions Club

Sammy B. White of Knox City, with the Texas Dept. of Welfare, presented an interesting slide film on how we should help combat child abuse at last Tuesday's meeting of the Munday Lions Club. The film began with a statement by Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who said: "Because it is morally, physically and emotionally right we all should join in the campaign against child abuse." It was pointed out that there are 2,000 cases of child abuse in Texas each year, and two children die each week of this cause. A total of 104 were killed in 1973, which resulted in the Legislature passing the child abuse campaign.

"It is the obligation of each person," White said, "to report instances of child abuse, mistreatment or neglect."

During the meeting, a president's button was presented Lion Carl, and the past-president's button to Hank Matthews.

NEW MAJOR BEING INTRODUCED AT UT

A new undergraduate major aimed at alleviating a critical shortage of persons who have formal university training in real estate and urban land development will be instituted at The University of Texas in Austin.

To be offered in UT's Finance Department, the major in real estate and urban land development will be conducted primarily by full-time academicians and will emphasize managerial and financial aspects of the field.

Substantial demand for students with the special training is expected, since real estate represents more than 80 per cent of Texas' tangible assets.

ELDERLY MAY SOON HAVE SPECIAL FOODS

Specially developed foods that astronauts took on space flights may one day provide nutritious meals for elderly shut-ins.

The Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs at The University of Texas in Austin is cooperating with several federal, state and local agencies to develop a meal system of nonperishable foods (in cans or flexpacks) that the elderly could reconstitute simply by adding water and heating.

If feasible, the project could help elderly persons remain in their homes rather than being institutionalized.

Oscar was a retired farmer and carpenter, a member of the First United Methodist Church in Munday "for as long as I can remember", and a loyal Mason. He became a member of Knox Lodge No. 851, AF&AM, at Munday and went on to become a 32nd degree Mason.

Everyone has too much detail work to do and lots of dry mail to sort out, so everyone cannot read everything that comes through their office. We believe everyone reads the Munday Courier and beginning this week, we will again use this means to keep you, our Chamber members and lots of other people, informed as to what is going on in our Chamber offices. One must read to keep informed if he, or she, cares what is going on in our world, so what's new?

The Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is a place where anyone can spend some time to find out what the organization is working on or working for if they chose to take the time.

For the past two weeks this office has been working on a transportation survey. The primary purpose of this survey is to determine the number of trucks that move through the town in a 24-hour period of time. This survey will not determine the course of the 4-lane highway No. 277. It will be used to compile a study that is currently being done by the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, and shall furnish us with information for publishing a new industrial brochure which is to be printed soon.

The Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will also use the 24-hour data to prove our need for highway improvement in Knox County. For several years the tourist dollars for Texas have shown sharp increases. This has become a factor in getting better highways built in Texas. Knox County has very little to attract tourists, however some very surprising figures are being reflected in this survey. Munday ships food and fibre to cities all over the United States. These products are vital to the economy of our country, so we need better highways to move these products to market, and we believe the figures on the truck survey plus the amount of food and fibre produced in the Munday area will impress others and also surprise many of us. Next week we will have some figures to prove our needs.

The Chamber Beautification Committee is at work again. We will have a report on this next week. Last fall the Chamber Manager requested funds from the United Fund and the City of Munday for beautification of our downtown area. Presently there is money enough to purchase planters. The Committee will decide upon the design by this time next week and work will proceed. We do plan to purchase approximately 30 planters for the downtown area, plant shrubs and seasonal small blooming flowers which will add a touch of color. Several civic organizations are standing by to help with the planting as soon as the planters are purchased. This project will tie in with our bicentennial celebration scheduled for next summer.

Farm And Ranch News

BOLL WEEVIL Cotton boll weevil are building up in some older cotton in Knox County. A few fields have been sprayed with control applications.

If your cotton is reaching the 1/3 grown square stage a close inspection to see if the cotton boll weevil is puncturing the squares is advised. If 20 to 25% of these young squares are being ruined by the boll weevil egg laying activity, it is time to consider control measures. An early boll weevil control application should also benefit by slowing down the cotton flea-hopper which prevents the plants from setting squares.

Early season applications should be made soon after the first squares have reached 1/3 grown and after one or not more than two applications in a short period of time make an effort to shut off control spray applications during the heavy fruiting period in order to keep from getting a heavy bollworm build up.

GRAIN SORGHUM MIDGE

Grain sorghum midge build up is expected to increase in the next few days and producers will want to keep close check on plants that are reaching the bloom stage.

The sorghum midge second generation will increase the numbers after sorghum has been blooming 2 to 3 weeks in an area. When an average of two adult midge can be found per head control applications should be applied every 3-5 days from early bloom until most grain in the field has past the bloom stage.

With several thousand acres of late grain sorghum planted in Knox County the midge problem will likely be here through the summer and early fall.

MP-339, Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghums and Small Grains are available to producers at the County Extension Office at the courthouse.

CABBAGE LOOPERS--BIG GARDEN PESTS

Wherever home vegetable gardens are growing, at least one insect pest can usually be found -- the cabbage looper.

Although its name indicates that it feeds on cabbage, this insect is also a major pest of cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce, beans and tomatoes as well as numerous other crops.

The worms are light green in color and have thin, white stripes running the length of their bodies. The tail end of the pest is larger than the head portion.

Full-grown loopers are about 1 1/2 inches long. They move with a looping action, hence the name "loopers".

Cabbage loopers are foliage feeders and give leaves a "buckshot" appearance where they are active. Heavy numbers can completely strip plants of their leaves.

Several insecticides will effectively control cabbage loopers if control measures are taken when the small worms are first detected. Control of large loopers becomes more difficult.

PINKEYE PROBLEMS IN CATTLE Separate animals with

pinkeye from the herd and treat infected eyes with an anti bacterial preparation. Keep infected animals in a sheltered area. Covering infected eyes will protect them from light and foreign matter and will speed recovery. A simple patch made of burlap and held in place with rubber cement seems to be effective.

Pinkeye is a serious problem in some beef cattle herds in Texas during the hot summer weather. The disease can cause considerable weight loss and even the loss of sight.

There is no single cure-all for pinkeye, but there are several practices which you can follow to help reduce pinkeye problems.

Clipping pastures before seedheads develop on grass is one practice that helps. These seedheads may irritate the eyes of the cattle and increase the chances of pinkeye infection.

Flies spread certain kinds of pinkeye, and repeated spraying of the faces of cattle with Ciodrin insecticide to control face flies is recommended. Dust bags, face wipers and backrubbers also help in controlling flies. Locate them near or on the salt box, on the way to water, or in shaded loafing areas.

An adequate amount of Vitamin A helps keep eyes healthy. Good pastures generally provide enough Vitamin A. Where dry weather is turning pastures brown, supplementary Vitamin A should be provided.

Studies have shown that calves with pinkeye weighed considerably less at weaning time and as yearlings when compared to calves the same age without pinkeye. Thus, controlling pinkeye can pay with increased profits at market time.

East, West Munday Joined As Munday

A Bit Of History

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article on the founding of Munday appeared in last Friday's Bicentennial edition of the Abilene Reporter-News. It is being reproduced for the interest it might have for local people.

In its beginning, according to old Reporter-News files, Munday was two towns, not one, loosely defined communities back in the early 1890s, one called East Munday and the other, logically, West Munday. The homes and small

business houses were scattered rather haphazardly across the central part of a four-section area of rich prairie farm land owned by J. N. Campbell, Dr. J. T. Lee, R. P. Munday and George Reeves. The sections cornered in the middle of what is now Main Street.

The community developed in two plots, about a half-mile apart, and the two plots were rivals until, about 1902, West Munday gave up and joined the faster-growing East end of town. Precise origin of Munday

is difficult to pinpoint. The Handbook of Texas says the town developed from a pioneer store built in early day by Charlie Bedford and that it got its name and its post office in 1895.

Reporter-News files say the search for a name and a post office began earlier in 1892. That year Benjamin friends of Sheriff T. D. Isbell proposed that the emerging community be named for the sheriff's daughter, Maud. The name was submitted for post office designation - but there was already a town named Maude.

R. P. Munday, who had been named the first postmaster, submitted two names for the town, Lowry and Munday. The postal officials chose the name of the postmaster and co-founder.

The town began to grow after the two segments of it merged about 1902. Shortly thereafter, residents of Munday joined their neighbors in an effort to encourage railroad builder Morgan Jones to extend the Wichita Valley Railroad, a line that had got from Wichita Falls to Seymour, south to Stamford. A rail promotion firm was chartered in 1905. The line was finished in 1908, giving Munday its first rail service.

State 4-H Horse Show Set For July 23-26

More than 600 Texas 4-H and other youth will be on hand for the 1975 State 4-H Horse Show at the Will Rogers Coliseum in Fort Worth July 23-26.

The show will feature open invitational competition as well as the regular show for qualifying 4-H youth, announces B. F. Yeates, horse specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some 260 4-H boys and girls who have qualified through competition at the county and district shows will participate in the regular show classes which will feature horses at halter, showmanship, reining, pole bending and barrel racing.

The open invitational portion of the state show begins on Wednesday, July 23, at 7:30 a.m. with competition in the English classes of hunter hack, working hunter and jumping. Open competition in cutting, breakaway roping and judged roping will follow.

Drill team competition will be held at 7:30 a.m. the following morning. Finals in all the open classes will be held Thursday afternoon.

The regular show begins with preliminaries in showmanship at 5 p.m. Thursday.

Horses will be judged at halter beginning at 8 a.m. Friday. Preliminary competition in Western pleasure, reining and pole bending will continue throughout the day and evening.

Preliminaries in Western horsemanship and barrel racing will be conducted Saturday morning, and final competition in all classes of the regular show will begin at 2 p.m. An awards program will conclude the state show.

Honorary show chairman is Tarrant County Judge Mike Moncrief, with Gene L. Dunbar, vice president and

trust officer, Fort Worth National Bank, serving as show chairman.

Among show judges will be Dale Wilkinson of Findlay, Ohio, George Cheatham of Tulsa, Okla., Jim Heird of Wilkesboro, N. C., and Elvin Blackwell of Dallas.

According to Yeates, a horseman's handicrafts show will also be a part of the total show program.

Social Security News

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by July 31, according to Carl R. Beisner of the Vernon social security office.

"People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any 3-month quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the social security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter."

Quarters are Jan.-Feb.-Mar., Apr.-May-June, July-Aug.-Sept., and Oct.-Nov.-Dec. Wages Reports and social security contributions for the 2nd quarter of 1975 are due by July 31, Mr. Beisner said.

People who employ household workers may file the wage report on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service Office - "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for Social Security)." The social security contribution for a household employee is 5.85 per cent of covered wages, and the employer pays a matching amount.

Social security contributions help build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for workers and their families. People who employ household workers can get a free copy of the leaflet, "Social Security and Your Household Employee," at the Vernon social security office at 1701 Cumberland.

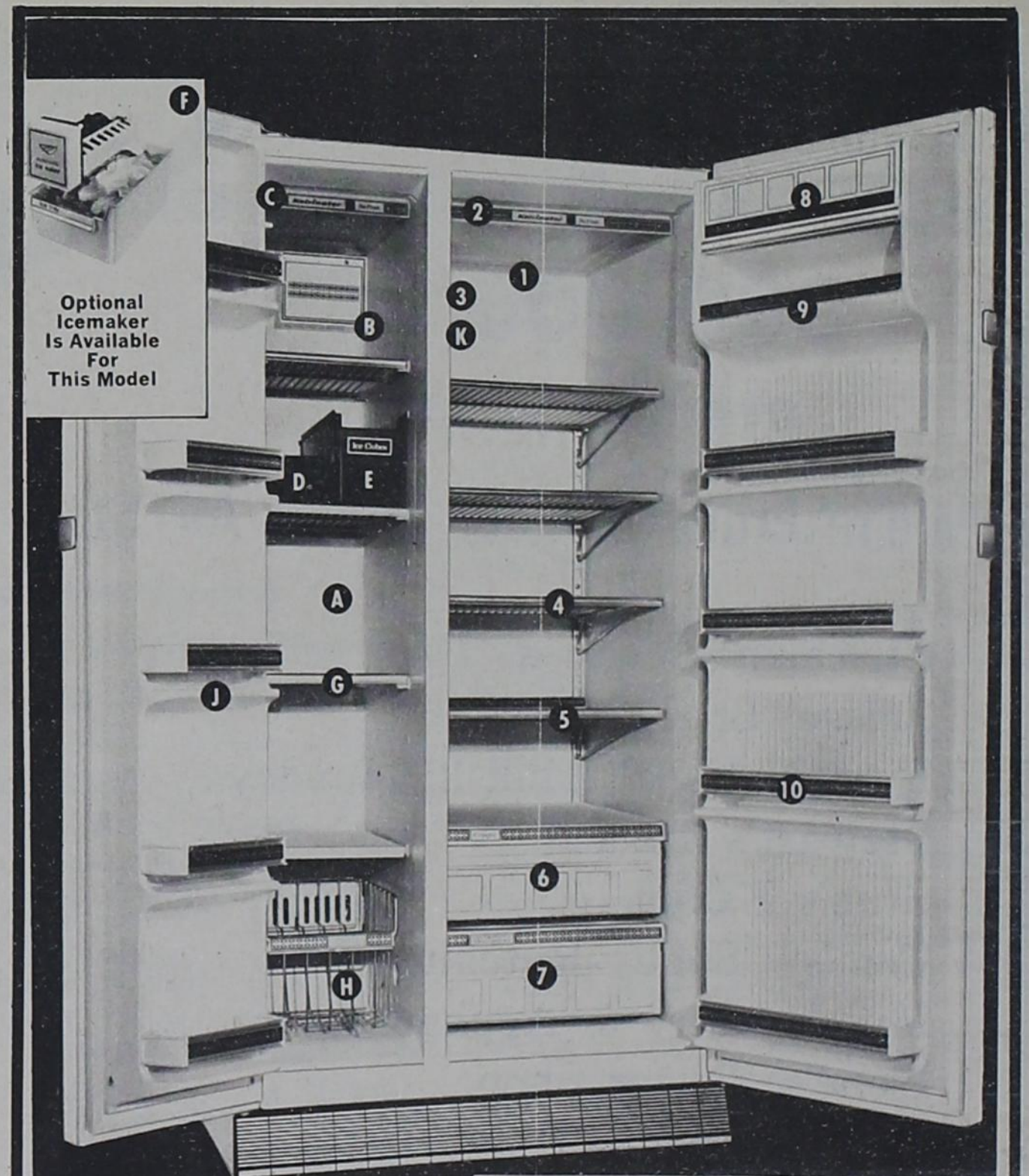

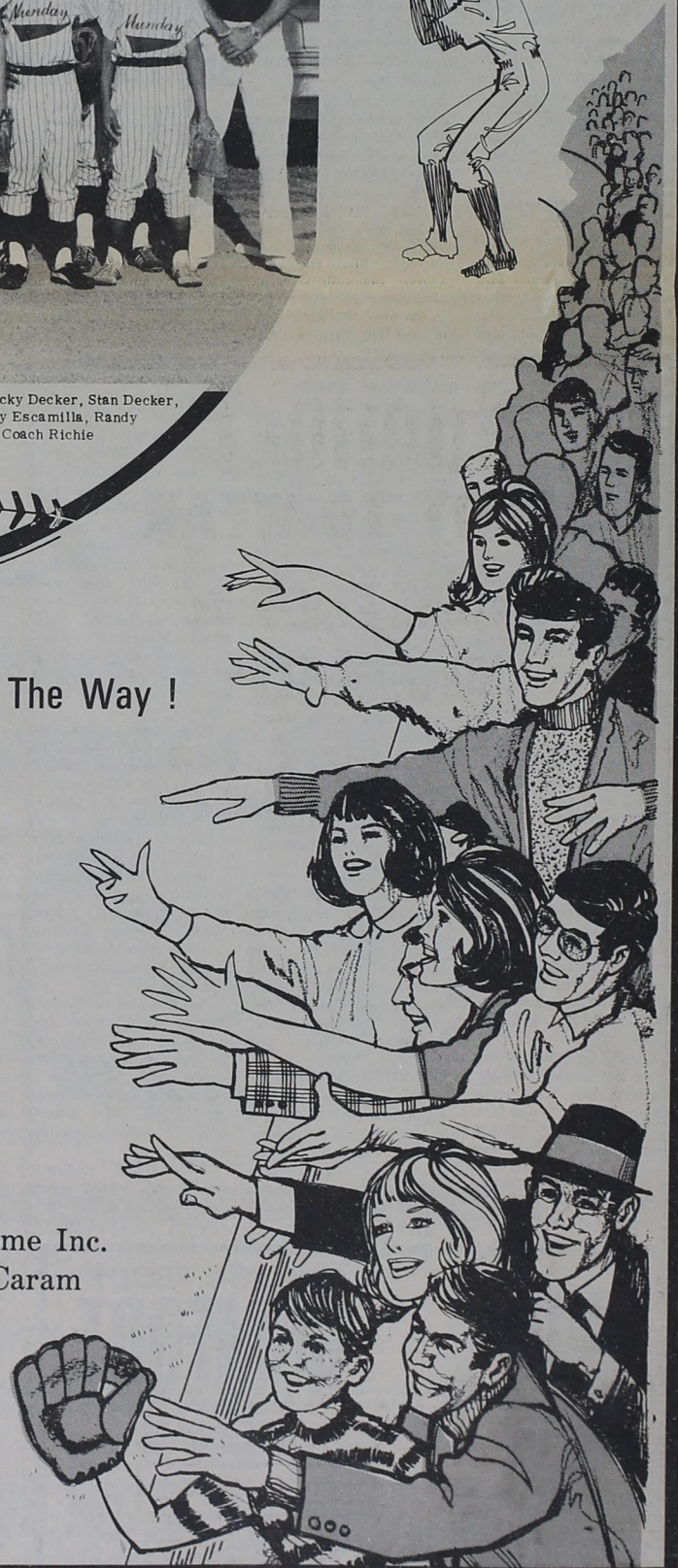
