# **Truscott Wins First Place In Community Improvement Contest**

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

**CONTROLLING APHIDS** IN GARDENS

Aphids are odd looking little insects with two tube-like structures on the end of their back that resemble exhaust pipes. They come in almost all colors--red, yellow, green, black, purple--and can play havoc with a vegetable garden.

Aphids, often called plant lice, vary in length from 1/16to 1/4 of an inch an may have wings. They damage plants by sucking juice from leaves, stems and fruit and can also transmit diseases to plants. Aphids will attack plants of any size and at any stage of growth--from seedlings to mature plants at harvest. Since aphid numbers can increase rapidly, garden crops should be checked at frequent intervals.

Plants infested with aphids may look wilted, and the ends of leaves may curl up and look yellowish. Heavy infestations of aphids can cause severe plant losses. Diazinon, dimethoate, endosulfan, malathion and naled are all effective insecticides to treat for aphids. Before applying any insecticide, make sure it is safe to use on the crops in your garden and follow directions to the "T".







Dr. Robert Branson, director of the Texas Agricultural Market Research and Development Center, recently summarized the report by specifying three actions which could improve cotton contracting. Since one of the major shortcomings of crop contracting has been the refusal to honor some contracts, Dr. Branson suggested formation of a central reporting agency ... one which would provide financial information on buyers and delivery information on producers. Other suggestions called for a crop disaster clause in every contract and development of low-cost Government crop contracting insurance. 





Because these weather conditions breed tornadoes, and Texas is the most tornado-prone state in the nation, says Dr. Gary Nelson, agricultural safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Texas has an average of 103 tornadoes a year, with most of them occurring in April and May when there are violent winds, severe thunderstorms, and masses of cool and warm air colliding with each other.

Eight out of 10 tornadoes occur between noon and midnight, with more than 20 per cent in the two-hour span from 4 to 6 p.m.

Tornadoes, which take an average annual toll of 184 human lives in the U. S., usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour, but wind speeds in the funnel of a tornado can get up to 300 miles per hour, explains Nelson.

The National Weather Service issues a "tornado watch" when atmospheric conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes. A "tornado warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar.

"If you hear of a tornado watch, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather

Don't stay in a car unless you can drive away from the tornado at right angles to its path.

"If you sight a tornado, report it at once, but don't tie up the phone with unnecessary calls," advises Nelson.

When cleaning up debris from a tornado, wear gloves and thick soled shoes and watch for downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. "Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit by a tornado until you're sure there are no gas leaks,"




