## Pilot Escapes Serious Injury In Plane Mishap

J. M. (Chris) Christensen, who operates the Christian Aviation in Munday, narrowly escaped death or serious injury late Saturday afternoon when his dusting plane crashed near Gilliland.

An ambulance from Munday was detailed to the scene of the crash and carried the injured man to Baylor County Hospital in Seymour for examination and treatment.

Initial reports were that Mr. Christensen received minor cuts and bruises about the hands and body, while he "was also complaining" of back pains. It was believed the back injury was caused by whiplash as the plane crashed.

According to reports, Mr. Christensen was operating near Gilliland late Saturday afternoon when the plane ran out of gas. It struck the ground and flipped over on its top as the pilot attempted

to land the craft. Several from Munday went to the crash scene when news of the crash was learned.

Mr. Christensen had been operating his flying service in Munday since purchasing the Leflar Flying Service several years ago.

## Knox Farmers Leaders In Guar Production

Knox County farmers placed fourth in 1975 Texas guar production with a crop totaling 4,270,000 pounds, Texas Agricultural Commissioner John C. White reported.

County farmers harvested 6,100 acres with a yield of 700 pounds per acre.

Texas guar production is concentrated on the Low Plains and Cross Timbers with small acreages seeded in South and Southcentral Texas. Experimental acreage have also been planted on the Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos areas.

While guar is a legume crop and some fields are turned under for soil-building purposes, most of the crop is harvested for the bean. Guar can be planted as late as July, and farmers will plant it as a catch crop for cotton or sorghum that has been hailed or flooded.

Wilbarger County led the state in production with 12,702,000 pounds.

Complete figures for Texas field crops have been compiled in the "1975 Texas Field Crops Statistics." Copies may be obtained by writing Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

## Farm, Ranch Safety Week To Be Observed July 25-31

County Judge Clonts has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1976 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Knox County at the request of Knox County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

Using the combined reports of statewide and Farm Bureau member accidental death reports, Judge Clonts said "records show that at least 300 Texas farm and ranch people died during 1975 at the following rate: traffic-123; tractors-35; drownings-28; firearms-21; fires and burns-16; machinery-14; animals-14; falls-11; electric currents-10; other vehicles (trailers)-9; suffocation-6; poisoning-4; lightning-3; tornadoes-3; other and specified-3; struck by object-2; and stopped on rail-2. Knox County recorded no farm/ranch deaths.

Twenty-five varieties of which seven are labeled for greening resistance will be viewed on one dryland and one irrigated demonstration on Zinsel Brothers fields southwest of Elkinland and northwest of Munday.

Dr. Dale A. Lovelace, Area Extension Agronomist and Emory F. Boring, Area Extension Entomologist from Vernon, will be on hand to assist with the discussion.

# Action Program Grant Made to Serve Areas

Washington, D. C.—Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$80,200 Community Services Administration grant to the Community Action Area Program, Incorporated, with headquarters at Abilene. The designee agencies are the community action programs of Mitchell, Haskell and Stephens counties. The grant is effective July 1, 1976, and will run for three months. The areas served are Taylor, Mitchell, Stephens, Jones, Kent, Haskell, Seymour, Knox, Throckmorton and Shackelford counties. The funds will be used to provide legal aid services, youth program, senior citizens program, comprehensive outreach and referral, community organization, economic development and manpower services. It will also provide administrative services for the following programs funded by other sources: summer food program, family planning, head start, day care for the elderly, medical transportation and human services delivery system.

**Cotton Batting Problems To Be Reviewed**  
Reagan V. Brown, special assistant to Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe, will be keynote speaker August 4 in Austin, Texas, at a meeting to review problems and conditions facing makers of cotton batting.  
The day-long meeting, sponsored by the National Cotton Batting Institute, will be held at the Sheraton-Crest Inn, beginning at 9:00 a. m. More than 100 companies from Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana have been invited to attend.  
Mr. Brown, one of Texas' most popular speakers, holds three degrees from Texas A&M University and has studied at Cornell, Colorado State and Utah State Universities. A professional sociologist, he was associated for many years with the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M, and is a recognized authority on community development and human relations.  
Producers of cotton batting, the cushioning material used in mattresses, furniture and auto seats, also will hear reports about OSHA dust standards, product liability, and the outlook for cotton and other raw materials.

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## Food Production Items Freed From Sales Tax

Texas farmers and ranchers no longer have to pay sales taxes on certain purchases to be used in the production of food and fiber.

Effective July 20, the Texas sales tax law exempts agricultural producers from sales taxes on such items as haying wire, fencing supplies, and machinery and equipment, points out Don Parks, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

However, a farmer or rancher does not automatically qualify for exemption from the sales tax, notes Parks. "Producers must file an exemption certificate with each firm or business with which they deal. These certificates are available from the Comptroller of Public Accounts in Austin or from local branch offices of the Comptroller.

To qualify for an exemption, the item purchased must be used exclusively on a farm or ranch. A farm or ranch is defined as land used entirely or partially in the production of crops, live-

stock or other agricultural products. Home gardens are not considered a farm," explains the economist.

Certain items are exempt without the use of an exemption certificate. These include feed for farm and ranch animals, fertilizer, seeds and annual plants, and animals.

Items requiring the use of an exemption certificate include fungicides, insecticides, herbicides, defoliants, desiccants, all medications for farm and ranch animals, and machinery and equipment used in food, grain and feed production, including such expendable supplies as hand tools, haying wire, fence wire and posts, gates and storage facilities for bulk commodities.

Natural gas or electricity used on a farm or ranch is also exempt with the appropriate certificate if used for pumps for livestock or irrigation water, dairy barn operations, welding machines, electric fences, and lights for barns, pens and poultry houses.

## Bullock Warns About Ignoring The Use Tax

Comptroller Bob Bullock warned Tuesday that many Texas businesses are ignoring the use tax and may run into costly problems when visited by his auditors.

"It's called the sales AND use tax," said Bullock. "But too many people don't understand what the second part of that means."

The Comptroller said the biggest part of the problem is with businesses that do not sell retail goods, have no sales and use tax permit, and never think about the tax when they buy equipment from outside the state.

"A bank, television or radio station, or any business requiring specialized equipment may buy that equipment from out of state without paying the Texas sales tax," he said. "In all those cases, however, they owe the Texas use tax on the total cost of the purchase."

In fact, said Bullock, the use tax is due on any goods bought from out of state and then put to business or personal use, without being resold.

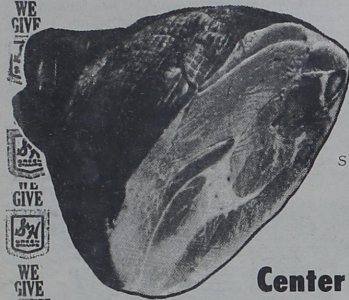

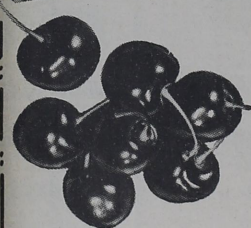
