Moguls Take Nine Years To Defeat The Wildcats

The Munday Moguls moved one more step toward the District 7-A crown Friday night as they defeated the Wildcats of Crowell 21-0.

Munday defeated the Wildcats nine years ago by the score of 7-6 and until this year could not manage a win over Crowell.

District 7-A now sports a three-way tie for the lead

between Munday, Knox City and Haskell. The Moguls by no means have the district sewed-up as both of the other teams tied for first have showed they are just as eager to obtain the 7-A crown. Haskell and Knox City both have outstanding ball clubs and will be in the race to upset the hopes of the Moguls.

Friday night action found the Moguls in possession of the ball after a 12 yard punt by the Wildcats. In consuming up a 47 yard drive, Robert Spells found paydirt from the one yard line as the Moguls went ahead 7-0 with Larry Welch adding the PAT.

The second and third quarters proved that both teams had outstanding defense. As the third quarter ended, neither team could manage to put any scores on the board and as the quarter ended the score was Munday 7 and Crowell 0.

In the fourth quarter Munday unleashed its defense on the Wildcats and added 14 points to their score. Jimmy Cooke, who has played mostly defensive linebacker, went in as a halfback and added 6 from the one yard line. With only 12 seconds gone since Cooke scored, the Wildcats in possession, a pass went up and Ronnie Phillips intercepted for the Moguls and ran the ball 42 yards for another TD. Larry Welch added both PATs so now the score stood at 21 to 0 in favor of the Moguls.

Late in the fourth, Crowell drove to the Munday 1 yard line but a 5 yard penalty set them back to the 6 with two tries the Wildcats failed to score.

Munday took over and made 2 first downs and then had to punt to the Crowell 27 yard line.

The game ended as Doug Michalik intercepted a Crowell pass and returned it to the 25 yard line.

Munday's halfback, Robert Spells, was leading rusher for the night with 103 yards.

Munday Moguls will travel to Rotan and take on the Yellowhammers this Friday night at 7:30.

City Council Holds Three Special Sessions

The City Council of Munday met in special session, September 26 for the purpose of finalizing the budget for 1977-78.

The budget was finalized as proposed and published in the September 15 issue of the Munday Courier.

A copy of the budget is available to the public at the City Hall in Munday.

SPECIAL SESSION
The council held another special meeting the 30th of September at 1:00 p.m.

Purpose was to examine the 1977 tax roll as prepared by personnel of the City of Munday and certified correct by Walter M. Hertel, tax collector.

Amounts of the tax roll are as follows: real estate value \$4,811,480; less veterans exemption of \$27,500; personal property value \$1,498,390 for a total value of \$6,282,370 at the rate of \$1 per \$100 value as previously set by the council. The total tax yield of the 1977 tax roll at 100 per

cent collection is \$62,823.70.

STREET PAVING
A special session of the City Council was held September 30, at 6 p.m. to examine the final paving estimate as prepared by Lynn O. Jackson, inspector for street paving project of 1976 with Coltharp Construction Co.

All work was done satisfactorily with a total of 7690 sq. yds. on the double asphalt course. On the contract bid of \$1.50 per sq. yd. a total of \$11,535 plus \$100 for extra blade work brought the total to \$11,635. Marr moved to pay contractor in full for completed work. Booe seconded and all members voted in favor.

Payment is to be made from street paving special with a loan to be made from General Funds.
Re-payment of at least a portion of the loan to the General Fund is to be made when property owners payments are in.

Parents Accepted Dog Show In Bilingual Project Held Oct. 8

The Bilingual Parenting Project is accepting referrals for its home-based program, sponsored by Region IX Education Service Center.

Funded by the Texas Education Agency, the project assists Region IX parents whose primary language is Spanish with their parenting skills. The two-year-old program provides training in the areas of health, safety, nutrition, child growth and development, parental involvement in schools and communication skills.

Director Delma Banuelos and Coordinator Delia Arias-Clark will hold bi-monthly parent classes in the homes of the project participants. Classes will begin in October and continue until May.

The criteria for project participants include:

- *Participants must be the parents of pre-school or elementary children.
- *Household earnings must be less than \$6,000 a year.
- *Participants must be willing to host sessions in their homes.
- *Spanish must be the primary spoken language in the home.
- *Participants must live in the 12-county Region IX area. These counties include Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Wilbarger, Baylor, Throckmorton, Wichita, Archer, Young, Clay, Jack and Montague.

Knox County Farm Bureau Will Hold Annual Meeting October 17

Warren Newberry of Waco, Executive Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, will be principal speaker for the annual meeting of the Knox County Farm Bureau, according to an announcement by Omar Cure, County Farm Bureau President.

He said the meeting, which culminates the year's activities for the local farm organization, will be held Monday, Oct. 17 at Munday High School in Munday. The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. with a bar-b-q supper.

Newberry is the top administrative official and business manager for the state organization and is

responsible to the Board of Directors through the president for the execution of the program and policies determined by the Board of Directors.

A native Oklahoman, the TFB executive director was reared on a cotton, wheat, and beef cattle farm near Lone Wolf, Oklahoma. He still maintains an active interest in the management of this farm. He graduated from Lone Wolf High School in 1942 and attended the University of Oklahoma.

Newberry operated the family farm until joining the staff of the American Farm Bureau Federation in 1953.

Newberry is married and is the father of two children, Linda, and Steve. The Newberrys reside in Waco and are active in the Lake-wood Christian Church.

The county president emphasized that the convention is the most important annual function of the local organization. In the business session which will be a part of the meeting, policies will be developed on local issues which will guide the county organization during the coming year.

Recommendations on state and national issues will be formulated which will be forwarded to the state organization for consideration at the state convention to be held in November in Houston. State policies for 1978 will be decided there and recommendations on national issues will be made to the American Farm Bureau Federation for action at the national convention which will be held in January in Houston.

The county annual meeting affords an opportunity for every Farm Bureau member to voice his opinion on issues affecting him on the local, state, and national level, he said. All members are urged to attend and participate, he added.

Farm Tours On Ambush To Be Held October 14

Local farmers, merchants and interested persons are invited to attend a farm tour on Ambush, an insecticide to control the bollworm/tobacco budworm.

There will be two tours, Friday, October 14, one on the Phillip McAfee farm, 1 mile west and 1/2 mile north of Sunset school house from

9:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and the other on the Lonnie Offutt farm north of Munday from 11:00 a.m. to noon.

The tour is sponsored by ICI United States Inc. of Wilmington, Del. The company does research on chemicals for agricultural use and has an enormous range of products for agriculture and industry.

Ambush was granted an emergency exemption from the EPA for the control of the bollworm.

The tours are designed to show the effect of Ambush Pyrethroid insecticide on experimental use plots for control of the bollworm.

Those attending the Phillip McAfee farm tour will have a chance for a drawing to be held for a door prize.

Following the Lonnie Offutt tour a barbeque dinner will be served from noon until 1 p.m. at the barn on the Offutt farm.

Cotton Classing Report

The Munday office opened October 3, 1977. According to Sidney Ferrell, in charge, this is the earliest opening date since 1964 when the office opened on September 14.

Cotton prices are ranging from 43 to 45 cents per pound with micronaire readings ranging mostly in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Market activity was slow. Grade quality was mostly high grade with 85 percent of the cotton classed this week being grade 31. Grades 40 and 32 each accounted for 5 percent and grade 41 was 3 percent. The predominant staple length was staple 31 with 64 percent followed by staple 30 with 26 percent. Staple 32 accounted for 9 percent of the weeks classing. Micronaire readings were 97 percent in the premium 3.5 to 4.9 range.

About 6,000 samples were classed during the week ending October 7. With the large increase in acreage and expected good yields this area could produce the largest number of bales in the history of the Munday office, which opened in 1958. In 1961 this office classed 115,000 samples and this could be the year that we beat that record.

Girl Scouts Enjoy Three Day Camp Out

Lake Pauline, Quanah, was the scene this year for the NorCenTex Council Girl Scouts annual "Do-It-Yourself," on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, October 7, 8 and 9. "Do-It-Yourself" is a weekend camp composed of troops made up of patrols. Each troop comes to camp as a fully-equipped unit bringing its own shelter, food and other equipment. Its purpose is to provide every NorCenTex Girl Scout the opportunity to learn troop camping. To give parents an opportunity to see and to learn troop camping skills so they may assist the troop during other camping activities and to provide troops the opportunity to make new friends and exchange ideas. The theme this year for "Do-It-Yourself" was "Circus World." Each troop

decorated their latrines and flags accordingly and selected and built a "midway game" to be enjoyed by all on Saturday afternoon. Each troop was encouraged to make "swaps" to exchange with girls from other troops. This years event hosted approximately 750 Girl Scouts and 200 leaders, adults and children. While population is increasing, the amount of farmland in the United States is shrinking. This means the acreage available to produce food and fiber for each consumer is declining. Land in farms now totals slightly less than 1,085 billion acres. Population has risen to 215 million. Farmland available per person amounts to 5 acres. Half a century ago, there was an average of more than 10 acres of land in farms for each man, woman and child in the U. S. Thirty years ago it had declined to 8 acres and 15 years ago, 6½ acres. The amount of farmland has shrunk by 106.7 million acres in 20 years. The U. S. Department of Agriculture says, "Only 5 acres stand between the consumer and starvation". Everyone has a vital stake in seeing that agricultural efficiency is maintained and increased.

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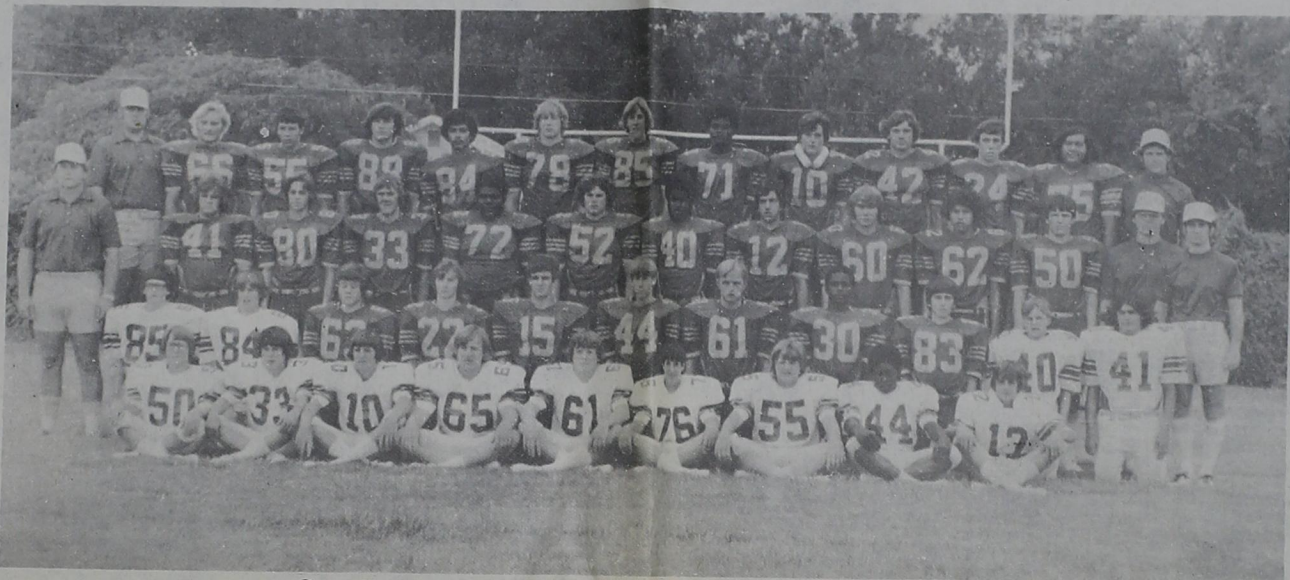
