

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

## Farm And Ranch News Bollworm Peak Egg Lay Predicted For July 26

Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist and I have recently been checking several cotton fields around the county for insert infestations. Most fields are beyond the stage where thrips can cause damage. Light to moderate bollworm activity is present although many of the eggs present are not hatching due to the hot, dry conditions. Relatively high numbers of beneficials are present in many fields.

The peak bollworm egg

lay has been predicted for Knox County for July 26. Producers are reminded land. that they need to continually be checking their fields for worm damage. Fields should be checked at least twice weekly and infestation levels determined by damage to green squares and numbers of small worms. 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

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
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
