

# **Cattle Owners Warned Of Sorghum Poisoning**

With many dryland sorghum fields being zeroed out due to drought, one alternative many producers may be considering is grazing of these fields. This can be extremely dangerous to cattle as the drought stressed sorghum could produce prussic acid which is highly toxic, according to Tommy Antilley, County Extension Agent.

# Hardin Attends Firemen School

Ray Lynn Hardin, Fire Chief of the Munday Volunteer Fire Department, attended the 49th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School July 23-28 at College Station. The school, attended by nearly 1,750 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

Firemen chose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Training, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire Protection, and Disaster Rescue Training. Fireman Hardin was sponsored by Knox County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since volunteer firemen were interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 100 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program sponsored 100 firemen at the school. "The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe volunteer fire departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said President Carrol G. Chaloupka of Dalhart. "It is our hope in sponsoring this program that the fireman will help the Munday Volunteer Department to better serve the residents of Knox County.'

with prussic acid, a type of cyanide that develops in drought-stricken plants.

The symptoms, bloating and staggering, can be seen within 15 minutes after cattle begin to graze and they can die shortly thereafter unless immediate treatment is begun.

Cattlemen are being warned about grazing herds on milo fields that did not "make-it" because of drought conditions or on drought-stricken pastures of Johnson grass, sudan grasses or common sorghums.

Showers that have occurred in a few areas have compounded the problem. The prussic acid content is extremely concentrated in

the new growth on droughtstricken plants. Cattlemen should wait two to three weeks before allowing cattle to graze on the new growth and should allow hay to lie at least five days after cutting, so the volatile cyanide gas can dissipate before baling. Before producers turn their cattle into these fields,

samples should be taken from several areas within the field and tested by a veterinarian.

Ranchers are also advised to feed cattle hay before turning them onto new pastures, since the hay provides a diluting effect should the pasture grass contain excessive amounts

of prussic acid. The loss of one or two cows can greatly outweigh the benefits of grazing this stressed sorghum.

# **OSHA To Place Costly Engineering Controls On Cotton Industry**

The National Cotton Council is filing suit to challenge stringent new cotton dust standards recently issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

This was announced today by Ed Breihan, Council vice president and cotton cooperative executive from Lubbock. Breihan presided over a regional seminar at the South Park Inn in Lubbock. The local seminar is one of four being conducted by the Council to acquaint industry members with the standards' compliance provi-

sions. Under OSHA's sweeping Phillip J. Wakelyn, Council new standards, costly engineering controls must be in place by 1982 to reduce cotton dust levels to 0.2 milligrams per cubic meter of air in textile yarn manufacturing; 0.5 in warehouses, classing rooms, cottonseed oil mills, and waste industries; and 0.75 in the Council and other groups weaving rooms.

Breihan said the standards are "technologically and economically impossible" for some sectors and expressed grave concern about their effect on the cotton industry's future. He further stated that worker protection could be insured through more practical and less expensive methods.







For 1979, the standards call for a March 4 completion date of first dust exposure monitoring with repeat tests every six months. By Sept. 4, 1979, medical surveillance must be started and written exposure limits solely through engineering controls must be completed.

Every spring, grass tetany claims two or three cows in some herds, but these losses could be prevented, Dr. J. R. Pickard, University of Illinois extension veterinarian, says. "A magnesium shortage in early grass is the problem." To prevent grass tetany, he suggests the following: 1) Start feeding magnesium oxide pellets or cubes to pregnant and lactating cows 30 days before turning them into fresh grass, 2) Avoid turning cows into lush straight-grass pastures following a cool spell, 3) Avoid heavy applications of fertilizer on grass pastures at this time of year, 4) Consider soil testing and balancing out the pasture fertility as a long-term preventive practice. A 2:1 ratio of magnesium to potassium and 1:5 ration of magnesium to calcium is desirable, 5) Plant grasses which are magnesium accumulators.





IT'S CANNING TIME--Eat all the fresh Texas peaches you can now, but put some away for those cold winter months, advises Texas Department of Agriculture home economist Fran Gerling. When canning these delicious beauties, a touch of spice can be very nice!

## Simple Home Canning Tips Can Keep You Out of a Jam

AUSTIN-The 1978 Texas peach crop is expected to be a near-record, and this means many homemakers will be hard at work canning the delicious fruit, notes Texas Department of Agriculture home economist Fran Gerling.

With this in mind, the Department offers the following tips to make that home canning a whole lot easier:

1. To insure sterile condition of containers, pour boiling water into jars. Any jar that has a lid which is interchangeable with the canning rings can be used.

2. Also boil lids and rings to insure that everything that comes into contact with the fruit is sterile. Place a set of tongs in boiling water to lids after boiling. 3. Pare peaches as close as possible to avoid waste.


sterilize them and to lift out

Peaches may be placed in a wire basket and scalded in boiling water to remove the skins.

4. Before putting lids on the jars, make sure the rims are free of any foreign matter such as peach bits or sugar to ensure a proper seal. Fasten rings securely and place in canner containing clean water.

5. Bring the water to a full rolling boil for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on ripeness of peaches being processed.

6. Remove jars from canner, cool overnight. Remove rings before storing, if desired.
