## Roberson Defeats Meers For Commissioner Prec. 2

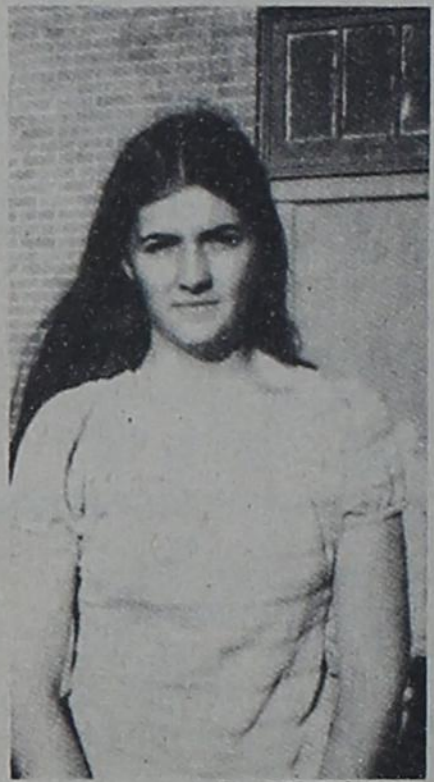

## Hill, Stenholm Carry County In Respective Races Saturday

The race for Governor was very close in the County with John Hill defeating Governor Dolph Briscoe by a margin of 80 votes.

Hill received 626 votes to 546 for Briscoe. Others receiving votes were: Smith, 123; Beagle, 11 and Mayo 3. Charles Stenholm of Stamford carried the county by a 2 to 1 margin over A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes of Abilene. With the votes cast in the 17th Congressional District these two men will face each other in a run-off June 3 for U.S. Representative of the 17th Congressional District.

Stenholm accumulated 684 votes to 320 for Rhodes. Other tabulations showed: Baum, 160; Godfrey, 69; Snowden, 23; Sharp, 11, and McCulloch, 9. Bob Krueger defeated Joe Christie for U. S. Senator by 666 to 488.

## EMS To Elect Officers

A meeting of the Munday Emergency Medical Service to elect officers for the coming year will be held, Thursday night, at 8:00 p.m. in the Munday Gin and Seed office.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race Bill Hobby lead in the county over other candidates by almost 7 to 1. Mark White defeated Price Daniel Jr. by a slim vote of 650 to 583. Warren G. Harding received 514 votes to 511 for Harry Ledbetter. The other candidate, Charlie Sanderson tabulated 132 votes in the State Treasurer race.

For Commissioner of Agriculture, Reagan Brown lead the county with 684 votes followed by Don Sewell, 259 and Joe Hubenak, 158. John Henderson was defeated by Mack Wallace 438 to 638 for Railroad Commissioner.

Jerry Sadler was chosen over John Poerner to fill the unexpired term for Railroad Commissioner, 640 to 326. For Associate Justice,

Supreme Court, place 1, O'Neal Bacon was defeated by Franklin Spears 348 to 654. Robert M. Campbell received 552 votes to 393 for T. C. Chadick for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, place 4.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, place 2 and place 3, Jim Vollers defeated Sam Clinton 515 to 488 and Bill Davis defeated Marvin O. Teague 608 to 385 respectively.

be in San Antonio, July 12-14 and this year's motto is "Golden Past-Brighter Future." Carraway told the group that all FFA members would have to work harder to make the brighter future.

"There are one-half million members enrolled in vo-ag within the FFA chapters with 60,000 members in Texas. Being in vo-ag and receiving awards is a challenge. Probably the old adage best describes the challenge in vo-ag, 'you have to give to get,'" stated Carraway.

Carraway closed his informative speech with these statements, "Ag is not just for a bunch of square country boys." Taking a phrase used by National President, Ken Johnson, and adding three initials Elvin summed up the roll of future farmers this way. "FFA has something for everybody and everybody has something for FFA, and by adding MTM, 'Make The Most' of everything you do or attempt to do, you rule out two words that stop most progress, can't and impossible."

Carraway emphasized, "If you want something bad enough, you can accomplish the impossible."

# Farm And Ranch News

It is almost time for Rolling Plains ranchers to be thinking about mesquite brush control with aerially-sprayed herbicides.

To determine if the right conditions exist to provide a good kill, it is necessary to take a look at weather conditions beginning last fall. Herbicides used to control mesquite are growth-regulating chemicals that must be translocated from the leaves to the stems and roots to be most effective. Translocation is strongly influenced by growing conditions at the time of the herbicide application.

Research has found that the highest percent of kill occurs when monthly rainfall exceeded the long term averages on each of the six months prior to spraying. On test at six ranch locations using 2,4,5-T when these six months had above average rainfall the percent of kill was 77 percent. When only 4 months had above average rainfall this dropped to 42 percent.

Based on 18 test where rainfall prior to spraying was above average in only two months prior to application, root kill was only 5 percent.

With the amounts of rainfall received in Knox County this past few months, producers should expect a low rate of kill on mesquite. Mesquites with little foliage are in poor condition for spraying.

If producers do want to spray mesquites this spring, the time of application is very important to percent of kill. Mesquite should not be sprayed until the leaves have fully extended and have turned from a light green to the dark lush green color and have small pods developing. Soil temperature at eighteen inch depths should be at least 75°F or above for best results.

To obtain the most benefit from mesquite control, a rancher should follow herbicide spraying with good ranch management practices. Sprayed areas should be deferred from grazing at least three months.

Control of mesquite is a management problem. The success of controlling mesquite with herbicide depends on many factors. To make sure the maximum benefit is obtained from the money spent on mesquite control, apply herbicides at the proper time under the proper climatic conditions and follow up with sound range management practices.
