Farm Safety Week To Be Observed July 25-31

President Jimmy Carter has proclaimed the week of July 25 through 31 National Farm Safety Week. The President reaffirmed the need for a reduction in the number of accidents and fires that lower production and bring personal loss to farm and ranch residents. National Farm Safety Week is co-sponsored by the

National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture and is suported by many organizaons serving agriculture. tis annual rural safety vent was begun in 1944 to lp reduce farm accidents pairing wartime food and ber production. The theme for the Week is Defense Against Injury." The Council and many farm safety leaders are encouraging expanded use of personal protective equipment by farmers and ranchers. Personal protective equipment has been a significant factor in reducing the number and severity of work injuries in other industries.

According to preliminary estimate by the National Safety Council, in 1978 accidents claimed the lives of approximately 5, 700 farm and ranch residents. Agricultural work accidents resulted in 1.900 deaths and 180,000 disabling injuries; farm and ranch residents accounted for 1,500 and 140,000, respectively. Total cost approached \$5 billion.

Variety Of **Flours From Texas Wheat**

Texas wheat reaches today's consumer in the form of many well-liked foods - such as bread, breakfast cereals, rolls, pancakes, biscuits, macaroni, spaghetti and noodles,. a foods and nutrition specialist says.

But first, Texas wheat is milled into flour, explains Mary K. Sweeten with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This flour is then marketed in several forms, each suited to a particular type of baked product.

Most of today's flour is enriched - meaning that thiamin, niacin, riboflavin and iron are added to bring the amount of these nutrients within limits specified by the government. Calcuim may also be added, Ms. Sweeten continues.

These are types of wheat flour available:

Enriched all-purpose flour - the kind usually sold for home use - is suitable for most home baking. Generally, it is a blend of hard and soft wheat flours, but it can be milled entirely from

This flour contains sufficient gluten - a protein - to form an elastic framework that is delicate enough for cake-making and strong for bread-making.

soft wheat, is lower in protein than all-purpose flour and usually is enriched. It is very fine and uniform and makes tender, delicate cakes. It is not suitable for bread-making.

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soft wheat.

Cake flour, milled from

Self-rising flour is all-

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purpose flour with leavening ingredients and salt added. It is convenient for use in biscuits and other quick breads.

One cup of self-rising is equal to one cup enriched flour plus one and one-half teaspoons baking powder plus one teaspoon salt.

Whole-wheat or graham flour is milled from the whole kernel and contains all the B-vitamins, iron and other nutrients naturally present in wheat. Wholegrain products also provide fiber.

The volume of breads made with whole-wheat flour may be lower and the texture coarser than those of breads made with allpurpose flour because of the weaker gluten strength of the whole-wheat flour.





For Quarter

July 31, 1979, is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld federal income taxes for the second quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited. This deadline does not

apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until August 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can obtain one from local IRS offices. IRS Publication 15, "Circular E -Employer's Tax Guide," is also available at local offices.
