

### Report On **Knox County Bond Sales**

July sales of Series E & H United States Savings Bonds in Knox County were reported today by County Bond Chairman, M. L. Wiggins to be \$5,372. Sales for the seven month period totaled \$66,723 for 43% of the 1979 sales goal of \$155,000.

The Munday homemaking department's annual playschool is now history for another year.


Twenty-seven children, ages three and four, attended the three day activity, Monday, Wednesday and

# Information On Johnson Cemetery Operation

Funds for operation of the Johnson Memorial Cemetery come from two sources. Five percent of all City tax revenue has been used for operating costs for nine of the last eleven years and the other source is sale of lots cemetery lots are 9 x 12, burial for two persons, and most are priced at \$50.00

each. Some few are \$75.00. A Cemetery Trust Fund was set up March 27, 1972, with a sizeable contribution by Mr. B. E. Smith, then a second sizeable contribution by Mr. Ira Bowden. Since this time the fund, from which only interest can be spent, has grown to \$7,553.25. No funds have been spent from this trust fund to date.

Several persons regularly donate to the trust fund instead of sending flowers as a memorial gift. The City acknowledges these memorials, both to the family of the deceased and to the donor.

Funds from tax revenue and cemetery lot sales are utilized to maintain the cemetery. The City does its' best to control the "grassburrs" having applied Balan three of the last four years. However, on a wet year, such as we have experienced this summer, I have seen neatly mowed areas grown up again in eight days. The thirteen acres of cemetery then needs mowing again. Chemicals applied only give partial control of the "grass-

burrs". The City has to sell the lots and draw deed to them; also stake the lots, one at a

To summarize the feelings of myself and most councilmen and mayors for the past 11 years, we would certainly welcome a good active cemetery association to take over the care of the cemetery, such as we see working in other area towns. Citizens simply do not contribute to regular cemetery operation when it is city financed, with the exception, of course of the trust fund, already mentioned. This fund's interest might could be utilized at some future colored flowers and candles time. As of date, it has been left unused so that it could increase for the future.



AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GOREE, TEXAS REQUIRING THE DEMOLITION, CLEARANCE OR REPAIR OF BUILDINGS WHICH ARE DELAPIDA-TED, SUB-STANDARD OR UNFIT FOR HUMAN HABITATION AND WHICH CONSTITUTE A HAZARD TO THE HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE OF THE CITIZENS OF GOREE, TEXAS, AND ESTABLISHING MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR CONTINUED USE AND OCCUPANCY OF STRUC-TURES, AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC NOTICE TO THE OWNERS AND A PUBLIC HEARING, AND PROVIDING FOR ASSESSMENT OF EXPENSES OF THE CITY ON THE LAND AND RECOVERY OR REMOVAL AND REPAIR EXPENSES, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY IN ITS ENACTMENT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GOREE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: The City of Goree, Texas has adopted the 1969 edition of the Southern Housing Code and the 1973 edition of the Southern Standard Housing Code for the purpose of promulgating a comprehensive system of modern, up-to-date building, plumbing, housing and gas inspection and regulation within the City of Goree, Texas, designed to promote the health, safety and general welfare of the Goree Community. For the purpose of administering this Ordinance, the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969 and the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1973 are hereby adopted and incorporated herein as fully as if set forth at length herein, and from the date on which this Ordinance shall take effect, the provisions of such Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969 and such Southern Standard Housing Code of 1973 shall be controlling in the use, maintenance and occupancy of all dwellings, dwelling units and/or structures within the area of jurisdiction of the City of Goree, Texas in administering this Ordinance except Section 103.2 of the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969 which, though not repealed by this Ordinance, shall not govern the procedure under this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. Sub-standard buildings or structures may be ordered to be and shall be vacated, repaired, or demolished and cleared under the following conditions, regulations and procedure:

(1.) When it shall come to the notice of the City Council of the City of Goree, Texas that a building or structure is sub-standard within the terms of the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969 and/or the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1973, the said City Council may cite said owner of such building or structure or his authorized agent or representative to appear and show cause why such building shall not be declared to be a sub-standard building or structure, and why he should not be ordered to vacate, repair, remove or demolish and clear such building or structure. The date of such hearing shall not be less than thirty (30) days after such citation shall have been made.

(2.) Such citation may be served by delivery of a copy thereof to the owner, or the person in possession, or if such premises be unoccupied, by attaching a copy of such citation in a place of prominence on such building or structure.

(3.) On the date set in such citation for hearing, hearing shall be had, and on a basis of such hearing, the City Council of the City of Goree, Texas shall determine whether or not such building or structure is a sub-standard building or structure, and then, in that event, the City Council of the City of Goree, Texas shall issue such orders as shall appear reasonably necessary to prevent said building or structure from being a hazard to life or property and to eliminate the said building or structure's sub-standard qualities.

**SECTION 3.** The following standards may be followed in substance by the City Council of the City of Goree, Texas in ordering repair, vacation, and demolition and clearance.

> (1.) If the sub-standard building or structure can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer be in a condition which is in violation of the terms of the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969 and/or the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1973 and this ordinance, it shall be ordered repaired.

(2.) If the sub-standard building or structure is in such condition as to make it dangerous to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of its occupants or of the public, it shall be ordered to be vacated.

(3.) In any case, where a sub-standard building or structure is fifty (50%) percent damaged or decayed, it shall be removed or demolished, and in all cases where a building cannot be repaired so that its existence will no longer be in violation of the terms of the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969 and/or the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1973 and this ordinance, it shall be demolished and cleared or removed.

SECTION 4. In any case, where the City Council orders a sub-standard building or structure repaired or demolished and cleared or removed, and the owner of any

such premises or building or structure which is sub-standard fails to correct, remedy or remove such condition within the time specified by the City Council of the City of Goree, Texas, the City Council may order such work or make such improvements as are necessary to correct, remedy or remove such condition or cause the same to be done and pay therefor and charge the expenses incurred thereby to the owner of such lot or premises. Such expenses shall be assessed against the lot or real estate upon which the work was done, the improvements made, or the demolishing and clearing or the removal of sub-standard buildings and structures accomplished. The doing of such work by the City or the ordering of same by the City Council shall not relieve such person from the prosecution for failure to comply with notice under Section 103.2 of the Southern Standard Housing Code of 1969.

SECTION 5. Whenever any work is done or improvements are made or any sub-standard building or structure is repaired, demolished, cleared or removed by the City under the provisions of Section 4. above, the Mayor on behalf of the City shall file a statement of the expenses incurred thereby with the County Clerk. Such statement shall give the amount of such expenses and the date or dates on which the work was done, or the expenses incurred and the cost of demolishing, clearing, repairing, or removing the sub-standard conditions or sub-standard building and/or structures. When this statement is filed with the County Clerk of Knox County, Texas, the City of Goree, Texas shall have a privilege lien on the lot or real estate upon which the work was done, or improvement made, or repairs made, or sub-standard building repaired, removed, or demolished and cleared to secure the expenses thereof. Such lien shall be second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements, and the amount thereof shall bear interest at the rate of ten (10%) percent per annum from the date the statement was filed with the County Clerk of Knox County, Texas. For any such expenditures, expenses and interest, suit may be instituted against the owner or owners, but the City may not recover any removal expenses by forcing sale of the subject land or realty. The statement of such expenses made herein and filed with the County Clerk, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended for such work, improvements, repairs, demolition, clearance or removal.

SECTION 6. Neither the City of Goree, Texas nor any authorized agent, servant, nor employees of the City of Goree, Texas acting under the terms of this Ordinance shall be liable or have any liability by reason of orders issued or work done in compliance with the terms of this

SECTION 7. It shall be the duty of the Mayor of the City of Goree, Texas to enforce the orders of the City Council under this Ordinance by filing action in the appropriate Court of this State when so authorized by the City Council.

SECTION 8. Any person who shall use or fail to leave a building or structure which has been ordered vacated under the terms of this Ordinance, or who shall enter an area around such building or structure that has been declared to be dangerous where notice of such declaration shall have been posted and/or any person who shall interfere or hinder the vacation, repair, or demolition and clearance of any building under the terms of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and liable to fine, and upon conviction of any such violation, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred and no/100 (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day's violation shall consitute a separate and distinct offense. In case the owner or occupant of any sub-standard building or structure ordered vacated, repaired, or demolished and cleared under the terms of this Ordinance shall be a corporation and shall violate any provisions of this Ordinance, the President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer of such corporation, or any member, agent or employee of such corporation, shall also severalty be liable for the penalties herein provided.

SECTION 9. If any article, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid, or be held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any part of the provisions thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or held to be unconstitutional.

SECTION 10. Inasmuch as this Ordinance is deemed to be in the best interest for the public health, safety, comfort, and general welfare of the City and citizens of the City of Goree, Texas, this Ordinance is to become effective immediately. The Ordinance Rule requiring the reading of an Ordinance at three (3) separate meetings of the City Council be, and the same is hereby suspended as to this Ordinance; that this Ordinance be, and it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and that it shall take effect and be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as provided by law, and it is so passed and ordered.

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
