The only safe thing to do if you are approached is to check with your local Better Business Bureau or Association of Commerce."

GREENVILLE, TEXAS, EVENING BANNER: "What of the future? Bayard L. England, president of Edison Electric Institute, says that air conditioning, dustproof and insect proof, will be as common as radio, and the push-button equipment will be more completely automatic than is dreamed of now. Thus the home manager will have still more time for community affairs and enjoying life. And perhaps, with those electric brain machines, the men will have time for extra activities-such as darning their own socks."

MEDICINE IN 1952

The past year was "one of exceptional progress in medical science." That statement was made by Dr. Edward J. McCormick, who was recently installed as the 107th president of the American Medical Association. He cited several outstanding medical achievements, such as the progress made in developing a vaccine against all of the known polio viruses.

Going into the health picture as a whole, Dr. McCormick then said: "Today we find it necessary to review our estimates and definitions of old age and human usefulness.

"The horizons of medicine are unlimited! Research workers are making magnificent progress in all fields. Spectacular devices such as the mechanical heart and lung and the mechanical kidney demonstrate man's ability to ferret out the long hidden secrets of the human body. I can perdict with confidence that the doctor of the future will do much of his work in the field of dis-

ease prevention." One of the AMA's intensive current activities lies in expanding medical education-with private, not government, funds. Plans are now under woy for the establishment of several new medical schools. To quote Dr. McCormick again, "The trend is away from centralized government dom-

ination. As Americans, let us keep it that way by supporting and promoting all voluntary, private activities at the national, state and local levels" That is the one sure road to ever-improving medical care.

ONE THING IS CERTAIN

At various times, surveys have been conducted to find out what the general public thinks businesses earn in the way of profit. Some of these surveys have concerned retail trade. And it has been learned that many believe the typical retailer pockets as much as twenty-five cents out of each dollar spent with him.

The retailer would be a mightly lucky man indeed if that were true. But it isn't. In 1952, for instance, the nation's department stores, after taxes, averaged but 2.4 per cent of sales. In 1951 the figure was 2.3 per cent. In other words, every time you spend a dollar in a general merchandise store only a fraction more than two cents belongs to the owners. All the rest, almost 98 cents, goes for merchandise, wages, taxes, rents, and all the other costs that are an inescapable part of running a business.

Profits may be a trifle larger than this in the future, or they may drop even lower. But one thing is certain. So long as we maintain the free competitive system, profits will be moderate.

OLD TRICK

Next time you hear someone damning the real or alleged shortcomings of American business, and demanding more government interference with the free enterprise system as the cure, it would be well to remember a recent statement by Secretary of Commerce Weeks.

This top-level official observed that, for more than 20 years, private enterprise has been "burdened by government, shackled by government, punished by government and then blamed by government for not performing as many miracles as it could have, had it been free."
