### IN TOUCH

Are you capable of resisting Satan when he tempts you? Many feel they cannot say "No" to the devil, and one comedian made a fortune coining the phrase, "The devil made me do it!" Yet the Bible is explicit when it tells us Satan can be resisted (James 4:7). The scriptures plainly say that with each temptation God provides a way of escape, so that we might not be overcome (1 Corinthians 10:13). Temptation is Satan's avenue of approach, his weapon. Here are a few short suggestions on resisting when tempted.

Never underestimate or overestimate your strength. Temptation can overpower even the strongest disciple. Consider the apostle Peter and Jesus' prediction about him in Luke 22:31-34. Our Lord's closest friends were overpowered by the devil's wiles.

Be sure to avoid evil companions. Your companions will influence the way you act. 1 Corinthians 15:33 says, "Evil companions corrupt good morals." We have heard the adage, "If you run with the goats, you should expect to smell like one". Some contact with the world and the ungodly is necessary, but watch the temptation to participate in their actions.

Don't neglect your prayer life. God is listening, if you will only talk to Him. Some say they can't speak to God because of a lack of something to say, and yet Romans 8:26 assures us that the Holy Spirit will intercede for us when we just can't find the words. But heed this warning: "God doesn't listen to sinners, but to worshippers doing his will" (John 9:31). We shouldn't expect God to listen if we choose to be habitual sinners.

Keep on studying the Bible. Some teachers would have you to believe that only an expressed faith in Christ alone will save you. Studying the Bible is the only way we can be sure we are doing God's will and obeying ALL the commands given to us by his word. The Bereans were commended for their study (Acts 17:11). Paul commanded study (2 Tim. 2:15), and we are instructed to be able to answer for our faith (1 Peter 3:15). God is speaking through his word, and our faith is strengthened by studying it (Romans 10:17).

Always remember God is watching. He is our closest

witness to our actions. The Hebrew writer (4:13) says that "all things are naked and open before Him to whom we must give account". God watches, not as a policeman waiting for wrong, but as a father who cares for your needs.

Say "NO" immediately to temptation. "NO!" is the only language Satan understands. James 4:7 tells us to resist the devil and he will flee from us. A psychology teacher at the college I attended used to say, "What is long in mind, is soon in hand." Don't let Satan catch you off guard by allowing yourself to hesitate. Learn to say "No."

Know what sin is! Make yourself a mental list at least. God listed many sins in Galatians 5:19-21, 1 Corinthians 6:9-10, and Romans 1:29-32. These lists include everything from drunkenness to dancing to envy to disobedience to parents. It would do each of us good to know what is wrong or right in God's eyes.

Finally, avoid as many temptations as you can. Familiarize yourself with the characteristics of your temptations. If you are like David in 1 Samuel II, you would want to watch your idleness; if you were like Elijah, you would want to be wary of loneliness (1 Kings 19). When we know to look for temptations, they can be handled easier.

God wants all men to be saved (John 3:16), and none to perish (2 Peter 3:9). Yet we cannot be saved when we continue in sin (Isaiah 59:1, 2). Let us pray that Satan and his temptations may be overcome through our faithful service and obedience to God's commands.

# Mogulettes Represent Munday At State Meet

The Mogulettes, Munday High School, and the town of Munday were represented well this past weekend at Austin State Track Meet by three outstanding young ladies.

Vickie Tolliver was on the winners stand for the first time this year, winning first in the shot put with a throw of 40'11", setting a record in the 4 kilo shot-put. Previously, Vickie had placed fifth and fourth at the state meet. "Vickie is a senior this year and hopes to be able to continue her track in college," commented Coach Danny Diggs.

Caroline Myers made her third trip to the state meet this year, winning for the third time and setting another record in the 800 meter run with a 2:15.2. "Caroline is one of the most promising young track athletes I have seen," stated Coach Diggs. "Caroline has much potential because of her speed and quickness that many middle distance runners are not blessed with having. Caroline has been instrumental also in helping our team's mile relay with some tremendous anchor legs, helping us to third and fourth finishes at region the last two years," he con-

tinued. Julie Myers made her fourth trip to state this year. This is a feat no other young lady from Munday has ever accomplished. In fact, very few men or women in the state of Texas can lay claim

to this honor. Julie has won the mile three times at state - twice setting new records. This year, Julie was second to the miler from Leonard, in her bid to win four consecutive state titles in the mile.

Coach Diggs made these comments, "Julie Myers is as fine an all-around track athlete as there is in the state. She has made it to region with good throws or times in five events last year and four events this year. She is one of the fiercest competitors I have ever seen - male or female. She does not like to come in any place other than first. This year Julie was in the finest condition of her career. She ran the fastest time at the state meet of her career and I know she, as well as myself, congratulate the young lady from Leonard on winning the mile because we know she earned it."

## Playnights Set For Knox County

Playnights, the Knox County 4-H Horse Show, and open horse shows have been set by the three Knox County Arena Associations. The annual Knox County Open Youth Horse Show has been set for June 21 at Benjamin. An Open All-Breed Horse Show will be held at the Knox City arena on July 19.

The Knox County 4-H Horse Show, which is limited to Knox County youth, will be held in Munday this year on June 7, starting at 5 p.m.

Playnights, which usually draw contestants from a wide area of the Big Country, this year will include barrels, flags and poles with three additional events scheduled for each playnight. They will get underway at 8 p.m.

There will be an open division in addition to the usual age divisions, which are pee wees, 8 and under, juniors, 9 - 12; and seniors, 13 - 19. The contestants age on January 1, 1980, determines in which division he will compete. Contestants of any age may compete in the open division.

The season's playnights will get underway at

Munday on May 10. Barrels, flags, poles, open end barrel crawl race, keyhole race, and keg roping race will be the events for the opening playnight.

Knox City's first playnight will be Friday, May 16, as the UIL Banquet is set for Saturday. In addition to barrels, flags and poles, Knox City's playnight will feature got deribbining races, potato races and calf and steer riding.

A Rope-A-Thon and playnight will be held in Munday on May 31. The rope-A-Thon, which will feature jackpot team roping, tie-down, ribbon breakaway roping and steer stopping will begin at 5 p.m. An open jackpot barrel race will also be featured. The regular playnight events will begin immediately following the Rope-A-Thon.

Knox City will have a playnight on June 14, at which the added events will be goat tying, steer daubing, and sled racing.

Benjamin will host the playnight set for July 26 at the arena there. Additional events have not yet been determined for this playnight.

Munday's last playnight of the season will be held August 2, with Knox City hosting the season's final playnight August 9.

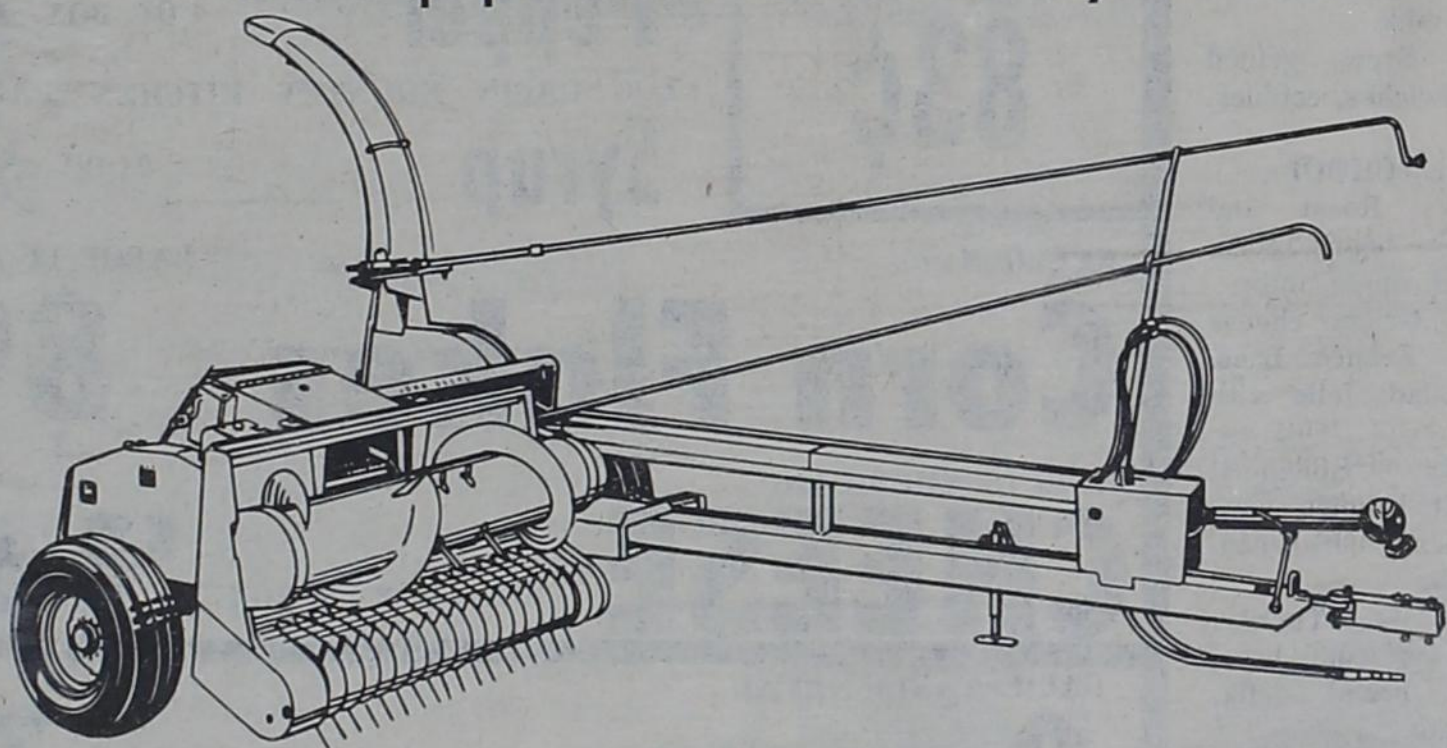

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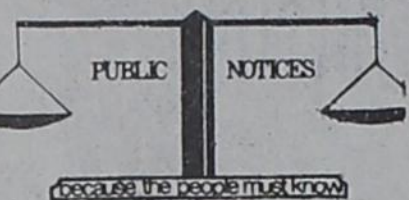
