Most any person can remember a mother love that even surpassed all human understanding,

So it was, we thought, this impelling motherly love that was the force behind the actions of Barbara Timm of Wisconsin as she undauntedly proceeded with her plans to visit her son who is one of the hostages held in Tehran.

In France, she obtained a visa and received permission to enter Iran.

It was at about this juncture that President Carter placed a ban on American travel to Iran as part of his government's sanctions program.

She continued her journey, since her lawyer said he believed the ban might not apply to the Timms, because they began their trip before the ban was imposed.

In Tehran, she was granted permission to visit her son and spent better than an hour with him.

This was, in our opinion, the climax to a motherly love instinct that would not be denied. And up to this time she had our sympathetic concern. Had she then departed Iran as soon as possible, the climatic events would have been completed.

But no!

When a heroic attempt was made, and failed, to rescue her hostage son and all others held prisoners in the American Embassy in Tehran, Mrs. Timm was shown on television with some Iranians, whom we believed to be inhuman to the last degree, denouncing her own governmental officials for and publicly apologizing to the officials President Carter's for action!

But the "greater love" did not stop there.

In his ten years as head coach at Midwestern he has been to the district tournament seven times, and to the National tournament four times. Coach Stockton also serves as the Athletic


