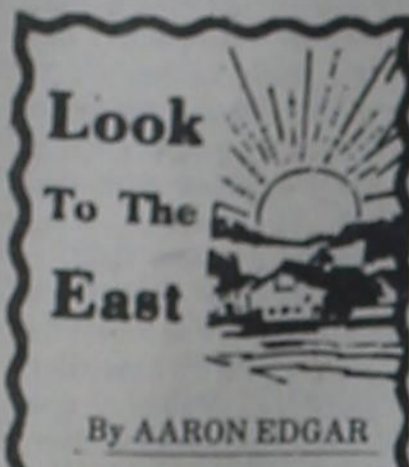

Of chief concern to everybody: How to combat with the heat!

This 100 degree-plus temperature creates a trying situation, one that is not eliminated by a snap of the finger.

And we've had two weeks or more of it! During the latter part of the week, the temperature dropped some. It got below 110 degrees.

Crops are burning up. Yards and gardens are burning up, and people are doing likewise. Deaths from the heat are increasing.

People are seeking, and finding, relief in every possible way.

The best way we could conjure up has been to get the air-conditioner going, give it some help with a circulating electric fan, mix up a big batch of ice water, freeze in the favorite chair and make as few moves as possible.

Even the thought of freezing in the chair brings about a portion of relief!

We've remarked a number of times that we'd hate to be a house roofer during this spell. And, you know, it started pretty soon after that hail storm that spelled disaster to a majority of roofs in Munday.

Before the heat got so severe, folks would put in a pretty good eight-hour day on top of Munday homes. The youngsters didn't seem any for the worse because of this.

If there was a breeze, it was usually more prevalent from the housetop. Sweat from the body (it got so hot that people quit perspiring and starting sweating) would moisten the clothing, which provided some relief.

Some of the boys doing the roofing wore no clothing above the waist - and this would have spelled disaster for us! We can't expose our body to the sun like that.

During the last week, however, we've noticed that the roofing business came to a halt after mid-day. The heat was too intense. A person whose home got a new roof said to the workers: "I think you've earned every penny of your pay!"

Places in Wichita Falls (and maybe other cities) hatched up another idea for those suffering most severely from the heat. They have provided heat shelters for those who had none, such as swimming pools, air-conditioners, etc.

A church in Wichita opened its doors and turned on air conditioning for just such people who were looking for a cool place. The pastor announced that the church would be open from noon to 5 p.m. daily as long as high temperatures prevailed.

A lounge and refreshments were being provided and a kitchen and television were available. Going still another step further, a telephone number was given so people needing transportation to the church could call for this service.

This is solving the heat situation for a number of folks.

But we'll have to wait until September to find out who shot J. R.!

## Munday And Knox City Show Gains

Figures revealed in a preliminary census count, which is subject to change, show a loss of 664 people in Knox County during the past decade. Reported figures for 1970 were 5,972 people in the county, while this figure dropped to 5,308 in the 1980 census, the loss of 11.1 percent.

Munday remained the highest populated town in the county, but showed a gain of only nine persons, from 1726 in 1970 to 1735 in

1980. Knox City showed a gain of 40 persons, up from 1536 to 1576 during the past 10 years.

Benjamin showed a loss of 47, and Goree's loss was 46, with the four towns showing a total loss of 44 persons. The preliminary report was also given by divisions. In division 005, Benjamin, Gilliland, Truscott and Vera, there was a drop in population from 905 in 1970 to 678 in 1980, or 25.1 per cent.

Goree (div. 010) included Goree and Hefner, a drop from 808 to 616, or 23.8 per cent. Goree's loss was from 538 in 1970 to 492 in 1980.

Knox City (div. 015) showed a gain of 0.1 per cent, from 1824 to 1826.

Munday (div. 020) including Munday, Gillespie and Rhineland, showed a loss of 10.1 per cent, from 2435 to 2188.

Outside the four incorporated cities, the county population was 1244 in 1980, showing a loss of 640.

These counts were taken from a computer printout dated June 28, 1980, and received from the Bureau of the Census dated July 2, 1980. Tabulations were solely for review purposes, it was stated, and are subject to change.

Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. First business was consideration of persons for 1980 City Tax Equalization Board. After discussion, Hardin moved for appointment of Goodson Sellers, Varney Moore, and Garon Tidwell as the City of Munday 1980 Equalization Board. If any member

appointed cannot serve, Paul Pendleton is appointed as alternate. Booe seconded. All members voted in favor.

Swimming Pool operation was discussed. Larry Smith moved that Phyllis Booe James be employed to take over the pool as manager next Tuesday, July 1st. She is to designate her own lifeguards; however, names, ages, and lifeguard certifications are to be submitted to City Hall for approval or disapproval by the City Council. Salary is to be \$400.00 per month for pool manager and lifeguards are to be paid \$3.00 per hour for on duty hours only as lifeguards. Selzer seconded. All in favor.
