Farm Home Destroyed By Fire

Members of the Munday Volunteer Fire Department answered a call Friday afternoon, June 29, shortly after 3:00 p.m. to the rural home of Mrs. Julia Mae Hicks. Knox City Volunteer Fire Department quickly followed, but with both departments working diligently, they were unable to save the home. The fire started in the kitchen area of the house.

Even with Knox City and Munday making the joint effort, water still had to be transported from town, as they ran out. Larry Don Lain, J. L. Hunter, J. E. Hunter and W. J. Roddy were among those working in the fields near the house and saw smoke coming from its roof. These men, along with others who were unidentified, managed to salvage a few items including a TV set, table and some pictures from the den of the home.

Mrs. Hicks has experienced a very personal loss in the destruction of her home as she was in possession of so many beautiful antiques that are impossible to replace.

Munday Fire Department members made three additional calls to the Hicks' fire site, one that night and two the following day. Each time the blaze had rekindled and had to be extinguished.

The firemen also answered an alarm Tuesday, July 3, to a Gilliland grass fire. On Thursday, an unoccupied house in the flats, near the resident of Horce Spells, caught fire and the firemen were able to extinguish the blaze before extensive damage was done.

Hail Cuts Wide Swath of Destruction Near Munday

Summer thunderclouds that formed over an area near Munday rather quickly last Thursday brought welcomed rain as well as damaging hail to areas of Knox County.

Hail that accompanied the rain that started around 5:30 p.m. Thursday did considerable damage to farmland just north of Munday. Hailstones were comparatively small, but they fell with such intensity that they "butchered up" much of the tender crops within the path of the storm.

The hail cut a swath about a mile in width and two miles in length, it was stated. Among the farmers in the area who reported damage were Lonnie Offutt, Chalmer Hobert, Clarence Brown and Joe Tidwell.

Rainfall was varied in much of the area from north of Munday to the southeast. Some pea-sized hail also fell in Munday.

Official rainfall for Munday was reported to be .88 of an inch by Goodson Sellers, local U. S. weather observer, but it was heavier east of the weather station with reports up to 1.40 inches within the city limits. Farmers reported two inches east of town to better than three inches "in the tighland" to the southwest.

Farmers in the hail area said it would be several days before the exact extent of damage to their crops could be determined.

Sheriff Redwine Names Deputies

Knox City Chief of Police James E. Redwine was unanimously selected by the five man Knox County Commissioners Court Wednesday, June 27, for the position of Knox County Sheriff. Redwine assumed the sheriff's responsibilities immediately upon his appointment.

Redwine has served as city marshal in Knox City for several years. Hours after the announcement of Redwine's appointment Chief Deputy Pete Hatfield resigned his post. He cited low salary as his reason for leaving.

According to Knox County Judge Homer T. Melton, the commissioners considered Redwine "the best qualified" of five applicants for the position.

Hatfield was one of the applicants to fulfill the final year and a half of former Sheriff Stone's term. Stone resigned his post

Sand, Wind, and Rain Hit Area Monday Night

Monday night, shortly before 8:30, red sand "boiled" up to the north in the Munday and Goree area and covered everything completely. High winds accompanied the sand and lightning, thunder and a

rainstorm followed quickly. County and City Law Enforcement officers are always out at stormy times watching clouds but the density of the dust and sand made visibility impossible. Therefore, since the National Weather Bureau had notified the officers by telephone that Munday was in a thunderstorm warning, they deemed it good judgement to sound the weather alarm.

In Goree, trees were blown over causing electric meter boxes to be separated from their housing. Electric power went off in Goree at 8:32 p.m. and was restored at 6:27 Tuesday morning. Frank Jackson, and his crew labored all night, as well as two crews from Stamford. Two vehicles and men from Knox City also aided them.

Shingles were blown from roofs in Munday and debris was in the air but no major damage has been reported.

Don't buy brucellosis when you're buying breeding cattle. That's the advise of Paul Beutin of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. With many cattle increasing herd size now, brucellosis can cause 40% fewer calves and 20% less milk in a herd. One test isn't enough, he says. "It takes three weeks to three months and sometimes even longer for an animal to develop a positive reaction to a blood test." The incidence of brucellosis is relatively small in the U. S. with only about one half of one percent infected. One of the problems, however, is 90% of the remaining infection is primarily in 10 states...Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Florida. Cattlemen buying breeding animals from these states should have the cattle tested regularly. It's only good business.

Stenholm Is Opposed To Profits Tax

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm indicated that he voted against the Crude Oil Windfall Profits Tax Act of 1979, because it was unfair to the royalty owner and the independent producer. The bill creates a complicated new tax law that will require additional accounting each month. In most cases, the land owner is the royalty owner, of which there are approximately 28,000 in the 17th District. The royalty owner will pay their share of the windfall profits tax. To tax one specific group of people in this manner is inconsistent with any basic principle of fairness.

The independent producer drills 90% of the wildcat wells and finds 75% of the new fields. Thus, accounting for more than half of all the oil and gas reserves discovered. During the last five years, they have re-invested more than 100% of their wellhead revenues in exploration. These funds come from outside private investors and borrowed capital. No outside investor would put money into a wildcat well, knowing that if a discovery was made, part of the revenue would be taxed-away.

The whole idea of crude oil price decontrol is to stimulate new production incentives with respect to the independent producer. Congress recently voted to use taxpayer's money for synthetic fuel development. Why then, under the guise of a windfall profits tax, are we attempting to take revenues from the independent producer, who presently is investing more than 100% of their wellhead revenues in search of new reservoirs?

Leon "Curley" Strickland, 60, of Knox City, passed away at 3:30 a.m. Monday in the Knox County Hospital following a brief illness. He was born January 13, 1919, in Chathan, La., and had lived in Knox City since 1923, where he was a painting contractor. He was an Army veteran of World War II, a member of the American Legion, and a member of the First Christian Church.

Funeral services were scheduled for 10 a.m. Thursday from the First Christian Church, with the pastor, Rev. Darrell Marion, officiating. He will be assisted by Rev. Randolph Wilson. Farm And Ranch News

Several fields of both dryland and irrigated cotton were checked for cotton pest by Emory Boring, Area Extension Entomologist, and I this past week. Cotton is growing well and older cotton has reached the 1/3 grown square stage.

Beneficial insects are abundant in most fields with spiders, lady beetles, nabids and minute pirate bugs being observed most often. Fleahopper numbers ranged up to 25 per 100 terminals. Cotton was setting squares even in those fields whose heavier fleahopper populations were found. Control measures were not needed in any of those fields.

Fleahoppers are most damaging during the first week of squaring. After most cotton plants have set squares, larger numbers of fleahoppers can be tolerated. The need for fleahopper control should be based on the number of fleahoppers present and the level of square damage.

No boll weevil damage was found. Populations are expected to be generally light at least until the second week in August.

No bollworm eggs or larvae were found. The bollworm moth egg-lay prediction will be available by July 23 pinpointing peak bollworm egg lay.

Flea problems are widespread on pets, in homes and in home landscapes due to

prolonged cool, wet conditions this spring.

Successful control procedures must include both population reduction and continuing preventive measures. 1. Chemical control of adult fleas on pets and around the home must take place at the same time. Wash pets with a medicated soap or dust them with an approved flea preparation. Extend residual kill with a flea collar. For spot sprays in the home use propoxor (Baygon) and ronnel as an area spray around the home.

2. Treat infested yard areas with carbaryl (Sevin), Propoxor (Baygon), ronnel or diazinon. Be sure not to infect pet food.

3. Retreatment of infested areas is extremely important to keep fleas under control. Retreat at 10-14 day intervals until flea populations have been eliminated.

July 15 Date Of New Postal Regulation

July 15 is the deadline mailers have to use up small and undersized envelope and cards, Fort Worth Sectional Center Manager JACK D. WATSON reminds customers.

Starting that date, the Postal Service makes its new size standards effective. Cards and envelopes measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long no longer will be mailable and will be returned to sender.

Extra large First-Class envelopes - more than 6 1/8 inches by 11 1/2 inches - will incur a 7-cent surcharge if they weigh one ounce or less.

Postmaster WATSON advises these oversized pieces will be returned to the sender if they do not carry the 7-cent surcharge but can be remailed if the surcharge postage then is affixed. However, delays for these pieces can be avoided if mailers make sure that sufficient postage has been applied.

The new regulation also will prohibit thin or flimsy cards. After July 15, the cards must be at least seven thousandths (.007) of an inch thick.

"Small envelopes and flimsy cards tend to jam mail processing equipment and cause damage to other mail as well," explained Postmaster Watson. "The surcharge on oversized or odd-shaped pieces is intended to cover the added cost of handling such pieces which must be processed manually," he said. "These standards have been established to allow the Postal Service to process mail more efficiently and this will mean better service for customers."

Crackdown On Fraud Cases

James Harper, Manager of the Vernon, Texas Social Security Office today announced two more convictions in the 5-state southwest region as part of SSA's continuing crackdown on fraud in the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

Mr. Harper said that Susan M. George of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma pled guilty in federal court at Oklahoma City to one count of having given false information about her own and her spouse's work and income in order to qualify him for SSI benefits as a needy disabled person. Mr. Harper also stated that Estelle Holmes of New Orleans, Louisiana pled guilty in federal court at New Orleans to one count of providing false information about her work and income to qualify for SSI. Sentencing in both cases will take place in July, he added.

"The maximum sentence for a single count of SSI fraud is one year in jail and \$1,000 fine," said Mr. Harper. "SSI is a program administered by the SSA and is designed to help needy aged, blind, and disabled individuals. We are doing all we can to assure that only the needy receive SSI benefits. Other similar fraud cases are now under active investigation."

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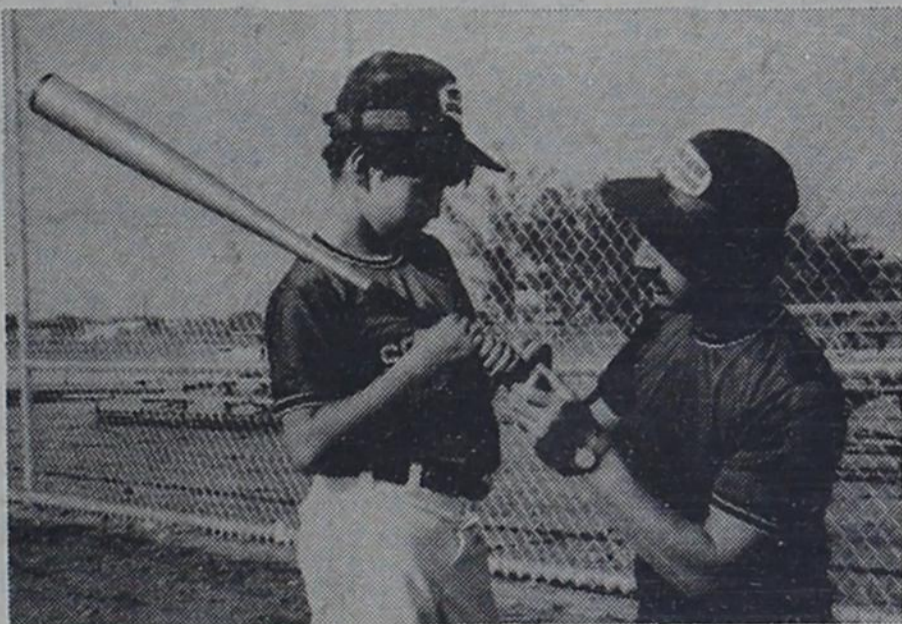

Juicy and succulent, cantaloupe is a great summertime cooler.

In addition, half of one cantaloupe contains only 60 calories yet furnishes the entire day's supply of vitamins A and C for healthy gums, tissues and skin, and normal growth and vision.

Try the five-point test for good cantaloupe eating - which means, examining the netting, slip, color, firmness and aroma.

For peak flavor, the cantaloupe should be well netted. The netting is the raised, grey-brown pattern over the surface that stands out above the green or yellow skin color.

The best-eating melons have high, raised netting over some part of the surface.

And, it will not have large areas that are "slick" without any netting - except for the side that lay on the ground.

You may also see "stripes" of green or yellow - or in riper melons, even stripes of a brownish color.

Look for a "full slip". This is a circular scar where the stem was detached when the ripe melon was picked.

A stem scar that retains part of the stem or has been gouged out of the melon indicates that the melon was not ripe when picked from the vine.

A cantaloupe is usually at its tastiest when the skin color is yellow or turning yellow. Green color on a well-netted melon with full slip indicates that the melon is not ready to eat.

To check for firmness, squeeze the melon gently.

You may need to use both hands to keep from bruising it. If it yields a little, it is ripe. But avoid a really soft melon or one with large, soft bruises.

Aroma may or may not be present. If it is present, and in combination with the other points for good cantaloupe eating, you can expect a tasty melon.

Store cantaloupes in the refrigerator in a closed plastic bag or container. The melon's odor if taken up by other foods if not stored in a closed container during refrigeration storage.

You may wish to freeze a few melon balls for later use while they are in peak season and at their lowest price. Use only top-quality fruit.

Cut into cubes or melon balls. Cover with a cold sugar syrup using two cups sugar to four cups water or pack in bags with no sugar. Expel as much air as possible from the bag, seal and freeze immediately.

When using frozen melon balls, serve them partially thawed, especially those frozen without sugar. Melon frozen in sugar syrup will maintain texture better and stay firmer after thawing.

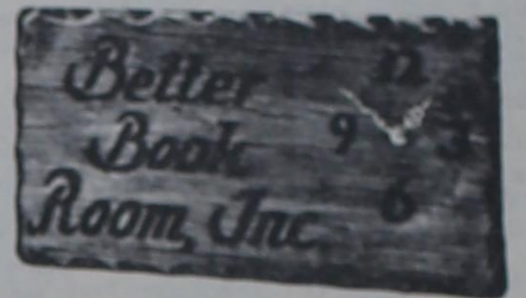

Grain Sorghum Target Price Is Increased

Grain Sorghum Producers Association was informed last week that the 1979 sorghum target price has been increased 4 cents, thus raising it to \$2.34 per bushel. This announcement came in a USDA press release dated June 29, following GSPA's request for an investigation into USDA's failure to comply with the intent of the law, as stated in the Agricultural Act of 1977.

In the release, Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland was quoted as stating, "The target price for 1979 crop grain sorghum has been increased from \$2.30 to \$2.34 per bushel. The action was taken to comply with the legislative intent that the same cost of production formula be used to adjust sorghum target price as is used to adjust the corn target price. A recent examination by the Economics Statistics and Cooperative Service of the cost estimates and calculations leading to the sorghum target price adjustment, shows that it should have been set at \$2.34."

After careful calculations of the formula, GSPA believes that the sorghum target price for 1979 should be set at \$2.40, rather than \$2.34. Elbert Harp, Executive Director of GSPA, stated that legislative hearings into this matter (originally scheduled for July 10) would still be held sometime this month. "We are not going to be satisfied until we get the increase that we deserve," Harp stated.

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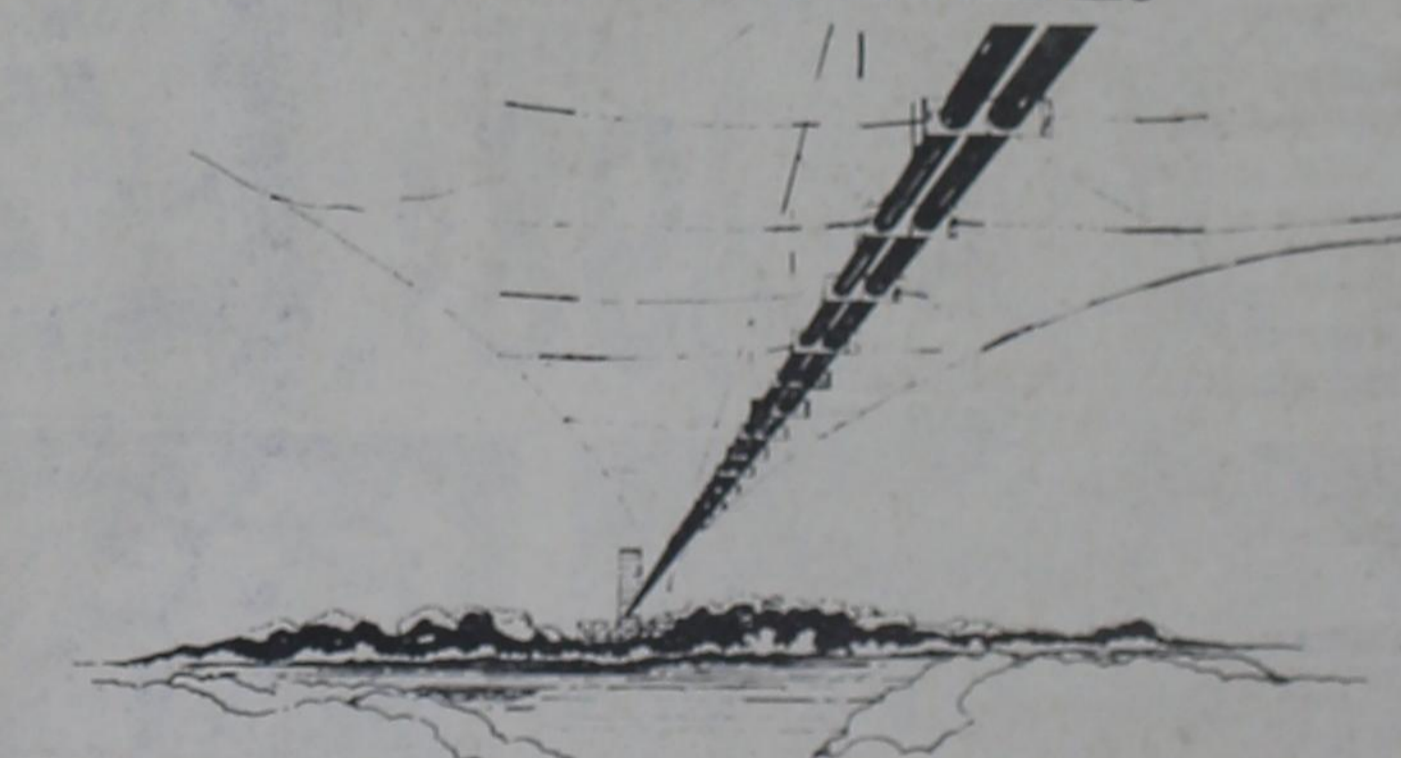


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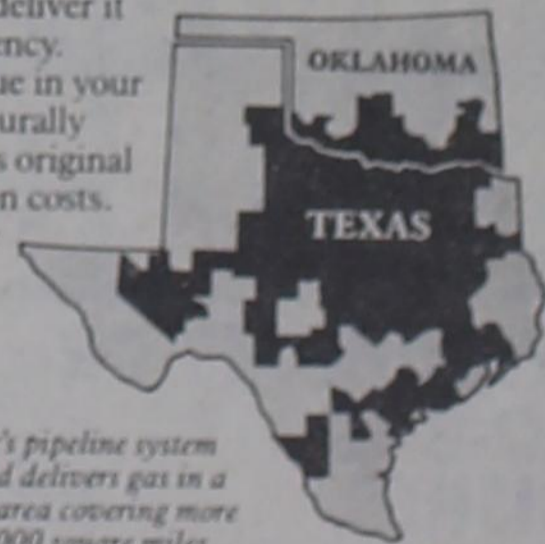


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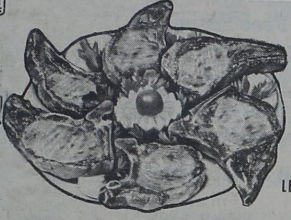
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
