This incentive was originated by the Institute during the Bicentennial year. Their efforts shall be continued in the future to challenge every rural town to: (1) to be self-dependent; (2) to motivate local citizens to become active in townhall meetings to identify and solve problems; and (3) to adopt long-range programs for future development."

Curly Awalt reported "that the state meeting was one of the most enlightening and interesting he had ever attended." In continuing he added "it seemed to me that Munday is already far ahead of so many other towns in working out solutions to problems. We certainly impressed others by telling of our ambulance problem and that it took only a few short months to accomplish our goal by providing emergency medical services to our area."

Dr. Kingston then related his impression of the meeting in saying "it takes a lot of courage and hard work on the local level to achieve the goals set by any community, but Munday, in the past, has proven that its people are a determined group and can, by working together, achieve almost any goal they choose. Town-hall meetings are simply brainstorming sessions whereby everyone can share ideas on what we need and how to get the job done. ## Council Approves Fiscal Year Budget

City of Munday met Tues- in future years. day, April 18 in special session at 7:00 p.m. at the City Hall.

Members present were: Mayor Dale Selzer, and aldermen Von Marr, Donald Hobert, Ray Lynn Hardin, M. M. Booe and Jessie Andrade.

Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order and Donald Hobert led in prayer. Minutes of the April 11, 1978 regular meeting were read and approved with one minor correction at the top of page 193 in the minute book which should have shown one abstention. (Now

Mayor Selzer stated that he, former Mayor Clint Norman and Walter Hertel, city administrator had previously reviewed the budget and he recommended its approval without any increases other than property additions to the tax role at this time.

Hardin recommended that

a fire truck fund be commenced this year by setting aside \$8,000 from the operating funds to Munday Fire Department Fire Truck Funds. Discussion. This is to be reviewed each year and the City's needs and financial status would help determine if additional funds and in what amounts could be

After discussion Marr moved that the proposed budget for the fiscal year April 1, 1978 to March 31, 1979 be approved and adopted as previously submitted and published in the Munday Courier as follows: cash balance, all funds \$57,985 and invested funds \$130,869; total \$188,854 plus estimated receipts \$293,440; less estimated disbursements \$292,388 for an estimated surplus total of \$189,906; motion states one exception, this being a transfer of \$8,000 from operating funds to Munday Fire Department, Fire Truck Fund, this to be invested in C.D.'s or approved securities for 6 years to earn interest. New surplus total after transfer of funds is \$181,906. (This is estimated as an increase in all funds of \$1,052 over one year ago). Andrade seconded the motion. Carried with all in

favor. The Council next discussed swimming pool operation and legal implications involved. Hobert moved that hiring an operator and lifeguard approval be delayed at this time to further check this out. Marr seconded. All for.

Next discussed was operation of Corporation Court. The April 6 minutes were discussed and reviewed in regard to hiring a full time city judge. Legal aspects as to requirements of office were also discussed. After discussion, Booe moved that the City continue as we are now operating and as also set out in the April 11 minutes and that we continue at this time on this basis. Hardin seconded. All members for.






## Andrade Advances To Regional In Tennis

CORRECT TAX RETURN ERRORS AFTER FILING ON FORM 1040X

Discovered an error after filing an income tax return? If so, correct the mistake by filing a Form 1040X, the Internal Revenue Service

The forms are available at local IRS offices or can be obtained by using the handy order blank in the tax package.

Some of the more common tax return errors that can be corrected on a 1040X include failing to report income, forgetting to claim deductions, or mistakes in the amount of credit claimed.

Generally, the 1040X form must be filed within 3 years from the due date of the original return or 2 years from the date of the tax payment, whichever is later.





Scientists at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center aren't sure why cement kiln dust increases weight gains in cattle, but cattle that have been fed the dust showed a 28% faster rate of gain than those fed a control diet. But before everyone runs out and buys the dust, which is high in minerals with 27% calcium, the USDA scientists want to do more tests. Research indicates they have a long way to go in understanding the mineral requirements of livestock, and they aren't sure yet what is happening to the animal eating the fine powder. Studies show that steers fed a low quality diet containing cement kiln dust gain weight faster, ate less feed and produced higher grading carcasses than those on a controlled diet. Gross studies of the liver, spleen, rumen, kidneys and heart of steer fed dust diets showed no abnormalities. Cement dust has not been approved by regulatory agencies as a feed additive.
