Look To The East

"For Whom the Bell Tolls."

Thinking of the title of this book by Ernest Hemingway, and the movie production that followed, awakened our thinking to the fact that many, many times our lives are influenced by a bell, or bells.

In business or in our home life, it's the little bells that keep our actions on an even keel.

There's the little alarm bell that tells us it's time to arise and begin a new day. We're fortunate in that, after about 50 years, we do not have to depend on this bell every morning. But we became so accustomed to a certain period that usually we awaken without the little noisemaker.

Then, there's the door bell which rings at many unexpected times. We hesitate to answer it because we don't know if it's a welcomed guest or a book peddler or vacuum cleaner demonstrator.

The telephone bell is another awakener. Rarely are we startled by its ring, unless it awakens us from a sound slumber in the wee small hours. Then we answer with apprehension, like some people do upon the receipt of a telegram, fearing that it's a harbinger of bad, or unpleasant news.

Some of our every-day appliances are equipped with bells that awaken us to the fact that they need attention.

Back in the hot type method of producing a newspaper, the *linotype* was equipped with a tiny bell that warned us we were near the end of the assembly. Many times, we needed to drop a hyphen, send the line through the machine and start a new line.

This old typewriter just now rang a bell, telling us to shift the carriage!

"Wedding Bells Popular in Month of June". This is a headline that appeared in last week's Courier. We associate bells with weddings; yet, many times weddings are performed without the sound of bells.

Our most popular historic bell is the Liberty Bell—that famous bell of the State House at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence of the United States in 1776. It was originally cast in England, was recast in Philadelphia in 1753, and upon it are the words: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land, to all the inhabitants thereof."

The revered bell was cracked July 8, 1835, while tolling the funeral of John Marshall, U. S. Chief Justice, and has been used on rare occasions since.

However, it was struck on June 6, 1944, when Allied forces landed in France. Special sound equipment picked up the tone, amplified it, and broadcast it to all parts of the United States.

Our public schools are governed by bells to a large extent. The ringing of bells warns of the beginning and ending of class periods, of recess, the noon break, and back to classes again.

There's a bell mounted on a pole just west of the city hall that has a bit of history, itself.

It was used on a locomotive in its prime; and, for some reason, it became the property of Dwight C. Key, who donated it to the Munday Chamber of Commerce. It was rung on some occasions—like, when to remind Chamber of Commerce directors that they should assemble in a meeting right away.

We remember another occasion: When E. W. Harrell was city secretary, there was a period when he was given the chore of ringing this bell on the hour every hour on election day to remind voters to get out and vote. It must not have worked too well, because the idea was soon abandoned.

If the rope was left hanging within reach of the younger set, local boys would have a picnic ringing this bell at every opportunity!

Bells are also associated with Christmas, as in the song "Jingle Bells". This song makes a right spritely little tune, unless it's "sung" by The Singing Dogs, as in times past!

Some churches use bells today. There's one in the belfry of St. Joseph's

Council Okay's Increase In Munday Housing Units

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met June 17, 1981 at the Munday City Hall at 9 p.m. in special session.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen Donald Hobert, M. M. Booe, Larry Smith, Ray Lynn Hardin, and A. Dale Selzer.

Members absent: none.

Mayor called the meeting to order. Minutes of the June 9, 1981 regular meeting were read. Smith moved for approval as written. Booe seconded. All in favor.

A discussion was held regarding Munday Housing Authority taking over 24, 2 bedroom units of Munday Home Development Corporation. M. L. Wiggins, Tommy Harper and Robert Nix met with the Council to discuss the proposal. Mr. Wiggins explained: Rental charges for the units are now \$115.00 to \$144.00 a month (based on income) under Plan 1; also income limitations are approximately \$12,000. Under the proposed Farmers Home Administration plan to transfer to Munday Housing Authority it would change to Plan 2 (income limitations then approximately \$15,000.); also interest would be changed from 3% to 1%. Further Discussion.

A. Dale Selzer made a motion that the Council pass a Resolution allowing the Munday Housing Authority to increase the number of units from 75 to 99 units. To clarify in lieu of tax payments: In lieu of tax payments by the Munday Housing Authority states that: Each such annual payment in lieu of taxes shall be made after the end of fiscal year established for such projects and shall be 10% of the amount of total rent collected, minus utilities. (Payment shall be shared by City of Munday and Munday Schools.) Smith seconded. Voting yes, Hobert, Selzer, Hardin and Smith. No, Booe. Carried.

Frank Jackson of West Texas Utilities Company met with the Council to explain the street lighting contract and to

C. H. Blackmon Employed As Jailer For Knox County

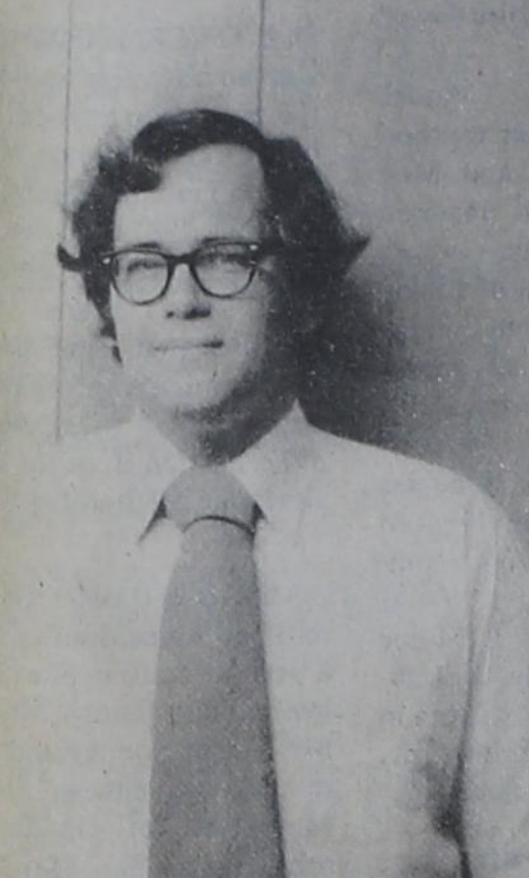

Dr. David Nagel Now With A&M Munday Research Station

Dr. Earl Gilmore, resident director of research at the Chillicothe-Vernon Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, has announced that Dr. David (Dave) H. Nagel has been appointed to the position of assistant professor and superintendent of Munday Research Station.

Dr. Nagel began his duties in Munday on Friday, June 19. He recently completed the requirements for his PHD degree in soil fertility at the University of Florida in Gainesville, Florida.

Munday Research Station is one of the group of stations in the rolling plains that is connected with the Chillicothe-Vernon Center. "Dr. Nagel's responsi-

bilities will be to administer the operation at the Munday station and conduct research in cropping systems, giving major emphasis on crops and soils," stated Dr. Gilmore.

He has a bachelor's degree from Northeast Louisiana University in Monroe and a master's degree from the University of Arkansas.

Dr. Nagel and his wife, Judy, are natives of New Orleans. They have one daughter, Sarah, who is two years old.

Dr. Nagel stated that he and his wife are very pleased to be in Texas to make their home. This is, in fact, their first time to be in the state. He said, "I am looking forward to getting acquainted with the people in the community."

Oil Activity Is Picking Up!

Oil activity in Knox County seems to be picking up, with the announcement last Sunday of four locations in the county. They are as follows:

Sun Oil Co. of Abilene will drill 1-42 Mamie McFaddin Ward as a new field wildcat in Knox County, going to 6,200 feet. Location is four miles west of Benjamin and five miles east of 2,623-foot Tannehill production in the Little Giant field.

Glenn W. Cooper of Seymour, active driller in the Munday area for several years, has announced two locations for new field wildcats near Munday, each slated for a depth of 2,300 feet. One is 2 1/2 miles northeast of Canyon production in Knox City North field and six miles northwest of Munday. The 2 H. H. Partridge and No. 3 Partridge are located on the same section.

Six miles southwest of Truscott, R. L. Adkins Corp. of Sweetwater will drill a 6,200-foot new field wildcat. It is the No. 1 Margaret Todd and is 2 1/4 miles southwest of Bend Conglomerate production.

Haskell Editor Gives Program On Fire Safety

How safe is your home?

The numerous fire hazards in the ordinary home, as demonstrated by Don Comedy, editor of the Haskell Free Press, awakened local Lions to many dangers in our homes.

Comedy, who is a member of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, was one of 42,000 firemen who took training in fire hazards at Texas A&M last year. He demonstrated the potential hazards of some household items contained in aerosol cans, including insect repellants, WD-40, Lysol spray, hair spray, and others. These items burst into flame immediately when sprayed across a lighted candle. Comedy said there are over 1,200 items in the common household that are potential fire hazards.

"The common use of gasoline," he said, "makes us complacent regarding its hazards. Many times, we have it stored in containers too close to an open flame, or use it carelessly in many other ways; yet, it is one of the most dangerous fire hazards of them all."

Comedy was invited to Munday by J. Weldon Smith, program chairman for the day, to present this enjoyable program. Eighteen persons were present to hear him.

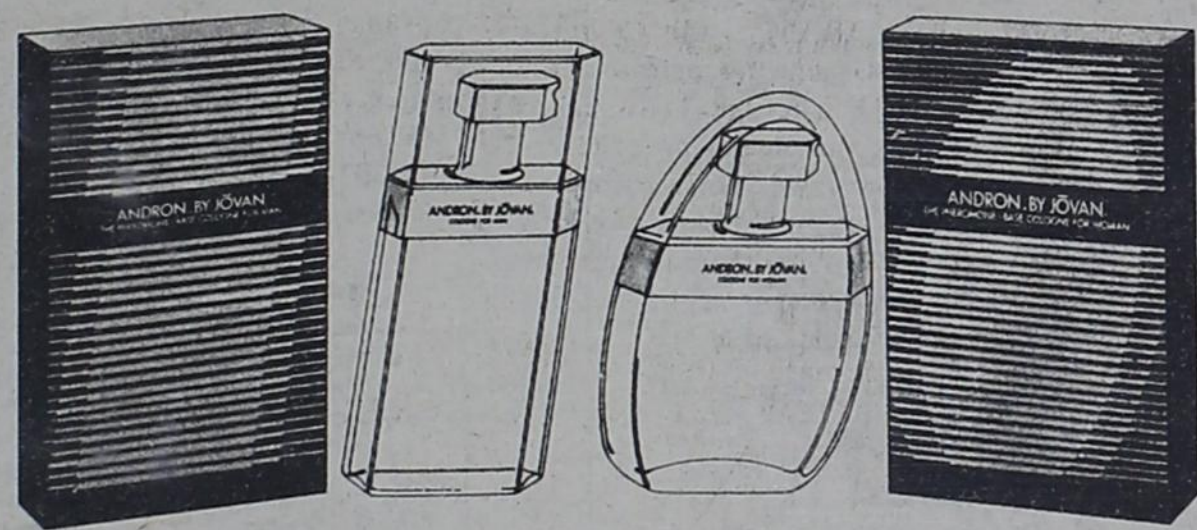

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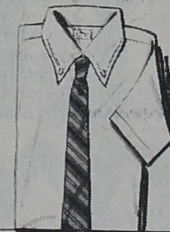

Local Draft Board Members Being Sought

As part of the revitalization of the Selective Service System, Colonel Paul Dean Aikin, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, says he expects almost one thousand individuals and organizations in Texas to receive a letter from him asking for help in recruiting local board members.

Colonel Aikin, a National Guard Officer, has been ordered to active duty for approximately 90 days for the purpose of recruiting a minimum of 690 local board members in Texas. Each of the 254 counties in the state must be represented on the 138 boards that will be established.

The Colonel's letter, sent to individuals, civic and ethnic organizations in all parts of the state, asks for names of highly respected and responsible citizens who may volunteer their services as local draft board members. Persons being considered for membership must:

--Be citizens of the United States between 18 and 60 years of age.

--Not be members of the Armed Forces (including reserve and retired status).

--If previously a local board member, having served not more than 15 years.

--Be willing to attend a few hours of training and later to devote an adequate amount of time serving on the boards without pay (probably one to two hours per month, or less).

Colonel Aikin urges each individual and organization receiving his letter to respond as soon as possible with names of qualified persons, both men and women. He also asks anyone interested in serving to contact him by mail at Box 5218, Austin, Tx. 78763 or phone Area Code 512-397-3952.

The boards will not be activated immediately, but selected members will be placed in standby status for possible future need.

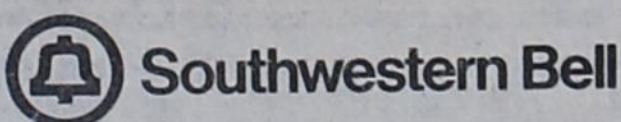

Area Wheat Report

Last weekend, and again during the first part of this week, additional rain was received over much of the Hard Red Winter Wheat Belt, further delaying the harvesting of the new crop and leaving much uncertainty regarding the extent of quality damage to the new crop until harvest has been completed.

As of Friday it was estimated that the wheat harvest is approximately 70% completed in Oklahoma, approximately 65% in Texas, and 20-25% in Kansas. It was reported in an estimate by the governor of Kansas that the May 9-11 freeze damage to Hard Red Winter wheat in 81 counties would be approximately 127 million bushels. The Enid Board of Trade reported that as of June 17, 2,731 car loads of new crop wheat had been received at Enid.

Maynard Moore, operator of Farmers Grain Co-op, reported his firm received its last load of 1981 wheat last Sunday.

During this week the market gradually increased a few cents by midweek, and has since slowly decreased, closing today approximately four cents per bushel below last Friday.

Wheat export inspections for the week ending June 11, 1981, were 27,222,000 bushels, compared to 22,883,000 bushels for the previous week. Total loadings since June 1, 1981, were 43,651,000 bushels compared to 28,106,000 bushels for the same period a year ago.

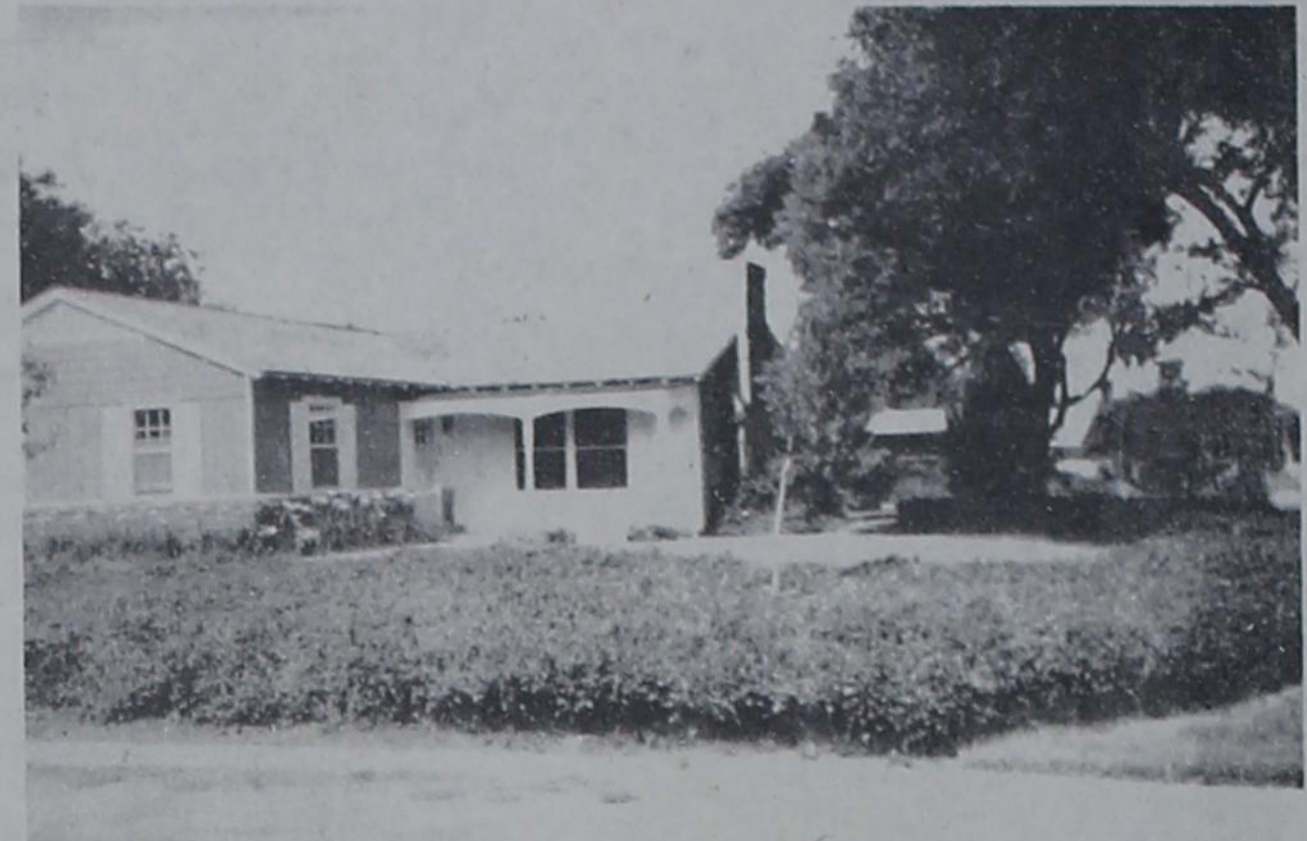
