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

Cotton Scouts Hired To Monotor Insect Activity like to participate are invited to sign up

Cotton producers in the Rhineland area have decided to employ cotton scouts to monitor insect activity. Other cotton growers who would like to have their cotton scouted for insects may contact Vernal Zeissel, chairman of the Knox County Boll Weevil Association, or Tommy Decker at Rhineland Co-op

The purpose of this program is to gather information for making better judgment toward cotton insect control. It is actually aimed at making fewer spray applications.

The cotton scout will check fields at four locations weekly. Critical bollworm flights inspections will be made more often in irrigated fields. The cost of this scouting will be \$1.50 per acre for irrigated cotton, and 75 cents per acre

The scouts are being trained by Emory Boring, Extension Area Entomologist. A report date sheet will be left with the producer each week, showing the amount of insect activity.

Time is short, so cotton producers need to sign up immediately. They need to sign up and deposit their checks at the Rhineland Co-op Gin. Growers have already committed enough acres for a definite "go ahead" with the scouting

Basic Skill Performance By Munday Pupils Given

Performance of Munday pupils on Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) was explained at the June meeting of Munday Independent School board. TABS was mandated by the 66th Texas Legislature, and this is the second year for the statewide test. Last year fifth and ninth graders took the test. Third graders were added

this year. Douglas Myers, superintendent, was prepared to discuss performance by Munday pupils, explaining results from across the state were not available. He indicated release of all results are delayed to prevent comparison of different school

districts. More important is for educators to look at results of their own school system to determine strengths and weaknesses of curriculum and to make necessary adjustments to meet the needs of pupils. Pupils are tested for their skills in mathematics,

reading and writing. Mastery of all three areas are achieved by 81% of the ninth graders who took the test. From among ninth graders, 85% mastered mathematics; 70% mastered reading, and 88% mastered writing.

Results of tests given third and fifth graders were revealed somewhat differently, indicating less importance to overall achievement, and more importance to specific areas of the three broad testing areas.

graders on the mathematics section showed a high of 96% mastered units of measure and a low of 58% mastered geometric terms and figures.

Mastery by fifth graders on the reading section ranged from a high of 96% on use of context clues to a low of 59% on ability to recall facts and

On the writing section, 100% of fifth graders showed mastery of spelling, while 70% showed mastery of correct English usage.

High and low percentage cited illustrates extremes of

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mathematics ranged down to 57% mastery of ability to select units of measure.

On the reading section. third grade results ranged from 96% master of ability to recognize words through phonic analysis to 48% mastery of ability to identify main ideas.

Third graders taking the writing test showed 100% mastery of spelling, while 70% demonstrated mastery of punctuation.

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

Medicare Medical Insurance Premium Now Eleven Dollars

The monthly premium for the medical insurance part of Medicare increased to \$11 for the 12-month period starting in July, Social Security District Manager in Vernon said.

In spite of this increase, people should know that they are paying less than a third of the cost of this insurance. More than two-thirds is paid by the U. S. Government from general revenues, not from social security taxes, Mr. Harper said.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, no matter where they are received in the United States. in an office, home, hospital,

or elsewhere; for outpatient hospital services; for home health care in a person's home; and for other medical services and supplies not covered by Medicare hospital insurance.

For most covered services, medical insurance pays 80 percent of the approved charges after the patient has incurred \$60 in approved charges--the annual deductible--for the year. Because of the way approved charges are figured and because of the rates in inflation in medical care prices, however, approved charges are often less than doctors' or sup-



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

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



Throwing these nutritious foods out is the same thing as throwing away pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and even dollars at meal time.

Try some of these tips to conserve food you spend money for--real savings depend on your storage and preparation habits, as well as on buying:

BUYING

Buy foods in amounts your family will eat for one mealor amounts you can set aside in the freezer or refrigerator for later without wasting.

Don't get carried away buying fresh foods on special if you can't store them properly to prevent spoilage.

Fresh peaches at 49 cents a pound are no bargain if you buy four pounds, eat three pounds and throw one pound

> STORAGE Wrap leftovers properly

for freezer or refrigerator. In the refrigerator, always cover foods with wax paper, foil or plastic wrap--or store

Foods stored uncovered lose moisture and can pick up flavors from other foods.

Foods for the freezer should be packaged in moisture, vapor-resistant packaging such as plastic containers, foil or freezer

Label packages before putting them in the freezer.

Bread needs special storage, too. Store breads in their original container or in an air-tight container.

It's true that breads keep longer in the refrigerator, but they also can become stale there. For toasting later, this is no problem. But for other uses, freeze bread. Freezing is best for long-term storage.

Keep fresh vegetables in the refrigerator crisper or a plastic bag--all except potatoes and dry onions. Potatoes and dry onions need cool, dry storage.

Keep milk fresh by placing it in the refrigerator immediately after shopping. Don't leave milk sitting on the counter--even during mealtimes!

Store flours and grains in containers with tight-fitting lids. Whole-wheat flour becomes rancid rather quickly, so keep it in the refrigerator for long-term

PREPARATION If your family doesn't like leftovers, prepare only the amount of food they will eat at one meal.

Involve family members in meal planning. Ask them what and how much they will eat. A cooperative effort is a definite key to saving money on the food bill.

Here are two food-savingsuccess steps to use in preparation itself:

For "no like bread crust" families, trim off the crust and save it to toast for croutons or bread crumbs atop casseroles--if the family will accept crust any of those


